USDA To Help In Providing Housing For The Homeless

Rural residents who are homeless or inadequately-housed families may now have a chance to become homeowners under a plan being adopted by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Frank B. Stroud, FmHA County Supervisor, said. Under the plan, special emphasis will be given to homes that have been in FmHA's inventory at least 18 months. Inventory homes will be offered to public bodies, including housing authorities and nonprofit community-based organizations, for rent to the homeless; or in some cases, FmHA will rent directly to the individuals, Mr. Stroud said. In addition, homes which were recently acquired by FmHA into inventory but have not yet been repaired will also be offered for lease to the homeless. The families who obtain the housing from the public bodies or nonprofit organizations may apply to buy the house at any time during the lease.

Those who rent directly from FmHA will pay rent based on their income and will be given the opportunity to buy the house they rent. Mr. Stroud said that many homeless people work and have incomes, and have the potential to become homeowners. "By helping people find a decent place to live, we also help eliminate the cost to taxpayers of maintaining vacant houses," Mr. Stroud said. FmHA officials in Texas are seeking organizations which are interested in providing housing to the homeless and to inadequately-housed families. Information concerning housing for the homeless may be obtained from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 1608-A East Main, Clarksville, TX - (903) 427-5646. The FmHA office in Clarksville is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

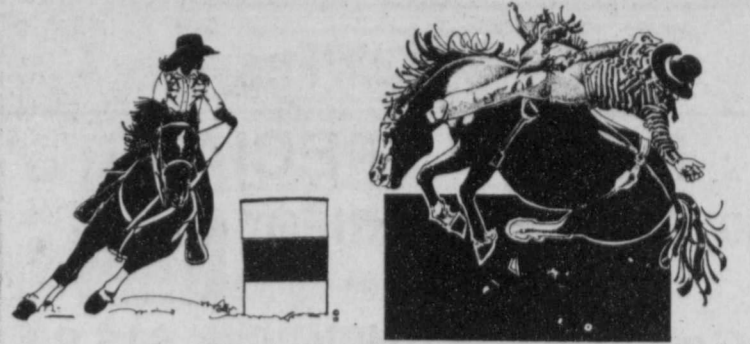





The 73rd regular session of the Legislature has concluded. A new Penal Code has been enacted. Parts of it will take effect September 1, 1993, and part September 1, 1994. Over the next few weeks, I hope to bring to you the major changes in our criminal law.

The biggest change is the creation of our fourth class of felony called a "State Jail Felony". It will be the lowest class of felony. "State Jails" will be prison facilities that have standards in between regular prisons and our county jails. A "State Jail Felony" would carry a penalty of 180 days to 2 years and up to a \$10,000 fine.

The idea behind "State Jail Felonies" is to house the less violent offenders in these "jails". This, in turn, would free up prison space for violent offenders. These violent offenders would spend longer periods of time in prison than they do now.

For example, a life sentence for a capital murder offense would require 40 actual calendar years as a minimum time spent in prison. Murder, indecency with a child, aggravated kidnapping, aggravated sexual assault, aggravated robbery and any crime connected with the use of a deadly weapon would require the lessor of 30 calendar years or 1/2 of the maximum sentence for the particular crime. This part of the new law would be good. It would keep these kinds of criminals locked up and off our streets.

My next article will discuss the pros and cons of the "State Jail Felonies" and the types of crimes that will be in that category.

State Jails-what are they? Senate Bill 532 created the "State Jail Division" as part of our prison system. They are state jails and not county jails. They will house convicted felons. The prison system will manage the State Jails or contract with a private vendor or the commission court of a county for the construction, operation, maintenance or management of a State Jail Facility. Also a Community Supervision and Corrections Department (probation department) may, through grants, contract, operate, maintain or manage a State Jail Facility. These jails shall adopt reasonable rules for work proram and programs for rehabilitation, education and recreation. A State Jail Facility may be located on private land or land owned by any government entity. Nine regions in the state shall be set up to provide these State Jails.

Prisoners may be confined in State Jails for no more than two years. These State Jails are designed for the less violent offenders. Some of the offenses that will be State Jail felonies are:

Criminally Negligent Homicide, Reckless Assault-causing bodily injury; Interference with child custody; criminal nonsupport; Criminal Mischief if value of damage is \$1,500 but less than \$20,000; burglary of a building; theft of \$1,500 or more but less than \$20,000 or cattle, horses, etc. and under \$20,000, or theft of a firearm; theft of services if \$1,500 or more and less than \$20,000; unauthorized use of motor vehicle; credit card abuse; delivery of marijuana is over 1/4 ounce and up to five pounds; delivery of cocaine under 1 gram.

Punishment for these offenses have been downgraded to State Jail Felonies with two year minimum sentence.s The other side of the coin is there will be more room for violent offenders to serve longer periods of time in Texas Department of Corrections.

Red River County Sheriff Starts Garden At Jail

Red River County Sheriff Bob Edrington has a luscious vegetable garden located next to the Red River County Jail Facility in Clarksville. Sheriff Edrington asked for volunteers from his inmates to work the garden. The jail population averages about 22 inmates per day. Three inmates are chosen from the volunteers.

In the spring the plot for the garden was tilled, non-commercial fertilizer was applied to the soil and the plants or seeds were planted. Sheriff Edrington says that the first produce from the garden was harvested last week. The garden sports peas, squash, okra, even cantaloupes. The fresh produce is used to supplement feeding the facility's inmates. Inmates harvest, pull weeds and water the plants to work off part of their time. If the inmates work in the garden

for one day, Sheriff Edrington counts that as two days time served. Sheriff Edrington states "Not only do the inmates enjoy fresh vegetables with their meals, served right out of the kitchen facility, but they can work off time and I think the garden gives them a sense of responsibility. Even though inmates who worked to start the garden aren't still here to reap the produce, all who work do it with a sense of pride".

"Taking Care of God's Creation" Was Bible School Theme

"Taking Care of God's Creation" was the theme of the Bible school sponsored by First United Methodist Church of Bogata and the Cuthand Methodist Church on June 15, 1993, in Thomas Park. Over 80 workers and students took part in this one-day outing.

The Bible school started in a traditional manner at First United Methodist in Bogata with songs, pledges, and a short skit presented by Brooke Belcher, Alison Foster, Jill Foster, and John White.
