Water Department Matters Subject Of Bogata City Council

Mayor Mildred called the meeting of the Bogata City Council to order at 5 PM on Monday, July 12. All members were present.

Buck Ramsey offered the Invocation. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and the paying of bills was approved.

In the matter of old business, the installation of telephones at the water and sewer plant was decided against. The main reasons being that there is no way to keep vandals from destroying them and there would be no way to monitor long distance calls.

A clarification was made on the question of cutting off water for a day or two and turning it back on at no charge. The only reason this can be done is if there is an emergency (a broken water line possibly). At this time the city would be able to turn it off for a short period only.

Talco Campus Wins Performance Award

Talco School has received the 1993 TSSAS Performance Award, designed to identify and give public recognition to public schools in the state of Texas for student academic performance gains. In all, only 377 of 6,184 campuses statewide were eligible for this award.

Talco was chosen from the 377 eligible campuses. The school will receive a certificate and monetary award of \$30,000 to be presented to Principal Johnny Gable on July 17 by Texas Commissioner of Education Skip Meno, at a formal ceremony in Austin.

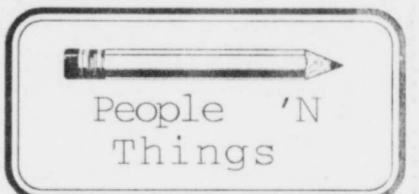
Activities should get under way at 11:00 a.m., and last until everyone wears out.

Makes It's Own Crust Custard

Spray Pam
Corn Meal
2 eggs or 1/2 cup eggbeaters
3/4 cup sugar
1 1/4 cup milk or canned skim milk
1 teaspoon salt
1 tsp. flavoring (vanilla or lemon) or you can use
1 tsp. lemon juice
2 Tablespoons flour

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Spray pie pan with Pam or other spray. Be sure to coat well. Put in about a heaping tablespoon of corn meal, and shake it around the way you do flour in a cake pan. Discard loose meal. In a mixing bowl, beat eggs or substitute and sugar until fluffy. Gradually mix in flour and salt. Add milk and flavoring. Beat until well mixed. Pour mixture into pie plate, and cook until set and light brown. It should be firm. Cook approximately 30 minutes. Note: If you use the eggbeaters and canned skim milk, the pie will be practically fat free.

Tostados

1 1/2 lb. hamburger
3 cans refried beans
2 small cans taco sauce
Tortillas
Non fat sour cream
Lettuce
Tomatoes
Onions
Cheese

Brown meat, drain. Add salt and pepper to taste. Add beans and sauce; let simmer for 15 min. Serve on warm tortillas with lettuce tomatoes, onions, and sour cream. Good with picante sauce.

Fruity Pizza

1 roll of vanilla cookie dough
1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1/3 cup sugar
1 tsp. vanilla

Slice cookie dough and press into a pizza pan. Bake according to directions on package. Beat cream cheese, sugar and vanilla until fluffy and spread over baked, cooled cookie crust. Arrange fresh strawberries, banana slices, orange sections and pineapple chunks in circles on dough. You may want to use Fruit Fresh to keep bananas from turning. Canned pie fillings could also be used for expediency.

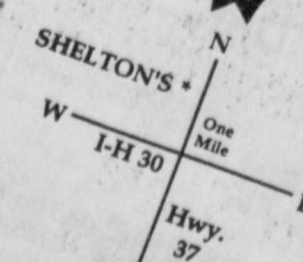

Red River County Adds "Seek & Find" Dog To Canine Unit

Red River County Sheriffs Department has added a German Shepherd (also known as German Police Dogs) dog named Jasper to bring the county's number of canine units to two.

Jasper's handler, Kevin Jenkins reports that although Jasper can be used for seeking narcotics, his main purpose will be to track scents.

The two year old dog is a native of Germany and trained in Germany. He responds to commands given to him in German. Jenkins has had to learn eight commands in the German lan-

guage before beginning work with the dog.

Jenkins reports that the dog will be worth every cent of the \$7,500 cost if one lost child or senior citizen can be tracked and found.

Jenkins says that Jasper can be used as an attack dog, for crowd control or to recover a discarded weapon (for example one which was used in a crime).

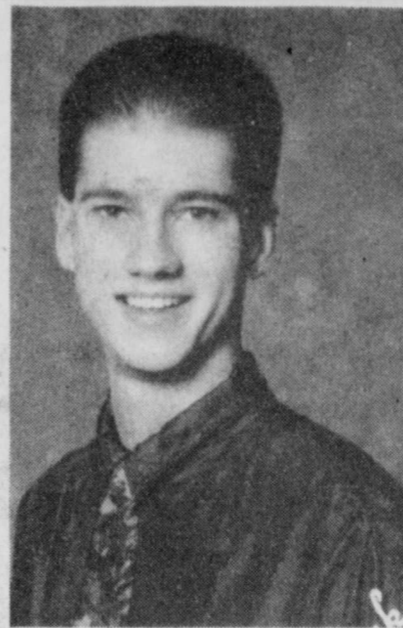
He can also be used to track fugitives. As an example if a "bad guy" commits a crime, or escapes from jail and hides in the woods or a building

Jasper is capable of tracking that person.

Jenkins says that the \$7,500 purchase price paid for the dog came entirely from contributions. Vet expenses and even dog food, he points out, are donated.

Although Jasper is stationed in Red River County, Jenkins stated that he will be available to help neighboring counties with seek and find duties.

They also hope to be available to demonstrate the dog's talents to special group presentations in the near future.



Mark Allums, Signed To Play At Southwestern

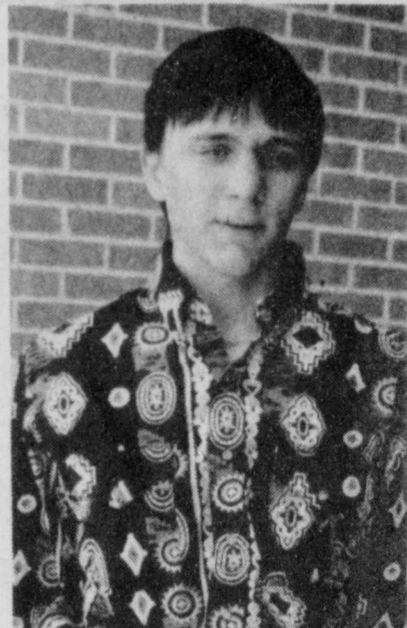
Allums To Play For Southwestern U

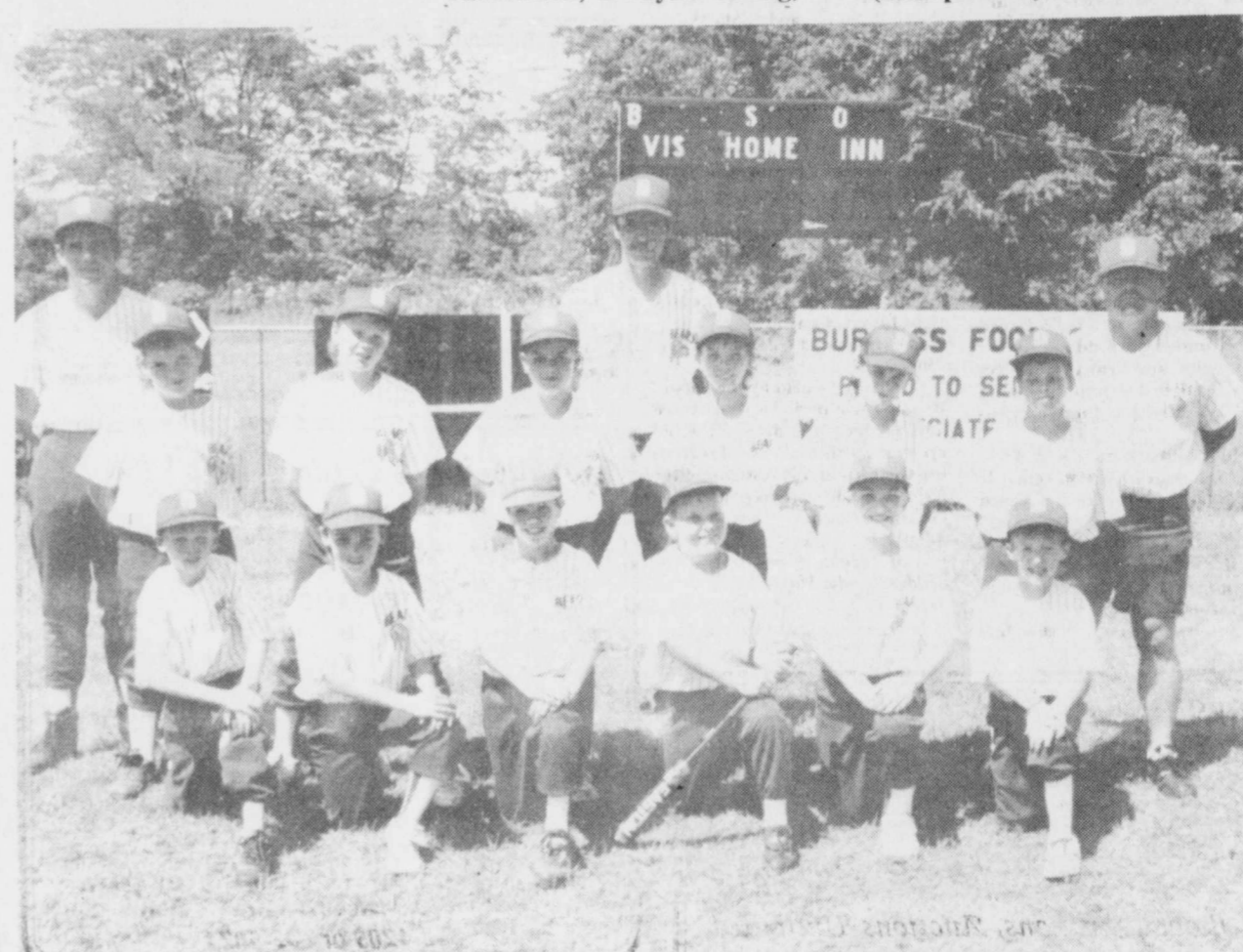

Comments From Your County Attorney
Jack Herrington
The down side of State Jail Felonies.
Previous articles explained what State Jail Felonies are and what some of the crimes are that fall in the State Jail category. What is the down side of State Jail felony convictions? Upon conviction of a state jail felony, the judge MUST suspend imposition of sentence and place the defendant on community suspension (Probation) for a period of 2 to 5 years.
In addition, a judge may sentence a defendant to jail for 30 days as part of his probation.
Also a judge may require 60 days in a State Jail at the beginning of his probation, or 6 months in a state jail if he has a prior felony, or 1 year in a State Jail if he has 2 or more felonies.
Any of the normal terms and conditions of probation may be placed on a State Jail defendant who is placed on probation.
The bottom line is that State Jail felonies will be automatically placed on probation after conviction. The intent of the legislative is passing the State Jail felony laws is to reduce prison overcrowding. We at the county level will have a greater burden-we will have more probations to deal with. Only time will tell if these new laws will be beneficial to the justice system.

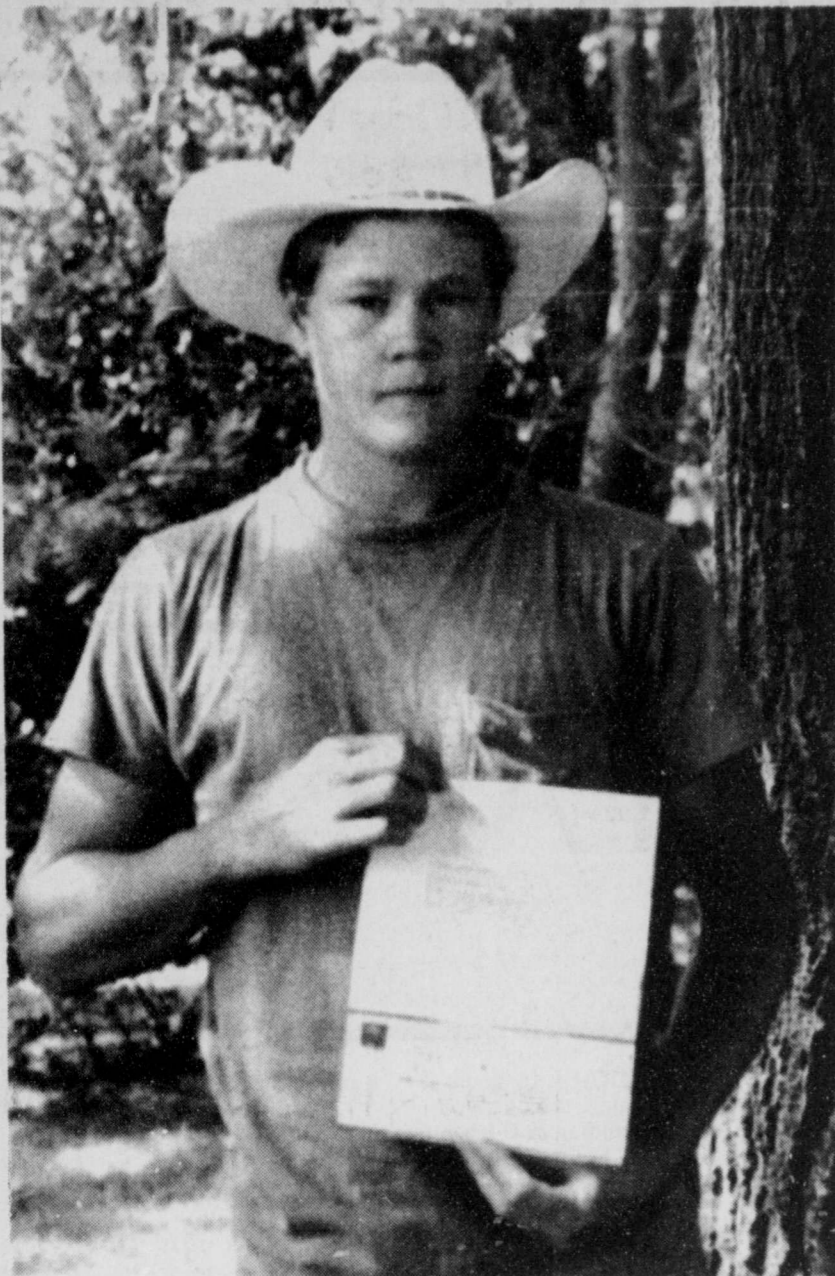
