
also hope to speak within the schools and the community organizations about grief education. We really believe that educating people on how to deal with their losses is a vital part of our job."

moisture. Cloud cover for part of several days dropped the temperature into a much more comfortable level, also.


A chance of more precipitation remains until Saturday, when a new high pressure system will bring clear skies and one hundred degree plus temperatures.

Vandals Hit Rural Red River County Mailboxes

Within the last two weeks vandals have managed to destroy over 20 rural mailboxes in the Pine Branch and Rosalie Communities. Several mailboxes have been hit again after they were replaced.

Destruction of a U.S. Postal Mailbox is a violation of both Federal and State laws. Penalties can be as severe as three years in prison and a \$1,000. fine for each box destroyed.

The Bogata Post Office and the Postal Inspection Service are asking for information concerning the destruction of the mailboxes. If you witness acts of vandalism to mailboxes, write down a description and immediately notify the local law enforcement authorities and then notify the Postal Inspection Service at 817-625-3425.

All persons interested in researching their family history are urged to come and enjoy the evening.



Country Cooking

Well, it finally happened. The ladies from the Woodland Caring and Sharing Club got their recipes in to the news office. I told you all that they would come through. As you read their recipes, you might want to try to remember how their pictures looked in the previous papers so you can picture how they looked preparing their recipes.

While it is probably not exactly germane to the situation, I'll share a couple of things with you that I have learned this past week. The first is that you can add a dab of the fat free cream cheese (the kind in the spread tub) to your fat free pimento cheese and give it an altogether different taste. A spoon of fat free mayonnaise and a spoon of fat free Miracle Whip gives it a better taste than just the mayonnaise. We also made a wonderful mustard dip for things like corny dogs and chicken breast strips by just mixing mustard with brown sugar and adding your favorite spices, anything from garlic powder to cayenne pepper (anything that suits your taste), and heating in the microwave for about 2 minutes, or longer depending on how much you made. You want it to get good and hot first or the sugar will be a little grainy. I also tried corny dogs with the batter made with eggbeaters and skim milk, and a cornbread mix, or from scratch. Just put a spoon of batter in a sprayed corn stick pan, lay a chicken or turkey frank on top of it and put another spoon of batter on

top. Bake just as you would cornbread, but not too brown. If it's too brown, it's hard to eat and the flavor is not as good.

I have also relearned this week about taking care of little boys. I haven't had any little boys in many years, and I've not kept our grandsons much, especially the little one, with our mother around. Our daughter, Chris, has been at Children's Medical Center, in Dallas, with her daughter, Yolanda, so we have had Christopher and Jerred. Christopher can pretty well take care of himself, but Jerred is less than two years old, so his conversation skills are limited. My main problem is his favorite foods. He doesn't have any. Or at least not any that I have found. Christopher eats anything you put in front of him, if it's not beans or tomatoes, or if it doesn't move. I have finally figured out that Jerred will tell you whether he likes it or not. Last night, out of desperation, I opened a can of fruit cocktail and a carton of Blue Bell Ice Cream and put some in a bowl, and just on the chance that he might eat it, I fed it to him in small bites. Every time he got a bite of that good tasting stuff, he would screw up his little face, and look at me with those big brown eyes, and say, "Good." Now I remember the formula: Little bitty kids need little bitty bites. Little boys also have lots of good sugar for old grannies. Have a good week.

Squash Dressing

- 2 cups squash, cooked and mashed
- 1/2 lb. sausage, crumbled
- 1 pkg. cornbread mix
- 2 eggs
- 2 heaping tablespoons minced onion salt and pepper to taste

Mix all ingredients and pour into casserole dish and bake in 350 oven for about 45 minutes or until brown and done to the touch.

Raisin Cream Pie

- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons flour, heaped
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/3 cup raisins, soaked in small amount of water

Whip egg yolks in milk and heat to scalding stage. Do not boil. Add sugar, flour, melted butter. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. When it begins to thicken, stir in raisins. When thick, add 1/2 teaspoon vanilla and pour into baked pie crust, top with meringue made from beaten egg yolks and brown.

Squash Relish

- 8 cups sliced yellow squash
- 2 cups chopped onions
- 2 cups chopped green pepper

1 large jar chopped pimento
Soak squash in 3 cups water and 2/3 cup salt for at least one hour. Pour off brine. Make syrup of 3 cups sugar, 2 cups vinegar, 2 T. mustard seed, 2 T. celery seed. A few whole cloves if desired. Bring to a boil. Drop in vegetables. Bring to a boil again, but do not let cook. Put into hot jars at once and seal. This is very good with beans or peas.

Cornbread Salad

- 1 pkg. cornbread mix, cooked
- 1 small onion or fresh onions, chopped
- 1 bell pepper, chopped
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 1 tomato, chopped
- 2 tablespoons mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 t. pepper
- 1 t. sugar, do not use if you use Jiffy mix

Combine crumbled cornbread with remaining ingredients. Chill. This is even better the second day.

Broccoli Cornbread

- 2 pkgs. cornbread mix
 - 1 pkg. frozen broccoli, chopped
 - 1 cup small curd cottage cheese
 - 4 large eggs
 - 1 stick melted oleo
- Mix all ingredients together and bake about 35 minutes or until golden and done to the touch.

Hunter's Education Course To Be Taught

A Course in hunter education is scheduled for Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday nights, August 30, 31, and September 1, from 6 - 10 p.m. in the vocational Agriculture building at Mt. Vernon High School. Bruce Hunnicutt, a local Vocational Agriculture teacher will be the instructor for the hunter education class.

The course is open to adults and to young people under the age of 18 and will include instructions in hunter responsibility; wildlife conservation and management; firearm, bow, muzzle loading, handgun safety; wildlife identification; game care; survival and first aid; water safety and hypothermia; and other special concerns in hunter safety.

Everyone above the age of 12 who passes the exam with a minimum score of 70 at the conclusion of the course will receive a lifetime hunter education certificate that is recognized by Texas and other states. Those below 12 years of age must take the

course over again for proper certification.

With dove season coming up, and deer season and squirrel season set to begin October, this is a good opportunity for hunters to take the safety course before the fall hunting season gets into full swing Hunnicutt said, "I urge them to get certified now."

Keeping Healthy

Age-Related Macular Degeneration

If you're over 50 and the telephone pole or door frame seem a little bent or crooked, you may have the earliest stage of macular degeneration.

The condition, a gradual destruction of a portion of the retina, affects about two percent of those 50 to 65 years old and about 11 percent of those 65 to 75.

People who have the problem do not become blind, but they may lose the ability to see fine details.

Because early diagnosis is the key to successful treatment, everyone over 50 should have regular eye examinations.

The use of vitamins or zinc to prevent progression of the disease is the subject of many investigations, but at present there is no scientific evidence to support their efficacy. There is also no conclusive evidence about whether blocking sunlight with tinted glasses can help prevent progression of the disease.

The best prevention is a regular eye examination, coupled with awareness of the condition. If you notice a change in your vision, let your ophthalmologist know about it promptly.



The Red River Haven employees are again practicing to take on the Clarksville Nursing Center team in a rematch. The game is scheduled for a later date.


