

The newsletter is filled with stories about the loss of a child, articles on ways to work through grief and personal accounts by parents telling of how they managed to cope. They have an annual picnic in which the whole group gets together with the families of the members and at Christmas they decorate a memorial tree in Bywaters Park which people can bring ornaments in memory of a loved one. The group is funded by donations that mainly go towards publishing the newsletter.

### Rivercrest High Enrollment School Is Up Slightly On First Day


According to reports from Rivercrest High School, the school enrollment was slightly up from last years total with 207 students registered on
