Postal Corner

An Information Column About The U.S. Postal Service, Bogata, Texas

QUESTION: Does 2 Day Priority Mail arrive in 2 days? Is the \$2.90 for Priority Mail a good buy?

ANSWER: No, not always. First, 2 Day Priority Mail is not a guaranteed 2 day delivery. It is not like Express Mail, that is a guaranteed time delivery . Second, Priority Mail does get priority handling while it is being passed through the mail stream. Third Priority Mail is less expense for items that weigh more than 11 ounces and less than 2 pounds.

QUESTION: My son has moved away temporarily and I want to forward his mail to him. Do I need to put additional postage on everything I forward to him?

ANSWER: That depends on the type of mail he is getting. All first class mail can be forwarded. Magazines and newspaperscan be forwarded for 60 days without additional postage. After 60 days postage must be applied. Bulk rate mail can not be forwarded without additional postage. The only exception is an endorsement by the mailer that states: Foward Guaranteed, Return Postage Guaranteed, or Address correction Requested. The postage will be collected at the address where the piece of mail is delivered. This type of endorsement must be handled by a Postal employee. If you have any question about the possibility of any type of mail you would like to forward please ask.
