Limited dietsof meat, breads graced the tables of the most royal. No matter how beautifully prepared, or elaborately served, nothing changed the fact that in winter there was no fresh fruit and very little in the line of veg-

The poor fared even worse, of course, and bleeding gums and scurvy ran rampant. Of course, actual starvation ended many of these ills.

Of a family of five or six children only one or two might survive, even among the wealthy.

The medicines of the time consisted of herbs, and although there was actually some benefit in some of them, the royal household would have given all for a bottle of aspirin and an antibi-

People lived with rushes or straw scattered on the floor, and cold stone walls could be warmed only a little by tapestrys and

wall hangings. The most exhaulted of people, surrounded by doctors armed with ments, would have had a much better chance of survival if they could have gone to the most overworked and poorly funded free clinic in the nation!

The wealthy might own as many as seven complete dresses, while the poor owned only one. The middle class perhaps had one or two outifits. Though the richly dressed might have on a fortune of jewels, pearls, silver and gold they could not wash nor clean them.

The roles of men and women were sharply defined, and women were bartered and used as political pawns by royalty at every turn.

There were no insurance comanies for diasters, no life insurance to aid a widow whose husband died, no Social Security, no welfare.

If a member of court displeased the monarch they might find themselves stripped of all their lands and means of livelihood...if not their life. Filth prevailed, with the poverty

ridden never bathing and the royals bathing perhaps once or twice a

Lice and fleas were a fact of life. and not just on pets, but on hu-

Temperatures were not controlable. No fans in the heat, othing but inefficient fireplaces in the winter.

I enjoyed the book, and I en-

joyed a look into the past. It's strange to think that being "middle class" provides us with a much better way of life than the most powerful and world-controlling people of the past!





Genealogical Society To Honor Henry Stout

Henry Stout was born in Weakley Co. Tennessee in 1799. He left home at the early age of 14. He married Sarah Talbott in Arkansas . In 1819, he moved to Pecan Point, now in Bowie County, but then part of Red River County.

Henry was a unique character in that he was an adventurer, a scout, an Indian fighter, and a guide to early pioneers. He led many pioneer's through the area and taught them how to adapt to the frontier way of life. He taught the settlers to use the bear for more than just meat. To render the fat for lard and to use the hide for covering.

Henry was also a guide for hunting parties. On one trip, he was known to hit a bear in the head with the stock of his gun, breaking it, then killing the bear with a knife.

Henry was in Red River County until the 1830's when he decided to move on. His reason was that the land was becoming too populated. He moved his family to Wood County where some descendants still live.

The Red River County Genealogical Society will honor Henry Stout with a Special Pictoral Cancellation on October 2, 1993 at Clarksville. The cancellation will take place in front of the Post Office. The cost of the cancellation will be \$2.00, and will include an envelope and stamp.

8 link sausages (browned) 1/4 cup milk

in a slow oven Fruit Cobbler

Line Dutch oven with aluminum foil that goes up the sides most of the way. Put any type of pie filling in bottom. Sprinkle lightly with cinnamon, then 1/2 cup brown sugar. Sprinkle dry yellow or white cake mix on top. Pour 1 cup of 7 -Up over the cake mix. 15 briquets on top and 10 under dutch oven for 30 minutes or until done. (or cook in 350 degree oven in pyrex cobbler sized dish)

Chicken Breasts With Mushrooms 6 to 8 chicken breasts (skinless)

1 stick margarine 1 large onion (chopped) 1/2 lb. mushrooms (sliced)

1 can chicken broth 1 can cream of mushroom soup

The grandmother in the back of the house kept hearing the phone ring, but assumed her grandson was just talking with his friends, until she happened to look outside just in time to see all the police cars surounding her house. As I thought about this little boy, I went back to the scene of the accident. I asked questions about the extent of the damages to reassure myself, and when the wreckers and the Highway Patrol showed up and everyone looked as though, it was business as usual, I was able to relax a bit about calling that very serious number.

Jail Space Needed

After nine months in office, our office has sent over 30 people to prison. Juries have handed down stiff sentences in many cases. The public has told us that they want criminals and law breakers off the streets of our

The Sheriff and I are faced with a serious problem. You want criminals in jail and prison, the Sheriff wants them in jail and prison and I want them in jail and prison. We all want poeple who break the law to know that they

This morning there were 33 people in jail in Red River County and one female housed in the Mt. Vernon Jail at a daily cost to you and I, the

Our jail holds 14. We are overcrowded under state jail policy. The jail commission has told the Sheriff that something must be done soon. We are going to be forced by the State to start housing our prisoners in other counties at \$40 to \$50 per day.

Our money would be better spent building a large jail. Many counties face the same problem we do. We only have two choices, build space and house our own prisoners or send them somewhere else and send our dollars with them.

I intend to continue to enforce the law and prosecute those who break


