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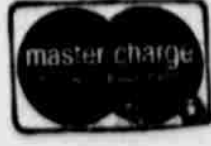

365,000 feet of parallel terraces. 586 acres of damaged land was graded and shaped to reclaim the damaged area, and 79 acres of waterways were reshaped. If you made a request and do not intend to complete the needed repair work, SCS needs to know your intentions. If you have done the work that you applied for, and have not reported its completion to either the AS- CS or SCS offices, please do so at your earliest possible convenience. We still have lots of work to check out that has been reported as finished, so we need to know all that we must do to complete this program by June 30. Many of you have been waiting until wheat harvest is completed to start your work. This is fine, but be sure that you are virtually completed, and reported as such to the ASCS office prior to June 30. SCS technicians have several months after the close of the program to complete our work of checking out, but you have only until June 30th to complete the work. The ASCS office will send out

tended, notification will be sent out via every means that we have. If you made an application for assistance under the ECM program for such repair work as grading and shaping, re-leveling of irrigated land, rebuilding terraces, rebuilding farm ponds, reshaping waterways, and rebuilding diversions, and SCS has not contacted you, please make an effort to contact us within the next few days. To date farmers and ranchers of Haskell County have repaired 15,500 feet of graded terraces, over 2 million feet of standard level terraces, and well over

a letter this week to each applicant that has not been contacted, notifying them of these facts. If you are one of them, please take immediate action. If not, then notify your friends or neighbors that you know as having made applications to "get on the ball" so to speak. We in the SCS cannot get a record to personally contacting the hundred or more applicants that have not yet been contacted. So every one must pitch in and help. We also have work to do under the 1973 REAP and the 1974 RECP, plus keeping up with the progress of 29 active Great Plains Conservation Program participants. Any help that you can give will be greatly appreciated.

Pecan Spray Dates May 24-27

Control measures for the pecan nut casebearer should be applied immediately. The pecan nut casebearer moths emerged over an extended period of time. Therefore a second application will be needed five to seven days following the first application. To further tie down the exact timing of when pecan nut casebearers should be controlled, producers are urged to inspect the small nutlets for the flat light green to white pecan nut casebearer eggs. These eggs

are about the size of a pin head and generally will be deposited on the brown ends of the small nutlets. Once eggs are observed the producer knows that these eggs will hatch in a few days and an insecticide must be applied to protect the nutlets. By inspecting the small nutlets closely after the eggs have been found, exact timing for control measures should be applied as soon as the first damaged nutlet is observed. This method works very well for those producers that are willing to spend the time required to inspect for the first damage of the pecan nut casebearer. The insecticide used for pecan nut casebearer control can

be mixed with a fungicide to protect the pecan tree against scab and zinc sulfate to prevent zinc deficiency. All these can be mixed together and sprayed on pecans at the same time. Thorough tree coverage is necessary to obtain effective control of the pecan nut casebearer. Some insecticides which might be used for control of the pecan nut casebearer are Sevin, Malathion and Zolone. Information on other materials that might be used in a commercial orchard can be obtained from your County Extension Agent. The insecticide that is used should be mixed and applied according to the directions on the label.

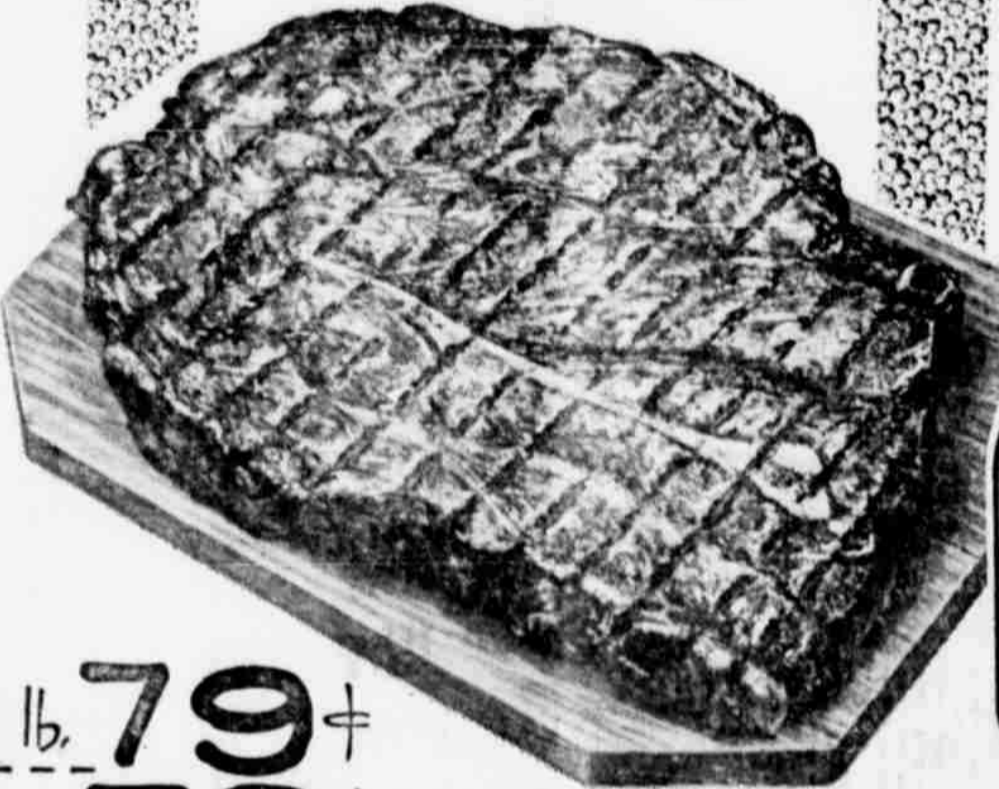
