Life--Give Blood

that blood collected from volunteer donors is considerably safer than blood obtained from paid denors. Through its Blood Program, the American Red Cross is the largest collector, processor and distributor of blood from voluntary donors. It provides approximately 40 percent of the nation's blood requirements through 59 regional centers. The total of blood collected by the Red Cross in 1972 amounted to over 3.5 million units, which were provided to 4,248 hospitals throughout the United States.

Blood and the specific products made from it save lives and maintain and improve the health of millions of persons each year. Although the use of whole blood in transfusion may occasionally be necessary most often a patient will derive the greatest benefit from receiving only that special component (portion) of blood needed to replace the specific blood cells or proteins that are deficient.

In addition to providing blood and blood products to hospitals, clinies, physicians, and public health agencies, the Blood Program utilizes a small amount for studies carried on at the Red Cross Blood Research Laboratory and for investigations carried on by other organizations interested in finding new and better uses for blood.

The research staff has contributed to a number of major breakthroughs in blood research including an improved method for long-term storage of frozen red cells: improved ways of isolating blood coagulation factors beneficial to hemophiliacs; and the discovery of a fundamental concept of how blood platelets function in the formation of blood clots ... the latter discovery is valuable for the treatment of thrombotic diseases such as heart attacks and strokes.

Red Cross blood research efforts currently include developing more sensitive and efficient tests for detecting hepatitisassociated antigen in blood, the solving of problems related to freezing platelets (the blood component instrumental in clot formation), the studying metabolism (life sustaining process) and functions of various blood cells and exploring uses for immunoglobulins other than gamma Globulins, which may contain antibodies useful in managing certain infections. Eventually, some of the freezing techniques under investigation may

be applicable to the preservation of human organs for transplant procedures.

The Red Cross Blood Group Reference Laboratory performs extensive typing on samples from persons whose blood evidences unusual characteristics. By carefully identifying the rare factor and maintaining current information about persons having rare types in its computerized Rare Donor Registry, the Red Cross can readily locate donors and thus provide such uncommon types of blood whenever and wherever they may be needed. To insure the safest possible

blood for recipients, every unit collected by the Red Cross is tested for the presence of an antigen frequently associated with post-transfusion (or serum) hepatitis. A new, more effective method called radioimmunoassay, is being adapted by all Red Cross centers during 1973. Using this recently federally licensed testing method, the Red Cross expects to detect roughly four to six times as many carriers of the antigen as previously found, and thus to reduce risk to recipients of Red Cross blood and blood products.

During its 25th year, the Red Cross Blood Program is committed more than ever before to totally fulfilling the blood requirements of the American people through donations made voluntarily by generous persons.




