Imagine that you could wear cotton clothing that wouldn't accept stains. I don't mean just repels them, but literally cannot be stained. Imagine a bandage that will not grow bacteria, or a toxic waste plant that simply pours its waste through a few layers of material and the water comes out crystal pure!

Does it all sound like a futuristic science fiction movie?

It isn't. In fact, certain things, such as the sterile bandages that won't grow bacteria, are expected to be on the market within a year.

A program on television (not network, but satellite reception) kept me enthralled and fascinated last week. What a wonderful world awaits!

In France, in conjunction with several nations, including the United States, there is a laboratory that is bio-engineering fabrics.

I can't claim to truly understand bio-engineering, but it seems that the basic fibers are modified so that they may contain antibiotics, or refuse to grow mildew or bacteria or strain things out. They are not dyed or dipped or impregnated with these substances...they become part of the fabric. This means that they don't weaken or break down, but contain their properties for the life of the fabric.

The possibilities appear limitless. The program showed a white cotton towel put into a sack of this new fabric along with a packet of dye.

It was tossed in a washing machine, and another white cotton towel put in also.

After the wash cycle finished everything had been washed. The towel in the sack was dyed blue. The towel on the outside was still spotlessly white! This new fabric is capable of letting water through, but not letting the dye pass!

Pollutants can be strained out similarly, and there is hope that oil spill containment in the future may be facilitated. Perhaps streams and rivers can be cleaned up and yet plants could economically operate!

The sterile or antibiotic bandages should prove an incredible boon to burn victims and others with skin conditions. Hopefully, within a few years this bio-engineered material will be put to hundreds of valuable uses.

For now though, as messy as I am, as much ink, mud and food as seem to manage to stain my clothes with...let's see a replay of those fabrics that absolutely, positively will not stain!

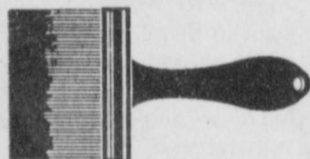

Bogata City Council Has Regular Meeting

Mayor Mildred Eudy called the meeting of the Bogata City Council to order at 5 P.M. on Monday October 11. W.T. Harbison gave the invocation. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and the bills were paid.

There had been a place on the agenda for presentations from a resident, but he did not attend. Talco Bogata CISD Superintendent Explains Misconceptions Of Tax Notice

Superintendent of the Talco-Bogata CISD, Freddy Wade, said there is some confusion concerning the Notice of Public Hearing on Tax Increase published in the October 7 edition of the news.

The statement concerning a 700% increase in tax revenue is very misleading. The proposed tax rate for 1993-94 is \$1.00 per \$100.00 of value which is the same tax rate the district has levied for the last four years. The Texas Legislature would not allow

the public schools to use the portion of the 92-93 tax rate collected by the now abolished County Education district in the tax comparison the schools were required to publish. Since our local tax rate was 13 cents last year, we had to use that rate as our base. When you compare that rate to \$1.00 (the proposed rate for 93-94 it indicates better than a 700% increase. In actuality the increase is zero percent.

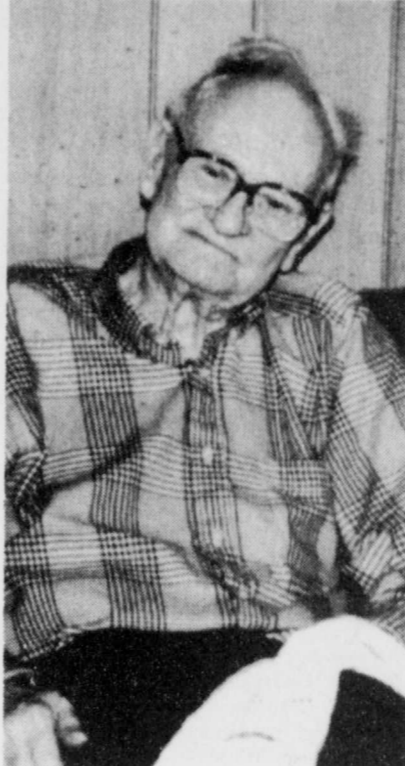

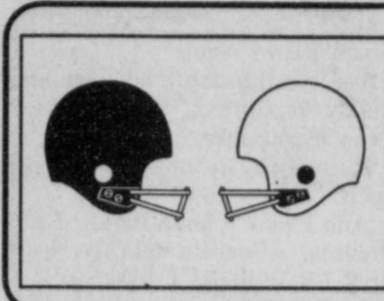
Following the game, the happy Rebel team gave coach Wake Wood a good soaking with their ice water cooler.

After two more turnovers, two penalties were assessed against the Patriots to end the first quarter.

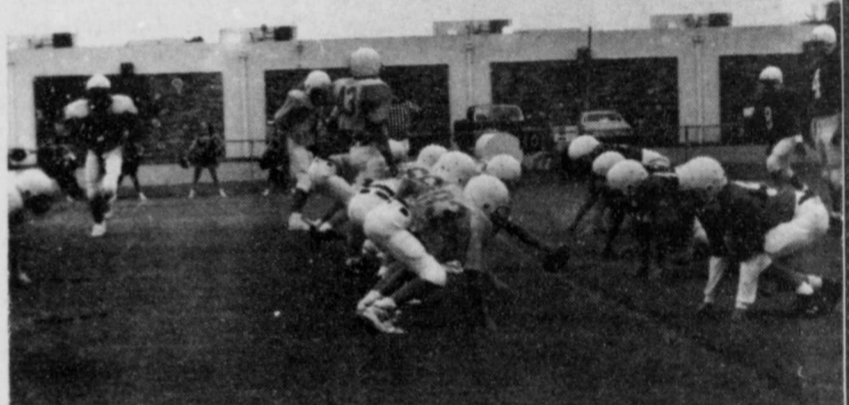
The score at that time was Rebs 6, Pats 0.

Showing off his Rebel colors once again, Juan Torres ran in another T.D. The following 2 pt. conversion was good.

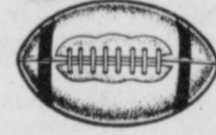
After the Rebel kickoff, Elliott Pogue intercepted a pass enabling Juan Torres to score again.

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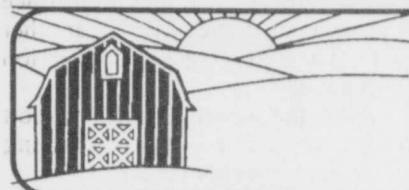

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

Postal employees are often asked by customers how best to prepare parcels and letters for mailing.

When holiday messages or parcels are delayed or damaged, no one is happy. The odds favor timely, safe delivery of holiday mail, and with a little extra care, customers can help the United States Postal Service complete its appointed rounds.

Mailing early is the best way to get important holiday cards and gifts to their destination on time. But there are several other mailing tips that will help speed your mail safely to delivery.

As a first step, customers should properly address cards and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box number), and then the city, state, and ZIP CODE reserved for the last line. Including the apartment number is especially important during the holiday season. Customers also need to pack

their own address inside all packages that they mail. If the outside address is ruined to the point that the address is unreadable, then the parcel can still be delivered. If this happens, it will take a few weeks before the parcel can be delivered.

Postal customers are reminded that some holiday greeting cards may not be acceptable for mailing at standard rates. Letter standards require that envelopes be at least 3 and 1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to meet minimum mailing standards. On the other hand, a surcharge must be paid on pieces which exceed any of the following dimensions-- 6 and 1/2 inches high or 11 and 1/2 inches long or 1/4 inch thick.

Getting your cards, letters, and parcels delivered on time for the holiday season is our goal this year. With your help, our job and your satisfaction become easier.

Tex-Mex Meatballs In Yogurt-Chili Sauce

- 1 lb. lean ground beef
1/3 cup finely chopped onion
1/4 cup bread crumbs
1 container (8 oz.) plain yogurt
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 tbsp. chopped fresh cilantro or parsley
1/2 tsp. ground cumin
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1 1/2 tsp. cornstarch
1/2 cup bottled salsa
1-2 tsp. chili powder

Preheat oven to 375°F. Combine ground beef, onion, bread crumbs, 1/4 cup yogurt, egg, cilantro, cumin, salt and pepper until blended. Shape into 1-inch balls; arrange on baking sheet. Bake 12 to 15 minutes, or until done. Combine remaining yogurt and cornstarch in chafing dish or saucepan. Stir in salsa and chili powder. Bring to boiling over medium heat, stirring frequently. Boil and stir 2 minutes. Stir in meatballs.

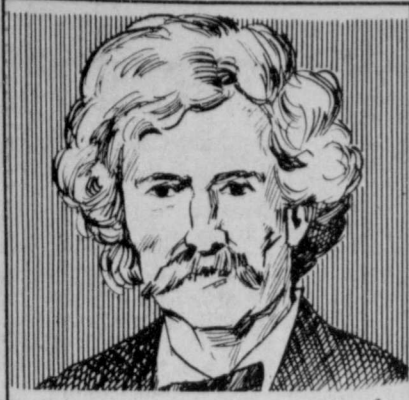

Nuts & Bolts

I do not think I could be described as an alarmist, but I saw something on television the other day which just scared me to death. The program had conducted a test to see how well trained children were when it came to talking with and going with strangers. The "stranger" was a plain clothes policeman. The children were probably aged four to nine. Out of four children, the man was able to get all but one of them to come with him in less than one minute each. The other child began crying when he told her that her mother was sick and started shaking her head, but she also looked as though she would have given in if they had not stopped the test and let her see that her mother wasn't sick. The children were lured by different things. One was in his own yard, and was willing to leave it without a second thought. One was playing in a park and the man asked him if he could help him fix his Nintendo game which he supposedly had in his car. The child was so anxious to get to that game that he was almost walking ahead of the "stranger". The scary part of this is that these children were chosen from a group whose mothers said that there was absolutely no way that their child would go with anyone or talk with anyone. These mothers were horrified to find that all the training and teaching they had done didn't help when it came down to actually having to put into practice what their children had been taught.

There have been rumors of attempted abductions, and there have

been stories in the newspaper about people who are bothering children around here. Our oldest granddaughter was worried sick about what would happen if someone offered her little sister a toy that she liked. She said, "Granny, if someone offered her a toy, she'd go with them" in a heartbeat" to get it. What can we do to protect her?" This was a question I was totally unable to answer, and I am afraid that most people are in the same position. Do we put our children under lock and key? Do we hire a body guard? What if the stranger is not a stranger? What if he is a "friend" or a relative?

When I was a child, I heard a story on the radio about a little girl who had gotten a piece of a balloon down her throat and died. Our children were never allowed to have balloons. That was relatively simple to accomplish. If I saw a balloon, I threw it away. This was something I could physically do. Teaching a child to react wisely in a situation with which he is unfamiliar is not simple. I have no answers. I am afraid there are no answers, except possibly to never let down your guard even for a short time. When a child or a young adult misbehaves, their parents can just say, "Well I did the best I could, and now if he or she is in trouble, it's not my fault." This is not about fault or misbehaving. If a child is abducted, they are rarely returned. This is not about blame. It is about the lives and safety of our children and grandchildren, and I am still scared to death.
