## Town Meeting In Bogata To Take Input On Jail Overcrowding Solutions

Red River County officials will be at a town meeting in Bogata on Monday, November 8 at 7:00 p.m. at the Bogata Community Center.

This meeting is to obtain input, and explain options open to Red River County on jail matters.

Ideas and suggestions as to what the public would like to see done with the jail overcrowding situation will be welcomed.

County Judge L.D. Williamson reports that it is interesting to note that Red River County is currently number four on the list of most overcrowded jail facilities within the State of Texas.

The Commission on Jail Standards has given the Red River County Jail a conditional certification of compliance, and has recommended that the Court address the problem within six months. If nothing is done to alleviate the overcrowding problem, the Commission on Jail Standards can

close the existing facility and require the County to house inmates in an out of county facility at the cost of \$40 per day per prisoner. Or, the Commission on Jail Standards can require that all prisoners over the number of twelve be housed at an out of county jail at a cost of \$40 per day per prisoner.

Options that will be discussed include a proposal to build a jail to meet current needs. It would be paid for by a bond issue or additional taxation.

Another proposal is to build a jail larger than needed with the possibility of paying for it by housing out-of-county prisoners in the extra space.

A third option is to do nothing right now. This would mean that in a few months the county would probably not meet standards and excess inmates would have to be housed in another county as mentioned above.

County officials estimate that the figure could be as many as 16 in-

mates per day that would be in another county. This could cost nearly a quarter of a million dollars a year.

The current jail population is 31. Number of state prisoners in the Red River County Jail is 16 and the number of Red River County Prisoners in jail is 15. Felony prisoners number 14, misdemeanor prisoners -2.

There are 28 males and three females in the county jail currently.

One prisoner is being farmed out of county at the \$40 per day cost.

Texas Department of Corrections accepts one prisoner each month from Red River County.

The Commissioners Court and County Officials would like to hear any suggestions, ideas and recommendations that the citizens would like to share on the subject of jail overcrowding. Please come to this meeting, it is important to every Red River County citizen.

## "Scam" Cheating People In Area

Sheriff B.J. McCoy was in Deport Thursday morning, and made a statement concerning a recent "scam" which has been done in Deport and also in Red River County.

A white male, driving a Chevrolet Pickup in blue and cream, with Oklahoma tags, has posed as a salesperson making up a magazine on aluminum siding. He told an older Deport woman that he would clean her siding for free if he could take a picture of it. Then, he offered to put siding on the building next to her home for \$310 and said it would normally cost \$600. The woman wrote him a check and he disappeared.

In Red River County the same man obtained \$250 posing as a roofing.

Sheriff McCoy wants to stress that they want anyone who has been approached by this man, or who has been victimized by this scam to please call the Lamar County Sheriff's Department and ask to speak to him. The number is 737-2400. Sheriff McCoy says that someone just might have the clue that would lead to an arrest in this crime, and that restitution is sometimes possible on this type of "scam".

He also says that "if a deal seems to be too good to be true or too cheap, it probably is". He says the main thing is to never, ever give money up front, before a job is started.

If anyone has information concerning this crime, please, call the sheriff.

## Response Made To Housing Authority Story

An Associated Press News story being printed in newspapers throughout Texas has reported that the Texas Human Rights Commission has voted to recommend that federal funding be withheld from 11 housing authorities in East and Northeast Texas, including Deport, Blossom and Bogata unless they take action to integrate their public housing. The recommendation was made to HUD (Housing and Urban Development).

Melba G. Ladd, Executive Director of the City of Deport's Housing Authority, has prepared a response to this story. Blossom's Executive Director Larry Bridges concurs with Mrs. Ladd's assessment of this situation. Also contacted Wednesday morning was Executive Director of the City of Bogata Housing Authority A.D. Stephenson who also said that he agrees with Mrs. Ladd's assessment.

She says, in a letter which is being sent to authorities state-wide, that:

The current publicity being released regarding Public Housing in our area contains only a part of the facts from reporting by the local Authorities to HUD.

As is the case in this type of reporting, an overall picture of events does not show the actual compliance records of these Authorities.

I can not speak for other Directors; however, there is no denying there has been discrimination in the past, not just to minorities, but to other

areas of the population.

The onset of the lawsuit YOUNG vs. CISNEROS filed in 1982 against the Clarksville Housing Authority resulted in a complete overhaul of activities in East Texas Housing Authorities. These activities consisted of compliance to directives ordered by District Judge William Wayne Justice, monitored by U.S. Department of HUD.

Detailed reviews, City/Area wide inspections have resulted in this local Authority being given a rating of UNITARY STATUS (in compliance). HUD recommended to the Court that Deport Housing be released from the lawsuit in 1990. No ruling has been made on that recommendation.

As I attend training meetings and visit with others who hold my position, I am gratified at the talent, understanding and business capabilities of local citizens, desperately making efforts to serve their communities.

Sensationalism, bordering on harassment reaches the media and press. Our accomplishments, our records do not, as we remain silent for fear of further implications.

I do not speak for others, I do not speak for my Board. I speak with a plea that consideration and yes publicity be given to the progress that has been made and continues.

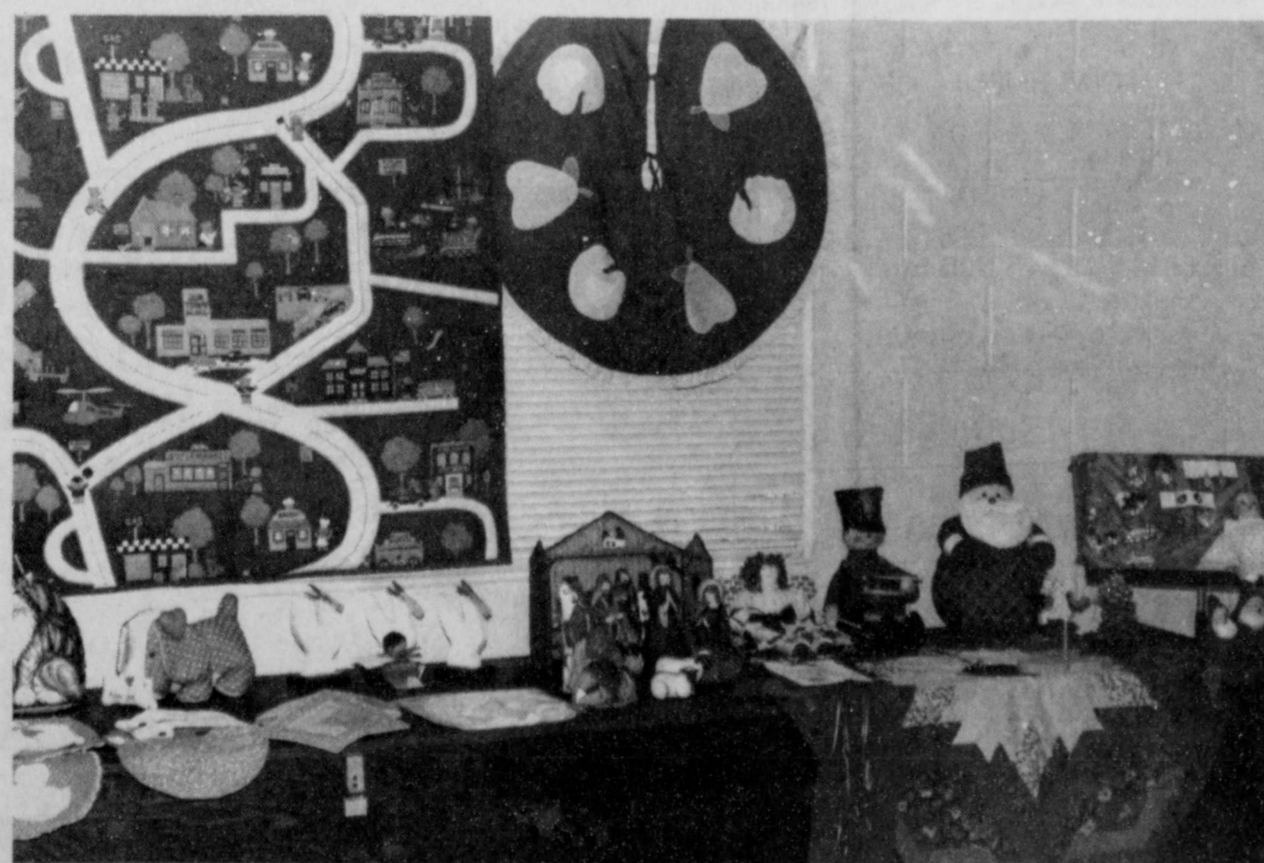
The bazaar area opens at 9:00 a.m.

## Beverly White Is Red River County Treasurer

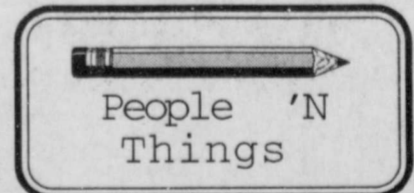

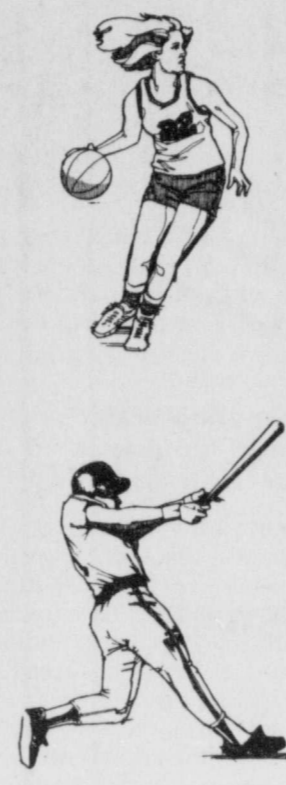
The clock had run down to one minute, the Mustangs had control of the ball and the Rebels had no time-

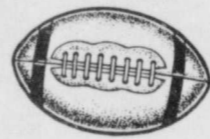

Some of the fringe benefits, according to Commander Spencer are increased self-confidence and poise, experience in communicating with others and valuable training in self expression. For the state winners, there is also the broadening experience of a five-day tour of Washington, D.C. and the opportunity to make lasting friendships with the other state winners.

In the 46 years the VFW and its

Ladies Auxiliary have been involved with the Voice of Democracy Program, more than 6,000,000 high school students have participated. Participants write and then record a three-to five minute audio essay expressing their views on "My Commitment to America." From among the state winners, national winners are chosen to receive a total of over \$88,500 in scholarships with a \$20,000.00 first place award.

Also participating in the activity were Bogata Mayor and coordinator of the project, Mildred Eudy, and Zelma Mauldin, who was representing the VFW Auxiliary of Post # 8187 in Bogata.

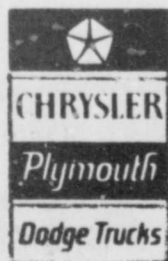

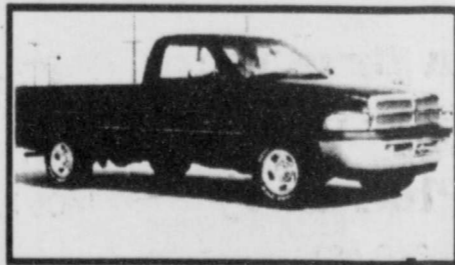

**Comments From Your County Attorney**

After a recent misunderstanding regarding whosets the punishment during a jury trial, it should be a god topic to review. In Texas we have a bifurcated jury trial system. This means a 2-part trial. During the first phase of the trial, the jury hears the evidence and is given the law by the judge. The jury decides if a defendant is guilty or innocent based only on that evidence and the law. If found innocent, that is the end of the case.

However, if the jury returns a guilty verdict, then the second part of the trial begins. Additional evidence may be introduced at this time. Evidence of a prior criminal record or the lack of that record is often presented at this time. The jury then sets the punishment outlined in the range that is set by law. A 3rd degree felony has a range of from 2 to 10 years. A 2nd degree felony has a range of from 2 to 20 years. A 1st degree felony has a range of from 5 to 99 years or life. A capitol murder felony has a punishment of either life or death. A capitol murder life sentence is a minimum of 40 calendar years before parole can be considered.

In a 1st, 2nd or 3rd degree felony, a defendant may receive probation from a jury if the defendant has never before been convicted of a felony offense. The jury can assess up to 10 years probation.

## For Fall Foliage, Who Are You Going To Call?

Wondering where and when the best fall color areas of the state will be this fall? Call 1-800-452-9292 to the Texas Travel Information Centers, operated by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), for the latest color updates and events around the state. The phone center is open from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m.

The foliage report is compiled and updated weekly from spotters around the state and distributed to callers by counselors at the 11 information centers and the phone center in Austin.

TxDOT spotters tell us there is color in several areas. While some leaves are turning with the first flush of brilliant hues of orange and red,

the peak color season will arrive in mid-November.

Atlanta, Tyler, San Augustine, Martin Creek and Dangerfield State Parks report the leaves are changing. Lost Maples State Natural Area near Vanderpool is expecting its color in mid-November.

For hiking and birding enthusiasts, trail maps are available from the Texas Forestry Association Museum in Lufkin. The Big Thicket Association also provides guided and self-guided tours, hikes, and canoe trips during the fall. Maps and directions are available at the visitor station seven miles north of Kountze at F.M. 420 and US 69.

1 cup all-purpose flour  
1/2 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 cup margarine, softened  
1/2 cup crunchy peanut butter  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 1/4 tsp. 'N Low granulated sugar substitute  
1 egg  
1 tsp. vanilla extract  
2 tbsps. chopped, unsalted peanuts

In small bowl, mix flour and baking powder. In large bowl, with mixer at medium speed, beat margarine, peanut butter, sugar and Sweet 'N Low until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. 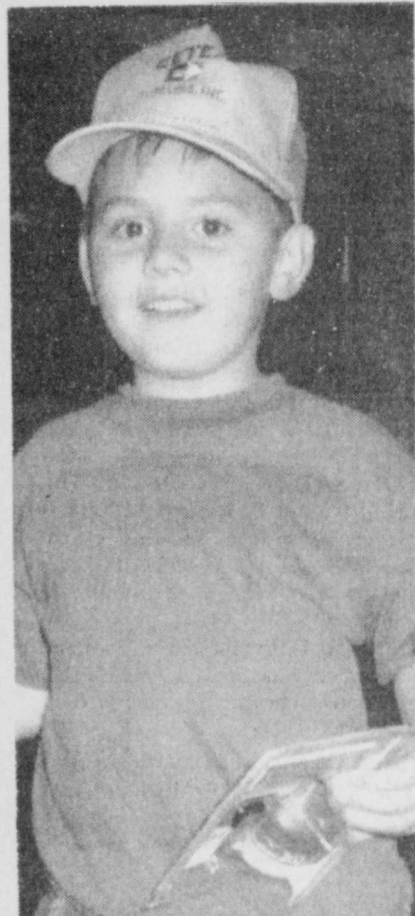

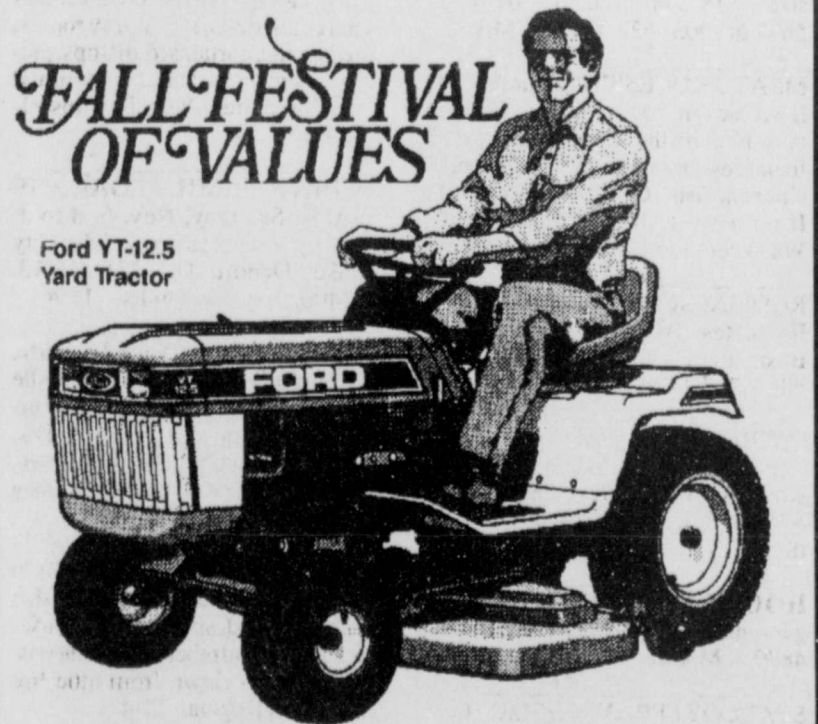
