It is time for this year's Veterans edition. In 1993 the *Deport Times* (and Thunder Prairie Publishing) was awarded a singular honor.

The American Legion of Texas presented the *Times* with a State-Wide Media Award for print. They give an award for television, print and radio and we were so honored to be the recipient of the print award.

The Veterans Edition was the main reason we earned the award. Apparently it really impressed the state judges.

In an acceptance speech at the presentation I pointed out that this particular edition was my husband's "brainstorm". He felt it was something that would provide veterans and their families with a keepsake to be proud of. So it has proven. We cannot express just how pleased we were that the American Legion felt our efforts were worth recognition. Not because it inflated our ego...but because it proves that our original intention was accomplished...the recognition of veterans.

When we began this edition we never envisioned just how big it would become. We certainly never thought it would gain state-wide recognition. The veterans and families can take pride in knowing that their pictures won this award.

As more and more veterans photos came in we were struck with just how many of them there are!

We had nearly another 100 photos again this year! What to do...we couldn't keep expanding forever! So, we took out artwork, quotes, and "squashed" things up. Still, we had too many without adding even more pages, and that is very expensive. Finally, sadly, we removed a handful of those veterans who were included in our very first edition...and have been included since. We hated to do it.

In fact, this is probably going to be the last year we put out a veterans edition. The expense of sizing, scanning, typesetting, printing and mailing an issue with so many photographs...even with sponsors...is overwhelming. It is the only issue we publish in which we don't strive for a profit margin, but it is becoming too big to handle.

Another disappointment is that I had saved a service man's letter from months ago to run in this year's edition. When my computer hard drive "crashed" the letter went with it. I don't remember who it belonged to, so I can't ask them to bring it back in!

But...we have done our very best. We have dedicated as much time and effort as possible into getting each photo right. I'm sure there are some mistakes...it would be virtually impossible not to have some when dealing with over 300 photos. But please...overlook them and take this very special issue as it's meant...a tribute to this nation's veterans who deserve so much recognition.

Faces From The Past Deserve Recognition Now

Once more it is Veteran's Day. About fifty new faces have joined the long list of those whose pictures appear on these pages. One by one, as we scan the photos and place them in position on the page, these faces look back at us. Many of the faces we still see regularly...but they are older now, as time proceeds at it's usual unstoppable pace. Fresh-faced young men from World War II, Youthful faces from Korea, even Viet Nam veterans are middle aged now. Only the Desert Storm troops retain their youthful looks...and those too will join the ranks of "the past" as time goes on.

Some of those veterans whose photos we publish were with us last year and aren't this year. Among those no longer with us is Stanley Bell...featured in 1992 with a color photo and story on the front page. Stanley died in 1993, one more of the few remaining World War I veterans who has gone to his reward. Bogata City Council Meets

The Bogata City Council met Monday November 8, at City Hall. Mayor Mildred Eudy called the meeting to order at 5 P.M. Buck Ramsey gave the Invocation The council immediately went into executive session, at 5:05 P.M., and reconvened at 5:45 P.M.

Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved, and payment of bills was approved.

In old business, the second reading of the ordinance to raise meter deposits to \$75.00 took place, and the ordinance was approved. A correction to the budget was approved. There was no change in the budget, it was just a clerical change.

Results from the executive session were voted on. Two city employees received 6% raises as a result of additional schooling to be licensed. The council considered sending more

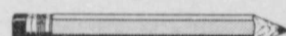
letters to parties who are not getting properties cleaned up as promised. Two parties are already working on some of the worst, and are doing as well as possible, since they are limited in the time they have to work. If a person receives a letter from the City telling them that they must get their property cleaned up and they don't do it, the city has no choice but to clean it themselves and the owner must pay for the labor.

W.T. Harbison was appointed as a member for the Red River Appraisal Board.

The council discussed the solution of the the water problem on Hudson Street. This is to be handled by Mayor Eudy and Wyatt Bush.

\$15.00 was approved for the Veterans Day Ad in the Newspapers.

Since there was no more business, the meeting was adjourned.

Mandarin Orange Cake by Ruby Horn

1 box yellow cake mix
1 (11 oz.) can mandarin oranges with juice
4 eggs
1/2 cup vegetable oil

Mix cake mix, oranges with juice, eggs, and oil with electric mixer until orange slices are broken up and batter is fluffy. (About 3 minutes) Divide among 3 greased and floured, 8 or 9 inch layer pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes, or until it tests done. Ice between layers and on top.

Icing
1 can crushed pineapple with juice
1 carton cool whip
3 oz. vanilla pudding mix (dry)
Mix well and spread between layers and on the top and sides of cake. Keep in refrigerator.

Original Green Bean Casserole
1 can cut green beans drained
3/4 cup milk
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup
1/8 tsp ground black pepper
1 can French Fried Onions

Combine all ingredients except 1/2 can onions; pour into a 1 1/2 quart casserole, bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 30 minutes, or until heated through. Top

with remaining onions. Bake uncovered 5 minutes or until onions are golden. Makes 6 servings.

Beef Roast
3 or 4 lb. beef roast
sprinkle 1/2 pkg. Lipton Soup mix over meat and cover with 3 cans mushroom soup, undiluted. Stir soup so it will not be lumpy. Put in a pan or oven safe dish 13X9X2 inches, lined with heavy foil. Seal the foil tightly. Bake in 350 degree oven for 2 1/2 or 3 hours. Do not open foil until done.

Tomato Stuffing
3 or 4 cups corn bread
or 5 large tomatoes peeled and mashed, 4 or 4 of tomatoes
1/2 tsp black pepper
hot pepper to taste
1 egg
4 slices of light bread
1 cup chopped celery
1 medium onion
1 Tbsp sage
1/4 cup oil
1/2 cup evaporated milk

Cook onions and celery in 1 cup of water until tender. Mix all the other ingredients together and pour in dish or pan to bake. Put 2 slices of bacon on top. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes or 1 hour.

Keeping Healthy

Sprains and Strains of Raking Autumn Leaves

Yardowners, beware: Raking leaves may be hazardous to your health. Stooping, bending and stretching can punish your back, shoulders, neck and arms with painful muscular strains and sprains.

To avoid injury, perform these stretching exercises for at least one week before hitting the lawn:

—Side-to-Side Rotations: Standing with your hands on your hips, turn as far as possible to the left, holding the position five seconds, then turn to the right and hold that position five seconds. Repeat 10 times.

—Overhead Stretches: Standing with your feet slightly apart, stretch both arms over your head. Hold five seconds. Repeat 10 times.

—Front-and-Back Arm Stretches: Standing, with a straight back and arms at shoulder height, stretch arms straight out in front of your body and hold five seconds. Repeat 10 times. Holding arms at a comfortable height, swing straight arms behind body until shoulder blades touch, holding five seconds. Repeat 10 times.

To Avoid a Cold

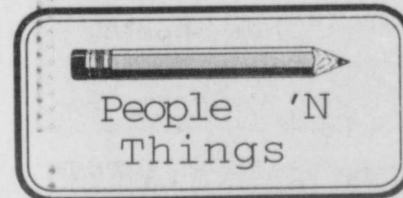

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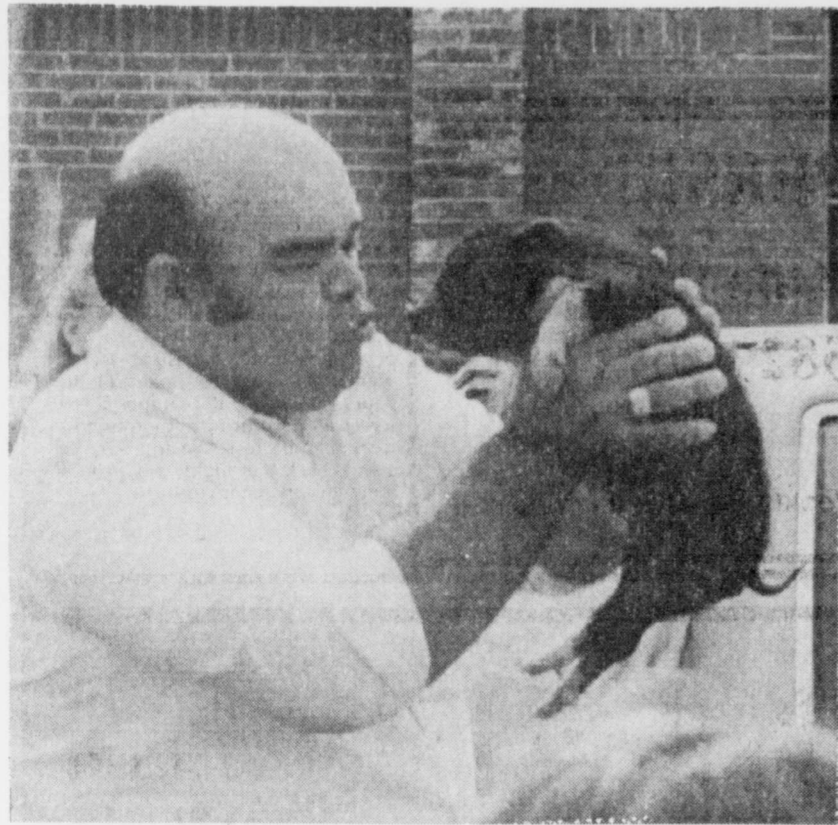

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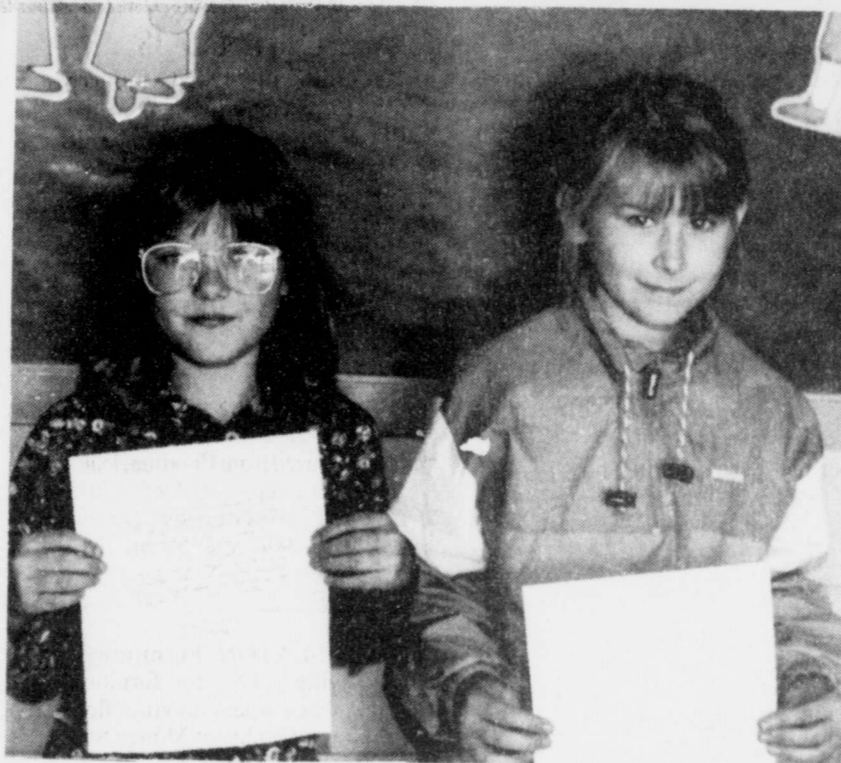

Few Attend Bogata Town Meeting Monday

Thirty one citizens attended the Town Meeting at the Community Center, in Bogata, Monday night. The reason for this meeting was to discuss the jail situation in Red River County. County officials in the group included County Judge, L. D. Williamson, Sheriff Bob Edrington, Commissioner of Precinct 1, Tommie Corbell, Commissioner of Precinct 3, Ben Storey, County Auditor Shirley Ann Anderson, and County Treasurer, Beverly White.

Judge Williamson explained that the problem with the jail is that the county has been given 6 months to come up to state standards or be shut down. The inspection was done in August. It seems that we have a 14 bed facility for all the prisoners who are arrested. There are at present 31 prisoners in custody, 28 of them are in the Clarksville Jail, and 3 are in the Franklin County Jail. Twenty of the prisoners are due to be sent to TDC at Huntsville, but there is no room for them, so they have to stay at Clarksville until there is room. The State pays the county to house the state's prisoners, but the county has to pay other counties for the prisoners who are farmed out to them. The county can send about 3 prisoners every two months to Huntsville.

The judge explained that there are a few possible solutions to consider. The county can build a 96 bed addition to the existing facility for \$1,000,000.00, and possibly pay it off early by housing prisoners from other counties @ \$40.00 a day and state prisoners @ \$30.25 a day. A 48 bed facility can be built for \$750,000.00. This would probably be sufficient for maybe 3 years, at which time another jail would need to be built. The county can also do nothing, and let the state close the jail. If the state closes the jail, the county would have to pay another county to house the prisoners. Every time a prisoner need to come to Red River County for a trial or any kind of hearing, they would have to be transported both ways at the expense of the county. The county would be responsible for the expenses of the prisoners' attorneys having to go to another county to consult with their clients. It would also be necessary to pay for the

medical expenses of the farmed out prisoners.

Financing the new facility, if it is built, was discussed. Certificates of obligation can be sold to lending institutions in a way so that there won't be a penalty for paying it off early. Money can be borrowed on the right, or a bond election could be held to see if the people want to fund the new jail. The bond election could not be set until April. Since the deadline on compliance is January, the bond election could result in the closing of the jail.

Suggestions from the people attending included doing nothing and letting the jail be closed, putting the prisoners in tents, building the 96

Mary Jane's Uncle Tom

This is the month when we honor our WWI veterans and I would like to share some thoughts about one of my favorites, Tom DeBerry, my uncle.

Thomas Arthur DeBerry was born October 14, 1887 near Bogata, the son of Martin Luther and Alice Jane (Gaines) DeBerry. Attending school in Bogata and graduating from Clarksville High School in 1905, he later was graduated from the University at Fayetteville, Arkansas. He was for a number of years a cotton buyer at Bogata, with a youthful background of farming and mercantile business. He served in the Army during World War I, including seven months overseas. At the first Armistice Day anniversary, November 11, 1919, the veterans of Bogata strung a wire behind the stores, and each tied a stick of dynamite to the wire. At a given signal they were to light their dynamite and they were all to go off together to make the celebration. All of the sticks went off except Tom's and he ran to pull his down to make the wire empty, and it went off in his hand. He lost one hand, and the other was maimed. For a year he was blind, though partial sight of one eye was restored. He was the first recipient of plastic surgery in Lamar or Red River Counties. Despite his handicaps, he resumed his work toward a career in law, and with my grandmother's aid in his studies, was successful in this.

for state representative from Red River County to which he was elected in 1923 to serve six years. He was then elected state senator for eight years, and upon his retirement, was appointed to the State Board of Control for two six-year terms.

During his years in the legislature, he won the reputation of being the "champion negationist", frequently voting against a measure in order to bring debate on it into the open, and his fictional characters, the Splivins Brothers, often quoted by him, also marked him as a champion of the underdog, but striving to balance the right of society as a whole with that of the individual. The spokesman for the "Forks of the creek boys" became acting Governor of Texas for a week once due to the absence of Governor Allred and Lieutenant Governor Woodul. He issued a proclamation setting aside Dec. 13-20 as Texas Turkey Week. He appealed for co operation of citizens, cafes, and hotel dining rooms in the use of Texas turkeys throughout the approaching holiday season to that the "Splivins Boys" will benefit by sale of their turkeys.

Uncle Tom died in 1958 leaving an example that hardships and handicaps can be overcome. His brothers, Albert, Paul, and Marvin served with him in WWI. The rest of his family, all raised at Bogata, were Minnie (Howison), Henry, Luther, Allen (Doll), Clarence, Dick, and Gordon.
