
When I asked Lillian if I could feature her in this column, and talked her into saying "yes", we decided that a picture with her Christmas Tree






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
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LADY REBEL Michelle Giles puts pressure on a Lady Patriot, Trinity Bowden in basketball action last weekend at





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Beware of Nutrition Claims In Women's Magazines

What types of nutrition messages are the readers of women's magazines receiving?

One recent study showed an overall increase in nutrition claims referring to the absence of specific dietary substances such as fat, sugar or cholesterol from food and beverage products. Many of the nutritional claims reflected topics related to the dietary guidelines recommendations. All advertisements were used to appeal to consumer concerns about taste, convenience and quality. Nutrition claims varied by product type adver-

Why are these women's magazines so full of nutrition information? Women tend to be especially interested in nutrition information. They read this more from magazines and other forms of print media.

Some of the leading women's magazines have nutritionists, dietitians or home economists respon-



sible for their nutrition articles or food/recipe sections. This increases the reliability when research-based information is used. Beware of some nutrition-related articles not written by dietitians, nutritionists or home economists. These articles may make weight loss claims or claims for use of certain nutrient supplements seem too good to be true. One example is the hype for chromium picolinate touted for weight loss. Chromium picolinate has not been approved for weight loss by the Food and Drug Administration. Consumers need to realize that weight loss comes only by changing lifestyle habits, including exercise and low-fat eating. No 'magic bullets" for weight loss exist.

If you have noted some nutritional claim that may be questionable, misleading or inaccurate, contact the local county Extension Office for research-based information related to the particular nutrition claim.



Holiday Entertaining? Keep Food Safety In Mind

Home Economics Delicious food is often a special part of Thanksgiving, Christmas and other holiday events. Entertaining ing, and definitely needs to be done with food safety in mind.

When planning a large scale event, keep in mind that preparing and handling large amounts of food will take planning ahead of time for safe preparation, storage and serving. If large quantities of food will be prepared ahead of time, quickly cool and refrigerate them. Divide into portions and store in shallow containers. Deep containers increase the time the center of a pot of food stays warm, encouraging bacterial growth. Consider the amount of refrigerator space

If perishable foods are picked up from a deli or purchased from a caterer, transport them quickly, and serve immediately; or if purchased ahead of time, transport them quickly to your refrigerator where they should remain until serving time. If you're purchasing a large quantity of food items such as meat trays or any perishable foods, ask that they be packaged in small portions, or do this when you get home. By doing this, you can replace trays often at the party event and not leave one large

tray out for too long.

If holiday meals are served buffet style, this may mean that the food remains on the table as guests come for family or friends on a small or and go. This is not the safest situalarge scale is fun, but often demand- tion, as foods left at warm room temperatures are susceptible to bacterial growth that causes foodborne illness. Plan serving times so that perishable foods do not remain at room temperature for more than two hours. Use smaller portions on the serving table, and replace them often from the heat source in the kitchen or from the refrigerator.

> On the serving table, or in the kitchen, keep hot foods hot. Chafing dishes may or may not keep foods at the necessary temperature of 140 degrees F. or above. Keep cold foods cold on the table by nestling serving containers in beds of ice.

When replenishing foods on the buffet, it's best to replace containers, rather than putting fresh food in a container that contains food that has been sitting out, especially if the food has been at room temperature.

Make your holiday events special and food safe by following safe food handling practices. If it is an event to remember, make it a pleasant one. Protect you and your guests from foodborne illness.

Traditional centuries-old Christmas delights

Everyone, it seems, loves pudding and who can resist the special treats that appear during the Christmas season? Plum pudding is one savorable dessert most closely associated with a traditional English holiday celebration. Cider was a popular beverage in pre-Revolutionary America, drunk by almost every member of the family at almost every meal. John Adams drank a pitcher of cider at breakfast every morning. When guests arrive, what could be easier than serving a luscious helping of pudding with a wine sauce and a mug of steaming hot cider spiced with cinnamon? Family and friends will be delighted to receive a sampling of your culinary creativity

The following recipe for "An English Plum Pudding" is reproduced from The Virginia House-Wife by Mary Randolph, 1830.

Beat eggs very light, add to them a pound of flour sifted, and a pound of powdered sugar; when it looks quite light, put in a pound of suet finely shred; a pint of milk, a nutmeg grated, and a gill of brandy; mix with it a pound of currants, washed, picked, and dried, and a pound of raisins stoned and floured - tie it in a thick cloth, and boil it steadily eight hours.

The modern recipes below for "Plum Pudding" and "Mulled Cider" are mixture and blend. Add the bread and suet mixture and stir well. Pour pudreproduced from Yuletide at Winterthur: Tastes and Visions of the Season (Winterthur Museum):

PLUM PUDDING

cup milk slices stale bread, cubed ounces suet, ground cup brown sugar, packed eggs, beaten

cup brandy teaspoon vanilla cups raisins cup currants cup nuts, chopped

cup candied orange peel cup flour teaspoon baking soda teaspoon salt teaspoons cinnamon teaspoon mace

Pour milk over bread and stir. Add suet, sugar, eggs, brandy, and vanilla, and mix completely. In a larger bowl, mix raisins, currants, nuts, and peel. Sift flour, soda, and salt and combine with spices. Add to the fruit and nut

teaspoon ground cloves

suet mixture and stir well. Pour pudding into a greased two-quart mold (do not use tube or bundt pans or ring mold). Cover the mold completely with foil using string to secure. Put the mold on a rack within a deep pot or dutch oven. Add boiling water to the pot to about an inch, cover, and steam the pudding for about 3½ hours. Be sure water level is maintained in pot. Remove mold and cool for about 15 to 20 minutes. Remove puddi. from mold and place on serving plate Serve with wine sauce or hard sauce of your choice. Makes twelve to sixteen servings.

MULLED CIDER

quarts cider cup orange juice cup lemon juice tablespoons sugar cinnamon sticks teaspoons whole cloves teaspoon nutmeg

Mix all ingredients and bring just to a boil. Cool and strain. Serve hot and place a cinnamon stick in each cup. Makes about 16 half-cup servings.
