




Slated meeting of the Rosalie Masonic Lodge 527 is the 4th Thursday of every month at 7:30 p.m.

Once again, I am featuring one of my favorite people. There is a special reason for telling you all who do not already know, about my sister-inlaw, Nelda Screws. You see, since this is the time of the year when most of us make and break resolutions, I thought it might be nice to see that resolutions can become fact, and not just dreams. Nelda and husband, Gerry own House Of Flowers, in Bogata. Gerry works at Campbell Soup, in Paris. They have two married children; their son Rusty and his wife Randi, and daughter, Kelly Jean and her husband Bobby all live in

Bogata Nelda had been running the flower shop for quite a while when she branched out into the business of catering weddings and parties, and renting formal attire. She worked until she got this part of the business established, and then she added to her shop what she really wanted to do. It's a Training center called Body Works. She has weight machines, free weights, steppers, a tanning bed, and as of this week, one of her patrons has added a punching bag. Nelda and or Kelly lead aerobics classes at

My sister-in-law is not very tall. She has small bones and every pound shows on her small frame, while I, on the other hand can carry an extra forty pounds on my right arm. But getting back to her ability to do things, and to Sandy's efficiency, they do many things together and most of them turn out all right, but occasionally they hit a snag. Jalapeno Cornbread by Nelda Screws

1 cup corn meal 2 egg beaters or 2 egg whites

1/2 can (#2) cream style corn 1 cup (8 oz.) Kraft Free cheese slices, chopped

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 cup flour

1/2 cup buttermilk

1/2 cup liquid Butter Buds 1 can Rotel tomatoes and green chiles,

1 1/2 tsp baking powder

Beat Egg Beaters (or egg whites) and add remaining ingredients, mixing well. Pour into a large cast iron skillet, that has been sprayed with a non-fat cooking spray. Bake 50 to 60 minutes at 350 degrees.

Chicken Enchiladas

1 medium chopped onion

1 (4 oz.) can chopped green chiles 1 (14 oz.) size chicken broth

1 Tbs. cornstarch 1 Tbs. flour

3 Tbs. liquid Butter Buds 1 tsp. minced garlic (in a jar) 2 cups cooked cubed white meat

chicken (without skin) 12 flour tortillas 16 oz. Kraft Free cheese slices cut in

1 can Hunts stewed tomatoes (14 1/2 oz) drained

1 can Hot Jalapeno Relish (Old El Paso) 7 1/2 oz. size, drained 2 cups Fat Free Sour Cream

Combine liquid Butter Buds, garlic, and onion in a sauce pan. Cook until soft. Add flour, cornstarch, chicken broth, and green chiles. Stir with a wire whisk until bubbly and smooth. Add flour mixed with water if a thicker sauce is desired. Add seasonings and cooked chicken. Remove from heat. Combine stewed tomatoes, jalapeno relish, two cups of fat free sour cream, and 1/2 of the cheese together in a

In a large bowl, combine both sauces together. Make your enchiladas by spooning chicken sauce mixture onto each flour tortilla. Next roll them up and place in a casserole dish that has been sprayed with a non fat cooling spray, with the seam side down. Pour the rest of the chicken sauce over the rolled up tortillas. Sprinkle remaining cheese on top. Heatin a 350 degree oven about 15-20 minutes or until hot and bubbly.

Carrot Cake with Vanilla Sauce

1 1/2 cups liquid Butter Buds

1 cup sugar

1 cup brown sugar 4 Egg Beaters or 4 egg whites 3 cups self-rising flour

2 tsp cinnamon 1/2 tsp. nutmeg

1/4 tsp ground cloves 1 small can crushed pineapple

2 tsp. vanilla 3 cups grated carrots

1 cup raisins 1 cup Grape Nuts Cereal

1 cup liquid Butter Buds

2/3 cup sugar

2-3 Tbs. cornstarch 1 Tbs. vanilla

Cream together Butter buds, sugars. Egg Beaters or Egg Whites, pineapple and vanilla. Add raisins and Grape Nuts. Add flour and spices. Fold in grated carrots. Pour into bundt pan sprayed with non fat cooking spray. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour.

While the cake is baking, combine all the sauce ingredients in a pan and cook on the stove. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Bring to a full boil and stir for 1 minute. Remove from heat. After call is baked, cool upright in pan for 5 minutes. Remove from pan. Pour 1/3 of the sauce over the cake and save the rest to be served with the cake. If sauce is lumpy, use a hand mixer and beat until smooth. If the sauce is too thin, add a little more

The Texas bound wagon train rolled to its last stop. A small band of settlers looked over this new land north of a small, but swift river and

The rolling countryside wasn't much different from their home in MS. There were a few Indians around in 1869 when the wagon train dispersed in the southern part of Red River County, near the present town of Bogata.

Aboard the wagons were families named Morse, Smith, Ware, Delevan,

Miss Carrie McCulloch has a more complete history of the Cuthand community. Her mother and an uncle were teenagers and passengers on

The site the folks chose was near the stage route between Clarksville and Mt. Pleasant. Several settled on Sulphur River near "Welch's Cross-

McCager Garvin erected his home on the stage line near Cuthand Creek. Garvin soon opened a farmer's commissary and it wasn't long before a settlement took shape. A man named Duffy opened a saloon to accomodate dusty, thirsty stage passengers. There being so many suffering from thirst and the dust; Delevan and son also built a log cabin on the west side of the road and established a saloon.

The original post office was called The Enterprise and was located a mile and a half south of the present community. It was moved to Garvinsville and the name changed to Cuthand because folks in another area had already picked the name Garvinsville for their own post of-

After Garvin opened the door on the mercantile business, other stores

Bill Garvin managed a store for Bill Sively. Dick Elder sold groceries and medicine. Zeke Mauldin, W.A. Mauldin and W.T. Mauldin ran a general merchandise store. Bart Duty managed a general merchandise store for Ed Gaines. Jim Good had a grocery store. Uncle Hick Blissard sold candy, canned goods and medicine. Andy Mankins owned a grocery store managed by George Holdaway. Sam Morse and H.B. Mauldin also had a

grocery store. A.G. Pittman and Jim Eaves and son had a general store. Lee Blissard bought Eaves interest and added coffins to his line of mer-
