Yet another article focused on what a woman's role as a wife and mother was.

The article said, and I quote, "a wife's role is to provide a warm, pleasant atmosphere for her husband in order to give purpose to his life, and to provide a healthy atmosphere to bring up children in".

Most of the articles centered upon child development, caring for a newborn, keeping husbands from "straying", decorating and clothing.

The advertising mentioned new stoves, new vacuum cleaners, new refrigerators and telephone services....not a word about computers, microwaves or VCRs. At that time there was no such thing for the general public!

Almost every ad featured a child of some age or another. Teenagers seemed to almost not exist....the kids all seemed to be below the age of 10 or so.

There were not "money saving coupons" either.

Another thing which has changed radically is HOW the fifties wife and mother was supposed to keep her family well nourished and healthy.

Articles encouraged her to feed her family eggs, eggs and more eggs, real cream, whole milk in big quantities, lots of meats like pork chops and bacon, roasts and gravies and sauces! A far cry from today's low-fat diets, indeed.

The cold war was a new and frightening venture into the unknown, as was atomic energy. Faith in governments seemed absolute!

All in all the articles provided a fascinating look backward. Since most of the changes in our lives come gradually, it was really interesting to actually be able to compare life then and now without the slow pace of years.

Life has changed, perhaps more than I had realized.

Talco-Bogata CISD Unanimously Passes Reduction In Force Recommendation

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District met in regular meeting on January 17 in the Rivercrest High School Board Room.

Trustees present were Jerry Russell, Frank Stubblefield, Eddy Brown, Ricky Franks, Sandra Ingram, John Ward. Trustees absent were Mollie Williams. School personnel present were Freddy Wade, Ray Miller, Jimmy Lee, Johnny Gable, Janice Franks. Others present were Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Shupp.

Prayer was led by Ricky Franks. The Board went into Executive Session at 7:35 p.m. The meeting reopened at 9 p.m.

The minutes from the December 6, 9 and 13 meetings, financial reports, cafeteria report, tax report and payment of bills were approved.

Budget 003 was approved as presented.

The Board adopted the Resolution

for the sale of the Rosalie School property, amending it to say the school will reserve all mineral rights, and if the Rosalie Community Club discontinues use of the property, it will revert back to the Talco-Bogata CISD.

The Block Scheduling was accepted as presented.

A report was heard on the computer at Rivercrest and updated information on the grade school computers.

Mr. Wade presented information on reorganization of the 7th and 8th grades. The Board's feeling was to leave as is if the District could not save money.

Mr. Wade presented a recommendation on Reduction in Force and was accepted unanimously by the Board to take the reduction in force recommendation one at a time.

Motion was made and carried unanimously to cut one personnel in

the counseling program.

Motion was made and carried to cut the coaching staff by one. Motion was also made and carried to cut the support services by one.

Motion was made and carried by cut the elementary staff when class size permits.

A plan for an Agriculture Storage building was unanimously approved.

The School Board election date was set for May 7, 1994.

The Board discussed head football coach and athletic director and decided to continue to interview for the coach and athletic director positions.

The Board decided to let the Superintendent's contract run its course, and to leave the Superintendent's salary the same.

As the last matter of business, Donna Miller's resignation was accepted and the board adjourned at 11:30 p.m.

Book Fair To Be Held At Bogata School Library

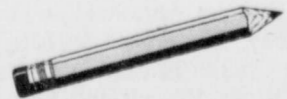

Janie Ballard, who is married to Mike Ballard, has 2 children; Ginnifer 20, and Ryan 17. Ginnifer is a Junior at Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, and Ryan is a Junior at Spring High School in Gladewater. Janie works as a payroll specialist for Gladewater Schools. Goddaughter, Glenda Ballard (married to Jack) has 2 children, Marlene is a 10 year old fourth grader and six year old Jordan is in the first grade. They live in Texarkana.

The Lowry's favorite meal is Red Beans, Mashed Potatoes, and Cornbread with a slice of onion. They also like steak and homemade soup. They have a garden and a truck patch, and they kill a calf each year so they have a freezer full of vegetables and meat.

Hunk Potato Salad

by Mary Jane Lowry
Use amounts according to the number to be fed.
-Cut potatoes into large chunks. Boil until tender but not soft as for creaming.
-Cut fresh tomatoes into fourths.
-Cut bell peppers into short strips.
-Pickles, either dill or sweet according to taste, may be added; also boiled eggs cut into fourths if desired.
Let potatoes cool. Mix everything together, pour your favorite dressing over it and let sit in fridge several hours or overnight.

Pecan Pie

1 cup of white corn syrup
1 cup of dark brown sugar
1/3 cup melted butter or margarine
1 heaping cup shelled pecans
3 whole eggs (beaten)
a dash of vanilla and a pinch of salt
Mix above ingredients well, pour into an unbaked 9 inch pastry pie shell and bake in 350 degree oven for 45 or 50 minutes. Cool and top with whipped cream or ice cream. Even served plain, nothing tops this.

Perfect Cornbread (Mary Frances Aufricht recipe)

1 cup sifted flour
1/4 cup sugar
4 tsp. baking powder

3/4 tsp salt
Sift the above together, and stir in:
1 cup yellow cornmeal
Add
2 eggs
1 cup milk
1/4 cup soft shortening
Beat until smooth, but do not overbeat. Pour into greased 9x9x2 pan. Bake at 425 degrees about 20 minutes.

Sweet and Sour Meat Loaf

1 1/2 pounds ground beef
1 cup dry bread crumbs
1 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
2 eggs
1 tsp instant minced onion
1 can (15 ounces) tomato sauce, divided
Topping
Reserved tomato sauce
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 cup sugar
2 tsp. prepared mustard
Mix together beef, bread crumbs, salt, pepper and eggs. Add onions and one half of tomato sauce. Form into loaf in 9X5X3 pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. In saucepan, combine topping ingredients. Bring to a boil. Pour over meat loaf; bake 10 minutes longer.
Yield: 6 servings

Jackie O, the Fulbright donkey, left for the Mitchell Ranch on Saturday.

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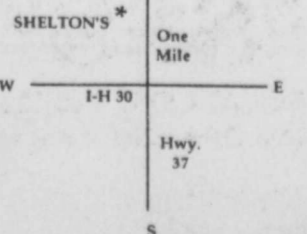

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
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Varsity Lady Rebels Lose Two: 63-45 and 63-40

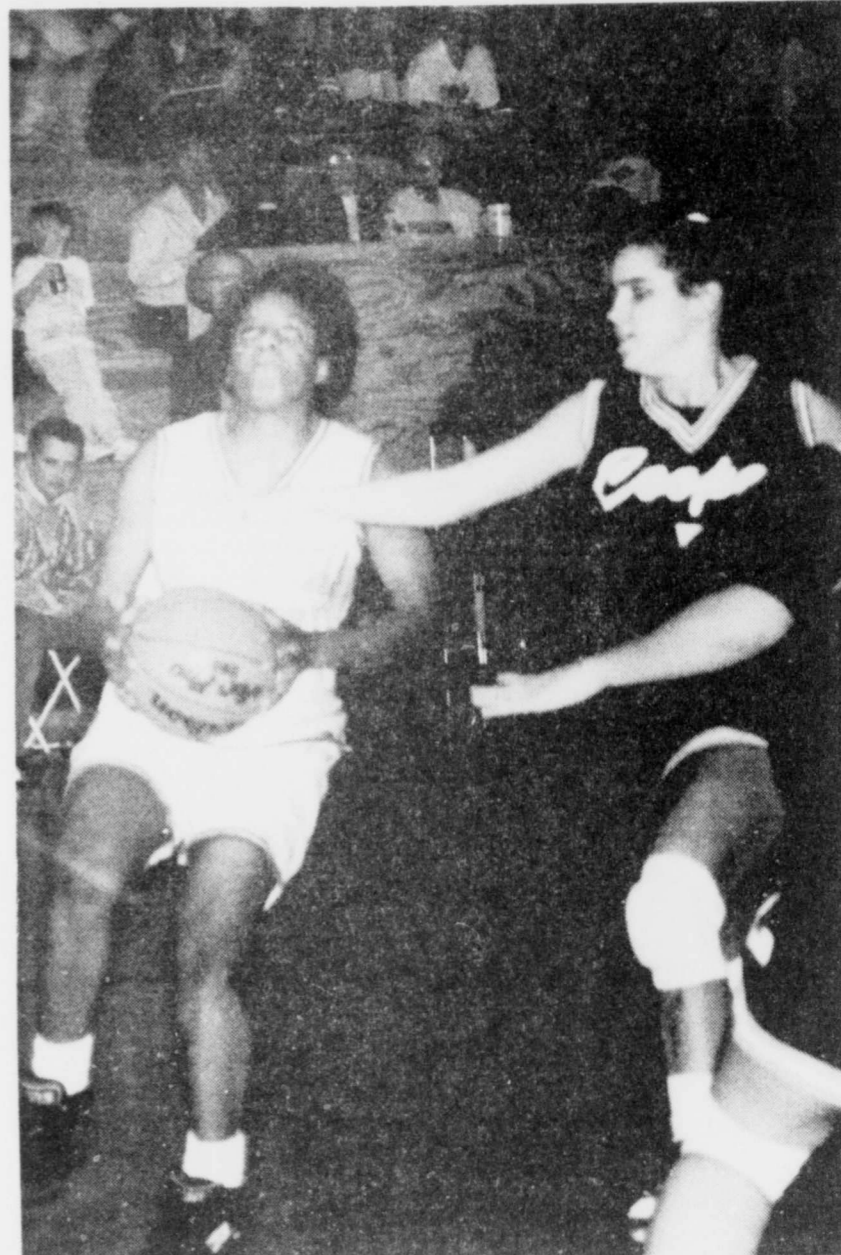

Easements May Help FmHA Farm Borrowers Restructure Debts

"Farmers with loans from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) may be able to put flood-damaged land under conservation easements in exchange for a reduction in their debt," George Ellis, FmHA State Director said today.

Use of the easements is not limited to flood areas, but it may be particularly helpful in such areas.

"Eligible lands may include wetlands, marginal farmland, highly erodible land, woodland, wildlife areas and several others," Ellis said. "In certain areas, there may be instances where farmland was damaged so severely by the recent flooding that restoring it may cost more than it's agricultural value."

"In those cases, a conservation easement may be a solution. Under this program, a voluntary easement can be placed on a portion of the land

in return for reduction in amount owed to FmHA."

Ellis said the easements are for 50 years or more and can help rebuild soil conditions as well as encourage development of wildlife habitat.

"Not only can FmHA farm borrowers take marginal acreage out of production in this way, they also can materially reduce their farm operating costs," Ellis said.

Farmers who think they may be eligible should contact their local FmHA County Office for further information.

Grocery store coupons

A lot of people collect coupons to redeem when they make purchases at the grocery store.

The coupons can save you money and, in some cases, lower the amount of sales tax you pay on your purchases.

Whether you save tax, of course, depends on the items you purchase. Food items are not subject to sales tax, whether you pay the full price for them or use a coupon to lower the price.

The real savings comes when you purchase otherwise taxable items with a coupon. Suppose you purchase a package of party napkins that are priced at \$1.50. Without a coupon you'll pay sales tax on the full amount.

A coupon for the napkins valued at 50 cents lowers the price of the item to \$1. Now, you'll only pay sales tax on \$1.

About that restaurant coupon

Let's say you and a companion plan to have dinner at a restaurant. You've received a coupon that entitles you to order two dinners, pay the cost of the higher meal and receive the second dinner free.

It's a good idea to tell the waitperson before you order that you have a coupon.

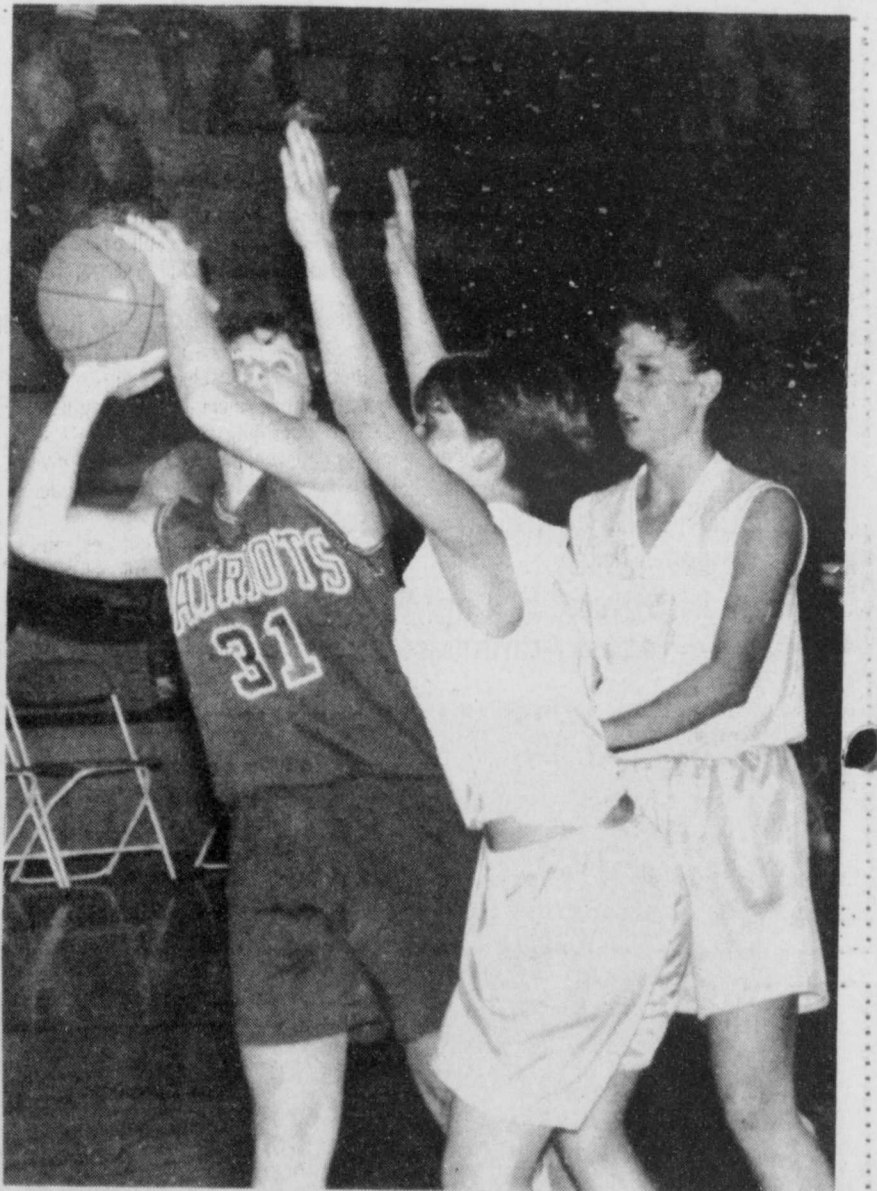
Then the waitperson knows to deduct the cost of the lesser meal from the total bill before figuring the sales tax.

In other words, you'll owe sales tax only on the total amount you pay for the meal—not the cost of the meal before the value of the coupon is deducted.

Two-For-One

The same thing applies to a "buy-one-get-one-free" offer. Maybe you buy one pizza and a coupon entitles you to receive a second pizza free. You owe sales tax only on the total amount you paid for the pizzas.

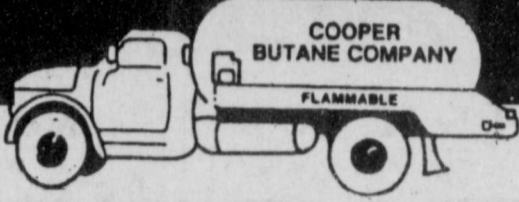
