Nine years ago (can it really have been that long) I went to Egypt. My friend Jayne King went with me, as those of you who are long-time readers of this publication may recall.

And, you may recall that I told of a very special jaunt while at Aswan, on the Nubian border of Egypt. I will try to sum up the episode once again.

We had several hours before our cruise ship on the Nile would arrive, so we asked our guide what we could see or do in that

He hired a 13 year old boy to sail a felucca (an ancient type of sail boat), up the Nile to the hills, where we trekked back into the tumbled rocks to see ancient hieroglyphics inscribed onto huge boulders.

On the way down we passed the village of our young boatman, and he invited us into his home. There, in a cramped room with a dirt floor and a single lightbulb, we gestured and tried to communicate with the family and shared their hot tea. As we sat with them and visited the women in the home brought forward their babies and one after another we held and cuddled

Soon, every woman in the village with an infant appeared, thrusting them towards us, in a peculiarly solemn manner.

We made the properly admiring noises, but at the time were aware something was going on that we didn't quite understand. Now, nine years later, this little

mystery may be solved. Several weeks ago I made a presentation to a sixth grade reading class at Blossom about Egypt, which they were studying. During the speech I mentioned this odd

occurance with the babies. Their teacher called me last week to read me a passage from a book she has been reading.

The book is written by a black man who went to Africa several years ago to research his roots. And, although the location was not Nubia, but another part of the continent of Africa, the description he gives of having babies presented to him, thrust at him almost urgently, is almost exactly the same as our experience.

He, also, was puzzled by the little ceremony, until about a year later when he was speaking about the incident to a professor who informed him that he had participated in an ancient ceremony called the "Laying On Of Hands"

It has nothing to do with the healing type of laying on of hands, and in fact, pre-dates Christianity.

The professor explained that it meant, quite literally, "I am you and you are me". Children are, of course, a world-wide symbol for our hopes and dreams of the future, therefore perfect to make such a statement with.

Since we were the only "tourists" to visit this little village in years, it certainly wasn't something done on a routine basis in hopes of tips!

Were we then honored by this presentation....told that we were accepted in spite of our differances? Or is it simply a custom that has survived through thousands of years, a courtesy extended to all who enter their

I shall never know.

"I am you and you are me". A phrase I heard last week....but which was spoken to me nine years ago. How strange, to have the translation come so many years later, and how I wish I could have comprehended then!



for blocked coronary arteries.



A 6.6 earthquake, 1,500 aftershocks thus far with some registering in the 4.0's and 5.0's, and a prediction of over 10,000 aftershocks within one month.

Los Angeles has taken its fair share of bumps and bruises over the past three years: the drought, the rains and mudslides, the riots, the fires, and of course, the earthquakes. Nevertheless, this recent jolt was something no amusement park can imitate. Normally, an earthquake rolls, and you feel as though you're at sea with waves roughly rumbling underneath you. This particular quake felt like being a penny in a shoebox, with someone taking the box and shaking it as hard as they could for 40 seconds.

For my own self, 40 seconds seemed like an eternity. Being asleep at 4:31 a.m., I was slammed around in the pitch dark, hearing everything crash around me in my apartment. It was a helpless feeling, and I could not do anything to stop it. I quickly learned that I was not the one in control.

Two weeks later, I look at restaurants where I ate....gone, shops where I bought goods...gone, places where people lived...gone. The pictures that I have seen and the words that I have heard on television do not even remotely come close to the devastation this city has experienced. You are receiving only a portion of the truth.

They have called it "The Northridge Earthquake" because the epicenter originated from that location. Yet, the damage extends over at least a 60mile radius. A rough estimate has repairs costing over 30 billion dol-

If you look for silver linings in dark clouds, you will eventually see them. I am the manager of a 7-unit complex, and my tenants worked with one another cleaning and restoring the complex. And on the first night following the quake, with only candles bearing light, we gathered around the dining table and gave thanks for life and the blessings that we had received. We had pulled together in the moment of crisis, and dealth with the circumstances surrounding us. And we realized most importantly that possessions are re-

placeable; the gift of life is not.

I want to thank everyone who has called my parents and myself concerned about my status. I am fine. Your prayers are needed though for the thousands without homes and who hav elost all that they had and for a city still reeling from a distant riot and a not so distant rage of fires. And most of all, I ask you to be thankful. Not for a particular item or thing, just be thankful for the goodness of life and all that it brings.

Soybean Referendum Set For February 9th

Soybean producers may vote February 9 to determine if the Soybean Promotion and Research Order program will be continued.

Assessments of 0.5 of 1 percent of the net market of soybeans has been collected from September 1, 1991 to the present from producers selling soybeans. This money has been used to conduct a coordinated program of promotion, research, consumer information, and industry information.

Producers who certify that they produced soybeans between September 1, 1991 and December 1, 1993 will be eligible to vote. The vote itself will take place on February 9,

1994 at the County Extension Office, and will be in person by secret ballot. Soybean producers are to vote in The County Extension Office in the county in which they reside, even if production was in another county or state.

The time period for requesting absentee ballots was from December 1, 1993 until the close of business January 21, 1994. Those not casting an absentee vote must take part in the February 9 referendum in order to

FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL NOTICE

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has received an application for financial assistance from Red River County Water Supply Corporation located in Clarksville, Red River County, Texas to improve/expand the existing water distribution system to serve existing and new customers in Red River County, Texas.

The specific components of this proposed action are to provide two (2) new water supply wells, two (2) elevated water tanks, one (1) remote water pressure tank, one (1) pumping station with pressure tank, and approximately forty-one (41) miles of water main along with necessary valves, fittings and appurtenances to serve their existing 1,490 water users and additional 160 new water

FmHA has determined there is no practical alternative to the location of the water distribution lines within the designated floodplain. Any adverse impacts to the floodplain will be mitigated by prohibiting the extension of service to structures not existing in the floodplains as published in the Bogata News newspaper on December 9, 1993 and in The Clarksville Times newspaper on December 2 and 16, 1993.

With the incorporation of the mitigation measure, FmHA has determined that the locational impact is minor to the extend that the floodplain or wetland natural value or functions are not

FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of the proposed action and has determined that it will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. Therefore, FmHA will not prepare an environmental impact statement for this project.

a total of \$12.6 million for their January rebates, a 20.6% increase over January 1993 payments of \$10.4 million. These payments include taxes collected on November sales and reported to the Comptroller in Decem-

"For the fourth consecutive month, year over year employment increased statewide," Sharp said, "for an average of 2.1% above last year's fig-

The city of Houston received a monthly payment of \$15 million, the largest city sales tax rebate for this month, a 15.1% increase over last year's \$13 million.

The \$9.9 million payment to the city of Dallas was the second largest payment for January, up 29.4% above the \$7.7 million sent to the city for the same period last year.

SSI Celebrates 20th Anniversary [

By Ray Hudson **District Manager** Paris, TX Social Security Office

This month, the Supplemental Security Income program, better known as SSI, joins the '20-something' crowd. The first SSI benefits were paid in January 1974 to about 3.2 million people. This month, an estimated 6.2 million individuals will receive payments under this program managed by the Social Security Administration that pays benefits to people with low incomes and few assets if they're 65 or older, or if they are blind or have a disability.

Many original SSI recipients had been on state assistance rolls before the federal program was established. SSI was set up to provide a nationally uniform standard for people with little or no income. In January 1974, the highest federal SSI payment to an individual was \$140 per month. Beginning this month, the national payment standard for an individual will

Although the SSI program was designed for needy people of all ages, more than half the original SSI population was 65 or older. Things have changed considerably in the last two decades. Individuals with disabilities are now the largest segment of SSI beneficiaries representing nearly three-fourths of all recipients. And children are the fastest-growing recipient group, accounting for nearly 23 percent of all SSI beneficiaries with disabilities. In December 1975, the first month such statistics are available, children represented only three percent of disabled SSI recipients.



given high priority to identifying individuals who might be eligible for SSI. Our goal is to make sure that anyone potentially eligible for SSI is aware of the program and is given every opportunity to file for benefits.

Individuals who think they might be eligible for SSI can call their local Social Security office to discuss the program or set up an appointment to file for benefits.
