## John Howison Is Appointed To Board By Governor

Governor Ann Richards has named John McCoul Howison, of Bogata, to the Board of Sulphur River Basin Authority. Howison is the first resident of Red River County to be named to the six member Board.

The eleven-county Sulphur River Basin Authority (SRBA) has jurisdiction for the six river segments of the Sulphur River, except for the portion of the Sulphur River Basin in Fannin County. The Authority's area, extending from Lamar county to Texarkana, includes a population of 160,000 and 3600 square miles, of which less than 4 per cent is urbanized land.

The SRBA was created by the Texas Legislature nine years ago, largely on the initiative of current Senator Bill Ratliff of Mount Pleas-

ant. It seeks to assure that the Basin's water resources will be developed for the economic benefit of the local area, and that the quality of these resources will be protected.

Almost 93 percent of the basin consists of open land use, including grassland, cropland, and woodland. Industries of economic importance to the SRBA area include chemical production, petroleum production, lignite mining, paper products, fabricated metal products, food products, dairies, and agriculture.

Some of the water quality concerns of the past have led to the upgrading of municipal wastewater facilities in the area. At present 46 permit holders are allowed to discharge 28 million gallons of waste water per day. Approximately half of this water is discharged in the Texarkana area.

2 cups sugar  
1 stick butter  
pinch of salt  
4 Tbsp. Cocoa  
1 cup peanut butter

1 stick butter, melted and cooled to room temperature  
1-6 oz. pkg. Toll House Morsels  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
one 9 inch unbaked pie shell

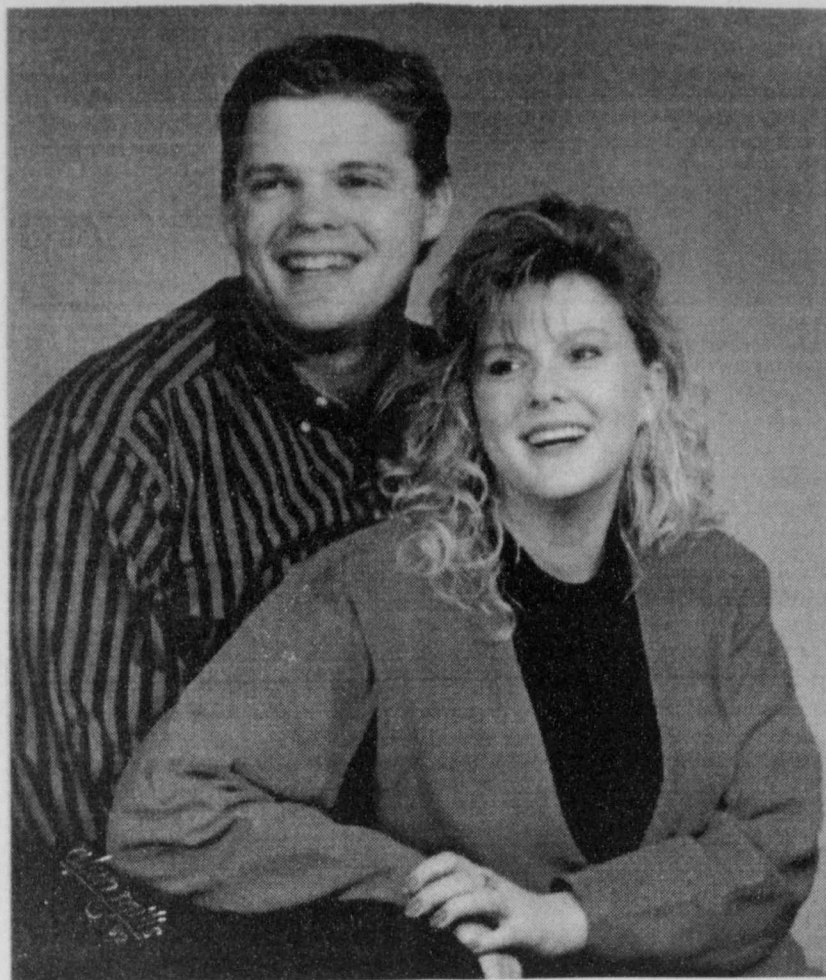

### Keeping Healthy

Age-Related Macular Degeneration

If you're over 50 and the telephone pole or door frame seem a little bent or crooked, you may have the earliest stage of macular degeneration.

The condition, a gradual destruction of a portion of the retina, affects about two percent of those 50 to 65 years old and about 11 percent of those 65 to 75.

People who have the problem do not become blind, but they may lose the ability to see fine details.

Because early diagnosis is the key to successful treatment, everyone over 50 should have regular eye examinations.

The use of vitamins or zinc to prevent progression of the disease is the subject of many investigations, but at present there is no scientific evidence to support their efficacy. There is also no conclusive evidence about whether blocking sunlight with tinted glasses can help prevent progression of the disease.

The best prevention is a regular eye examination, coupled with awareness of the condition. If you notice a change in your vision, let your ophthalmologist know about it promptly.

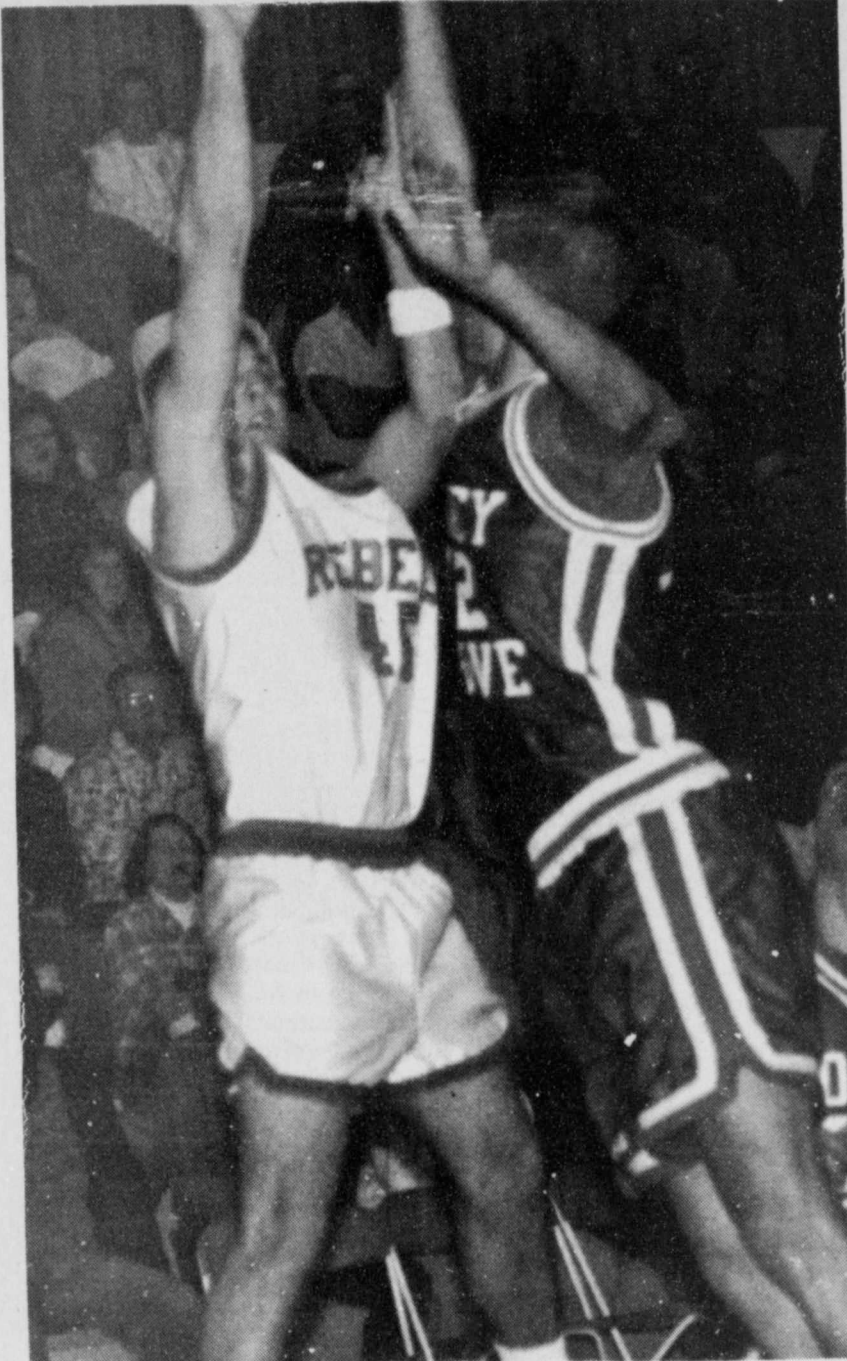

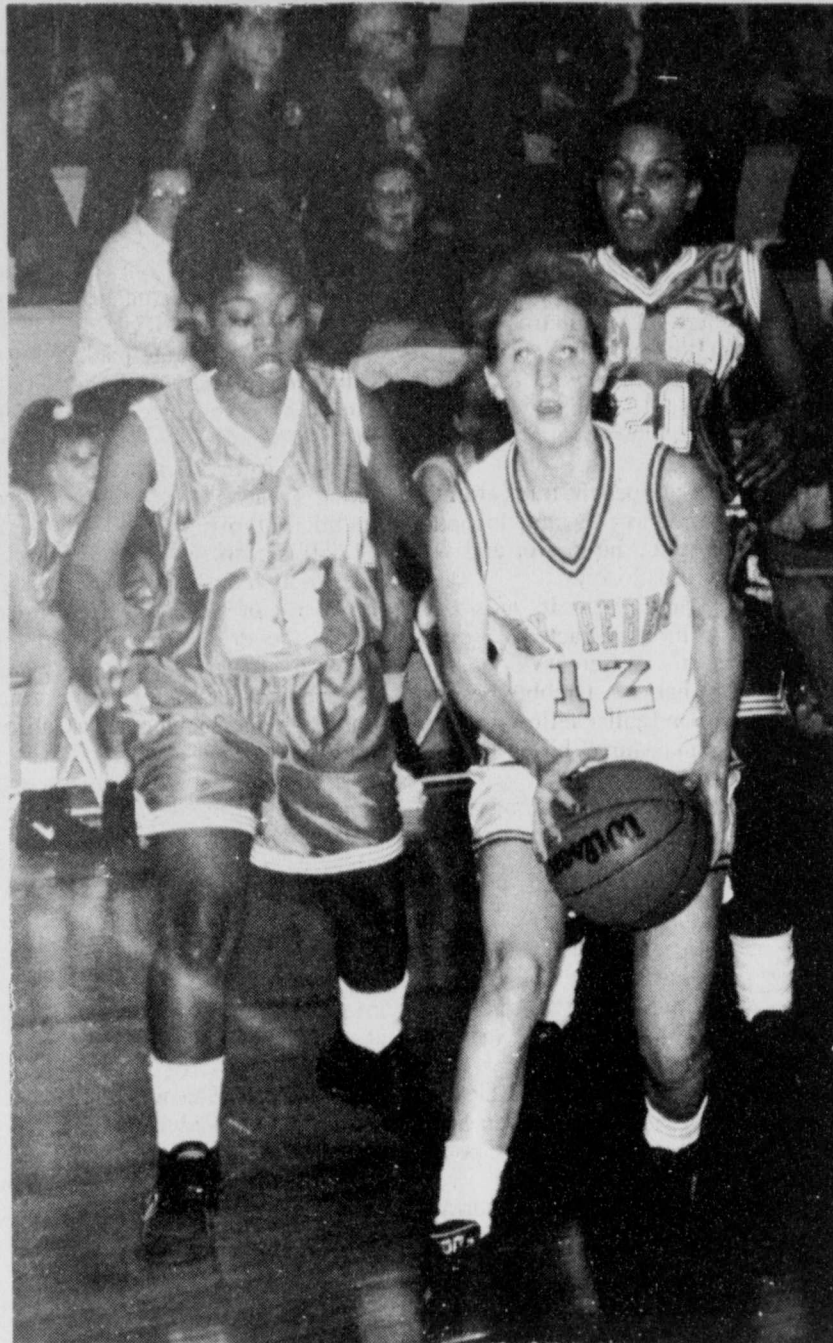

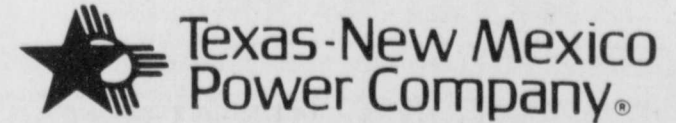

## Record Drug Bust Made In Franklin Co

Franklin County DPS Trooper Willie Drabble made what may be the largest seizure of drugs based on a traffic stop in Texas Saturday when he stopped a U-Haul truck loaded with furniture and appliances.

The truck was found to contain 873 pounds of cocaine, with an estimated street value of approximately \$39,110,400.

Drabble stopped the truck after the driver refused to pass him, no matter what the speed he drove, and was following too closely.

When the Hispanic man and woman in the truck acted very nervously and told different stories about their destinations, Drabble became suspicious and called fellow troopers Scott Lee and Murl Whitley for back up.

The couple gave their consent to search the truck, which was filled with used furniture, appliances and other household goods.

The troopers first found a clothes dryer which was stuffed with packages of cocaine. The couple was placed under arrest and the truck was taken to the Franklin County Sheriff's Office and searched further. A field test of one of the packages indicated cocaine which was more than 80% pure, according to Franklin County Investigator Gerry Allen.

Marko, one of Franklin County's drug dogs, was called, along with his

handler, Deputy Ricky Jones. Marko "hit" on a gas range and upright refrigerator/freezer. Both were packed to the brim with packages of cocaine. The 873 pounds of high grade cocaine in 174 separate packages was estimated to be worth \$44,800 a pound, \$400 an ounce, or \$11 to \$16 million wholesale. The packages weighed from 2.5 pounds to seven pounds each. No weapons were found, but officers did find over \$1,500 in cash.

Although the truck was rented in Ft. Worth, officers are still unsure of where the drugs were loaded and where the couple was taking them.

Arrested were Jorge Martinas Cardenas, age 25, who had a California driver's license with a San Bernardino address, and a passenger Omega Sanchez, age 30, who had a Texas driver's license with an El Paso address.

Bond was set by Justice of the Peace Paul Lovier at \$5 million each. They remain in the Franklin County Jail on charges of possession with intent to deliver over 400 grams of cocaine.

Assistant District Attorney Al Smith, whose office will be prosecuting the couple, said the local officers had prepared an excellent case.

The traffic stop was made at 4:50 p.m. February 5 at the 145 mile marker of I-30.



# Confusion On Election Day

by Judy Screws

I am always in a state of confusion when I go to the polls to vote. I wonder what the person who is elected will do once he takes office, how much he makes, and how long he will be in office. The voting booth is not the place to find out how you want to vote. I have been known to just put a mark by a name, because it was a woman, or because I liked the way the name sounded. This is no way to vote. I decided to at least find out about the duties and salaries of the elected officials in the upcoming Red River County Election. When I go to the polls on March 8, to vote, I'll be a little better informed, and as you

have probably already guessed if you read this far, so will you. I'll not print how much each official's salary is, but it is a matter of public record, so you can find out if you like. The following is an overview of the results of my investigation. When I list the candidates, the number beside their name is the position they will hold on the ballot.

When a person decides he or she would like to run for public office, they must register with their party chairman by the appointed date and pay a filing fee. All positions on the ballot this time paid a \$600.00 filing fee, except the Justice of the Peace

Candidates, who only paid \$300.00 each. The party chairman takes that filing fee, and with it he pays for election supplies, election judges' salaries, printing of ballots, and rents polling places. He takes for his part 5% of the election expenses and any money left is deposited in the state party fund. This money is held until the county needs it for election expenses.

The Texas Constitution makes a county a legal subdivision of the state; as a result, the powers and duties of a county are limited to those specifically allowed by the constitution and laws of Texas. Counties cannot create their own laws, but because of the difficulties of providing effective government services in more urbanized areas, many counties have been granted limited ordinance authority for special situations such as health care, vicious dogs, and massage parlors. The following is a list of positions up for re-election this term, who is running for the position, and what their duties will be if elected:

**County Judge**-The County Judge is the presiding officer and a voting member of the commissioners court. He or she oversees all county government departments through the court's responsibility for approving annual budgets for the entire county. County courts also probate wills and have jurisdiction over misdemeanors other than official misconduct and in those cases on which the highest fine may be imposed is \$500.00 or less. In mental illness and guardianships, and juvenile cases, the county judge has jurisdiction. He also conducts marriages and acts as a coroner when necessary. A county judge is not required to be an attorney but should be well informed. Running for county judge in the March 8 Primary are (1) L.D. Williamson and (2) H. Drue Pirtle.

**County Clerk**-The County Clerk is responsible for all county docu-

ments, supervises county elections, issues warrants for fines, records births and deaths, assists in the Democratic and Republican Primaries, is secretary to the commissioners court, and collects criminal fines and those assessed in county court. (1) Mary Hausler is unopposed in the race.

**District Clerk**-District Clerks are elected to serve particular judicial districts which may be comprised of several counties. The Red River County District Clerk serves 106th and 6th districts, and courts of appeals. The district clerk is the record keeper for all documents and evidence before the district courts. Clerks also swear in juries, track judicial files, and issue legal papers at the direction of the judge. Running for District clerk are (1) Mac Varley and (2) Clara Gaddis.

**County Treasurer**-The county treasurer deposits all revenue collected by the county; signs and registers all county warrants; disburses funds on the order of the commissioners court, keeps accounts of all receipts and expenditures of county funds, and the retirement system. (1) Beverly White is unopposed as county treasurer.

**County Commissioner**-Four commissioners are elected in each county from individual precincts. They serve four year staggered terms. Every two years at the general election, two commissioners are elected for four year terms. The commissioner and county judge make up the county commissioners court, the governing body of the county, responsible for county matters not assigned to other elected officials. Many people mistakenly believe the main job of the county commissioners is road and bridge building and upkeep. In the past, those were their major responsibilities, so county commissioners were commonly called "road

commissioners." Today, county commissioners may be properly seen as a member of the board of directors of the county's biggest corporation. Responsibility for voting on the budgets of each county department means commissioners must be familiar with all county functions.

Constitutional and statutory duties of the commissioners court include dividing the county into commissioner and justice of the peace precincts, establishing and maintaining roads, providing necessary county buildings, and managing public lands held by the county. On the March 8 ballot for commissioner are: Precinct 2- (1) Bob Cornelius (2) Melvin Raulston (3) Tommy Richardson (4) Ronnie D James (5) Arthur Castleman (6) Ronnie Hart (7) Larry Smith. Precinct 4 candidates are: (1) Alton Peek (2) Jimmy D. Cox.

**Justice of the Peace**-County wide Justices of the Peace have original jurisdiction in criminal misdemeanor cases which are punishable by fine only; exclusive jurisdiction in civil cases when the amount in controversy is \$200.00 or less; and other

jurisdiction as provided by law. Justices of the peace are ex-officio notary publics, may perform marriages and can act as coroners to determine why someone died. Additionally, justice courts have jurisdiction of civil matters in which exclusive jurisdiction is not in the district or county court and in which the amount in controversy is not more than \$5,000.00, cases of forcible entry and detainer; and foreclosure of mortgages and enforcement of liens on personal property in cases which the disputed amount is within the court's jurisdiction. On the March 8 ballot for Justice of the Peace are (1) James "Cotten" Davis (2) Dale Halyard (3) J.R. Lewis (4) Darlena Shimpock (5) Wilt Brown.

The only other position for election on the ballot is democratic chairman. This position is sought by Mrs. Sadie Halyard. This is the only elected position in which a write in vote counts, so don't waste your votes by writing names on the other positions.
