The Social Security Administra tion has begun 'reengineering' its dis ability program. The goal is to stream
line the process -- to line the process-- toensure that proper
decisions are reached in a timely manner.
Reengineering begins with a fundamental rethinking of the process for disability benefits and ends when hat individual receives a benefit or is found ineligible after completing all levels of admimistrative appeal. An 18-member reengineering project ensure dramatic improvements in the way the entire process works and is managed.
The steps in determining disability have not changed significantly since 1950s, yet case loads and the types of disabilities have changed radically. Improvement is urgently needed. Aboo under the Social Security and Supple mental Security Income (SSI) dis ability programs in 1994. This num ber representsan 1993 -percentincrease increase in the previous year. The workload currently consumes approximately 40-percent of SSA's operating budget and is expected to increase to mo he near future people expect when they apply for disability benefits, "focus group" meetings with peop
being held in various parts of the country. In addition, the reengineering project team is consulting with advocacy groups, case-
workers, and many of the Social Security employees who interview disability applicants daily. The team is visiting leading private sector organizations that have already
reengineered major business processes. The idea is to find similar processes that appear to be working particularly well and put them in place at Social Security. The review will not change the
definition of disability, whichrequires individuals to be unable to do substantial work for a year or more to qualify for benefits. The effort also will not affect individual benefit
amounts, nor will it change vocational rrehabilitation programs. And, Administrative Law Judges will con-
tinue to preside over disability heartinue to preside over disability hear-
ings. ings.

According to the National Weathe According to the National Weather
Service, the average dates of last frosts for our area is March 24. Remember, this date is an average which only
means there is a $50 \%$ chance a frost may occure at a later date. It is also wise to wait until the soil has warmed before planting seeds of warm-season crops. Soil temperaure at planting depth should be in the
upper 60's or into the 70's to increase seed germination and insure a good stand.
Some Some vegetable crops are cold-
hardy and can tolerate light forls hardy and can tolerate light frosts or freezes. These include beets, broc-
coli, cabbage, carrots, peas, lettuce, onions, parsley, radishes, spinach, cauliflower, collards, mustard, kale, and turnips. These can be planted in
late winter or early spring. ate winter or early spring.
It's normally best to plat warm-season crops in late spring as they will produce more high quality produce. During the hot summer such heat-tolerant crops as southern squash, and small fruited tomatoes Plant the best adapted varieties that are available as this can mean the
difference between gardening success and failure. Some of the current vegetable variety recommendations
