## Mildred Eudy Seeking Re-Election As Bogata Mayor

Mayor Mildred F. Eudy has announced her candidacy for the office of Mayor of Bogata. In an effort to give people a clear picture of her time as mayor of Bogata, Mrs. Eudy has given us a summary of the things which have transpired over the past few years:

Mayor Eudy and her husband, Bill, and their children, except for a two year period, have lived in Bogata since 1965. Mayor Eudy's and her husband's family have lived in Red River County for several generations. She is a member of the Methodist Church and the church choir. When the mayor took office, after Mr. Harbison resigned, she had her work cut out for her. The lift station on 37 had to be finished and water and sewer lines had to be laid. Thomas Park had to be built. The water tanks had to be cleaned, sandblasted and repainted. Mayor Eudy was will-

ing to listen to all concerns before making her decisions on matters. She asked for and received volunteers from the whole town to help implement these projects. The Lions Club went to work and raised needed money for Thomas Park. The town as a whole gave of themselves to make Thomas Park become a reality. The collapsed and dirty tanks are all in use now. She asked for and received a \$250,000.00 grant for another lift station and water and sewer lines to be built on N. Bryson Street. The city has in its works a 24 unit housing project which will be built on Highway 271. Plus we have allocation for V. Thedford Homes to be modernized. All of this at no cost to the taxpayers. In June of 1992, all full time employees started participating in Texas Municipal retirement system. She has upgraded all depart-

ments. She and the city council moved to buy mowers, a pickup, and a backhoe, etc., for the street and water department to work with. Under her leadership employee production has risen markedly. During the past three years, Bogata has been a target of sensation seeking media. Mayor Eudy has responded with discretion to these challenges. In the process she brought new dignity to the office of mayor. Mayor Eudy is the Chaplain of the Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. She is a Member of the State Community development Regional Review Committee, Arkansas Texas Region.

Mayor Eudy feels she has moved Bogata forward and she wants the opportunity to continue to do so. With your support May 7, she will make Bogata a better place for us all to live.

But the more we can get on Mondays, the better job and more time we can take to set it.

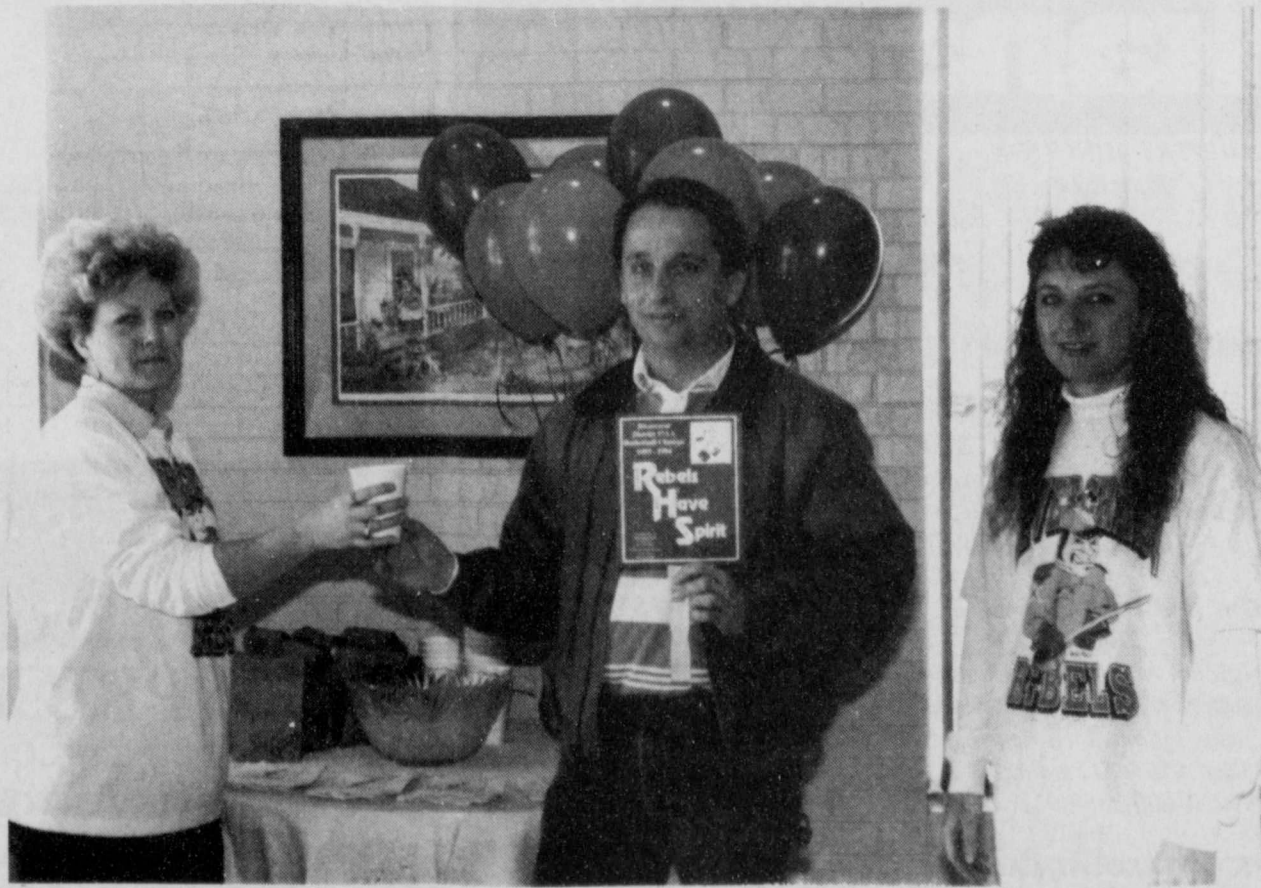

I really care for other people besides family, but I especially love family. Sometimes I love our children more than I like them. Right now they are all in pretty good shape with me.

Chris is the youngest of our children. She enjoys her family, crocheting, going to garage sales, and watching soap operas and cooking shows on television. She also enjoys something with which I cannot identify. She loves to re-arrange her furniture. I guess she got that from Mama. Daddy always said he never knew from one day to the next where their furniture would be when he came home in the afternoon. It's the same way at Chris' house.

Chris is a pretty good cook. She has always called long distance to get recipes when she started to cook

**Guacamole**  
by Chris Anna Screws  
4 avocados peeled and mashed save one to put back in  
1 large tomato diced  
6 green onions, chopped  
2 jalapena peppers seeded and chopped  
1/8 tsp salt  
1/8 tsp black pepper  
1/8 tsp chilli powder  
juice of 1/2 lemon  
Mix all ingredients well, put one seed back in the mixture to help guard against turning brown. Refrigerate. Serve on a bed of lettuce with chips.

**Taco Soup**  
1 lb. ground meat  
1 small onion chopped  
1-4 oz. can chopped green chillies  
1 tsp salt  
1 package taco seasoning mix  
1 pkg. Ranch dressing mix (dry)  
1 can hominy  
3 cans tomatoes  
1-15 oz can kidney beans  
1-15 oz can pinto beans

1 1/2 cups water  
Brown and drain ground meat. Stir in all other ingredients. Simmer a while. Serve with warm Flour tortillas.

**Pico de Gallo**  
2 large tomatoes chopped  
1 med. yellow onion chopped  
1 or 2 chopped Jalapena peppers  
1/4 tsp. salt  
juice of 1/2 lemon or lime  
6 to 8 cilantro leaves chopped  
Mix and serve on tacos or with beans.

**Flour Tortillas**  
8 cups White flour tortilla mix (Harina Preparada para tortillas)  
1 1/2 cups water  
Mix well. Roll into balls and roll the balls into thin circles. Heat on each side in a non stick skillet just until they start to brown. Makes about 36. \*\*\*\*\*To make pumpkin pies with this, add cinnamon and sugar to the flour before you add the water. Roll the circles out as before. Put pumpkin pie mix in the middle. Fold over like a fried pie but put in the oven and bake instead of frying.

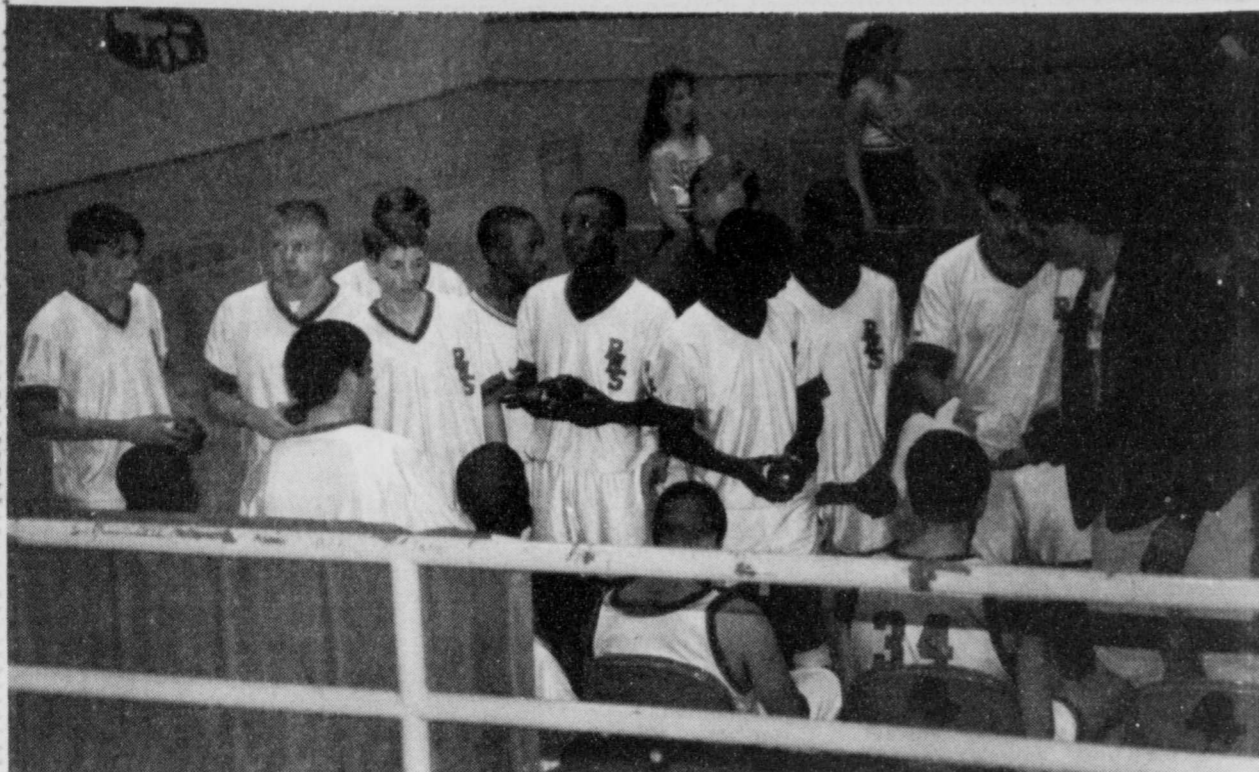

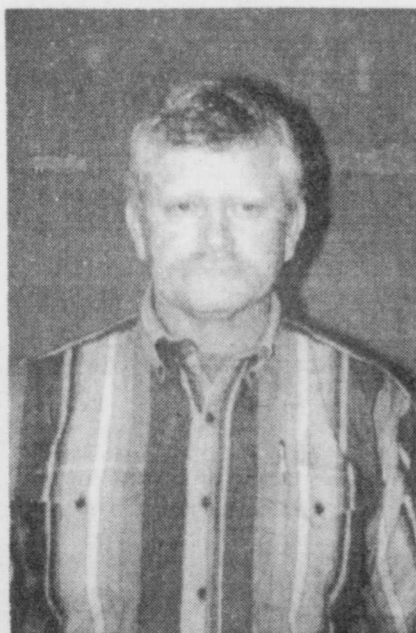

## James Davis Candidate For County-Wide Justice Of The Peace



With the experience I have gained during the eleven years you have allowed me to serve as your Justice of the Peace, I feel I am better qualified to serve and to operate this office in an efficient, energetic and economical manner.

I have certificates totaling 260 hours of education and certifications from Southwest Texas State University, Texas Justice Court Training Center, San Marcus, TX. I also have approximately 100 hours of additional training from specialty seminars such as Texas Bureau of Vital Statistics, Austin, in death investigation, death and birth certificates, juvenile law and truancy, emergency warrants for mental and chemical dependency and search warrants.

The most important change I feel necessary is to be available to the people 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to become your full time Justice of the Peace.

In 1983, when I took office, my salary was around \$4,000 a year. I took home approximately \$200.00 a month. At that time, I had a service station and maintained my office there. Through the eleven years, we have had salary increases and to date I am drawing \$7,812.82 a year and take home \$250.00 every two weeks. I continue to maintain my office in my home.

Due to inflation, it has been necessary to hold a second job in order to support my family and meet my obligations. Two years ago I had the opportunity to go into the trucking business, again for the benefit of my family. My third son graduated from high school last year and has joined his brothers in the trucking business. I can promise you, the people, that NOW I can be your full time Justice of the Peace. I've struggled for eleven years for a job that is very important to me. Please give me the opportunity to be there for you--"full time".

I also desire to have the most effectively run Justice of the Peace office with the utmost consideration and courtesy to the public while, at the same time, afford the most organized and timely "People's Court" for Red River County. I will call criminal docket weekly, civil and small claims monthly with the exception of Forcible Entry and Detainer, which will be heard 10 days after filing. The Justice Court is the People's Court and again, I intend for the people of Red River County to have the opportunity to utilize this court system in a timely, speedy, efficient manner and to have a court they will be very proud of.

I feel the eleven years of certification in Justice Court training will be a great relief of the taxpayers. Even though the state absorbs a great deal of the expense of Justice of the Peace training and education, the knowledge I have in the penal laws of Texas, Civil Practice and Remedies, Texas Rules of Court, Texas Criminal Procedure and the Code of Judicial Conduct will be a savings for taxpayers by removing them from any civil liabilities. Additionally, I already have the stamps and seals required by law, that bear my name along with checks and other documents required by law, to bear the name of Justice of the Peace.

I also intend to continue to utilize dockets and anything purchased by the other Precinct Justice of the Peace offices as all other elected offices belong to you, the people, and each voting taxpayer should have a voice in how each office is run.

I will always have an open ear and an open mind for any cost saving ideas and suggestions you might have for me.

These savings I've suggested will by no means hinder the efficiency of the office. Organization, an efficient system of checks and balances, being available on a full time basis, speedy trials and utilizing the tools the county has already purchased, will run the office more effectively.

I am prepared to give you, the taxpayer, my boss, 100% of my time and energy. With your vote of support, from my heart, I tell you, I will be your Public Servant.

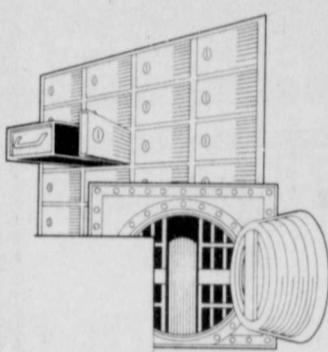

**Cowboys' Bill Bates To Be Guest Speaker**

The Dallas Cowboys 11-year veteran Bill Bates is the guest speaker at the Annual Banquet of the Mt. Pleasant/Titus County Chamber of Commerce, Thursday, March 31, 1994. The location is the Titus County Civic Center. Details about ticket sales will be released later.

1993 Chamber President, Larry Burns, Vice President American National Bank, will keynote his year of service. Also on the program will be 1994 President, Gary Brown, owner of Gary Brown Real Estate Appraisals and The Photo Shop.

Graduating from the University of Tennessee in 1983, scouting reports on Bates were all the same: "Good college player, but too small and too slow to play in the N.F.L." On Draft Day 1983 every N.F.L. team passed on the opportunity to draft the future All-Pro Bowl player. Bates and 175 other non-draftees obtained a tryout with the Dallas Cowboys. Although

"little and slow," his sheer intensity and determination caught the eye of Coach Tom Landry. The Cowboys took a chance and signed him to the lowest rookie contract allowed in the N.F.L.

The rest is history! Immediately establishing himself as a "Kamikaze" hitter, he was soon known through the league. In his very first season, Bates was selected as the Special Teams Player of the Year and single-handedly forced the N.F.L. to create a new position in the Pro Bowl for the Special Teams Player.

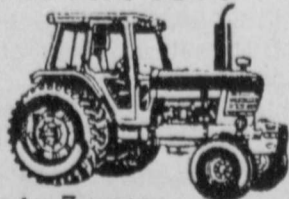

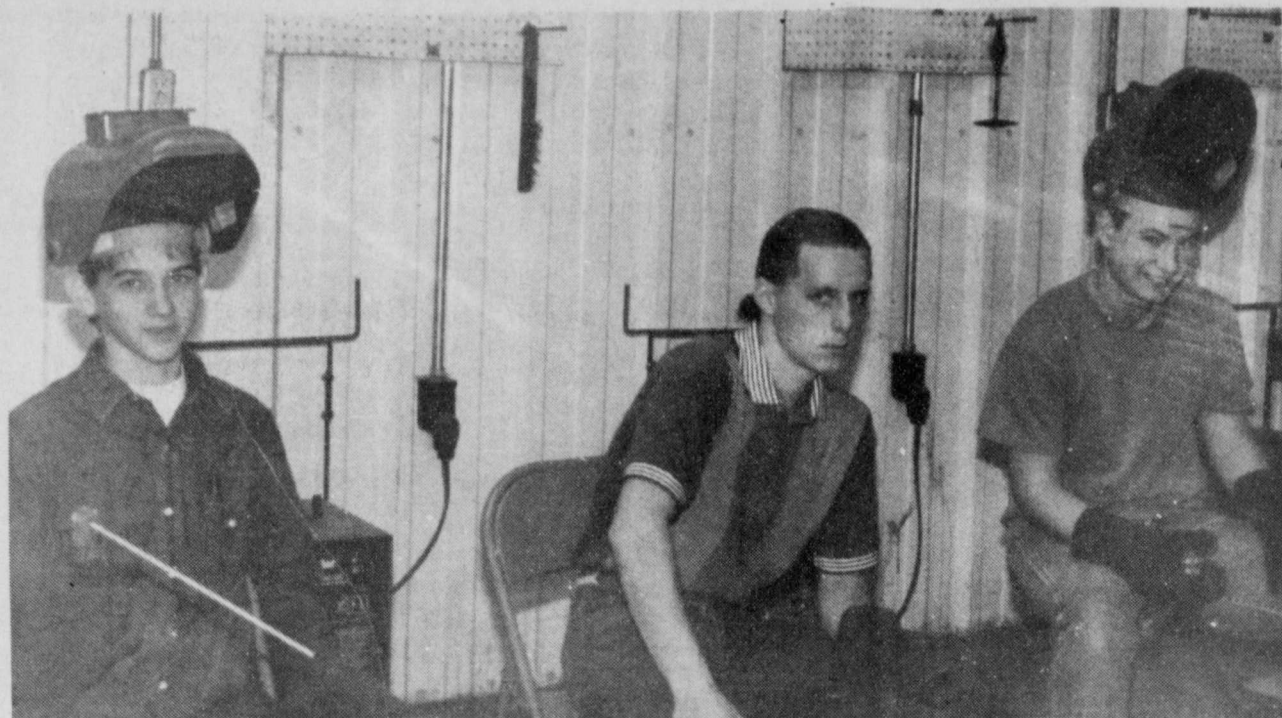

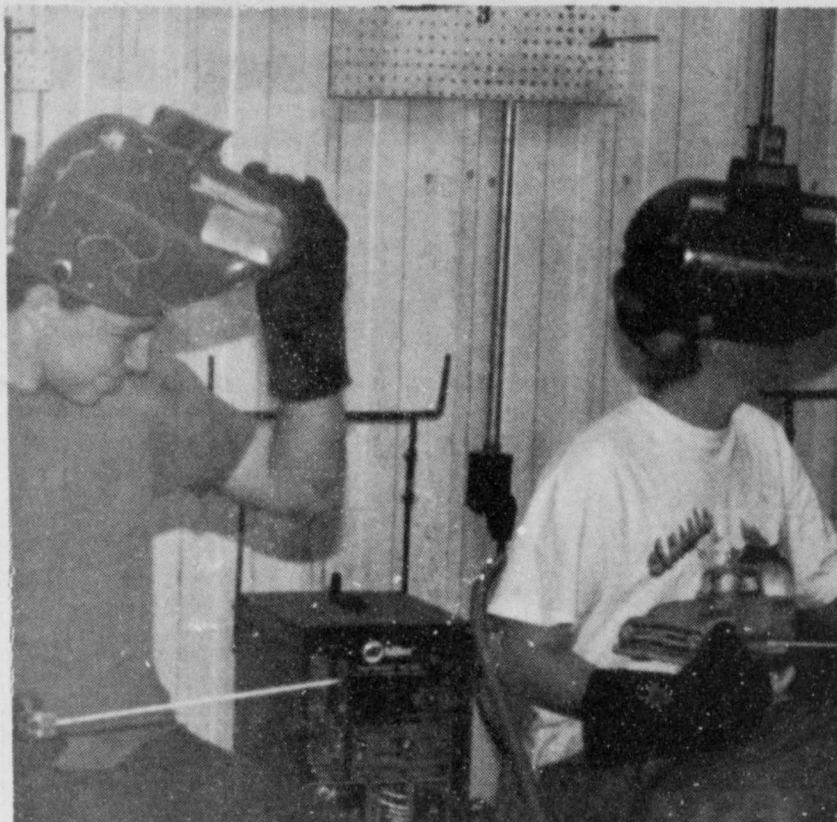

**Women Work Harder**

Women work harder than men, at home and at their jobs, according to a new study by two University of California, Santa Barbara sociologists.

Analyzing data from a representative national survey conducted by the University of Michigan, William and Denise Bielby studied 1,515 working men and women and found that women give more time and attention to their jobs than men despite the fact that women also spend more than twice as much time on household tasks.

The Bielbys' study concludes: "For women to work harder than men, despite their greater household responsibilities, they must be able to draw on a reserve of energy that is either not available to the typical male or, more realistically, that men choose not to draw upon."

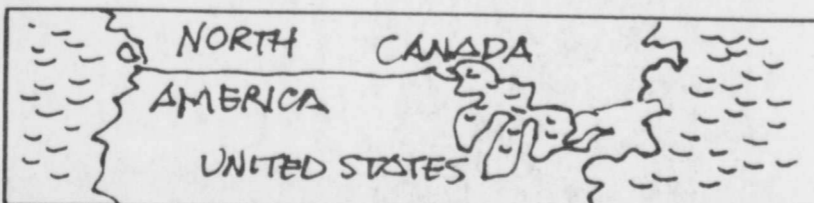

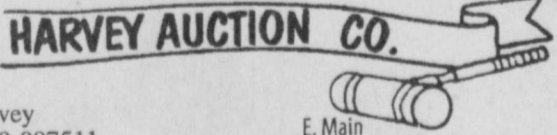
