## Talco-Bogata CISD Board Of Trustees Sign Up Deadline Approaching

According to Talco-Bogata CISD Superintendent Freddie Wade, the deadline to file for candidacy for the Vacancies on the Board of Trustees is March 23. Drawing for positions on the ballot will take place on March 24.

The election will be May 7 from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Ballots may be cast at Talco Elementary School and Bogata Elementary School.

There are three vacancies to be filled on the School Board.

Running for place one is incumbent Jerry Russell and Mike Rector. Mollie Williams, also an incumbent is the only person to have filed for place four.

Place seven, the At Large spot has been filed for by incumbent Ricky Franks and Kenneth Jeffery.

Although it is possible that others will file before the deadline this story will attempt to acquaint voters with the candidates that have already "thrown their hats into the ring".

Information and a photo of Mike Rector was not available at press time due to his work schedule.

Mollie Williams, Place four incumbent is seeking her second term. She has served as secretary for the Board for the past three years. Mollie is a life long resident of Bogata, she is married to Mike Williams and they have two daughters now attending Rivercrest High School, Mandy, a sophomore and Marla, a freshman.

Both girls will serve as Varsity cheerleader for the coming year. They also have a married daughter, Mikel Ann Haynes and two grandchildren. Mollie is administrative assistant at Guaranty Bank-Bogata. She has been employed there for four years. She was formerly the editor of the Bogata News. She has been active in the community affairs serving on various committees and worked for the local girls scout program. She and her family attend the First Assembly of God Church in Bogata.

Mollie says public education is facing some of it's worst times and she believes it will take board members, the administration, teachers, parents and concerned citizens working together to combat some of these problems.

"My philosophy is that students can receive a good education regardless of financial difficulties and social problems and I am committed to working toward this goal," she states.

Kenneth Jeffery, candidate At Large for the Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees has been a resident of Bogata for 42 years. He served on the school board 16 years when his four children were in school. Kenneth feels that "we have the best school system in the Red River Valley" and should continue giving young people, including his grandchildren, the best educational opportunities.

He is an active member of the United Methodist Church and a retired employee of Contel Telephone Company, after spending thirty-five years with the company.

He loves Bogata and it's people and wants the best for students.

Ricky Franks is the Place 7 incumbent. He has served 3 years and has signed up for re-election. Ricky is a 1979 Rivercrest High School graduate.

He is employed at Texas Utilities. He and his wife, Lori Hervey Franks, are lifetime residents of Talco and Johntown. They have one son Clint who is a Junior at Rivercrest, and one daughter, Kelsey, who is two years old.

They are members of the Calvary Baptist Church in Talco.

Ricky is a strong supporter of the school system and wishes to continue improving the educational system.

Jerry Russell is the place one incumbent. He has served 14 years on the board and has been in regular attendance at meetings and voted his convictions.

He attends Calvary Baptist Church in Talco and serves as a deacon, choir director and is a Brotherhood member.

Jerry works for Exxon. His wife, Barbara is a teacher at Rivercrest high school. They have two children, Greg and Jerilyn.

## McConnell Recognized As Land Heritage Family

The state of Texas recently honored Sam and Sammie McConnell as a Land Heritage Family at a special ceremony and reception held at the Lyndon Baines Johnson Auditorium at the University of Texas, in Austin, on January 21, 1994. This once in a lifetime event recognizes farming families who have continually owned and operated family land for 100 years or longer.

Mr. McConnell's maternal grandparents, J.C. and Sarah Waddell, came to Red River County, Texas, from North Carolina. They arrived in 1884 with their first child, Annie Mahala Waddell, and homesteaded 160 acres 12 miles south of Clarksville in what is now the Maple community.

Among the more than 100 years of land records, the McConnells have the original patent deed, signed by Governor Hogg on January 11, 1894. Tax receipts from 1886 show that J.C. and Sarah Waddell paid .84 cents county tax, .42 cents state tax, and .22 cents school tax for a total of \$1.48 on the 160 acres.

Sam and Sammie McConnell purchased the 80 acre "Home Place" in

1955 from Sam's parents, Will and Annie Mahala Waddell McConnell. Eight acres had been sold prior to this. In 1983 Sam was named as Outstanding Rancher in Red River County by the Soil and Water conservation District.

At the Austin ceremony, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Rick Perry presented the McConnells with a Certificate of Recognition as a Texas Land Heritage Family. One hundred twenty Texas families were recognized with over 2,000 friends and family members in attendance.

Attending the ceremony with the McConnells were Ken and Melanie Klein, of Whitehouse, and Morris, Ginger, Jill, and Alison Foster, of Bogata.

The McConnells have received official letters of congratulations from Ann Richards, Governor of Texas; Mike Espy, United States Secretary of Agriculture; Lloyd Benson, United States Secretary of Treasury; Senator Phil Gramm; Congressman Jim Chapman; Congressman Ralph Hall; and James B. Hunt, Governor of North Carolina.

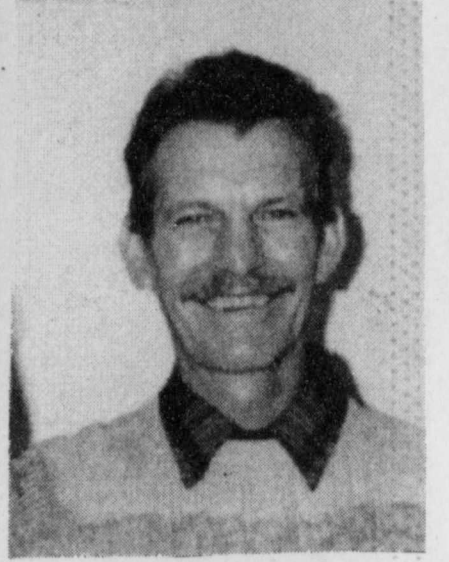

### Baked Spaghetti

- 1 Stick butter or margarine
- 1 onion- chopped
- 2 Garlic buttons -minced (may use garlic powder)
- 1 bell pepper- chopped
- 2 lb. ground beef
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of tomato soup
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 can sliced mushrooms (optional)
- 4 teaspoons chili powder
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 package of spaghetti
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 1 can tomato sauce

In a large skillet combine onions, garlic, green pepper and butter. Saute until golden brown. Add ground beef and brown. Add soups, tomato sauce, water, mushrooms, salt, pepper, and chili powder. 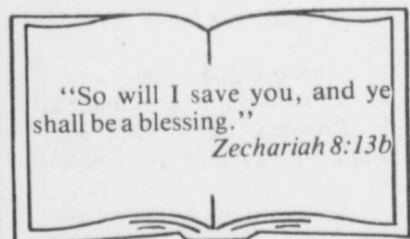

The Lady Pats took the win 15-12. Pitching for the Lady Rebels were Lindy Penn and Jaime Swarts.

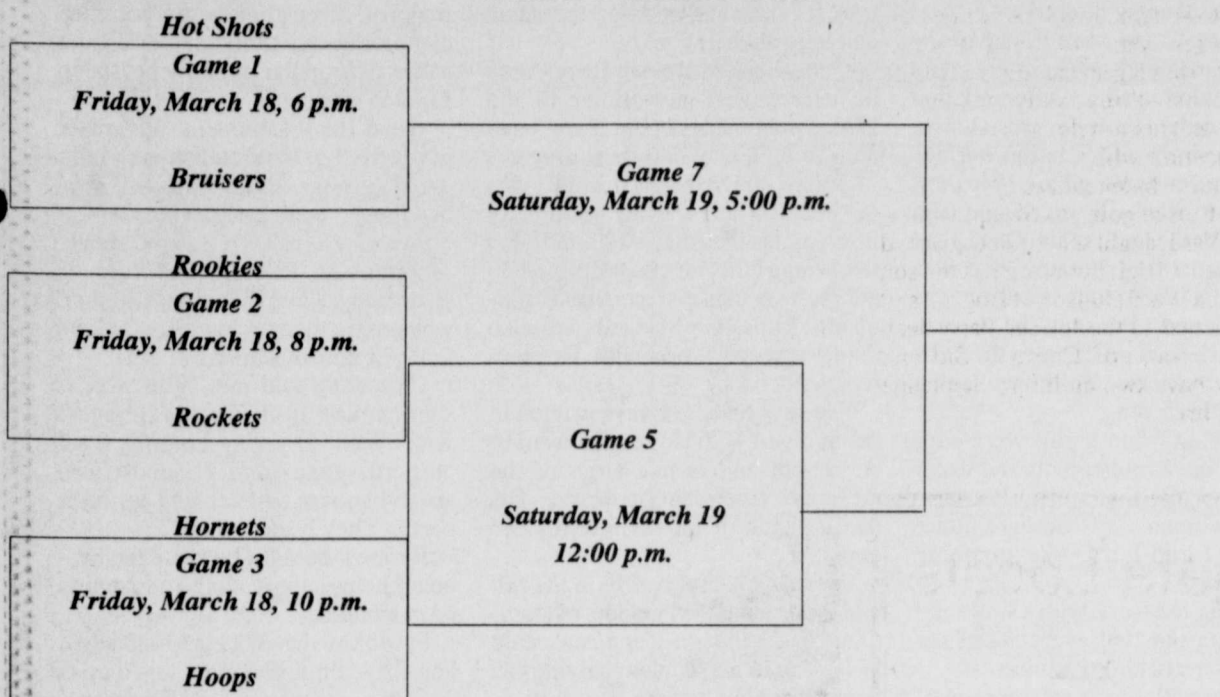
Coach Keith Brown said the girls made errors they had practiced hard not to make, and first game jitters played a part, but he expects improvement as the season progresses.

Coach Gary Schultz has an improving boys' baseball program.

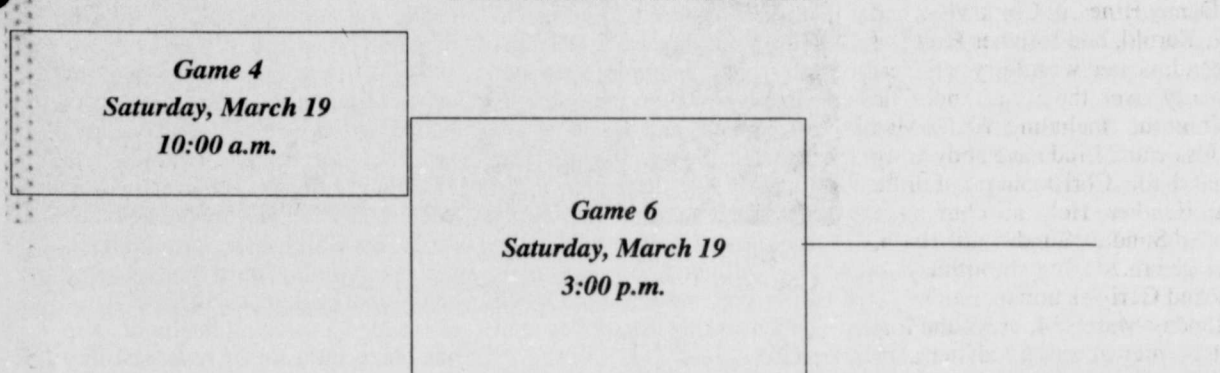

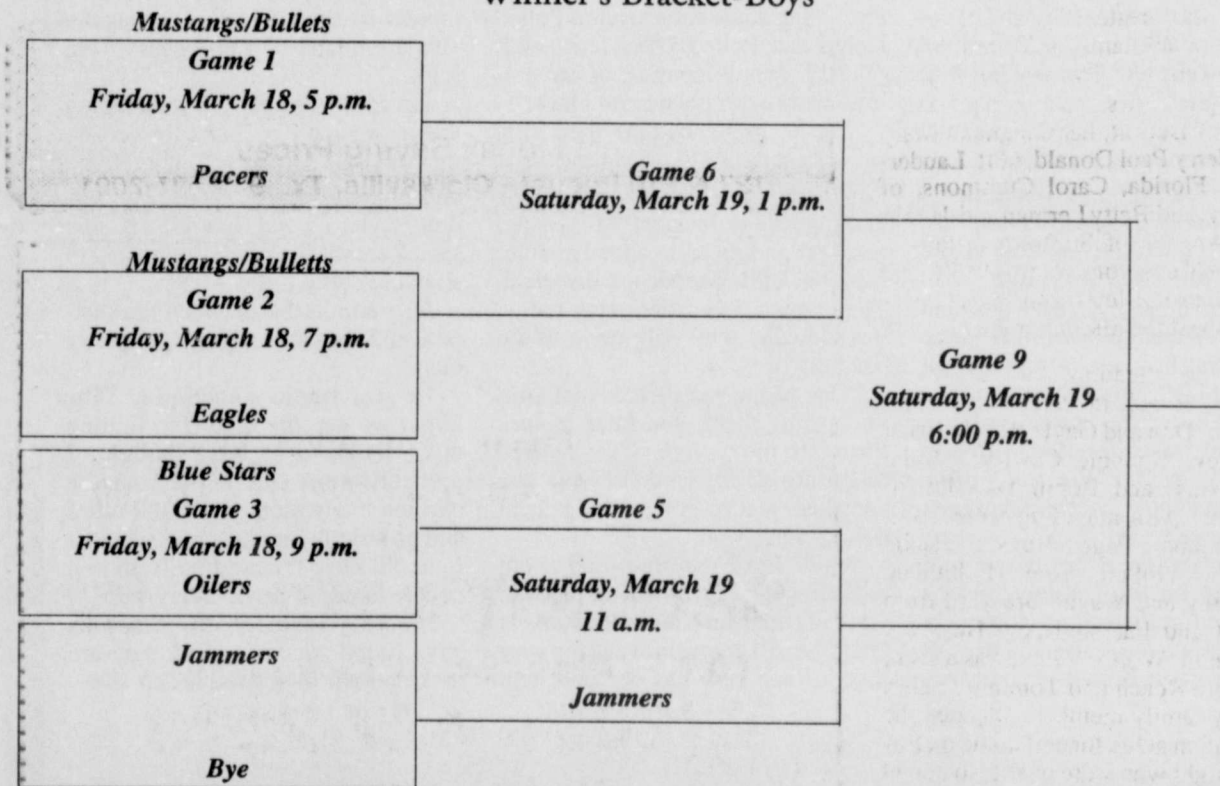

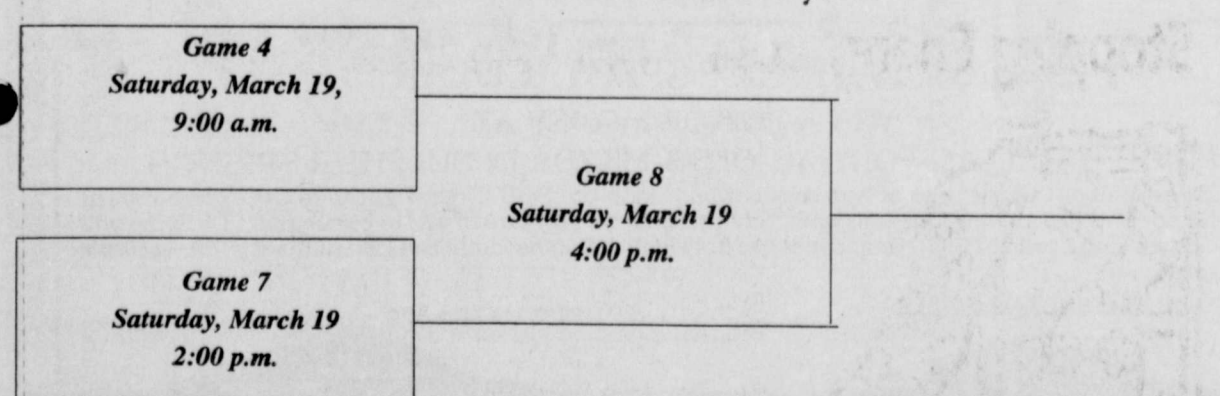

## Former Talco Resident Teaches Students About Ecology

Kindergarten teacher Gayla Dodd, known locally in Garland as "Mother Earth", can trace the origin of her zeal for environmental protection to the writings of Dr. Seuss.

She uses the "Mother Earth" moniker when she makes presentations involving environmental safety to local youngsters. She first saw the movie version of Seuss's fascinating and sad tale, *The Lorax*, in the early 1970's and was inspired to read the book. The story revolves around one overly ambitious individual whose wastefulness and greed leads to the decay of the environment.

Dodd's first contact with environmental issues came in the mid 1970's when she was appointed by the city to participate on a now defunct environmental council. She doesn't feel she accomplished much at that point in time.

She feels she has managed to convey her message to the thousands of kindergartners she has instructed over the past 20 years. These include her current 41 students in Shorehaven Elementary School. She is also chairwoman of Garland Clean and Green, the local branch of Keep Texas Beautiful/Keep America Beautiful.

As "Mother Earth" she discusses litter control, recycling, water pollution and consume power and has spoken to 6,000 children in various area schools and celebrations as well as workshops throughout the northeast Texas area. When in character, she wears an outfit made of continents and endangered species with a flowerpot on her head containing flowers made from aluminum cans.

She speaks to children as young as pre-kindergartners, but has yet to address middle or high schoolers. She may do so in the future, she said, if time and work permits.

As part of her classroom instruction, she takes compost to school in its various stages of decomposition. She places emphasis on recycling and conservation and also encourages her students to recycle paper.

Dodd doesn't consider ecological conservation to entail a drastic change of lifestyle, nor to take an unreasonable amount of time. One becomes used to the trappings, she said, which for her includes a worm bin in her living room and a compost pile in her backyard. She places her banana peels

in the worm bin and her used food on the compost pile. the compost is placed on her garden and plants.

Her children, Chad, 21 and Shana, 12, are both avid environmentalists, Dodd said.

Garland Mayor Bob Smith said he is impressed by Dodd's dedication. "She lives recycling," Smith said. "She is a living example of how recycling works. She's totally committed."

The children in Dodd's classes strongly support recycling and will

probably persuade their parents to do so, according to Dodd. Those who ignore composting and mulching the most are probably doing it to save time, she said.

Gayla Caldwell Dodd is the daughter of Nadine Caldwell of Talco. She attended Talco Schools and graduated from Rivercrest in 1965, got her B.S. from East Texas University in 1972 and her Masters in 1980.

# Stansells Growing In Limousin Industry

In 1989, Jerry, Pat and Kip Stansell loaded two Limousin heifers and left Talco, Texas for their first show in the small east Texas town of Canton.

When the family arrived at the show, they began fitting the heifers. "We thought we were just as big as anybody," Pat said. "It was hilarious. We didn't know anything. We had never done it before, and we read it out of a book. I know that people who had shown before thought that we were just country hicks."

As luck would have it, one of the heifers had a kicking fit in the chute and couldn't walk. After all that trouble, only one heifer was shown. But they survived and felt sure things would be smoother on their next try.

So the Stansells regrouped and headed for the Dallas fair. One heifer was disqualified because she was missing a shot, and another was quarantined. Pat says she quickly realized that, in addition to their eligibility problems, they were doing other things wrong.

"We didn't know you were supposed to have rubber mats and water hoses and all that stuff," Pat said. "As a woman, you observe other people. I told Jerry, 'We are doing this wrong.'"

Pat tells the story with a smile and she points out that everyone at the show offered helpful advice.

The Stansells have made progress in their showing efforts. Today, they take the shows in stride, and they know what they're doing. They must, because they recently showed the reserve champion heifer at the State Fair of Texas.

"We're not the best now at all, far from it. But it's like a carnival or a circus, and we know how to put the big top up."

The Stansell's Good Luck Limousin Ranch is not a show ring powerhouse, but for an operation that is only four years old, they have accomplished quite a bit. Good Luck Limousin is a respected and polished operation with big ambitions.

The Stansells are not new to the purebred cattle business. From 1960-70, Jerry ran registered Angus.

"It got to be quite a bit of a hassle registering the cattle, we thought at the time," Jerry said. "So we got out of it and started raising crossbred cattle, black baldies and crossed with red Brahman."

Jerry continued the commercial operation until 1989 when he decided maybe the purebred business wasn't such a hassle after all. He decided to find a breed he liked and get back into registered cattle.

The search led him to a friend and customer of the family machine shop and trucking business. Jerry went out to look at his Limousin cattle.

"I had heard the name Limousin before but wasn't familiar with it at all," Jerry said. "We saw those cattle, and I said, 'I believe these are the cattle we want.'"

"It was shortly after that we sold everything on the commercial end and started gathering up Limousin cattle. We went to sales and tried to buy one or two from everybody we could."

Now that the family had found their breed, all they needed was a name for the ranch. They found one with a little bit of luck.

The family had gone to Commerce, Texas for daughter Kristie's track meet.

"The track meet was in a wooded area," Pat said. "Somebody had thrown a sign away, a big sign with four-leaf clovers on each side and a horseshoe. It had Good Luck Ranch written on it."

Jerry says the family sat on the sign at the track meet, but they also took it home and adopted the name and logo as their own.

Good Luck Limousin Ranch may be a relatively newcomer to the Limousin business, but they have come a long way in a short time.

Today, the Stansells run 100 cows on their 300 acres. They artificially inseminate all of the heifers and keep two young bulls for clean-up duty. In addition to using semen from top-quality bulls, the Stansells are also doing embryo work with Holstein recipient cows.

Kip says he has always wanted to be involved with cattle. He went to AI school and is in charge of the artificial insemination work. His dad is thankful for his interest and expertise.

Good Luck cattle calve in the fall and spring, and they get lots of attention. Even though Limousin cattle have little to no problem calving, the Stansells enjoy being a part of it.

"We don't let any of our cows calve without attention," Jerry said. "We put them in a pasture that's close to our calving maternity ward. We don't allow any open range calving because there are just too many things that can happen, and we have too much invested. So we give all of our cows attention like they were at the doctor's office," he said.

The majority of the Stansells' cattle are red and fullblood. But Jerry realized that buyers wanted more when they began asking for polled and black cattle.

"I thought when I first got in, if I was going to raise Limousin cattle, I was going to raise fullblood. But I soon learned that there is little difference between fullbloods and purebreds anyway," Jerry said.

"We have gotten into polled and are raising some calves out of Polled Domo and Polled 770," Jerry said. "We've been doing most of our embryo work with polled and black."

The Stansells bought their first black heifer from Dorminy Brothers Land and Cattle Company at the Dixie Darling sale in Jackson, Mississippi last year and recently added another from the Little Mondeaux dispersal. They are in the show string today, but someday they will move to the pasture.

"One of the sad parts is that after you show them, you have to turn them into the pasture. They're used to getting all the feed they can eat, and then you've got to bring them down," Jerry said.

While Jerry may feel bad about banishing his favorites to pasture, you can't help but believe the cattle at Good Luck Limousin want for very little. Each cow has her own two

acres of prime pasture to graze, even though Jerry says his pastures could support more cattle. Someday, he hopes to expand the operation.

One of the reasons expansion is on the Stansells' agenda is that there is a greater demand for their cattle than they can currently meet.

"Most of our customers are local, but we've always sold everything that we can, and could've sold more than we have," Jerry said.

The Stansells sell from 20 to 30 head of cattle a year and keep the same number for their base herd. The majority of customers are commercial producers, although Good Luck cattle are popular as show prospects for area students.

Good Luck Limousin advertises in local school and rodeo programs, the TLA News, and Limousin World, but the greatest marketing tool is right in their back yard, so to speak.

Visitors to Talco, Texas from the south are greeted by a large billboard welcoming them to town—and Good Luck Limousin Ranch.

"Someone told me, 'You need a sign coming from the north,' and I said, 'Well, anybody coming from the north going south is bound to turn around sooner or later and go back north. They'll see it then.'"

He must be right because the billboard helps supply all the customers he can handle.

Pat jokes that if you blink when you drive through Talco, you'll miss it. Pat says you can find approximately 1,200 oil wells there. The Stansells have a few oil wells on their place, but unfortunately, Pat says, they don't own any of them.

The oilfield town provided the market for the business that Jerry's father started in 1947. Today, Jerry and Kip run Buck's Welding and Machine Shop, the business named after Jerry's father. Jerry says they do little welding now, but overhauling oil pumping units and moving equipment has kept them busy. They also added a trucking business. Kip has taken on a lot of responsibility with the business and will take over full time when his father retires.

The family shares responsibility in the welding and machine shop, and they all have roles in the Limousin operation.

One of Pat's favorite jobs is to play mother to baby calves on occasion. "It's the mama in me, I guess," Pat said.

Jerry and Kip keep busy managing the cattle, and Kip looks forward to his children getting involved. Kip and his wife, Kelly, have two children, Kyle, 11, and Kendall, 10. Kip says Kendall is already interested in showing cattle.

Jerry admits that between the business and the cattle, things get pretty busy.

"It gets hectic sometimes. The larger we get, the more I'm finding that. I like to be busy though. I probably won't stay in the business part too many more years. I'll retire and go strictly into the cows. At that time, I'll have the herd built up to a couple hundred head," Jerry said.

Working together, the Stansells have found success. And they are making their own good luck.

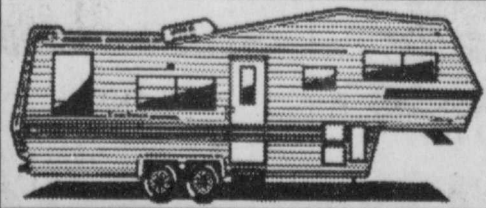

# George Wolf Finds New Hope With New Heart

Most of the time the expression "a change of heart" is used pretty lightly. But for the George Wolf family the phrase has taken on a whole new meaning. For a new heart is exactly what George received January 22nd.

George and his wife, Nell, their three children and their grandchildren live in Milton community near Deport. George is well-known throughout the area since he has driven a delivery truck for Bogata Propane-Welch Gas for many years.

About two years ago George, who is 59, began to have problems which they attributed to stress.

In October of 1993 the family learned that the cause was much more ominous than stress, it was a virus that may have been working destroying heart muscle for many years before it became apparent.

Doctors at the St. Joseph Heart Center in Paris flew George to Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas as they worked to find out what the damage was and what had to be done.

Finally, George came home with the knowledge that his only hope for survival was a heart transplant.

In pain and weak, he kept losing weight. He tried to keep busy but was unable to do much because of his health problems.

The phone would be the primary way to notify them that a heart was available, but a beeper was needed. Without some sort of paging device Nell was afraid to leave George long enough to pay bills, grocery shop or attend to any business.

She called Lamar County Sheriff B.J. McCoy to ask him if he had any suggestions, since the beepers provided in Dallas won't work this far away from the city.

McCoy told her he would check

into it and contacted Airways Communications and made a deal with them to furnish a beeper through the sheriff's department.

McCoy then contacted Medical City Hospital and told them that if they were unable to reach the Wolfs by phone to call the sheriff's department and the dispatcher would immediately attend to contacting the Wolfs.

The wait went on into the New Year with George looking a little worse all the time and the family's tension increasing.

Then, at 5:30 p.m. on a Saturday afternoon the hospital notified them that they had a possible donor.

"They said we had a fifty fifty chance or having a heart when we got to Dallas" Nell says.

The family began the trip to the metroplex that they had hoped for.

Upon arrival the family was stricken to learn that there was no heart for George when they arrived. Then, almost miraculously, another heart became available that was a perfect match for him. He was taken into surgery.

When the Lamar County Sheriff's Department was notified that the beeper wasn't needed anymore because of a successful surgery, it was announced over the department's radio so that all personnel could share in the knowledge, not only that the beeper wasn't needed, but that there was a good reason it wasn't needed!

The family reported that the most amazing thing about the transplant was the lack of pain their patient felt. After being so sick, he actually felt better almost immediately!

The next day he was up and put on

an exercise bike for five minutes.

Each day he has walked further and pedaled further as they work to build up his heart strength.

On Super Bowl Sunday George became so excited watching the game that he got up to walk up and down the halls to calm down.

He gets up and shaves, showers and dresses, and says he feels really good. He also has been throwing the pillow over his head when a nurse comes in the door with yet another needle. "George isn't here" he would shout! It didn't work, however, the needles found their destinations.

On Tuesday, February 1st, George left Medical City Hospital.

He is still under very careful monitoring and going back and forth between Dallas and Milton, where they live.

They are a closeknit family, and daughters Cindy and Lynn, son David, in-laws Bert and Angie and the five grandchildren are looking forward to his arrival back at Milton.

So are his many friends. For the George Wolfs, what seemed to be a nightmare for a while has turned into a dream, thanks to the accomplishments of modern medicine and the incredible generosity of someone, somewhere, who decided that if their life ended someone else's would have the chance to go on.
