So, once more we joined a tour a day and a half late, tired out but extremely happy to be there!

Miracle of miracles, we had our aggage too! But, I still want to know, why do these things happen to us? We took a count, and we have, over the past ten years, either missed flights or had lost bags three out of every five times! Oh, well, as long as we get there and have fun!

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

Mama had a black wash pot out in the back yard. She built a fire under it every week on Wednesday to do the washing. She always washed, starched and hung out our clothes on Wednesday. On Wednesday afternoon she would take the clothes off the line, fold some of them, and put them away. Then she would take the ones she had starched, which was most of them, and sprinkle them with water and wrap them up tight so that on Thursday she could spend the day ironing. Mama used that wash pot for other things too. She made lye soap in it. She also made hominy in it. She used lye to make the hominy. It caused the kernels of corn to pop open and the hard part would come off. I could not begin to tell you how to make hominy, but in recent years I have read a recipe which calls for baking soda instead of lye. I have also run across a recipe which allows you to make soap without using lye and hog lard. Your use vegetable shortening

Mama also made saurkraut in churns and butter in butter molds with pretty designs on them. Each mold held a pound of butter and Mama made it to sell. She sold lots of butter and eggs. I guess she learned that from Granny, because she would tell how Granny sold butter and eggs to the Peddler to buy supplies that they needed between times when they were able to go to town.

Does anyone remember how hog killing day smelled? I can still smell it. They had the barrels of boiling water outside and the lard rendering

pots in the house most of the time. Sometimes the lard got rendered outside. I remember the sugar cured bacon that was in the smoke house. It didn't need refrigerating. It was all used before it got old.

No, I'm not getting ready to tell you that I walked 5 miles to school in rain and snow, barefoot. I did ride a school bus for about a year, and after we moved to town, I walked a couple of blocks. The thing that got me to thinking about all the things Mama made was an article I recieved from Associated Milk Producers, about an ice cream made in coffee cans. Mama made Ice cream in syrup cans. We didn't have an ice cream freezer and Daddy loved Ice cream better than almost anything he ate so Mama would get out on the back porch and use two cans with Rock salt and ice and make ice cream in syrup buckets. It tasted like snow ice cream. Daddy still eats ice cream 3 times a day. Mother and Daddy bought refrigerators, washers, dryers, and most other time saving appliances just as soon as they came on the market, so my memories of most of this is short lived, but I still remember

I'm going to give you the recipe that the article has in it but I really don't believe Mama's was quite as rich. She probably put more sugar in it too. I have a couple of recipes I hope you'll like.

Wash out the cans. In the smaller can, mix the whipping cream, half and half, sugar and vanilla. Cover with lid and place in center of larger can.

Pack a layer of crushed ice around smaller can. Sprinkle ice liberally with salt and alternately add layers of ice and salt to fill larger can. Cover with

Choose a hard, level surface like a table, driveway, patio or cement walk and roll the can back and forth for 10

Use a spatula to scrape ice cream from can sides to the center. Discard melted ice. Put smaller can back in larger can and add more ice and salt. Roll for 5 more minutes; taste. Add fruit if desired. Pineapple Pie

1 flat can crushed pineapple

1 cup sugar 1/3 cup flour 2 Tablespoons margarine 1 tsp vanilla

1/2 tsp salt In a saucepan mix pineapple and juice with 3/4 cup sugar, flour, beaten egg yolks, vanilla butter and salt. Cook

on a slow burner until thickened. Pour into baked pie shell. Beat egg whites until stiff. Add 1/4 cup sugar and vanilla. Continue to beat

until stiff peaks form. Put meringue on top of filling and bake in 325 degree oven for 20 minutes. Snickerdoodles

2 3/4 cup sifted flour 3 tsp baking powder 1/2 tsp salt

1 cup soft butter 1 3/4 cup sugar

2 eggs

4 tsp cinnamon Mix flour, baking powder and salt

together. Cream butter; add 1 1/2 cups sugar gradually, creaming until fluffy. Blend in eggs. Add dry ingredientts gradually; mixing well. Chill in refrigerator. Shape dough into small balls, using 1 tablespoon dough for each ball. Combine remaining 1.4 cup sugar and cinnamon; roll balls in sugar mixture. Place about 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheets. Bake in 400 degree oven about 10 minutes. Store in covered container. Yield 5 dozen

Applications for emergency farm Federal Crop Insurance program will loans for losses caused by severe storms and tornadoes are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Clarksville, TX, FmHA County Supervisor Mr. Frank B. Stroud said.

Red River County is one of six in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Mike Espy, as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the

severe storms and tornadoes. Mr. Stroud said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5%.

Fiber In Your Diet

Fiber is categorized as either soluble or insoluble. Both types are found in all fruits, vegetables, and whole grains. Both types absorb water as they pass through the gastrointestinal tract. Soluble fibers include pectins, which are found in bananas, oranges, carrots, and apples, and gums, which are found in oatmeal. When soluble fibers take up water, they form a gellike substance that helps slow the body's absorption of refined sugar as well as cholesterol and other fats.

Studies have shown that adding soluble fibers to the diet can lower the level of cholesterol in the blood. High levels of serum cholesterol are associated with an increased risk of heart disease, and it is thought that fiber interferes with the process by which cholesterol is absorbed from the intestine.

By interfering with the absorption of sugar, soluble fiber also helps lower high blood-sugar levels.






