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





THE STATE OF TEXAS) CITY OF HASKELL

On this, the 12th day of February, 1974, the City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof and among other proceedings had were the following: a resolution and order was introduced and adopted.

The resolution and order are as follows:

WHEREAS the laws of the State of Texas provide that on April 6, 1974, there shall be elected the following officials for this city: a Mayor and 3 Councilmen.

WHEREAS the laws of the State of Texas further provide that the Election Code of the State of Texas is applicable to said election, and in order to comply with said Code, an order should be passed establishing the procedure to be followed in said election, and designating the voting place for said election.

THEREFORE, BE IT OR DERED by the City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas:

That all independent candidates at the election to be held on the first Saturday in April, 1974, for the above mentioned offices file their applications to become candidates with the City Secretary at the City Hall. Haskell, Texas on or before 30 days before the date of said election.

Said election shall be held at the following place in said City: City Hall Annex Building with E. J. Stewart as Presiding Judge, and Henry Withers as Alternate Presiding Judge, and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him which shall not exceed 8 clerks.

The Mayor shall issue all necessary orders, writs and notices for said election and returns of said election shall be made to this Council immediately after the closing of the

Safety cans are not those one or two gallon light metal cans equipped with a pouring spout, or those jeep cans of World War II fame. They are heavy metal cans equipped with flame arresters and are designed so gasoline will not spill if the can is upset. They should be labeled as being a safety can, and approved by a testing organization.


Please remember that carrying extra gasoline in the trunk of a car is like carrying a bomb and waiting for something to ignite it. Fumes from expansion overflow or a spill could spread through the vehicle and ignite, or a collision could puncture one of those flimsy cans, trapping the car occupants in an inferno.

With the extreme low humidity that we are experiencing these days, and the lack of rainfall, grass fires are an extremely dangerous hazard to both city and farm dweller alike. If you must burn trash inside the city limits, and there is a city ordinance that prohibits trash burning inside city limits, be sure that you watch the fire carefully. A freak wind can and often does whip sparks from the barrel. These sparks can and often do start grass fires which can rapidly get out of control even with the yard hose handy.

Store your gasoline containers used for mowers away from the house. Make sure that any storage area where gasoline and gasoline driven machinery

has plenty of ventilation. In general, and for safety's sake, take an extra precaution with burning off grass in yards. This doesn't do the yard one bit of good, but often hurts the grass later on in the year. Not only is it dangerous, but very messy, for all that burned grass soot blows into your house as well as your neighbor's, and it smells up the entire neighborhood. Talk about pollution, this is one of the greatest air pollution practices that you can


