VanDeaver as principal at Rivercrest High School to replace Ray Miller who had earlier accepted the Superintendent position at Aspermont, TX.

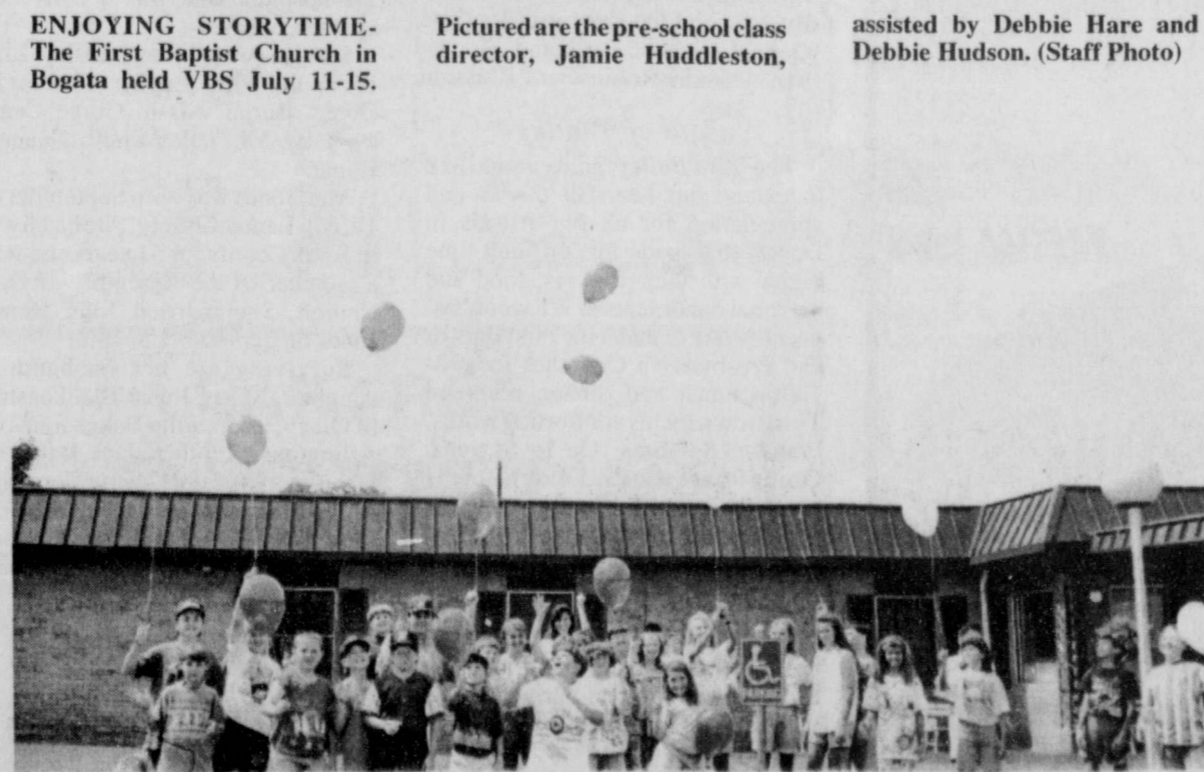
The next meetings of the board will be Thursday, July 21 and 22.

## Trustees Approve Agenda, Review Sewage System

The Talco-Bogata Board of Trustees met July 14 with all members present.

The consensus agenda items were approved in the first action by the board. Elementary principals, Johnny Gable and Jimmy Lee, presented the supplies list for each grade level with the approximate cost to each student.

The board voted to remain with the Hibbs-Hallmark Workmen's Compensation Cooperatin for the 1994-95 school year as recommended by the superintendent.

Superintendent Freddy Wade reviewed the Board on the status of the Rivercrest sewage plant and the work that needed to be done for the plant to be brought up to the standards of the permit. Work on the plant will include new pipes and fittings and

The board spent the remainder of the meeting in budget study. Meetings were scheduled for Tuesday, July 19 at 8:00 p.m. and Thursday, July 11 at 7:00 p.m.

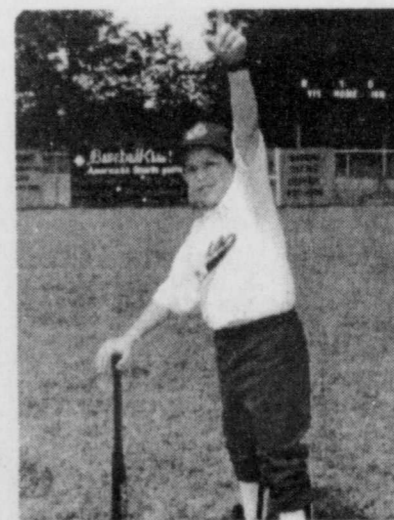
The board adjourned at 11:04 p.m.

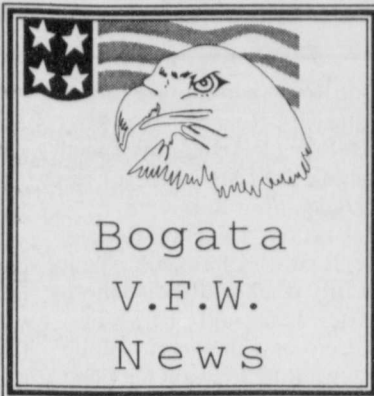

To write to a Senator: The Honorable (full name), United States Senate, Washington, DC 20510.

To your Representative- The honorable (full name, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, DC 20515. "Dear Mr./ Mrs. (last name)".

To write to the Governor of Texas- The Honorable (full name, Governor of Texas, State Capitol, P.O. Box 12428, Austin Texas, 78711. "Dear Governor (last name)".

To the Lt. Governor: The Honorable (full name), Lt. Governor of Texas, P.O. Box 12088, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. "Dear Governor (last name)".

To write a State Representative- The Honorable (full name), Texas House of Representatives, P.O. Box 2910, Austin Texas 78769. "Dear Mr./ Ms. (last name)".

The body of your letter should identify the subject (Bill number and title). If you are not sure of the number and title of the bill, write an explanation of the problem and they will be able to identify the bill. Explain in personal terms how the issue will affect you, your family, and community. Make a specific request such as voting for or co-sponsoring a bill.

Don't threaten. Don't try to use big words. Don't offer money. Just very plainly and simply tell the official what you have on your mind and cordially ask them to either help you themselves or direct your letter to the proper official.

To close your letter to the President use "Very Respectfully Yours", and to close letters to all other officials use "Sincerely yours".

I have the 800 phone numbers of various public officials and if you are interested, we'll publish them for you in the next few weeks.

Joe sang "I've Got Friends In Low Places" and I frankly preferred HIS version over Garth's! We teased him about helping him with his Texas accent...but he really did a nice job on the song.

All of us stayed up too late that night, but we were so relaxed and happy after our evening together.

The next morning we started on our last full day in Ireland.

Have you ever heard the expression "Not Worth A Tinker's Dam"? Did you know that it isn't swearing? I didn't until we learned from our guide that it refers to the "dams" that traveling tinkers used to repair enamel or tin pans, kettles, bowls or other containers. The "dam" was a small washer-like thing that was used to mend holes in the vessels. They could be purchased at 100 dams for a penny...thus the expression "not worth a tinker's dam" came into being to mean something that had little value.

As we travelled back towards Galway and it's famous bay we went past more neat farms, and stopped for lunch at Kylemore Abbey. Can you imagine wealth so great that you

could build your bride a lovely castle as a wedding present? That's why Kylemore was built, on the shores of a beautiful lake.

It is a Benedictine Convent now, and the nuns run a cafe and gift shop to help finance their works.

After lunch we visited the lower floors of the Kylemore Abbey, which are kept open to the public. Breathing marble mantle pieces, beautiful woodwork grace the inside. The

outside gardens were gorgeous too, but there was a cold, high wind blowing that caused us to huddle into our coats and put our hands over our ears to keep them warm.

Fuchsias dripped their fiery blossoms, more rhododendrons graced the slopes of the mountain on which the structure and lakes reside.

We drove through wild and almost empty country that afternoon, including the cottage and area where the movie "The Quiet Man" was filmed. Connemara, where once English Cromwell growled "not enough trees to hang a man...not enough ground to bury him in" is a windswept, rocky land.

Connemara is famous for it's marbles, and we stopped at the Connemara Marble Works. Ambrose Joyce, Senior, was on hand to talk to us that day, as his son, Ambrose Jr. was at home welcoming in the newest member of the Joyce family...Ambrose Joyce III. The marble works have been in the family for generations. The green marble of Connemara is almost mined out now, and can be used for only small things such as jewelry, paper weights, etc. There is a beautiful jet black marble with striking white designs and fossils in it, and the rare red marble is already mined out.

In Galway we visited the cathedral there, which was begun in 1958. The floors are of the dark and light green shades of Connemara marble with white, black and red mixed in to the beautiful designs.

The floors are stunning done in this way.

The cathedral features beautiful corbelled ceilings, contemporary stained glass windows, and mosaics, including John F. Kennedy's portrait. Irish Americans had much to do with raising money for the construction of the cathedral, including the Kennedys.

We took a quick look at an electronic "salmon eye" which counts the salmon as they pass through.

We checked into our last hotel of the trip, the Galway Ryan. Some of the group went to religious services that night, while others of us sat in the lobby and visited. We talked with Ernesto and Susan, Myra and Sharon, Stephen and Melissa for quite a while before going to bed.

The next morning we drove the little way from Galway to Shannon Airport, where we each received a big hug and a kiss from Ann and hearty handshakes from Joe before taking the long flight home to New York.

At New York there was the usual get-the-bags-and-go-through-customs hassle, then taking our stuff over to the TWA terminal by shuttle to await our flight to Dallas. A stop-

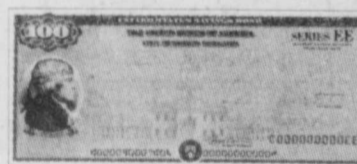
over in Kansas City added a few hours to our flight, but we finally arrived back in Dallas on a hot, humid night.

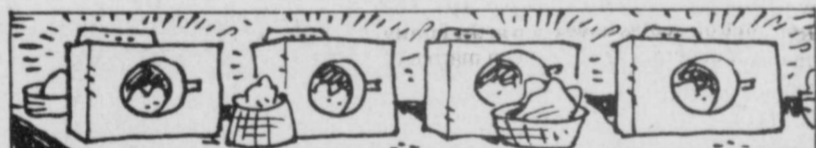
According to County Attorney Jack Herrington, final jury selection in the capital murder trial of Willie Earl Pondexter, Jr. was completed Wednesday in New Boston. Eight men and four women were seated on the jur, along with one man and one woman as alternates. Pondexter has been indicted for the capital murder of Martha Lennox on October 29, 1993 in Clarksville. We are seeking the death penalty in this case.

Testimony is scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, July 18. The trial is expected to take from three to five days.

Herrington stated he was pleased with the jury selection process and feels that 14 fair and impartial jurors have been seated. All jurors were qualified for the death penalty question. Eighty-four jurors were questioned individually over the past three weeks in order to seat this jury.

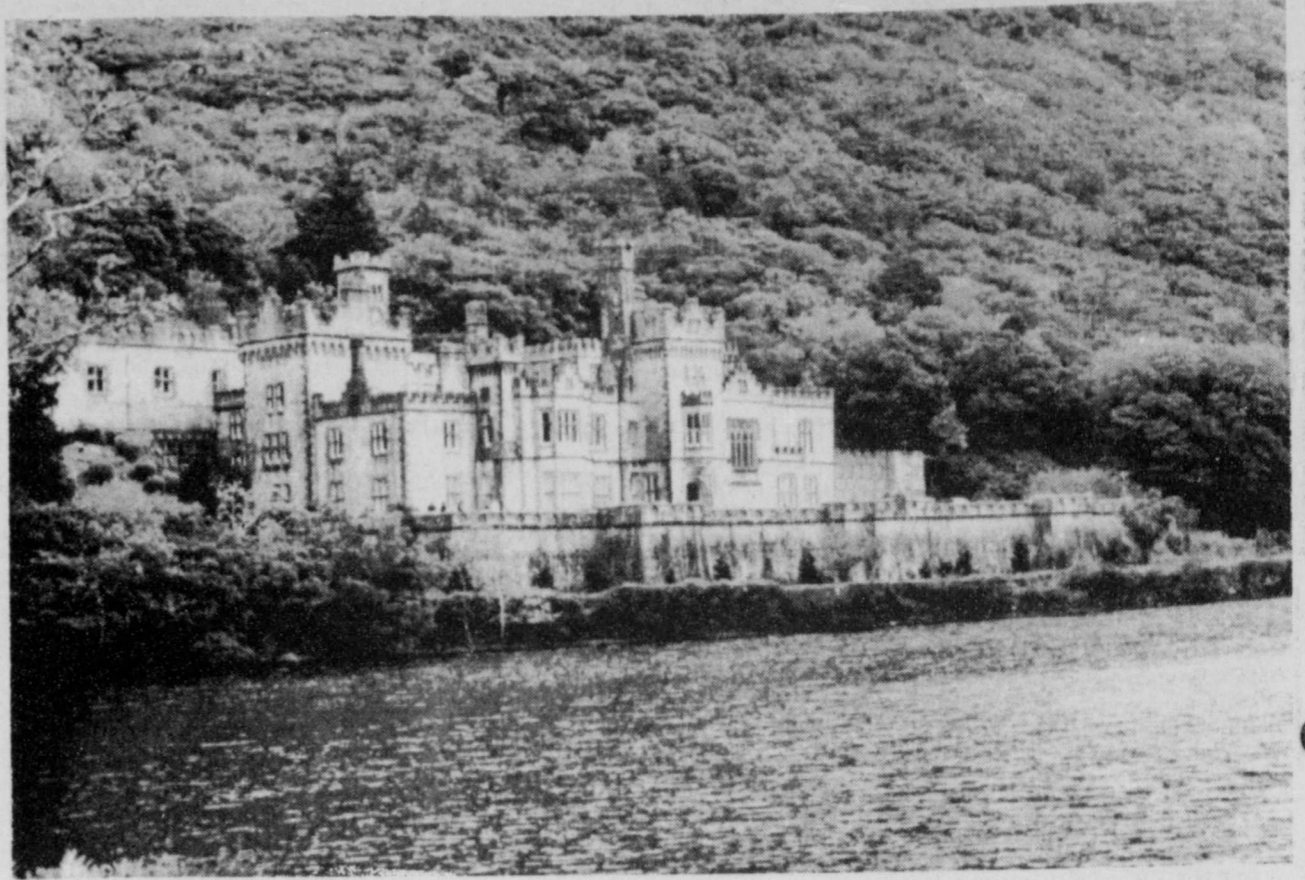
