Teresa is still on probation with the Bogata Volunteer Fire Department, but she spent 2 years on the Anna fire department before moving to Bogata.

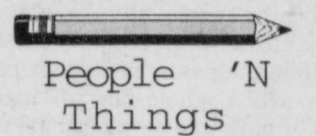
Teresa has a family. Her husband, John is a retired military man. He has two daughters, Nicole and Amy. They think that Teresa's job as a firefighter is neat.

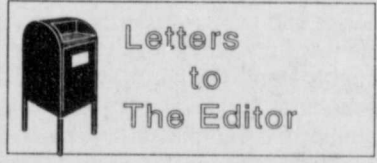

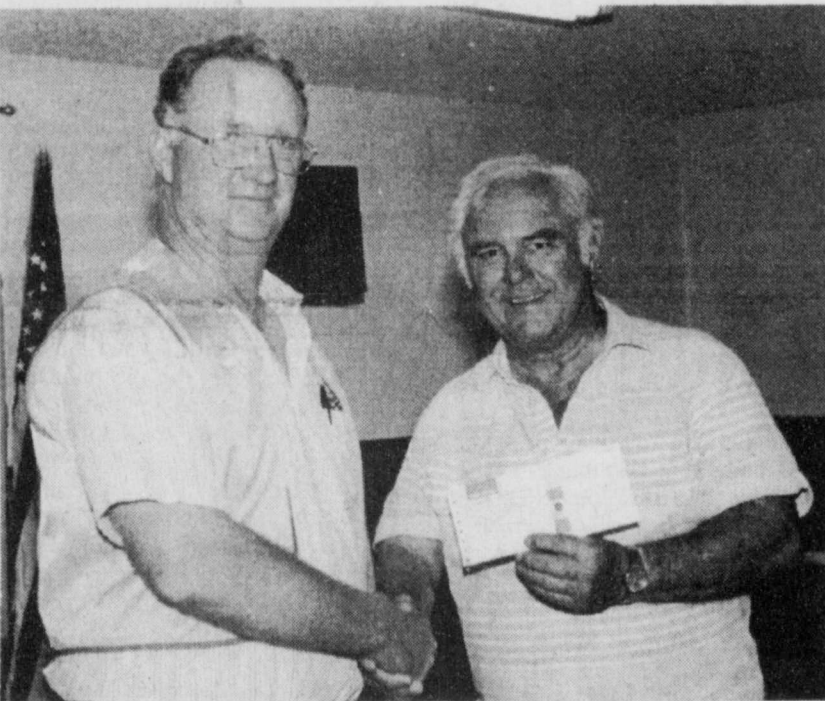
Dear Editor:

An Opposing View Concerning The Upcoming Balloting On Phone Service

Last week I wrote an editorial concerning the balloting for toll free calling to a number of towns.

I have received a letter to the editor expressing an opposite view...but it is not signed, unfortunately, and we cannot run unsigned letters. (No, it doesn't matter if it is paid for or not, we cannot run them).

However, the letter mentions that it is difficult for the writer and the elderly in Bogata to pay the average phone bill right now...and that the writer did not feel that he/she had any reason to be asked to help pay for other people's long distance service when he/she could use that money to call grandchildren out of state.

While I don't change my opinion that the toll-free option is a good thing...I will certainly concede that the writer of this letter has a valid point.

That is why there is going to be balloting to begin with...so that the majority may choose what they want.

I did a short survey, speaking with a number of Bogata residents, ranging in age from young, to middle aged, to senior citizens. And, senior citizens voiced the same concerns that the letter writer did...that they did not call Paris, or Clarksville, or Deport, Talco or any of the other towns around very much and were on fixed incomes. The middle aged and younger people I spoke to seem to feel that they definitely will use the service enough to more than compensate for the \$3.50 charge (it may not be that high, remember). About 50 % of the older people don't feel that they are interested in voting for this proposition at all.

So, if I offended anyone with my editorial I apologize...I won't change my stand that being able to call toll-free to and from these towns will be good for businesses and good for a lot of people...but my intention wasn't to offend anyone, only to make them aware of their options.

I will conclude this with the statement I make when any election comes up...VOTE AS YOU PLEASE, BUT PLEASE VOTE. It is the American way.

RM 2493 keeps surfacing as if it were an active issue. It is not an active issue anymore, and no letters are necessary at this time.

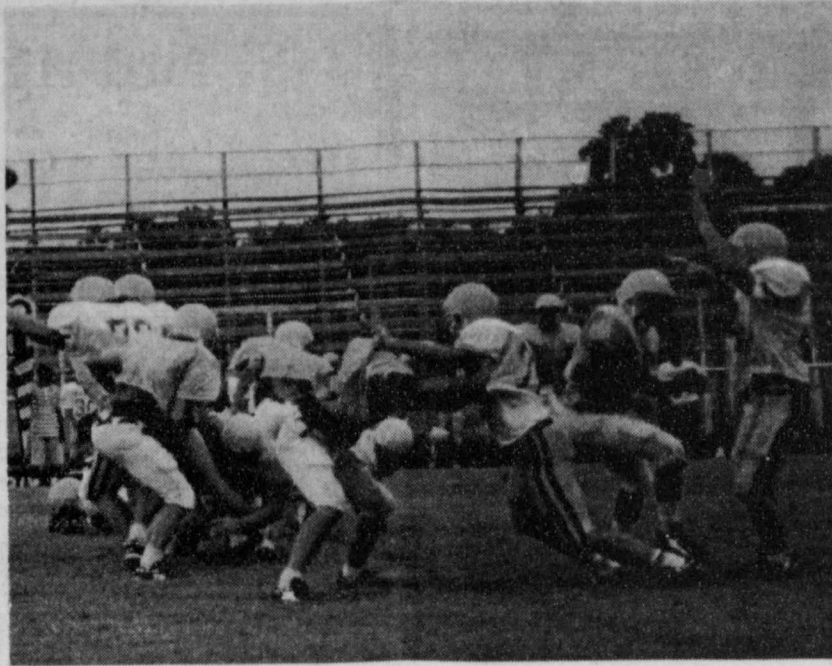
Harvilles Celebrate 55th Wedding Anniversary



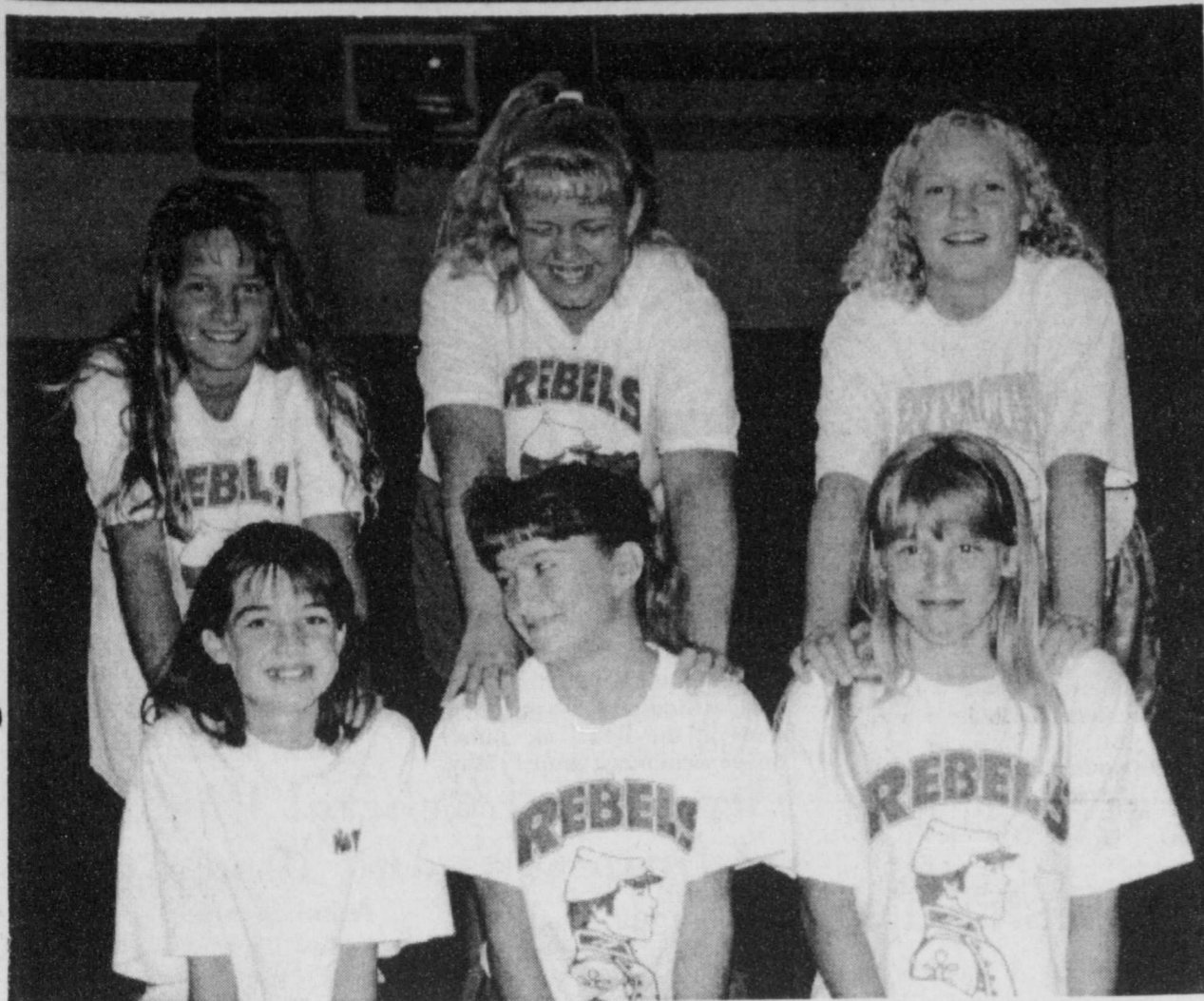

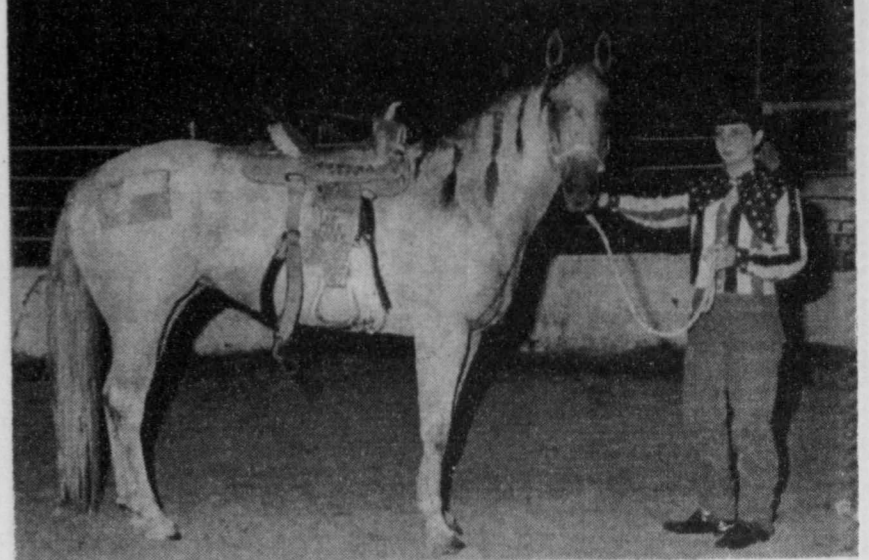

We saw many bald eagles. Some diving and catching fish from the cold bay water.

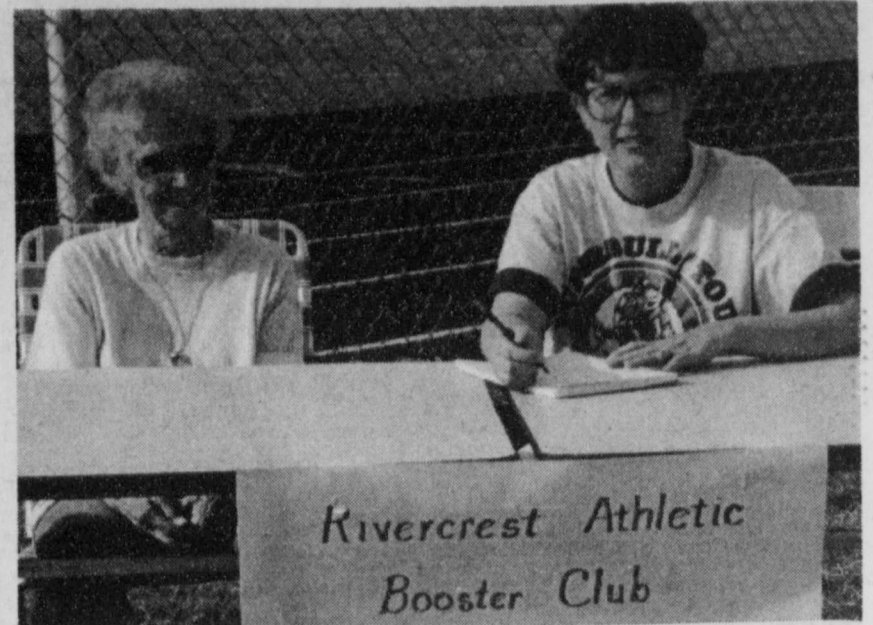
We took pictures of Whales feeding in the 300 feet deep waters when were trolling for Salmon. Saw Humpback but did not see any killer whales, although they were there.

Our sightseeing day included Mendahall Glacier, Salmon on their run upstream to lay their eggs and die. Plenty of bear to take care of dying salmon. We visited a hatchery, the downtown area, Governor's house, museum and the Red Dog Saloon. We ate salmon at Bernie's house with plenty of smoked salmon to munch on.

The last day was the best for fishing. Our boat caught 28 salmon. We had 11 boxes of fish and crab to bring home. We froze everything, put them in cardboard boxes with crumpled up newspaper all around and sealed all the joints with duct tape. Still frozen 14 hours later when we got home.

We enjoyed the cool weather, the great fellowship with our friends in Juno and of course the great coho fishing. The people of Alaska are much like the Texans of yeateryear, friendly and caring. Thank you Alaska for a great trip. Thanks to our wives for being so understnading, I think.

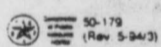



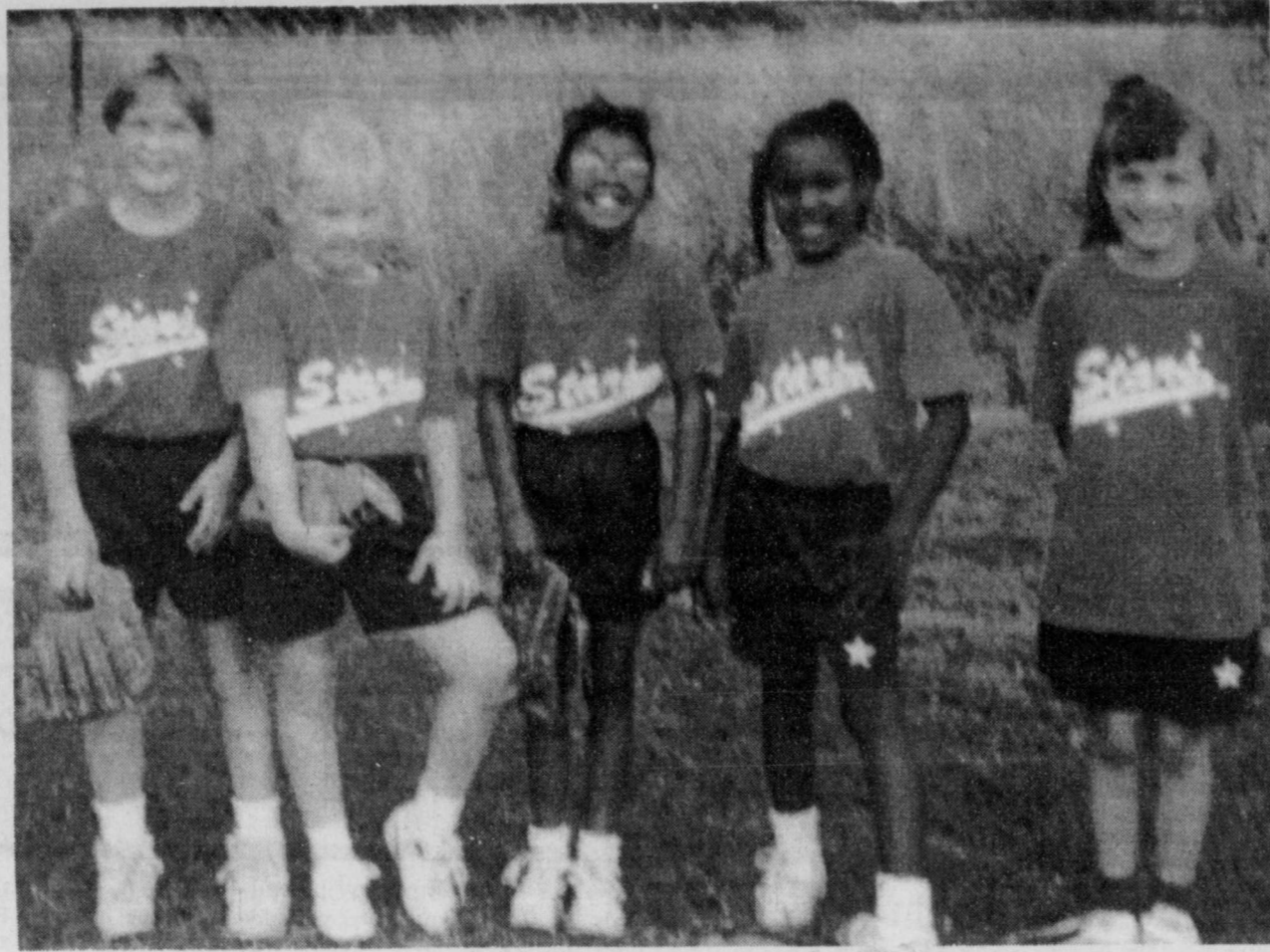
