The two incidents occurred almost exactly one year apart.

Last October, on an unusually cold and windy night, between Bogata and Deport I saw a figure walking on the side of the road.

He was wearing a hooded robe with some reflective tape on it, and a back pack. The robe, which resembled a monk's garb, was belted with a piece of rope.

He wasn't hitch hiking, but was striding along with his head tucked down against the bitter wind.

A few hours later, safe in my snug, warm bed, I heard a downpour of rain begin to lash the house. It lasted all night. And all night, I woke up wondering what the mysterious man on the road was doing. Had he found shelter or was he still trudging along in that terrible weather? That's all I know, but his image, wrath-like and determined, has stayed with me for some reason.

The other incident happened last week as I made my route from store to store putting papers in the newsracks

She crawled out of a truck at a convenience store, and I have reason to believe she was hitch hiking. She was very young, very thin, poorly dressed and in a month or two will have a baby.

Inside the store, as I put papers in the rack, I overheard her ask the clerk how much the total price on a packaged brownie would be. When informed it was 48 cents, she put it back and began searching for something cheaper.

All I could think of was that she was hungry and had less than 48 cents! As I left the store I reached in my pocket, where three one dollar bills were crumpled, and handed them to her. She looked at me, her face widened in a huge smile and she thanked me over and over.

As I sat in my car, putting away keys and some rubber bands, she tapped on the hood, said thank you again and went off with some food and orange juice to climb back into the truck. where the driver was impatiently waiting.

That's all I know. Where she is going, how her child will be brought into this world I will never know.

Like the mysterious robed man, she is simply a brief incident in my life...and a disturbing one. I have little use for beggers...but neither of these two, who share nothing in common but the fact that they were "on the road" were asking for anything. I have had the thoughts most of us usually use to rationalize a lack of action...."they probably make their living this way, she probably brought this situation on herself...etc, etc."

But their images won't go away...they return in the wee hours of the night to plague me with questions...not about them..but about myself and what I would do if I were in their circumstances. It's easy to say "well, I wouldn't let myself be in those circumstances". But somehow, the thought doesn't sound very convincing, even from my safe, comfortable bed.

The law about bringing pies and cakes to be sold or auctioned has been on the books for almost sixty years. This law hasn't changed and is rarely enforced unless they get a complaint. The new law is the culprit. This law is the one which started in June, and which was made just to collect enough money to hire 3 more inspectors for the TDH by collecting permit money from anyone who competes in stew cook offs or chilli cookoffs, or from people have a concession stand at events and anything

else where you sell food. You could easily get a non profit status and be exempt from paying the permit fee, but it would not matter whether you are non profit or not, you still can't sell pies and cakes, and you cannot sell anything which has not been cooked in an approved location.

As I said, this law is old, but when you start getting your non profit status from the state, you will bring yourself to the attention of the health department.

The crime you would be committing is a misdemeanor, and I feel terrible about the folks who have changed their plans because of my article. I didn't intend to cause a hardship on anyone, I just wanted them to leave us alone.

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
National School Bus Safety Week

Gary VanDeaver, Rivercrest High School Principal, who also serves as the Transportation Director for the Talco-Bogata CISD, reports that school bus safety is a subject every-one needs to be reminded of as often as possibel. Mr. Van Deaver reports that our local district currently runs seven bus routes each day as well as other buses being used to shuttle students between campuses and to carry students on extra-curricular trips. 'Our routes alone total approximately 420 miles daily. When you think of the number of buses, carrying a large percentage of our students, traveling that many miles daily, you realize the awesome responsibility that is shared by the bus drivers and other motorists who share the roads with the school buses. Our main concern in dealing with the transportation of students is safety. We maintain our buses in safe condition and all drivers are required to successfully complete training in


school bus driving. One of the greatest hazards comes from motorists who do not observe the school bus lighting system. In Texas we use an 8 light school bus warning system. These lights are located on the front and rear of the bus near the top where you see the SCHOOL BUS sign. The lamps are

the school bus is doing. When the bus is approaching a loading or unloading area, the yellow lights will flash. Red lights will flash when the bus is stopped to load or unload students and the newer buses are equipped with a stop arm which will be extended from the side of the bus. This system was adopted a few years ago because it more closely follows other traffic regulations. The alternately flashing yellow lights mean CAUTION to other motorists because the bus is preparing to stop. The flashing red lights and stop arm mean STOP. Motorists are required to stop at least 20 feet from a stopped school bus that is displaying flashing red lights.

Each time a motorist violates the school bus stop law, he or she creates a real hazard for the students who are boarding or leaving the bus.Mr. VanDeaver adds,"We are fortunate we haven't had anyone injured in a bus related accident.
