The two incidents occurred almost exactly one year apart.

Last October, on an unusually cold and windy night, between Bogata and Deport I saw a figure walking on the side of the road.

He was wearing a hooded robe with some reflective tape on it, and a back pack. The robe, which resembled a monk's garb, was belted with a piece of rope.

He wasn't hitch hiking, but was striding along with his head tucked down against the bitter wind.

A few hours later, safe in my snug, warm bed, I heard a down-pour of rain begin to lash the house. It lasted all night. And all night, I woke up wondering what the mysterious man on the road was doing. Had he found shelter or was he still trudging along in that terrible weather? That's all I know, but his image, wrath-like and determined, has stayed with me for some reason.

The other incident happened last week as I made my route from store to store putting papers in the newsracks.

She crawled out of a truck at a convenience store, and I have reason to believe she was hitch hiking. She was very young, very thin, poorly dressed and in a month or two will have a baby.

Inside the store, as I put papers in the rack, I overheard her ask the clerk how much the total price on a packaged brownie would be. When informed it was 48 cents, she put it back and began searching for something cheaper.

All I could think of was that she was hungry and had less than 48 cents! As I left the store I reached in my pocket, where three one dollar bills were crumpled, and handed them to her. She looked at me, her face widened in a huge smile and she thanked me over and over.

As I sat in my car, putting away keys and some rubber bands, she tapped on the hood, said thank you again and went off with some food and orange juice to climb back into the truck, where the driver was impatiently waiting.

That's all I know. Where she is going, how her child will be brought into this world I will never know.

Like the mysterious robbed man, she is simply a brief incident in my life...and a disturbing one. I have little use for beggars...but neither of these two, who share nothing in common but the fact that they were "on the road" were asking for anything. I have had the thoughts most of us usually use to rationalize a lack of action... "they probably make their living this way, she probably brought this situation on herself...etc. etc."

But their images won't go away...they return in the wee hours of the night to plague me with questions...not about them...but about myself and what I would do if I were in their circumstances. It's easy to say "well, I wouldn't let myself be in those circumstances". But somehow, the thought doesn't sound very convincing, even from my safe, comfortable bed.

## C.I.S.D. Board Supports District's Drug Policy

The Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. Board of Trustees met Tuesday, October 18 at Rivercrest High School.

The board heard an appeal from Donna Stewart concerning help with medical expenses and a policy prohibiting wild animals on campus.

The board approved items on the consensus agenda and then accepted the bid from Offenhauser and Company for liability, property, boiler and auto fleet insurance for 1994-95.

Campus attendance committees were approved for each campus.

Dates for future board meetings were set for November 14 and December 13, both at 7:00 p.m.

The board then entered into a discussion of the district's drug policy and assured the administration that they firmly support maximum disciplinary action for those found in possession, under the influence or selling of any illegal drug while at school.

Personnel needs were discussed before entering into Executive Session. After a brief Executive Session, the board adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

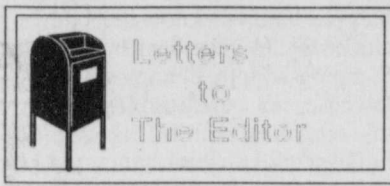
The group voted to purchase the Clarksville small firetruck. This truck has a 250 gallon capacity and is in good working order. Financing is being worked out at this time. This

Dear Readers,

I'm afraid I have created a monster. This was not my intention.

When I learned that the Texas Dept. of Health had sent a representative to the Red River County Fair, I became upset, because it just seemed so ridiculous.

The law about bringing pies and cakes to be sold or auctioned has been on the books for almost sixty years. This law hasn't changed and is rarely enforced unless they get a complaint. The new law is the culprit. This law is the one which started in June, and which was made just to collect enough money to hire 3 more inspectors for the TDH by collecting permit money from anyone who competes in stew cook offs or chilli cookoffs, or from people have a concession stand at events and anything else where you sell food.

You could easily get a non profit status and be exempt from paying the permit fee, but it would not matter whether you are non profit or not, you still can't sell pies and cakes, and you cannot sell anything which has not been cooked in an approved location.

As I said, this law is old, but when you start getting your non profit status from the state, you will bring yourself to the attention of the health department.

The crime you would be committing is a misdemeanor, and I feel terrible about the folks who have changed their plans because of my article. I didn't intend to cause a hardship on anyone, I just wanted them to leave us alone.

Faye also had visitors from Dallas and Garland, Ellen Hohle of Bogata has been keeping house for her.

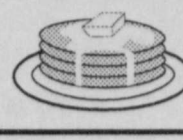
Worth Baker lost his housekeeper Judy Kelly, who will only be working in Clarksville. Worth will have new help soon.

## Country Cooking

Last week Roy Marris of Rugby came by the paper office and wanted to know if anyone had a seasoning recipe for pork sausage. It seems that he was going to butcher some hogs in a few weeks and was looking for an old fashioned recipe. No one knew of one right off, but we told him we would be on the lookout for one. I knew I had a recipe book with some old recipes in it and Nanalee said that she had one that was dated back to the Civil War.

I checked my recipe book and could not find a recipe for seasoning, but I did find some very interesting dishes. The book also contained some of the old fashioned remedies from small-pox to a cure for baldness and one for lockjaw. Did you know that chewing charcoal can get rid of bad breath? Sleeping with fresh hops in your pillowcase can cure insomnia. If you mix corn meal with 1/2 cup of buttermilk and make a thick batter; put it on your face, let dry for 15 minutes and then wash off, your face will be soft and smooth. Keep in mind that these cures were from back in the 1800's and early 1900's.

The recipe book entitled "Timely Tasteful Tales from the Red River Valley from 1800-1986". I believe it was published for the Lamar County Extension Homemakers in the late 1980's and traces recipes and home remedies and beauty tips and treatments beginning in the 1800's.

Some of the recipes are quite different than what we are used to now with our microwaves and new fangled gadgets. The Purple Hull Pea Jelly sounds different. It does call for sure-jell, so you know it is fairly recent. The Homemade Vinegar recipe is easy, just takes time and warm weather. Who can resist the Persimmon Pudding, I haven't checked the persimmon crop this year yet! Roasted Raccoon, Soupe from Hog's Feet and Roasted Stuffed Opossum with Sweet Potatoes sure makes our mouth water. The best I saved for last and it is How To Preserve A Husband. I know you ladies will enjoy this one for sure.

I hope you have enjoyed our little trip into the past and we will see you in the kitchen next week!

### Purple Hull Pea Jelly

4 cups juice  
5 cups sugar  
1 package Sure-Jell  
Cover hulls with water. Use as many as you wish. Boil until tender and drain juice. Add Sure-Jell when juice comes to a boil. Stir well and add sugar. Boil for 10 minutes. Skim the top and pour into jars.

### Homemade Vinegar

Put into an earthen jar, one gallon of warm water, 2 cups of sugar and a cake of yeast. Add red apple peelings to make a pretty color or risings from a kettle where preserves have been made. Vinegar will be ready to use in about two weeks, in warm weather.

### Persimmon Pudding

1 gallon persimmons  
1 quart buttermilk  
1 tablespoon soda  
1-1/4 pound sugar  
8 eggs  
1 large sweet potato, grated  
1 1/2 pounds flour  
1 tablespoon all spice  
1 tablespoon clovs  
1 tablespoon cinnamon  
Work together 1 gallon persimmons, 1 quart buttermilk and soda. Run through colander. Add butter mixed with sugar, eggs and sweet potato. Mix in flour and spices. Bake in thin layers and stack while hot. Serve with cream. (this came from a recipe book published in the 1800's.)

### Roasted Raccoon

Leave a 1/4 inch of fat on raccoon. Cover carcass with cloth dipped in fat. Place on a roasting rack in shallow pan. Do not cover nor add water. Bake at 175 degrees and dust with flour after each basting for a crackly and crisp crust.

### Soupe From Hog's Feet

As soon as the hog is cleaned, cut off the feet and throw them in a tub of cold water and a handful of salt. Let them stay covered in water until you are ready to clean them. This should be as soon as possible, as they will be much whiter. To get the hoof off, put the feet in hot water (not above the hoof). As soon as they get hot enough, slip a knife between the foot and hoof and slip it off. Scrape the foot and throw into a tub of clear water for a week,

then wash and boil them in a clean pot with a thin gruel of corn meal. Boil until half done, then take them up and throw them into a firkin (does anyone know what a firkin is?) of clean salt and water. Keep closely covered to prevent molding. They are now ready to fry, which should be done by splitting the foot in ahf and frying in egg batter.

### Stuffed Opossum With Sweet Potatoes

1 opossum  
1/4 cup fat  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
6 cups bread cubes  
dash of pepper  
1 1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning  
1/2 cup water  
1 sweet potato per person  
1 teaspoon salt

Melt fat in skillet and add onion and celery and cook until tender. Combine bread cubes, salt and pepper and poultry seasonings with onions and celery. Add water and mix thoroughly. Fill the body cavity. Close by sewing the skin together with a heavy string or by skewering the skin together and lacing with heavy string. Place, underside down, on rack in shallow roasting pan. Roast at 300 degrees for 2 1/2 hours or until well done. Basting occasionally with drippings and sprinkling lightly with flour after each basting for a crisp and crackly crust. When almost done, place boiled or baked sweet potatoes around meat and baste frequently with drippings. Remove browned opossum and potatoes to heated large platter. Allow 3/4 to 1 pound per person.

**How To Preserve A Husband**  
Be careful in your selection, do not choose too young and take only such varieties as have been reared in a good moral atmosphere. When once decided upon and selected, let that part remain forever settled and give your entire thought to preparation for domestic use. Some insist on keeping them in a pickle, while others are constantly getting in hot water. Even poor varieties may be made sweet and tender and good by garnishing them with patience, well sweetened with smiles and kisses, then wrap well in a mantle of charity; keep warm with a steady fire of domestic devotion. When prepared, they will keep for years.

Dale Halyard of Bogata was recently voted Top Radio Personality of the Year by members of the International Association of Country Gospel Music Trailblazers II at their annual awards night in Paris. Halyard hosts The Dale Halyard Show on radio station KGAP in

Clarksville, playing Christian music from 6 a.m. until 12 midnight. The show is a feature for Southern Gospel and Country Gospel music and is three hours of worship and praise through southern and country gospel music.

### National School Bus Safety Week

Gary VanDeaver, Rivercrest High School Principal, who also serves as the Transportation Director for the Talco-Bogata CISD, reports that school bus safety is a subject everyone needs to be reminded of as often as possible. Mr. Van Deaver reports that our local district currently runs seven bus routes each day as well as other buses being used to shuttle students between campuses and to carry students on extra-curricular trips. "Our routes alone total approximately 420 miles daily. When you think of the number of buses, carrying a large percentage of our students, traveling that many miles daily, you realize the awesome responsibility that is shared by the bus drivers and other motorists who share the roads with the school buses. Our main concern in dealing with the transportation of students is safety. We maintain our buses in safe condition and all drivers are required to successfully complete training in school bus driving."

One of the greatest hazards comes from motorists who do not observe the school bus lighting system. In Texas we use an 8 light school bus warning system. These lights are located on the front and rear of the bus near the top where you see the SCHOOL BUS sign. The lamps are used to warn other traffic about what

the school bus is doing. When the bus is approaching a loading or unloading area, the yellow lights will flash. Red lights will flash when the bus is stopped to load or unload students and the newer buses are equipped with a stop arm which will be extended from the side of the bus. This system was adopted a few years ago because it more closely follows other traffic regulations. The alternately flashing yellow lights mean CAUTION to other motorists because the bus is preparing to stop. The flashing red lights and stop arm mean STOP. Motorists are required to stop at least 20 feet from a stopped school bus that is displaying flashing red lights.

One of the most frequent complaints of school bus drivers is that other motorists do not obey the school bus stop law. Each time a motorist violates the school bus stop law, he or she creates a real hazard for the students who are boarding or leaving the bus. Mr. VanDeaver adds, "We are fortunate we haven't had anyone injured in a bus related accident. I would like to remind everyone to think about the precious cargo that is on board each time you see a school bus going down the road."
