The subject is sewing! "Sewing?" you may ask, what can be said about that.

I want to tell all those people out there who know how to sew...who can operate a sewing machine, construct garments and useful items like quilts, curtains and dog beds just what a talent I think they have.

Now, I can do hand work...crewel embroidery, cross stitch, needlepoint, hemming, handquilting, and silk ribbon embroidery. I can take needle and thread and twist it, turn it, loop it and create soom really pretty (an usually useless) things...but a pattern and sewing machine go way beyond my ability.

This fact I have known for years, but it was re-enforced in my mind once more when I decided to make a moire silk table runner with ribbon embroidery for our dining room table.

Now, the basic shape of a table runner is just that...basic. It is rectangular, not a complicated shape. No darts, dips, scallops, gathers, zippers, button holes or anything else to complicate things.

I managed to cut the fabric in half (big deal) I then attempted to try fusing an interfacing to the fabric. Nobody told ME about pressing cloths! Well, there was something in the directions about it, but it didn't soak in. Do you know what a mess interfacing makes when it is melted all over the iron? Just ask me.

But, finally, I managed to struggle through that. Then I was faced with the task that after all my ribbon embroidery was done

I was going to need to sew these two pieces of fabric together. That's when I chickened out. Forget it....I'm contacting one of my friends that can sew. The simple fact is that I can operate big tractors, drive grain trucks, am a pretty good hand on computers, can handle power tools and navigate through customs into foreign countries. But I cannot and never have been able to operate a sewing machine worth a flip! Threading it I can manage, a bobbin I can do...but adjusting speed while coordinating fabric feed and making the needle go straight? It's impossible. My mother tried to teach me, and my homemaking teacher exhibited more patience than was required...it didn't take. So, I'll swap skills with a friend. If she will machine stitch around the edges of my table runner I'll do something for her....mow her yard, set up brochures on the computer, I'll even weed her flower bed...anything, absolutely anything except trying to operate that most dreadfully complicated piece of equipment...the electric sewing machine!

Gillis Is Named To Dean's List

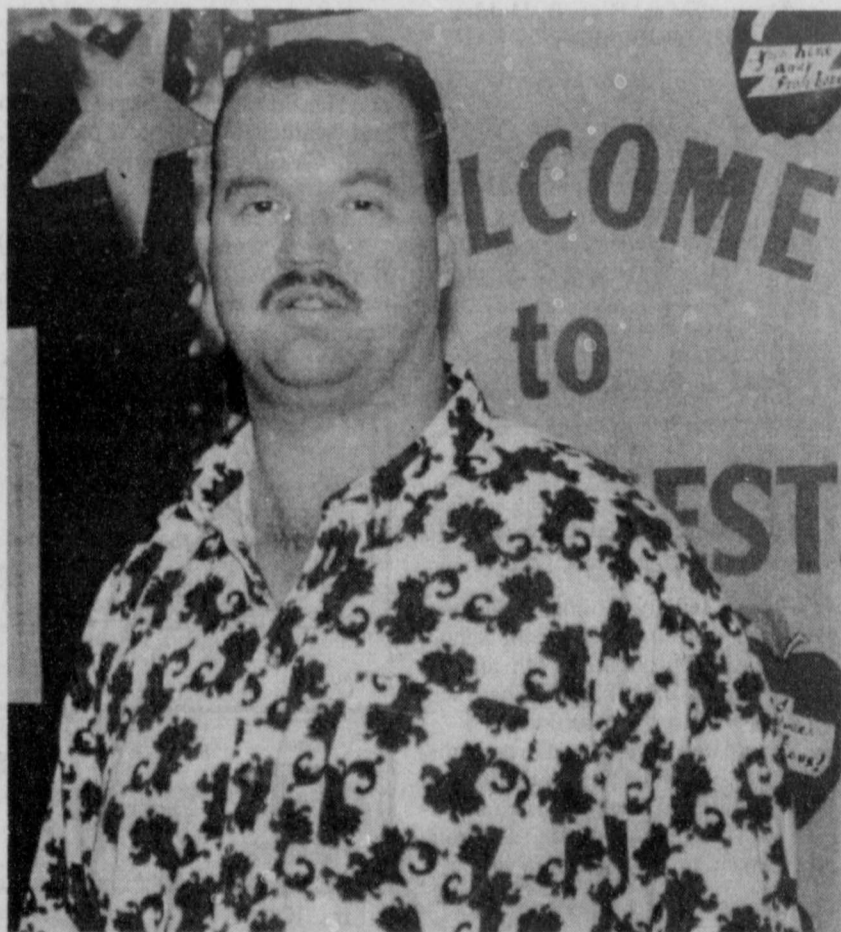

Byndas announces candidacy for Constable

Ted Byndas has announced his intention to be a candidate for Constable Precinct 1, county wide. This position was created when the Commissioner's Court consolidated the Justice of the Peace and the Constable to one precinct. The duties will primarily remain the same, to serve civil process generated out of the J.P. court, and act as bailiff for that court. This service includes civil or criminal process, citations, warrants, subpoenas or writs anywhere in the county or a county contiguous to Red River County.

Byndas is a high school graduate, has two years of college and is a graduate of the Police Academy in Kilgore, and has a basic and intermediate license. Since being a Constable, Byndas has taken 160 hours of civil process classes from the Texas Justice Court Training Center. TCLEOSE requires 20 hours each year.

He served in the United States Air

Force for 25 years and retired as a Senior Master Sergeant. He received four commendations and two meritorious service medals, and was a graduate of the NCO Academy and the Senior NCO Academy.

He and his wife, Kay, have three children, a daughter Sandy in Baytown, another daughter, Susan in Columbus, Ohio and a son, Doug stationed at Tinker Air Force Base, OK. He is a member of the First Baptist Church in Bogata.

Byndas retired from the service in 1979 and came to Red River County to enjoy his retirement, but was convinced by the Mayor, the late Worth Hood, and Bro. Bob Posey to take the City Marshal job in Bogata. He has a total of 11 years in law enforcement, and serves his eighth year as Constable Precinct #2.

Over this time period, Byndas feels he has gained valuable knowledge and experience that will be needed to fill this important position.

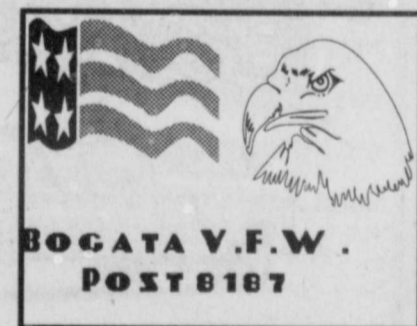

Since this is Super Bowl XXX weekend, all cooks should be allowed a day off. Just eat junk food and watch the big game with the Cowboys coming out the winner. While some folks will be anxiously awaiting the PRIZE PATROL and dreaming about what they will buy with that 10 million dollars from Ed McMahon!

So let the guys stew up a big pot of chili and kick back and relax! Ha! Ha!(Those dirty clothes will still be waiting for you-right where you left them!)

This week's recipes are dedicated to CHILI! Nothing better on a winter's day! One of the main dishes of the great state of Texas! Although chili came from Mexico (real Texans know that our state was the first ones to make chili!), and that chili is a Spanish word meaning red pepper, Texans still lay claim to the

dish.

Our recipes this week include Chili for a Crowd. This can be frozen or feed a really big gang of football fans. Real West Chili is one that takes you back out on the prairie after along day's working cattle, rustling cattle or whatever! Texas Chili, of course is the favorite among all Texans. Chili Beans... can't have chili without the beans! Chili Rice Bake, this sounds really good for a casserole and make ahead dish.

Now this next recipe is a tongue-twister... Chili-Cu-Etta (Chili-Barbeque-Spaghetti), it sounds very strange, but has a distinct hearty taste.

And last but not least, we have to have dessert... Chili Chocolate Pie. No kidding! It calls for 8 ounces Baker's chocolate. Never hurts to try something different! See you in the kitchen!

January 25, 1996 CHILI RECIPES

Chili for a Crowd
35 pounds lean meat, beef or venison
6 pounds fat
1 pound chili powder
1 ounce black pepper
3 ounces salt
1-1/2 ounces ground cumin
2 ounces paprika
1 tablespoon garlic powder

Put fat in bottom of large cooker and then put lean meat on top. Simmer for 3-4 hours and add seasonings and cook 30-60 minutes longer. Stir frequently. This freezes very well.

Real West Texas Chili
1/4 pound beef suet
1 cup chopped onion
1-1/2 teaspoon garlic
2-1/2 pounds ground beef
1/4 cup Gebhart's chili powder
1 tablespoon salt
1 pod dried hot pepper
1 teaspoon ground cumin
3 cups boiling water

Fry suet in large saucepan over medium-heat. Remove cracklings and add onions and garlic; stirring frequently. Cook until yellow. Cook ground beef until gray. Add all other ingredients. Bring to a boil and simmer over low heat until meat is tender and flavors blend. May be chilled in pan. Cut into bricks and wrapped and frozen.

Chili Beans
1 pound dry pint beans
1/2 pound bacon
1 pound hamburger
2 medium onions
2 bell peppers
2 cups tomato sauce
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1/4 cup salt
8 ounces green chilis-chopped
2 tablespoons granulated garlic
2 tablespoons red chili pepper
1 tablespoon black pepper
1 tablespoon cumin

Chili Rice Bake
1 pound ground beef
1 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped bell pepper
2 cups beef broth
1 can tomato paste
1 teaspoon garlic salt
1 tablespoon chili powder
1-1/2 cup rice-cooked
1 cup grated cheese

Cook ground beef, onion and peppers in skillet until meat is no longer pink. Blend in broth, tomato paste and season-

ings. Simmer a few minutes. Add rice and spoon into a 2-quart casserole dish. Spread grated cheese on top and bake at 350 degrees until cheese melts.

Chili-Cu-Etta (Chili-Barbeque-Spaghetti)
1 pound lean ground beef
2 onions-chopped
2 cloves garlic-minced
2 beef bouillon cubes
1 cup water
1 cup barbeque sauce
1 cup spaghetti sauce
1 tablespoon chili powder
1 teaspoon cumin
salt to taste
9 ounces long spaghetti-cooked
2 cups uncooked pinto beans(recipe)
3 chicken bouillon cubes
1 clove garlic
1 sweet onion-chopped
8 ounces cheddar cheese

Brown ground beef, onions and garlic; drain. Dissolve bouillon cubes in water. Add bouillon, barbeque sauce, spaghetti sauce, chili powder and cumin. Cook 15 minutes on medium heat. Add salt to taste. Simmer another 30 minutes on low. If too dry, add more water.

To prepare beans, wash and soak 2 cups pinto beans overnight, or put on stove and bring to a boil. Take off burner and let set for 1 hour. Add 3 chicken bouillon cubes and 1 clove garlic. Return to stove and cook over low heat 3 hours or until done. To serve, pile on the plate the spaghetti, chili-cu-etta, beans, sweet onion and cheese. Delicious and serves 6.

Chili Chocolate Pie
1/2 pound hamburger meat
1 can Ro-Tel tomatoes with chilies
1 teaspoon chili powder
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon cumin
8 crushed soda crackers
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
1/4 teaspoon oregano
1/3 square unsweetened chocolate-grated
2 pie shells-unbaked
cheddar cheese-grated

Combine all ingredients and mix well. Place meat in unbaked pie shell. Cover with unbaked pie shell. Flute edges. Brush pie crust with egg white. Bake at 400 degrees for 30 minutes at least or until meat is done. Sprinkle with grated cheese or top crust. Return to oven until cheese melts.

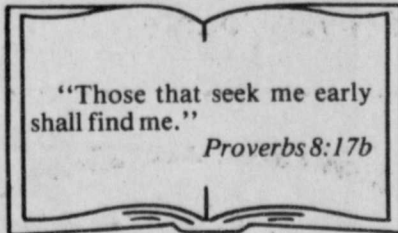

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New Ground In The Bottom

Dad only went to the sixth grade in school, but the older I got I knew Dad had a lot of what he called "horse sense." Dad was a simple man who lived in a simple world. My dad wore overalls and a jumper almost all his life and wore overalls without the jumper, until he died. Dad was a sharecropper for many years and money was something he never had much of. I think if dad had made a million dollars in one year, his life still would not have changed that much. Dad may have had a newer tractor or pickup but I think that's about all. Many times I heard him wish for the good old days. I could never understand why. I think Dad always wanted to go back to the 20's and 30's when a man's word was as good as gold. Where Dad could see hard work and satisfied people, I saw only toil that most men today could not survive. Dad helped clear Sulphur Bottom for 50 cents a day. A day's work began at daylight and ended at dark. He told me that he wore coal oil soaked rags around his legs to keep chiggers off his body and many times his shoes were red as blood, with millions of chiggers. Dad told me one time he was down to his last dollar and he had worked two long days for it. Christmas was near and we did not have enough food for winter. All crops failed because the levee around Sulphur Bottom had broken and flooded all the farm land. He said he was on his way to town to try to borrow some money and he ran into some friends who were shooting dice. He prayed a silent prayer and when he had finished the game, he had \$31.00, a lot of money in those days. He went on to town and bought 100 pounds of pinto beans, 100 pounds of sugar, 25 pounds of corn meal and 20 pounds of coffee, a case of Rex jelly and had enough money left for Christmas. That was the first time I had ever heard of my dad "gambling" as he called it. However as I see it, my dad "gambled" every year on the banks of the big muddy a place called Sulphur Bottom.

I can never remember when we did not have large quantities of pinto beans, flour, meal, lard, pork and potatoes. Dad always raised chickens for eggs and meat and a cow for milk. This may sound like a terrible diet today, but it carried my dad and his dad to their late 80's. I wonder, was it really that bad. The house we lived in for many years was an old box house, made from 1X12 green lumber. After the lumber shrank, between each plank 1/2" to 3/4" of pure daylight could be seen from the inside. Some cracks were patched with 1X4 and some were not. I cannot ever remember seeing a sharecropper working on a house he did not own.

There are many stories to tell, my dad never, and I mean never, let us go hungry. Each year my dad raised six hogs, killed, cured or made sausage from all the meat, rendered all fat into lard and made soap from what was left. I always loved "hog killing season" as my dad called it and

years later I begged and pleaded with my mother to let me skip school and assist my dad in rendering the fat into lard. What a frightful day! Dad repaired his tractor every few years and he washed all the engine parts in gasoline. Because there was so much oil and grease in the old gas, my dad used it to start fires, (a big mistake). This time the old gas had sat in storage for many months. I put wood around an old cast iron wash pot. I had seen my mother boil clothes in it to get the sweat of toil completely out. I started the fire, but dad was always in a hurry. He went to the storage building and got the 5 gal. can of old gas. The gas had settled and separated. He turned the gas up and started pouring it on the fire. It blazed up instantly and dad pulled back the can sucking flame into it. The can exploded and I could not see my dad for the flame. He screamed, "Son, help me". It was the first time in my life that dad had to have my help and I did not know what to do. My dad went a few steps to a chicken watering trough. As he started to move, I saw a large heavy throw rug hanging on the clothes line a few steps away. I raced for the rug as my dad knelt down and started flipping water onto his body. In a flash, I was there with the rug around his feet and legs and I choked the fire out. I do not understand how I did it to this day. I helped my dad remove his old cowboy boots and poured at least a pint or more of gas from each boot. I helped him remove his brand new overalls. As I saw his legs appear, I knew my dad was badly burned. He told me there was a bottle over the door of his bedroom and I must get it quickly. I returned and dad took off the cap, turned up the pint bottle and drank every drop at one time. It was the first time in my life that I had ever seen my dad drink whiskey. Dad said that he was OK and would not go to the doctor, but I knew he must. I called Bo Bryson crying for help. Roads were muddy, but I could depend on Bo. He loved my father too. In minutes I heard Bo coming down the road. He arrived and looked at dad. He looked straight in to my dad's eyes and said, with authority, "Uncle Homer, you are going to the doctor." Dad could not change his mind and in seconds Bo was loading dad into his car. I thank God for Bo Bryson to this day. I had saved my dad's life that day. But we rarely talked about it. Many years later as he looked at his terrible scarred legs, he said, "Son, if you had not put out that fire, I was ready to run for the pool of water, and I knew, I could never make it without burning up. I thank God and you for being there that day." Dad had a hard time giving compliments and I accepted this one with a lump in my throat and tear in each eye, as I remembered that frightful day. There were many things I wanted to remember about my dad, today, but the grief is too much, so I must quit.

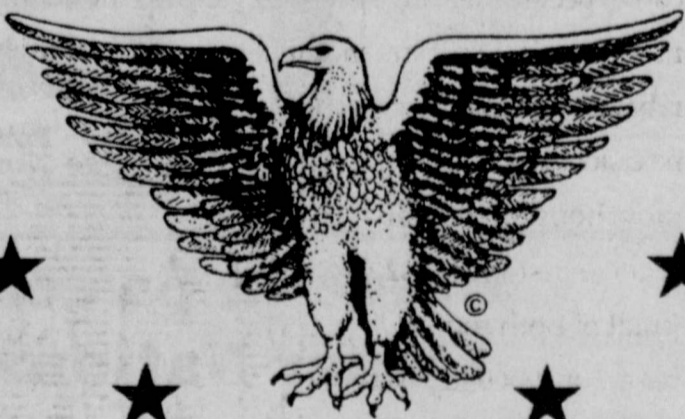

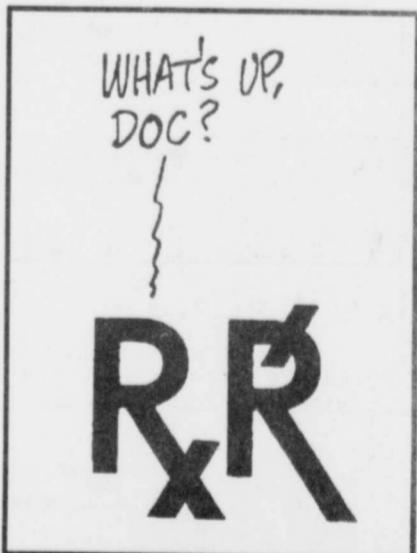
