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National Commander Speaks to VFW

Paul A Spera, the 1995-96 National commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, spoke to a gathering of local veteran and dignataries at VFW 8560 in Sulphur Springs on Tuesday, March 26th. National Commander Spera, traveling with Texas State Commander Paul Duff, State Sr. Vice Commander Alexander VErnon and N.F. Layne State Jr. Vice Commander visited Congressional Candidate Max Sandlin, an aide from Jim Chapman's office the Hopkins County Judge, and Sheriff and several Hopkins County Hospital Administrators. This was a two hour stop-over breakfast as they traveled across the state of Texas.

"The VFW works everyway we can to make life better for our active duty veterans," local veterans were told by Commander Spear. He went on to tell of "Operation Call Home", a joint venture between AT"&T and the VFW. Veterans stationed in Bosnia during the Christmas Holidays were each presented with a \$20 prepaid calling card, and with special lines open were able to call home on Christmas Day. Spera announced that it is in the planning stages for this to become a permanent program for overseas Military and VA Hospitalized patients.

The commander also discussed Veterans HEalth Care. "We have another job, serving those that have already served... There are those in Congress that want to do something to cut the budget...I am concerned about Veterans. They were promised lifetime health care but those in Congress are now nickle and diming away veteran's entitlements. The same entitlements that they were promised 20,30,40 years ago when they volunteered to stay in the service and serve their country. Yes, your Congressman votes to increase the VA budget, but they fail to tell you that it is far below the cost of living increase. Thus the VA cannot keep up with the needs of a growing segment of aging veterans." Spera went on to say. "I have been told by VA Hospital Directors across the Nation that any further VA Hospital cuts will come directly from patient care". According to national statistics, 9 out of every 10 veterans get turned away from Va Hosoptial care.

"We as voters, have not been noisy enought", according to Commander Spera. ""We let them (Congress) tell us how wonderul they are, how grateful this nation is for its veterans, but then they go and make budget cuts affecting the health care of these same veterans." Recently an independent Veterans Group has been formed. It is comprised of veterans from other Veterans organizations. The purpose of this group is to ensure the protection of our aging veterans entitlements and health care. They have come up with a three point plan to meet this goal.

1. Change VA eligibility requirements, so that most veterans will be able to receive VA Hospital care.

2. Current regulations are tieing the Va's hands. change these regulations. For example: A veteran can go to the VA Hospital/ Clinic for eye exams and outpatient surgery. The VA Hospital cannot provide him with glasses after that surgery unless he is admiktted to the hospital.

3. Let Midicare/Medical pay for VA benefits. Don't penalize the Va Hospital system. Have the same guidelines apply for VA hospitals as public sector hospitals concerning medical reinbursements.

Congress Sonny Montgormery has recently introduced bills ont hese issues. They have bi-partisan support in both the House and SEnate. The Senate version is \$1563 and the House version is HR3119. Commander Spera asked that we contact our local congressman and seantor and request that they sign as co-sponsors of these bills and give them their full support.

Commander Speara closed "We must anser the call to duty, it is time for us to get involved in politics. We need to get involved at the grass roots level. Let our Legislators know our concerns and needs, and then hold them accountable for their actions."

Rahsaan "Rocky" Porter was convicted of deadly conduct and attempted murder last Wednesday and sentenced to five years in prison and 15 years in prison respectively. County Attorney Jack Herrington said the offenses arose out of a drive by shooting of a ten year old boy in February of 1995. After an altercation with the father, Porter drove by the house of the child, got out of his car and fired 2 shots toward the house. Thirty minutes later Porter came back and fired at least four more shots from a Chinese made SKS Rifle at the child and the father. The child was hit in the arm. He was airlifted to Wadley Hospital and doctors were

able to save his arm. He has undergone 2 surgeries and a fourth is scheduled this summer. After denying his part in the shooting for over a year, Porter took the stand at punishment and confessed to the shooting. He said he hid the gun in the attic of his apartment and later threw it in the Red River. Porter is married and has a six month old child. Herrington said Porter must serve one half of his sentence day for day with no good time credit before he will even be eligible for parole.

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





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Don't look up even when lying down

By Jack Dodd The year was 1885, 5 years after H.C. F. Dodd (1856-1914) had married Belle Smiley (1858-1932). There were a total of 11 children born to this couple residing in Rosalie. H.C.F. had arrived in Texas from Spartansburg, N.C. when he was only one year old. HCF married one Smiley girl and his brother Herschel (1856-1906) had married her sister, Mary. Herschel and Mary were married in 1875. H.C. F. and Belle were married on January 14, 1880. H.C.F. was nicknamed "Jack". If you had a name like Hiram Cornelius Franklin Dodd wouldn't you need a more simple name? That was Jack. I am also nicknamed "Jack". With a name like Henry Clay Dodd, Jr. I didn't need one more. I changed my name when I started the first grade in Rosalie. No problem, just started signing my name "Jack" on all the papers. Of course I was still Henry Jr. to all the family.

The first child born to H..C.F. and Belle was Martha (Dutch) who later married Dr. Jones in Rosalie. These were the parents of Lucy Bell Holder. Then came Cora. She moved to New

Mexico and reared her family. My father H.C. Senior was the lost child born on the old log cabin homestead about one and one half miles from Rosalie Store. We had a lot of dry, sultry work days on the farm after that, but I never saw Simon wallow any more. That was sad because Simon was a good wallower.



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
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

Estimated Tax

for 1996

People who expect to owe at least \$500 in tax for 1996 after subtracting withholding and credits may need to estimate taxes before their annual return is due.

Estimated tax is the way to pay tax on income that is not covered by withholding. This income includes self-employment, unemproyment compensation, interest, dividends, alimony, rents and awards. If the amount of income tax withheld from salary, pension or other income is not enough to cover the taxes on this unwithheld income, estimated tax payments should be made.

To figure and pay estimated tax, use Form 1040-ES.

"Estimated Tax for Individuals," which includes a worksheet to help calculate the payment. Each payment must be accompanied by

the payment voucher from Form 1040-ES.

People who have income subject to estimated tax during the first payment period (January through March) must make the first payment by April 15, 1996. They can pay all their estimated tax at that time, or in four installments. Each period has a specific due date. The other installment due dates are June 17, September 16, and January 15 of the next year.

Now any of you familiar with hound dogs know that laying on cool planks with a breeze causes them to roll over on their backs, legs up and groan, growl and on occasions expel some gas. Now the Mrs. was a little embarrassed by all of this so she told the Mr. to do something with the old dog to keep him out of church. Their

We could have gotten two milk shakes and 1 hamburger at the café for 15 cents and would have been a lot better off than buying the High Life.

The Methodist Church in Rosalie had a group of big oak trees in the front yard. Many of them are still there. The following day the family from over yonder all went to church. It was hot and the church's front door was wide open, in fact both doors. About the singing of the first song, the old blue tick hound ambled in, circled 3 times to find the upwind direction and laid down at the end of the pew where the family sat. By the singing of the second song the old dog had started his grunting and groaning and the Mrs. started hissing to the Mr. to get the dog out of the

It was at this time that the Mr. and son should have shot the old dog or better still have us take the dog to the storm cellar. But the Mr.. and the son, my age, exactly, got up, pulled the old hound out front of the church under the oak trees. House, Hell, that old hound circled around the big oak trees in front of the



Mother called Mrs. Foster and told her about my sudden illness. Mrs. Foster told mother what had happened and told her as soon as I slept it off I would be okay somewhat.

Mr. friends, that was 56 years ago and you could put all the wine I have drunk in all those years in a small milk pan. Paul and I moved away in '42 and '43. Haven't seen him since, but I expect he would remember ev erything you have read here today. I still think of you, Paul. Saw your older brother, the retired preacher, last year. He said you got rich in the jewelry business in California. I'm glad some local boys made good. Some people say I got lucky. However, it always seemed to me that the harder I worked the luckier I got.





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
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


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
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
