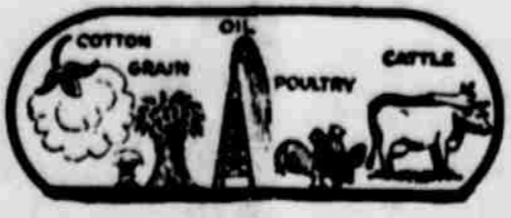
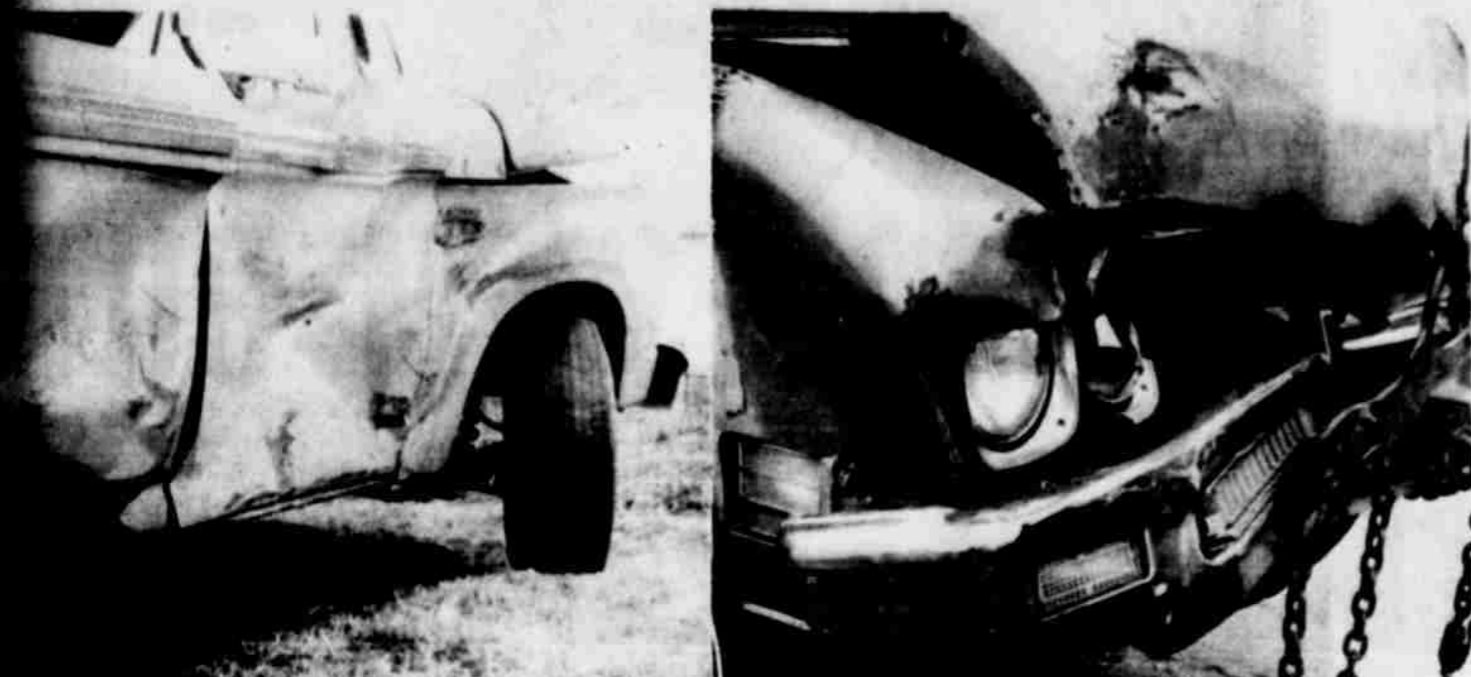

Millers Creek Lake Fenced And Locked

Visitors to the Millers Creek reservoir site last week-end were probably disappointed to find access to the site fenced and locked.

During construction, the area was open, as fencing was removed for construction purposes. Removal of fences created a problem of retaining cattle within the area and as the project is now completed, fencing was necessary to protect cattle and property of adjoining land owners.

Locking out the area was necessary due to automobiles and motorcycles attempting to climb the downstream side of the dam, which was mulched and sodded with bermuda grass, but the grass has not had time to form a complete protective cover. Vehicle tracks on the new dam will create gullies that will be very expensive to repair.

A State funded boat ramp and parking area has been approved by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and work on this facility is expected to begin very soon.

Recreation at the reservoir will be provided the public when adequate storage of water is impounded and personnel is hired for safety of the public and sanitation of the reservoir, but as of this date, the area is closed to the public due to the above mentioned reasons and only authorized personnel will be permitted access to the reservoir area.

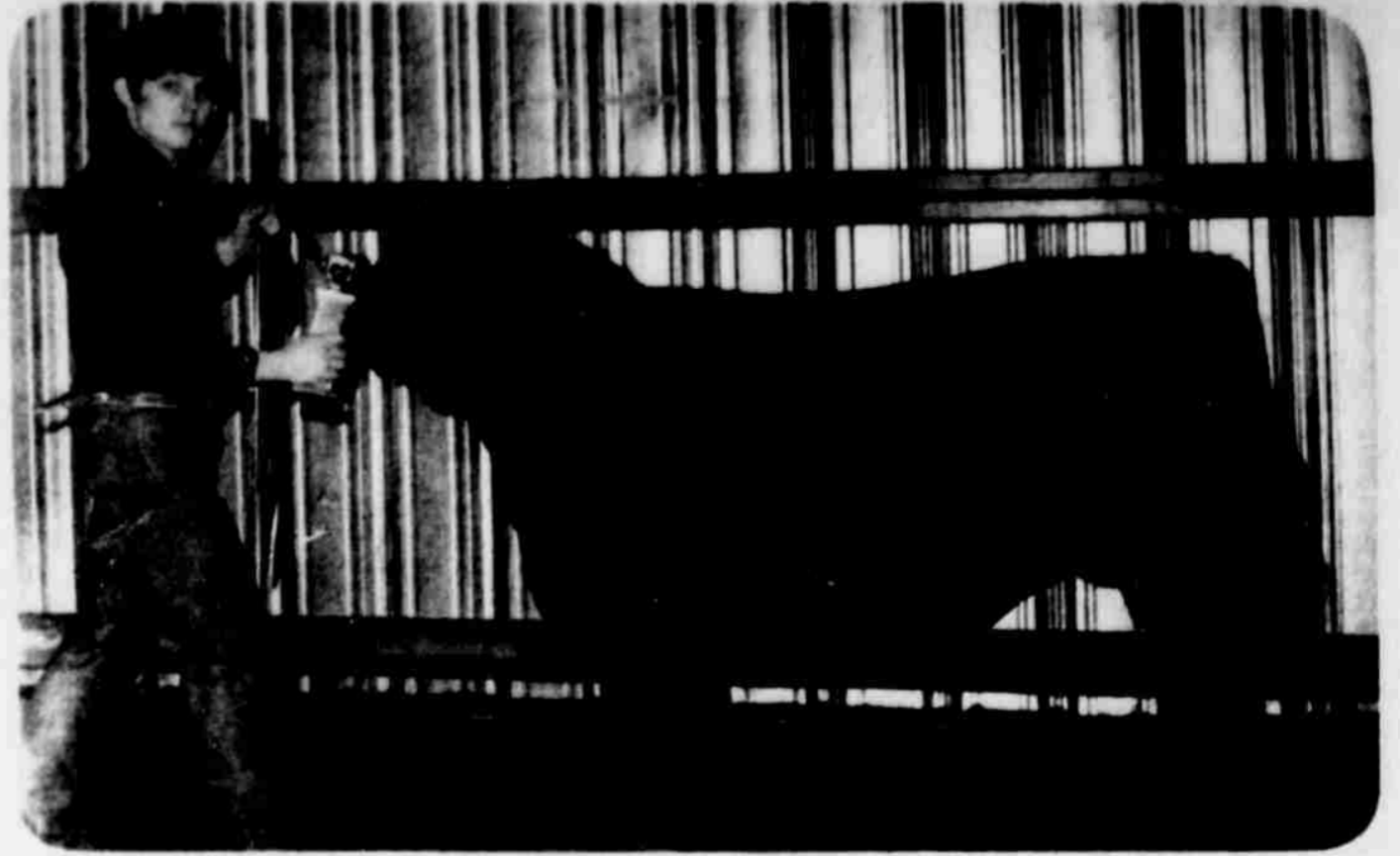

Food prices will rise 15 percent during 1975, according to recent estimates. This means that families with income under \$20,000 may have to spend from 25 to 50 per cent of their incomes for food.

To help families estimate the amount of foods they will need to buy to meet nutritional needs, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has developed low, moderate and liberal cost plans.

These plans provide diets consistent with food patterns that are typical of those of most groups of people in the U. S.

The liberal cost plan allows a greater variety of foods and considerably more animal products, fruits and vegetables than either of the other two plans.

The moderate cost plan includes larger quantities of meat, vegetables and fruit

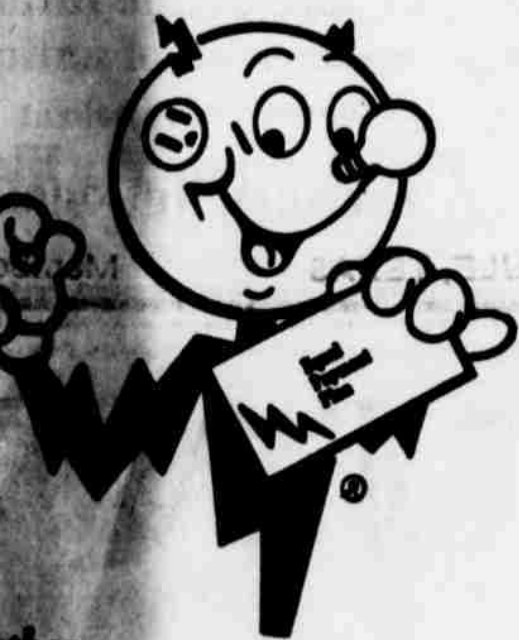

"As It Looks from Here"

WASHINGTON, D. C.—PEOPLE'S COMPLAINTS ABOUT OBSCENE AND INDECENT material on television are paying off. By reason of these complaints and pressure from Congressional sources, the Federal Communications Commission will seek legislation making it a crime to show these programs.

A TEN-PAGE REPORT TO CONGRESS on the broadcasting of violent, indecent and obscene material proposes to close what the Commission believes to be a loophole in Federal law which makes it a crime to use indecent language in broadcasting.

UNDER PRESENT LAW, THE FCC says it is uncertain whether the Commission has authority to proceed against video depiction of obscene and indecent material. The report does not specifically say what kind of programming would be considered indecent. In the past, some Commissioners have expressed concern that X-rated movies might be shown on television and some have already been shown. The report points to recent guidelines the Commission issued in a decision involving complaints against a New York radio station which had broadcast during mid-afternoon a sexy program in what they considered to be vulgar terms. The Commission ruled that in that case it would not permit indecent language to be broadcast during hours when children might be listening. One Commissioner wrote in the report that there should be no specification as to time. "To me," the Commissioner said, "the language used in this case has absolutely no place on the air whether it be 2:00 p.m. or 2:00 a.m."

IN THE PAST THE PROBLEM HAS BEEN, can the Government regulate and limit programs under the provision of the First Amend-

ment to the Constitution guaranteeing freedom of speech. Under this Constitutional provision, it is sensitive for the Government to get into the business of determining what is offensive and what is not and this has been a hangup in trying to reach solutions to the problems of some broadcasting.

THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF BROADCASTERS' TELEVISION CODE REVIEW BOARD has adopted guidelines which will come before the broadcasting industry in April. In reviewing the reform proposal by the industry, the FCC has already said that it will not provide absolute assurance that children or particularly sensitive adults will be insulated from objectionable materials. The Commission says, however, that the new commitments by the broadcasting industry suggest it is prepared to regulate itself to bring about improved conditions. It goes on to say that if this were done to the proper extent, legis-

lation may not be necessary. ONE OF THE COMMISSIONERS WHO IS A FORMER BROADCASTER HIMSELF said that to try to set specific rules or setting aside certain times when more objectionable programs may be shown is not the answer. He said that "garbage is garbage" and, under no stretch of the imagination, should fifth be permitted to be broadcast in the context of literary, artistic, political or scientific value.

THE COMMISSION'S REPORT AND THE PROPOSED GUIDELINES OF THE broadcasting industry are expected to be examined this month during Congressional hearings on how well the Federal Communications Commission is doing its job. It is hoped that the broadcasting industry in consultation and cooperation with the FCC will come up with agreement to clean up the airways and that, preferably, strict legislation will not be necessary. Government intervention and more control

is not desirable if the problem can be resolved otherwise. Even drafting legislation for this purpose will be difficult in defining limits under the First Amendment of the Constitution.

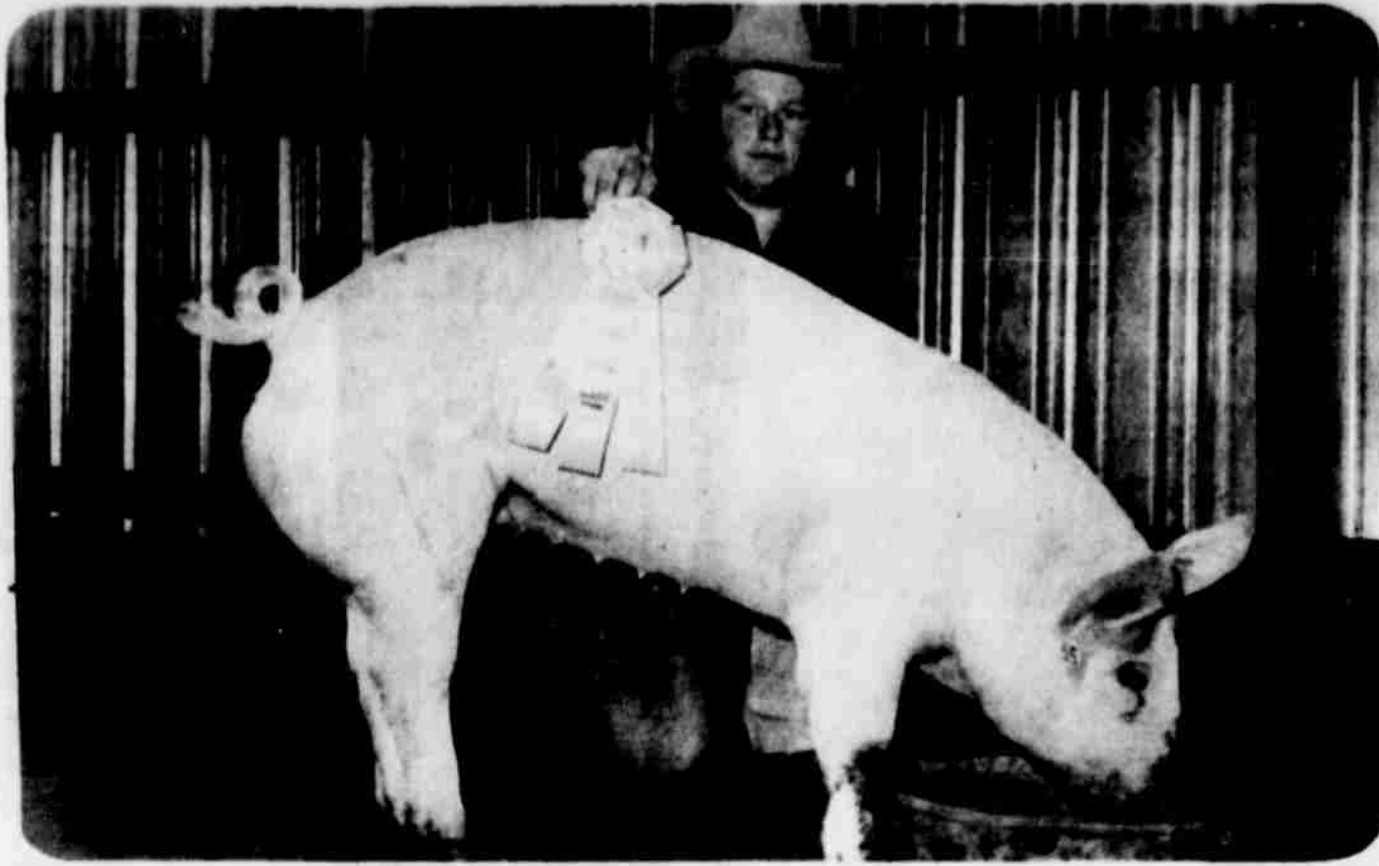

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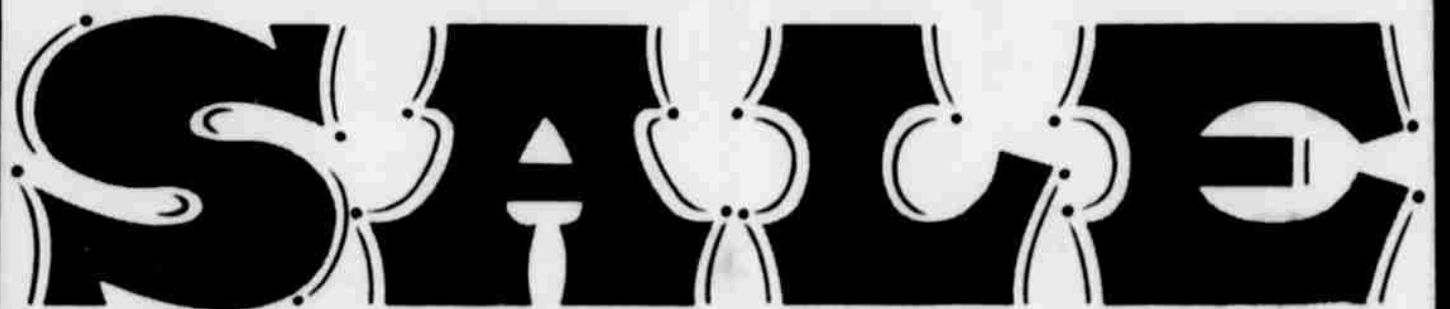

Vegetable Garden Can Be Attractive To Landscape

A small vegetable garden, home landscape design, especially in urban areas where attractive part of the overall space is limited. Some vegeta-

able plants may be used in combination with bulbs, annuals and perennials or by themselves as ornamentals.

Max Scapleton, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers some pointers on working a vegetable garden into the landscape plan.

A small area, such as 5 feet by 10 feet, well prepared and maintained can produce an amazing variety and amount of fresh garden produce without dominating the typical small urban or suburban lot. A small plot may also be a good choice for people who do not have the extra time required to maintain a large area. The plot should be in a sunny, well-drained location. High-density crops such as carrots, lettuce, radishes, bell peppers, tomatoes and onions are excellent choices for a small garden plot.

Mr. Scapleton suggests edging vegetable plantings with construction material such as pressure treated pine, cedar, redwood or railroad ties to reduce weeding and provide better draining and a neater appearance. There is no reason to screen a vegetable garden from view if it is kept neat and attractive. Good landscape designs reflect the interest and hobbies of homeowners, and vegetables are a source of pride and interest to many people.

If you do not want to prepare a special area for vegetables, consider bordering existing planting areas with lettuce, carrots, radishes or other leafy green vegetables, says Scapleton. Chain link or other open weave wire fences provide excellent support for pole beans, cucumbers, small melons and

squash. A row of okra can provide quick summer screening while producing fare for the table and freezer. Dwarf tomatoes provide handsome container specimens for the porch desk or terrace, and it's easy to work an egg plant, several peppers and a short row of shallots into existing landscape plantings.

There is ample opportunity for everyone from apartment dwellers to rural citizens with plenty of space to add beauty, interest and usefulness to their environment by incorporating vegetables into their landscapes, contends Mr. Scapleton.

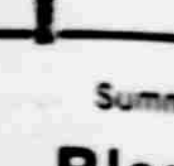

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.
