The Board discussed the Rivercrest Sewer Plant project with representative of KSA Engineers of Longview.



A nurse who lost her battle against cancer was honored by medical professionals recently during the dedication of the Cancer Rehabilitation Program at Trinity Mother Frances Regional Wellness Center. Fifty people attended the ceremony.

Jeanie Halverson Spencer, M.S., R.N., who was instrumental in developing the rehabilitation program for cancer patients, died April 24,

She had designed a completer plan for a cancer rehabilitation program after she learned she had developed breast cancer. She was 52 when she

Mrs. Spencer was a nurse at Titus County Memorial Hospital in Mount Pleasant, and her personal interest in exercise and sports led her to pursue a masters degree in Clinical Exercise Physiology, which she completed in 1992 at the University of Texas Tyler.

She learned she had breast cancer in 1990. Shortly thereafter, she combined her drive to fight cancer, her knowledge as a nurse and her skills as an exercise physiologist to write the clinical protocol for a cancer rehabilitation program. She believed exercise and rehabilitation would benefit cancer survivors just as individuals with heart and pulmonary disease benefit from similar programs.


