





cup white corn syrup cup dark brown sugar

1/3 teaspoon salt 1/3 cup melted butter or margarine

l teaspoon vanilla 3 whole eggs (slightly beaten) 1 heaping cup shelled whole pecans

Combine syrup, sugar, salt, butter and vanilla. Mix well. Add slightly beaten eggs. Pour into 9 inch unbaked pie shell. Sprinkled pecans all over. Bake in pre heated 350 degree oven for approximately 45 minutes. When cool you may top with whipped cream or ice

Cantaloupe Pie

I baked pie shell 2 1/2 cups cooked cantaloupe

Put jars on cookie sheet in cold oven. Turn oven to 350 degrees. Bake 45 minutes. Keep oven door closed. Let jars cool before opening door.
