



## TO THE EDITOR:

This past week there was a medical emergency in which the Bogata First Responders failed to respond. We regret that this happened and would like to thank the family involved for bringing this to our attention. The Bogata First Responders were never called to this emergency by the 911 dispatcher. Our 911 dispatchers (one per shift) handle radio traffic to and from ambulance, fire depts. DPS and sheriff deputies for all of Red River County as well as the Clarksville Police Dept. At times this must get very hectic, trying to keep up with all these different agencies. Our protocol is set up for the first responders to be called to every emergency, excluding nursing home, in and around Bogata. We cover Rosalie, Johntown, Fulbright and we are available for Cuthand if needed. Due to our small number of state certified members there may be times we can't respond because of work or other personal obligations. We are trying to get more people through school to help with this problem. We have a great group of 911 dispatchers that do a very good job under very stressful conditions. In the future, if you call 911 for an emergency, we ask that you also request First Responders. This will help remind the dispatchers to call us. We do our best to correct problems that might keep us from delivering the best possible service to our area. 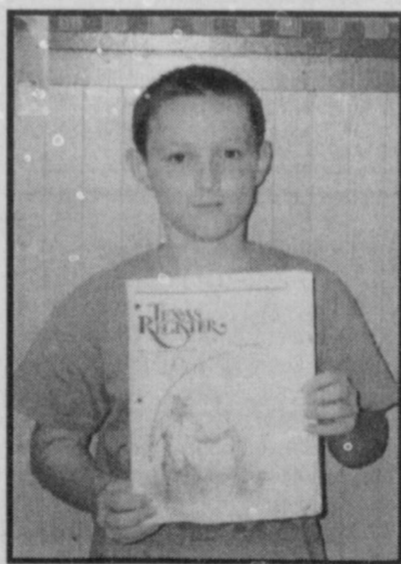
All of the nominee's will be escorted on the field by their fathers.

Homecoming ceremonies will be held at the Rivercrest stadium on September 20 beginning at 7:00 p.m.

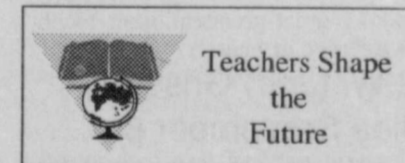
## Bogata student's drawing published in magazine

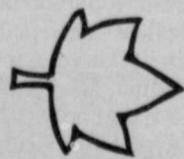
Justin has entered several different art contests and won or placed with his creative artistic efforts.

## Bogata Council hears complaints about loose dogs

The Bogata City Council heard from a citizen concerning a problem with loose dogs within the city, but no decision was made. They were presented with several letters concerning the dog problem, including one from Dr. Nada at the medical clinic and from Principal Bill Mabry at the Bogata school.

A public hearing was held on the proposed 1996-97 budget. A committee from the Lions Club was on hand and they discussed the maintenance of the Community Center.

The council voted not to enter into a contract with Edgar Inglis concerning a refund of federal taxes on gasoline.

They decided to purchase two front tires for the John Deere backhoe, and decided to have the 1988 Ford pickup checked out for repairs.

The 1996-97 budget was adopted and the 1996 tax rate was set at .46799/\$100.

No action was taken about amending the peddlers ordinance. They did vote to amend Water Use Ordinance #89-2, Section 9, to raise fee for returned checks to \$20.

The decision was made to landscape Thomas Park with low-maintenance plants.

They also decided not to hire a permanent full-time employee in the street department at this time.

# Country Cooking

While mowing the other day, after the recent rains and several days growth of grass, the wind had played havoc with my apple tree. They lay over, around and underneath the tree, forcing me to run over several of them. These apples seem to be the only fruit that survived the frost of the year and I really should not let any of them go to waste. They are of the winesap variety and are great apple for pies. They ripen in late September and are very tart.  
This leads me into the column for the week. . . . can you guess what it is about? Apples, of course!  
There are many varieties. Since the days of Eden, the apple has played it's part in legend, science, art and history. Apples were raised in the gardens of the Phoenicians. In Greek mythology, one of Hercules' laborers was to obtain the golden apples of the Hesperides which were extremely well guarded because they bestowed immortality on those who had them. Newton is said to have discovered the law of gravity when an apple fell on his head. Countless painters have used apples in their still life. Finally, apples figure in the social history of

our country. The first settlers included apple seeds in their precious supplies and Peregrine White, the first child born in New England, planted apple trees there. American apples were exported to London before the American Revolution. Later, John Chapman traveled to the Ohio Wilderness, preaching and planting apple seeds, thus earning him the nickname of Johnny Appleseed.  
They can be round like a McIntosh or egg-shaped like a Delicious. In size, it can vary from a two-inch crabapple to a six-inch Rome Beauty. The flesh may be white as a Wealthy, yellow as a Golden Delicious, crisp as a Northern Spy, mellow as a Baldwin, sweet as a Grimes Golden, or tart as a new Winesap. The skin is thin and glossy and ranges in color from bright to russet red or yellow to green. Apples fit into every course in every meal and are munched between meals too; they are found in lunches and a fancy torte. No wonder they are one of the favorite fruits and have crept into our everyday lives or as the old saying goes, "an apple for the teacher", or "an apple a day keeps the doctor away."

**Party Apple Salad**  
4 large eating apples  
orange, pineapple, lemon or grapefruit juice  
1 cup diced celery  
1 large banana-diced  
2/3 cup coarsely chopped pecans  
mayonnaise  
prepared mustard  
candied or other salad greens  
Core apples, leaving bottoms whole. Hollow out, leaving a 1/2 inch shell. Sprinkle cavities and apple pulp with fruit juice. Chop pulp; add celery, banana and nuts. Moisten with mayonnaise and add mustard to taste. Mix well and fill apples, piling mixture up in center. Chill. Serve on greens.

**Apple-Cabbage Slaw**  
juice of 1/2 orange  
juice of 1/2 lemon  
2 medium red apples-cored and cut into 1/8 inch wedges  
4 cups finely chopped white cabbage  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
1/4 cup applesauce  
1 teaspoon horseradish  
1 teaspoon prepared mustard  
2 tablespoons parsley and nuts  
Pour fruit juice over apples. Add cabbage and mix lightly. Mix mayonnaise, applesauce, horseradish and mustard. Pour over apples and cabbage and mix carefully. Sprinkle top with parsley and nuts.

**Cranberry-Apple Salad**  
1 cup cranberries  
2 seedless oranges (leave one unpeeled)  
2 apples-cored and unpeeled  
sugar  
1 box raspberry-flavor gelatin  
1 cup boiling water  
salad greens  
Force cranberries, oranges and apples through food chopper. Mix with 1/2 cup and 1 cup sugar and let stand 1 hour. Dissolve gelatin in 1 cup very hot water. Chill until slightly thickened. Add fruit mixture. (Juice from fruit will make up extra liquid needed) Pour into 8-inch square pan or gelatin mold and chill until firm. Unmold on greens and garnish with olives.

**Apple-Mincemeat Relish**  
1 cup bouillon  
1 package mincemeat-crumble  
2 cups applesauce  
1 teaspoon grated lemon  
Bring bouillon to boil and add mincemeat. Simmer 5 minutes or until mincemeat has absorbed all liquid. Add applesauce and lemon rind and simmer 15 minutes. Cool, then refrigerate.

**Autumn Apple Bread**  
1/4 cup shortening  
2/3 cup sugar  
2 beaten eggs  
2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 cups grated apples  
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
2/3 cup chopped nuts  
Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy; beat in eggs. Sift in next four ingredients. Add alternately with apple and egg mixture. Stir in lemon rind and nuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 50-60 minutes.

**Apple Crisp**  
2 pounds cooking apples, peeled & sliced  
1/4 cup water  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
1/2 cup packed brown sugar  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
3/4 cup flour  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
Put apples in shallow greased 2 quart casserole; add water. Combine sugars, nutmeg, cinnamon, salt and flour. Cut in butter with pastry blender. Spoon evenly over apples. Cover and bake for 30 minutes at 350 degrees.



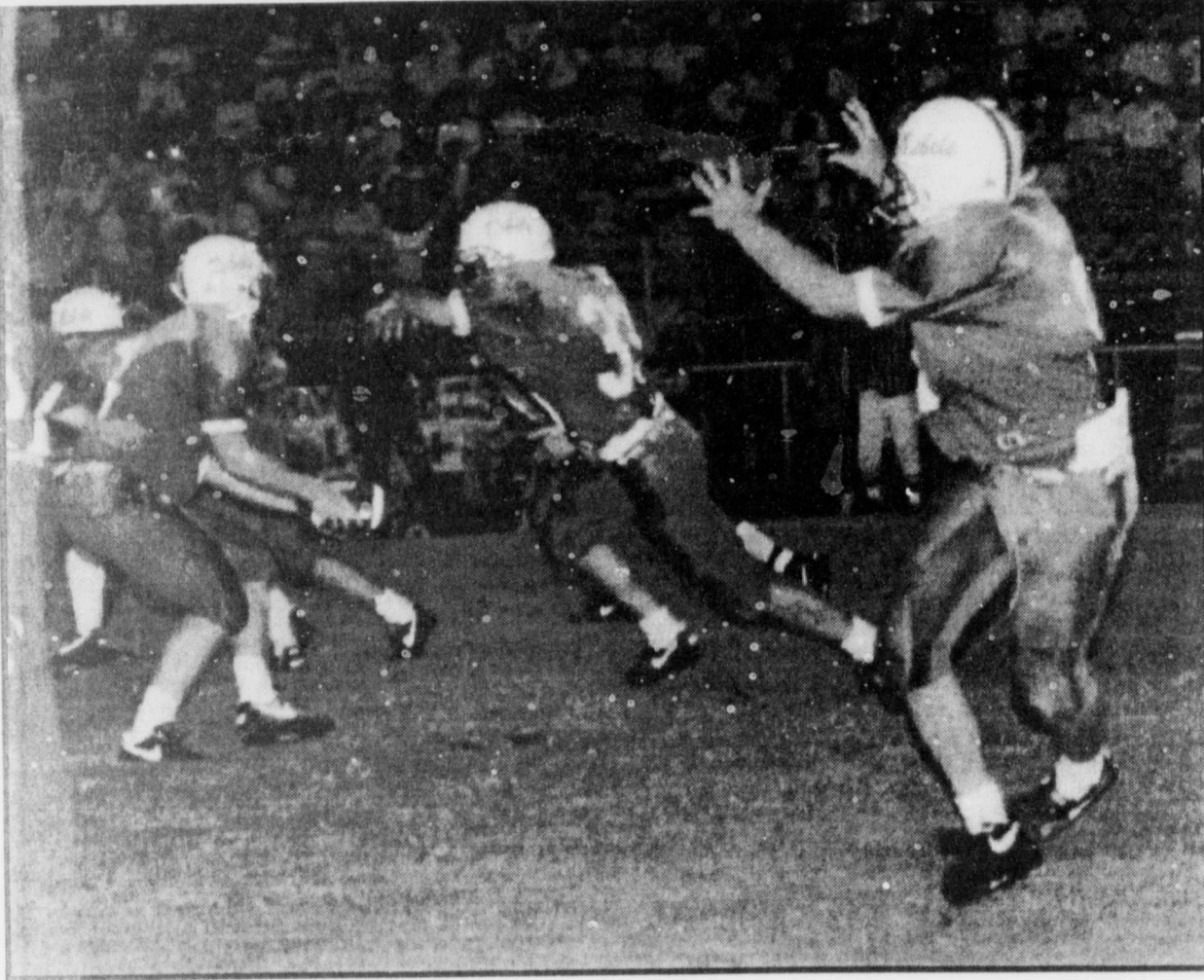

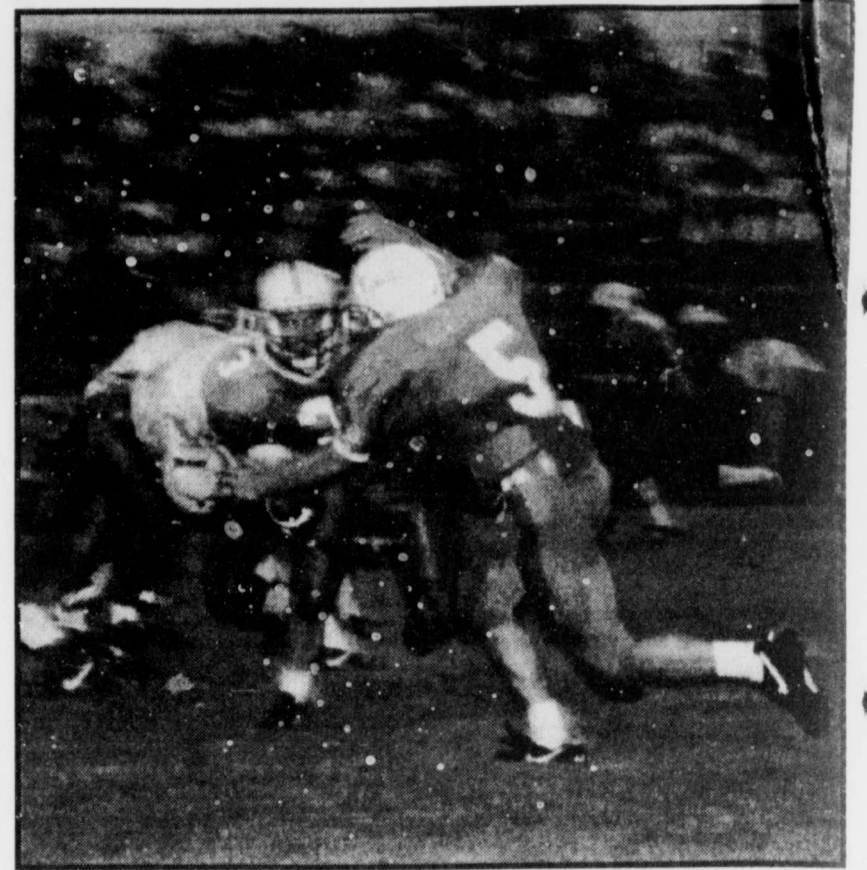

**The Bogata High School Principal**

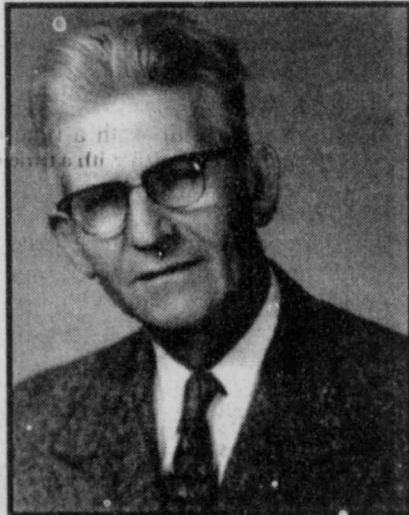

**Remedies Superstitions and Wives Tales**

While thumbing through a popular magazine recently I read a story on remedies, superstitions and wives tales. Most of the ones in the story I had never heard of and they seemed rather mild compared to the ones I grew up with. We here in North East Texas have our own set of all of the above and they vary from family to family but I love to hear these little bits of wisdom or whimsy. Some are sure fire, some old wives were pretty sharp cookies and some are at the least, questionable.

My grandfather would pull over to the side of the road and wait for another car to pass if a black cat crossed the road in front of him. Someone else could get the bad luck. If the palm of your left hand itches you're sure to receive some money, however, if the palm of your right hand itches you're sure to make a friend. Spill salt lately? I hope you threw a pinch over your left shoulder to fend off bad luck. Does your nose itch, you're sure to have company. I hope none of you hears an owl call outside your window. It's a sign of the worst bad luck. If someone hands you an open pocket knife, don't close it. It's bad luck, give it back to the one who

opened it to be closed.  
A remedy to keep that natural blond hair or to bleach cloth pretty and white is to use lemon juice. Gotten into bull nettle? Rub the area with dirt, it will stop the pain. To stop vomiting and upset stomach, mash a banana and add one teaspoon of nutmeg and make yourself a sandwich. To get water out of your ear, mix equal parts of rubbing alcohol with vinegar and fill ear canal. The water will come out with the mixture. Sore throat, mix one teaspoon salt, one teaspoon vinegar in one cup hot water and gargle. It will ease the pain. Aloe Vera cactus juice eases the pain of sunburn and poison ivy. A little baking soda mixed in water will get rid of indigestion.

For the best weather predictions cut into a persimmon seed carefully and you'll find a spoon, fork or knife. The spoon predicts a mild, dry winter, the fork, a cold wet winter and the knife predicts a long cold winter with ice and snow. A ring around the moon predicts rain. Count any stars inside the ring to know how many days it will rain. A new moon tipped up is holding water, there will be little rain.

A new moon with the tip down is pouring rain. Fog in August predicts a bad winter. We will see since we had numerous foggy nights this August.

And then there is "The Sign", which is what part of the body the zodiac sign is in, such the feet, head etc. My husband will not work calves, horses or pigs without checking the sign. If an animal is castrated in the sign it will not swell or bleed as much. Woe to those worked in the wrong sign. Digging fence post? If the sign is right you will have more than enough dirt to fill the post hole. If it is not, you will never fill up that hole.

Although these are only a few of the remedies, superstitions and wives tales I know of, I will always be faithful to the Farmers Almanac when I plant our garden. I haven't had a bad one yet and I know I planted in the right sign. It had nothing to do with good seed, fertilizer, bug killer, the right amount of water and sunshine.

I'm not encouraging everyone to try all of these remedies, believe all the superstitions and wives tales but if you run across an appropriate time to check them out, who knows they may work.

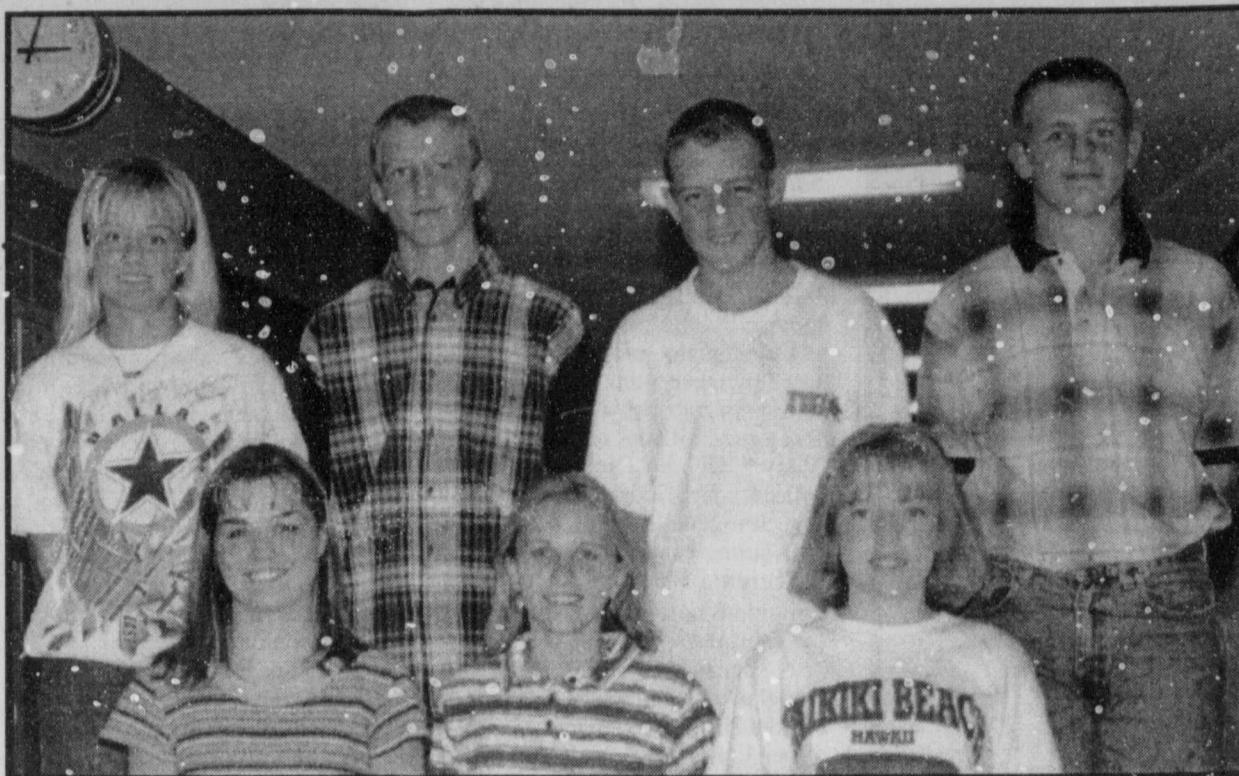

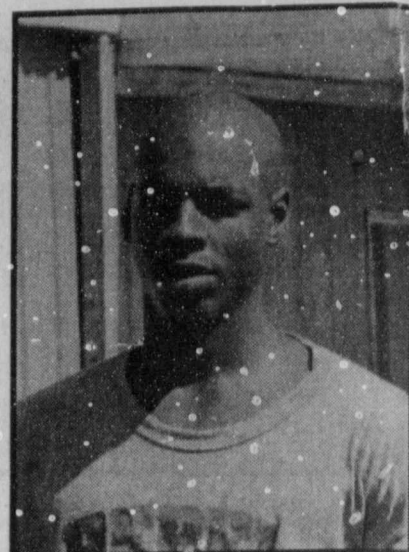
After a chance to return home for a few days, Jody "ships out" to Marine Corps Combat Training at Camp Pendleton, California. Upon comple-

I found my attitude was quickly adjusted and the idea of a family reunion became more inviting. My sponsor allowed me two hours free from practice, so I intended to take full advantage of my given circumstances.

The day started off just right when Mom decided to go early and have my sister and me bring the giant sized pan of baked beans, which, we concluded, could feed reunions for generations after we are gone. Our cousin, Clay, drove us to the reunion, and although I recommended the beans be held, Mandy and Clay insisted they would ride okay in the trunk. We arrived a little late since getting dressed is a three hour process for my sister. I carried the what seemed to be growing pan of beans to the door, while Mandy and Clay wiped beans from his trunk. (I tried to tell them!)

As I entered, I was surprised to see so many faces that looked so familiar, yet extremely distant at the same time. I was then dragged from "cousin" to "cousin", smiling as if I were being paid by the hour, yet thinking the hot gym at school and a bunch of sweaty cheerleaders just might be more fun. But being the obedient person that I am, I spoke nicely and tried to appear proud to be related to these people. It was a little awkward, so those of us who knew each other segregated ourselves in one corner. The laws who had been dragged there against their will were gathered at their own table, probably thanking the Good Lord that they weren't blood related. Conversation wandered from one subject to another. We found that some of us closely resembled some of the distant cousins present. I could see the resemblance in some, but I felt that I more resembled our pastor and his wife whom we weren't even related to. They were pushing their modesty aside and scooting to the front of the food line. The meal consisted of barbecue, all the trimmings and a huge table of desserts. Everyone wanted seconds, but due to the shortage of chairs, (if you got up, you lost yours), many just cut the meal short. I was amazed at how seriously the teenage cousins became offended when they lost their chairs. There were several heated conversations over the issue at my table, so when it got to threats and bribes, I decided I could live without the fruit salad.

As the day progressed, I became more familiar with the people around me. Then, there were a few families

present no one knew. A very nice lady pulled me aside and began asking me about an essay I had written for the Sweetest Day Contest last year. The essay was about my hero, my late grandmother, Lore Clark Roach. My sister, Mikel had brought the framed essay for display. The lady was being very complimentary, and of course I was loving the attention. I found myself growing very fond of this distant cousin, whoever she was. Then she said the most startling thing to me. She said, "Well, I wish I could have met your grandmother." Okay, I thought to myself, how on earth could this woman not have met my grandmother and be related to her? I tried, however, to stay open minded to the situation. I thought she must live very far away and not have visited often. She asked for a copy of the essay, and I promised to get her one, thinking Mom would have her address for us to mail it to her. When she asked if I lived in Bogata, I said to myself, "Gee, this woman certainly doesn't keep up with her family". After I told her we lived just across the pasture from the church, she said she'd probably see me around since she lived in Johtown. That was the last straw! I immediately escaped to my familiar table and demanded to know who the lady was. They informed me that she was Mrs. Chessie Clark, the new Johtown pastor's wife. It seems that upon meeting with members of my family, they realized that there was possibly a "Clark" connection. As it turned out, that assumption was correct and I am very happy about it, however, I wish I could have known all this before I became so thoroughly confused.

Later in the day, a TV and VCR were brought in and we watched a video entitled "When Mama Was a Preacher." The video was made several years ago by my grandmother and her sisters, Tommie Lanier and Velma Roach. In this video, they told about their childhood in Arkansas with their mother, who was a preacher. As I watched the film, I found myself in tears. Some of the cousins were making fun of me, but my second cousin, Ruth told me that tears are a sign that I have a good soul and heart. I moved closer to the television and watched with amazement as they told the story. I found myself laughing as the sisters interrupted one another, freely, giving their opinions and correcting one another as they thought necessary. As they told their story, they laughed and cried and we laughed and cried right along with them. Although it had been noisy all day, a sudden silence filled the room. I suppose it was during this film I realized what family reunions are all about. They are about appreciation. Appreciation for your heritage; for your family; for your life. The people sur-

ROUNDING me were all very different. Some of them were a little strange to me, just as I was a little strange to them. Some of them I am not close to at all. We are all like hundreds of branches and twigs going different directions, but we are all connected. I think only when we are older do we really appreciate our families.

Remember, Citizens, after you request an ambulance from the 911 dispatcher, please request that the first responders also be sent so that you may receive the help you need.

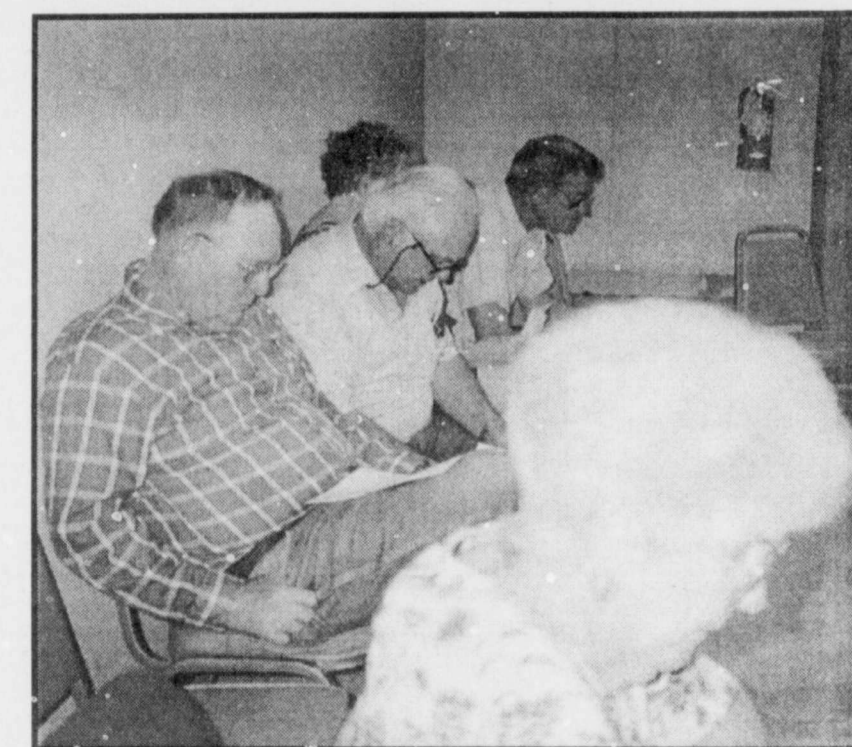

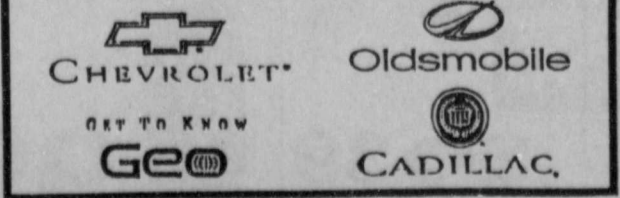

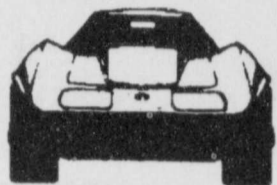

Kyle and J.P. Harvey participated in the event three years ago and have attended the event as fans each year since.

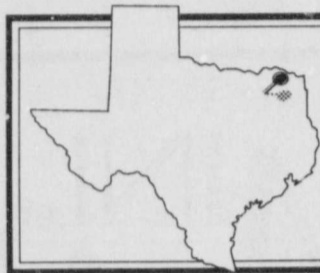
Kyle Harvey died June 16th of this
