#### Credit to be issued to GTE Bogata-Talco customers for delay

GTE has extended local calling for customers in the Bogata telephone exchange area to Talco. Under the plan, all calls from Bogata to Talco are now local. Customers in Talco can also call Bogata without long distance charges.

Originally scheduled to go into effect September 30, expanded local calling between Bogata and Talco was implemented on October 10. As a result, Bogata customers will receive credit for any long distance charges made to Talco between those two dates.

In addition to Talco, Bogata may also call toll-free to Clarksville, Mt. Vernon, Winfield, Winnsboro, Birthwright, Cooper Deport, Detroit, Paris, and Sulpher Springs.

"Prior to the start of Expanded Local calling (ELC), each call between these areas was billed separately as a long-distance call and customer would see a long-distance charge per call on their monthly bills, said Tommy Jackson, GTE area manager. "Now, these calls are equivalent to local calls.

This action is a result of balloting which took place in the Bogata telephone service area under the rules of Senate Bill 632 and the Public Utility Commission Rule 23.49 (c). Under those guidelines, certain communities were allowed to petition for extended toll-free calling to nearby com-

The monthly per-line charge for Expanded Toll-Free Local Calling remains at \$3.50 for residential customers and \$7 for business customers in the Bogata telephone exchange. The charge is listed as "Expanded Local Calling" in the tax portion of the telephone bill.

The history of National Red Ribbon Week is as follows: On Thursday, Feb. 7, 1985, Enrique "kiki" Camarena, 37, stashed his badge and his service revolver in his desk drawer and headed for lunch with his wife Mika. Kiki, a U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration agent, had been on the trail of Mexico's marijuana and cocaine barons. He was due to be reassigned in three weeks, having come dangerously close to unlocking a multi-billion dollar drug pipeline, which he suspected extended into the highest reaches of the Mexican army, police and government.

According to the DEA's reconstruction of events, as he headed to lunch five men appeared at the agent's side and shoved him into a car. That was the last time anyone but his kidnappers would see him alive.

Kiki Camarena's body was found one month later in a shallow grave, 70 miles Michoacan, Mexico. He had

### Bogata given a 2-Star school rating

ber issue of the Texas Monthly, the Bogata School campus has been named a 2-Star School. The list rates 3,172 of the elementary schools in Texas. The rating system is based on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test, the one consistent, uniform, statewide measure of what students are learning. Several hundred schools were excluded from the ratings because they tested fewer than fifty students or contained only one or two grades and thus did not meet the Texas Education Agency's definition of an elementary school, according to the

Continuing, the article stated that TAAS scores alone does not tell them much about what a good job a school is doing. To compare a surburban school with an inner-city school, even in the same area, is like comparing apples to oranges. A good rating system has to compare a school with others, whose students have similar characteristics.

The system was developed by

According to the 1996 Novem- Darvin M. Winick of the Center for 2 star-if the school ranked at or above Greater Houston Partnership) and Larry Toenjes, a University of Houston sociologist, and is based on two numbers--the percentage of children who passed all sections of the TAAS test and the percentage of kids on the free-or assisted-lunch program. The latter reflects an accuate account of the students in the school that come from backgrounds of poverty. These students are noted to be generally at a cultural and an educational disadstandardized tests.

> Winick-Toenjes's system compares a school, for example, with 80 percent disadvantaged students against other schools with a similar number of disadvantaged students.

> The rating system assigns stars for meeting certain goals. The best schools in Texas earned four stars and continue on that level, with the worst scoring no stars. Here is the list of requirements.

1) 1 star-at least 30 percent of the

The article went on to tell that the Texas Education Agency had their own way of rating schools, but in a method that was designed to identify vantage and tend to score lower on the ones that are succeeding and the others that are failing. The Winick-Toenjes answers the question of the child being at the top or on the



#### Bogata Lions Club meets




