The Haskell Indians downed the Seymour Panthers last Friday night, 32-20, in a non-district clash. Plagued by penalties, the Tribe had difficulties in sustaining a drive for more than six or seven plays.

The Tribe received the opening kickoff and after six plays, were forced to punt. Seymour managed only three plays before punting the ball back to the Indians. Randy Ivy began the scoring drive with a 12 yard run from the 30. After rushes by Quarterback Tim Pringle and Jim Pippin, Charles Alexanader carried the ball 4 yards and one play later scored from the 1. PAT was no good.

The Panthers then marched 70 yards in 10 plays to tie the Tribe. A pass for the extra point was good and the Panthers led 8-6 with about 2:29 left in the first period.

Haskell players and coaches understood one official to say it would be ruled an automatic touchdown, but when the official ruling was made Seymour was penalized 15 yards. This put the ball on the Seymour 30 vard line and six plays later Charles Alexander scored from the 1.

Raymond Rodella presented the Tribe with another fine opportunity on the third play of the second half when he recovered a Seymour fumble on their own 9 yard line. Ivy carried the ball from that point to put the Tribe back in the lead 18-14.



Since going to Japan in 1952, Dr. Bray has taught at the school of theology at Kwansei Bakuin University, Nishinomiya. The seminary furnishes ministers to the United Church in Japan, which includes the former Methodist Church and other Protestant bodies. Dr. Bray teaches Greek, New Testament and history of the Greco-Roman world. He has organized two churches in Japan and has served as president of the Fellowship of Christian Missionaries in Japan.

Mrs. Bray has done volunteer work with the students at Kwansei Gakuin University, such as speech coaching and assistant with the English Speaking Society. In 1970 she began to teach English conversation at Seiwa Joshi Daigaku and will continue there after their furlough.

Cutworms are hampering mesquite control operations in parts of West Texas, says a range brush and weed control specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The insects are stripping mesquite trees of their foliage, thereby making spray programs ineffective. An alternate method of mesquite control should be considered where more than 10 percent of the mesquite trees have been affected by the cutworms.

ELECTIONS-ABSENTEE VOTING-CERTIFICATE OF

PERMANENT DISABILITY

CHAPTER 54

S. B. NO. 193

An Act relating to absentee voting in elections; enacting provisions permitting any permanently disabled voter to file a certificate of permanent disability with the registrar of voters in lieu of having to submit a certificate of disability with each application for an absentee ballot; containing penal provisions; amending Section 37. Texas Election Code (Article 5.05, Vernon's Texas Election Code), by adding Subdivision 2d; and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Section 37, Texas Ejection Code, as amended (Article 5.05, Vernon's Texas Election Code), is amended by adding17 Subdivision 2d, to read as follows:

Subdivision 2d. Certificate of permanent disability

"(a) A voter having an ailment or physical disability which renders him permanently unable to appear at the polling place is not required to accompany his application for an absentee ballot with the certificate of sickness or physical disability referred to in Subdivision 2 of this section if he files a certificate of permanent disability with the registrar of voters as provided in this subdivision. A certificate of permanent disability must be signed by a duly licensed physician or chiropractor or accredited Christian Science practitioner and must certify that the person signing it has personal knowledge of the voter's physical condition; that the voter has an ailment or phys-







TAP Mobile Unit To Be At Fair


