



January 9, 1997 **Apricot Lemon Scones** Nanalee Nichols 2 cups all-purpose flour 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar tablespoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 3/4 cup dried apricots-choppedl tablespoon plus I teaspoon grated lemon peel 1-1/4 cup whipping cream

3 tablespoon melted butter Preheat oven to 425. Mix flour, sugar, baking powder and salt in large owl. Stir in apricots and lemon peel. Add whipping cream and stir just until dough forms. Turn dough out onto loured surface. Knead gently just until dough holds together. Form dough into 10 inch diameter, 1/2 inch thick around. Cut into 12 wedges. Transfer to baking sheet, brush with melted butter and sprinkle with sugar. Bake until light golden brown about 15 minutes. Transfer to rack and cool slightly. Can be served warm or at room temperature. May be served with preserves if desired.





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Lawsuit seeks to prove credit union is operating within the law

A Texarkana credit union is suing a Mt. Pleasant bank, seeking to prove that the credit union is operating within the law. The Red River Federal Credit Union has filed a lawsuit in the United States District Court in Texarkana against Guaranty Bank, a Mt. Pleasant bank, seeking to prove that the Red River Federal Credit Union is obeying the law. The lawsuit seeks no damages or recovery against Guaranty Bank. The lawsuit does not allege that Guaranty Bank has taken any wrongful or improper actions. Rather, the lawsuit requests that the court issue an order stating that Red River Federal Credit Union s obeying the law.

The lawsuit arises form an earlier case in Washington, D.C. The American Bankers Association filed a suit against the National Credit Union Administration, a federal agency, alleging that the federal agency had acted in violation of federal law when it radically expanded possible memberships for credit unions. Under federal law, a credit union can only offer memberships to people who have a "common bond", which is generally interpreted to mean people who work for the same employer. Many large corporations, operate credit unions for the benefit of their employees. The NCUA, and a number of credit unions, over the last few years, have allowed virtually unlimited expansion of the membership groups without regard to the federal law.

In that lawsuit, a federal court in Washington ruled that the National Credit Union Administration violated the law in allowing expansion of the field of membership of credit unions to groups that did not share a single occupational common bond. The order barred federal credit unions from adding any new members to existing employee groups if they were not related to the single common occupation

Following this setback, the NCUA issued an interim rule which circum-



vented the court's decision. On December 4, the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C. struck down the interim rule. Judge Thomas Jackson harshly criticized the NCUA's interim rule, and called the agencies actions "surreptitious, underhanded and collusive." The Judge indicated that he was considering referring these actions to the United States Attorney General for investigation. The NCUA has sought an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The Red River Federal Credit Union was organized to serve personnel at the Ked River Army Depot and the Lone Star Army Ammunition Plant. Over the years, the Credit Union has expanded its membership extensively, to include groups that have no apparent relation to the Army or military personnel in Texarkana. Their membership roster now includes businesses such as David's Hair Design, Guy's Orange Stand, the Texarkana Gazette newspaper and a company called "Two Guys and a Rake". Guaranty Bank contacted Red River Federal Credit Union when the credit union issued a membership to one of the bank's employees and a spouse of one of the bank's employees, neither of whom have any relationship with the military facilities in Texarkana.

In response to the bank's inquiry, the credit union sued the bank in Texarkana, seeking to have a judge rule that the credit union is obeying the law. A bank spokesman said that it seemed bizarre that a company felt that it was necessary to file a lawsuit against an unaffiliated business in order to prove that the company was obeying the law.

In the meantime, the battle in the courts continues. Acknowledging that the case would probably go before the U.S. Supreme Court, a Federal Appeals Court recently froze the status of the Washington case, allowing an immediate appeal to the nation's highest court.



The Detroit Eagles got their long wanted revenge over the Rivercrest Rebels by defeating them in the finals of the Roxton Tournament by a score of 52-48.



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Bogata Cemetery Pavilion

Remembering Bogata Cemetery

By Frances Mayes Rozell The Bogata Cemetery was first known as the Maple Springs "burying ground" by the few settlers of the vicinity. In 1880, a Bogata post office was established at the Maple Springs community, and the name of the town and cemetery were changed.

Williams Humphries came to the Red River area in 1828 as a 14 year old boy. He returned to Tennessee and Alabama. However, in 1836, he came back to settle permanently, bringing his family.

Isaac Wilson lived about a mile north and a little east of the site where Humphries built his log cabin. This was about 16 miles south of Clarksville. Humphries' east boundary line and Wilson's west line were the same.

The need for a burying ground arose when Sarah Jane Humphries died March 1840. She was the fourth child of her parents, William and Mary (McGill) Humphries. Her gravestone erected many years later states," Our hearts were sad when we laid her here. For no one else was buried near."

This grave was on a hill of high ground not far north of the parents' first home and not far from the east boundary line of his survey.

Before too long, a relative of the Wilson family died and was buried about 100 feet east and north of Sarah Jane's grave on the Wilson land. The identity of this second person remains unknown to us. Thus began the cemetery.

When anyone died in the vicinity, and a request was made of the Humphries, or Wilson families to bury near their graves, the request was granted. In September 1878, William Humphries gave a deed to land of his Headright Survey for use as a burying ground as did Mrs. L.A. Wilson. (Land of the Isaac Wilson Headright. Isaac had died in 1844.)

About 1899, the ladies of the community organized a Cemetery Society. They raised money to hire someone to keep the cemetery clean. The men helped to clean, dig stumps, cut briars and sprouts. The women raised funds from donations, ice cream suppers and such to keep it clean. About 1902, or 1903, they decided a pavilion was needed where funerals could be held instead of at the graveside as most had been. They raised funds, and the men hauled lumber and worked to build an octagonal building with lattice work at the corners and above the arches. It was painted white outside with a beaded ceiling painted robin's egg blue. While the men worked, the women brought food for a noon meal served picnic fashion. It is the same pavilion there today. The Society made up money and around 1905 and bought metal benches to put under the pavilion. Today the Cemetery Society is

known as the Bogata Cemetery Association. It received a charter November 5, 1945. Curtis Wilkinson was president of the association at the time.

In 1945, adjoining land was purchased. This ground was spoken of locally as the "new cemetery'. In 1968, an agreement was made between directors of the so called "old and new" cemeteries to combine under the name, Bogata Cemetery Association.

Other adjoining land has been added. The association has a reserve fund, the interest from which, with money from the sale of lots in the " new cemetery" and donations, maintains the entire cemetery.


For over 145 years, this cemetery has been the resting place for pioneers and travelers of this area, for an Indian fighter, soldiers of the Confederate and Union armies, the Spanish American War, all branches of service of World Wars I and II, and the Korean and the Viet Nam Wars. Since March 1840, this cemetery

has been in continuous use.

A historical marker was dedicated at the cemetery in June of 1977. The marker was placed at the southwest corner of the Pavilion on the hill termed in the early days as the "Burying ground"

At the present there is a board of directors of the Bogata Cemetery Association, Inc. The board members include: Frances Roach Rozell-President, Tommie Corbell-Vice President, Alice Ann White-Secretary-Treasurer, Eleanor McCluer, Bill White, Mable Troutt, Sam McConnell, John Howison, Alfred Puckett, Neil Rozell, Gaston Puckett and Mary Ann Williams.





The Texas Public Utility Commissioin recently announced its final order outlining prices, terms and conditions under which AT&T could connect with Southwestern Bell's network in Texas to provide local phone service. The PUC ordered a discount to AT&T of 21.6 percent off Southwestern Bell's retail rates, but may have left some areas of the interconnection agreement unresolved. The text of the order is not yet available.

According to Rian Wren, AT&T vice president-local services in the Southwest, "The PUC's decision regarding the resale rate is balanced. It is in line with decisions being made around the nation. For that, we commed the PUC for following the intent of Congress when it passed legislation earlier this year to give ocnsumers the benefits of competition, choice, competitive pricing and more services.



FIRST DEER-Rockelle, eight year old daughter of Clint and sheila Jackson of Lone Star community, shot her first doe on


