



In the family's spare time they enjoy fishing, camping and any activity that involves the children. They feel any time spent with them is only quality time well spent.



Dr. Jones was a familiar sight to all in the Rosalie Community as he went about in his topped buggy pulled by his two fiery horses. His buggy was equipped with tooth forceps, obstetrical instruments and surgical knives. He was equal to any emergency occurring down the long rough road. He loved the Rosalie community and its people and gave many years of his life in dedicated service to them.

The only copy of the Rosalie Courier now existing belongs to the Bogata News and is Volume 6, No. 25 published in April 1898, indicating the paper was more than years old at the time.

The firs teacher was Miss Eugene Armstrong, a spinster from MS> After she taught a short term down at the Hart place, she, in 1870 built a house of her own. She taught in one room and with her mother lived in the other. She had five months of school and each student was required to pay tuition. A few of the students were Miss Lump LaMay, her sister, Mrs. Matt Kirksey, Mrs. Phillips, Judge Kennedy, Miss Ellen Gibson and Mrs. Lula Hinson. Some well known pupils from Rosalie were Dr. D.R. (Dave) Woods of Olney; Dr. L.B. (Limmie) Woods of Ardmore, Oklahoma; Judge George Morrison of Clarksville and Reverend Jessie A. Derrick.

The telephone office was first operated by Mrs. Julian Frances and the first telephone was put in at Smith's Store in 1888. To know a little about Bertha Gable. She, Bertha Frugia, graduated from Talco High School in 1945. She attended business school in Tyler and then worked at the school. She and J.R. Gable were married in 1947. J.R. was a military man-retiring in 1966. He and Bertha lived in Fort Lewis, Washington; Camp Polk, La.; Heidelberg, Germany; Ft. Sill OK; and Verdun, France. They moved to Clarksville in 1971. Bertha started doing genealogical research in 1948 and has been an inspiration to many working with their genealogy. She is at this time the second vice president of the Texas State Genealogical Society. In 1986 the Red River County Historical Society of Clarksville, published a book, Red River Recollections-A history of Red River County, its communities and families. Johnna Weaver, chairman, stated in her acknowledgment: "a special debt of gratitude is due to J.R. and




of this book. Bertha is the editor of this book and has dedicated many long, hard hours to this project."

V. Thedford was distinguished citizen of Bogata

By Frances Mayes Rozell Mr. Thedford was named "Distin-

guished senior citizen of the Bogata Community. This was community and county wide recognition of senior citizens of Red River County.

Mr. Thedford retired in 1958. He became mayor in 1946 and continued to serve until 1964. During his administration the water and sewer systems were modernized, major improvements and lighting for the streets were realized, natural gas was obtained and both public and private housing made remarkable gains.(taken from a Bogata News article about 1967)

In early 1920's Mr. Thedford had a house built north of town on main street (the house Gaston and Roberta Puckett recently moved from). The Thedford family fived there until 1945. At that time, Mr. Thedford had a house built next door-north of the Methodist Church

The Thedford children are: Joe Hutchinson, deceased, Vernon, who joined the marines and after several years got out. When world War II broke out, he re enlisted. He was in the 4th Marine division-23 regiment. His friend and ours, Bill White, was in 24 regiment of same division. The battle of Iwo Jima-February 18, 1945 was fought by their division and the 5th division. Bill was wounded the 2nd day: Vernon was wounded nearer the end of the action. Very few marines escaped death or injury during this campaign. Bogata was very lucky our two marines came home. Vernon and Bill were in other campaigns together before Iwo Jima - Marshall Islands-Roi-Namur: Saipan; and Tinia. They attend Iwo Jima Survivors Reunions each year on February 18. Vernon and his wife, Jessie Lou Bond, live in Tarpon Spring, Florida.

Otto graduated in 1936 and was in Pre Med at the University of Texas when he died of leukemia in 1939.

Margaret graduated in 1936 and and married Harold Gough. They live in San Diego, California. Mable was born in 1929 and graduated from BHS in 1945. She married Jack Troutt who became Bogata's Doctor Jack Troutt. He practiced dentistry in our community for 36 years before retiring. Mable and Dr. Trout were active in Methodist Church, the school and many other organizations. Their children are Jackie, Janet and Leslie deceased. They have three grandchildren, Cashel and Trey Troutt of Garland and Leslie Weiler of Paris. Mable and Dr. Troutt live in Paris and are active in First Methodist Church there.

Mr. Thedford died in 1970 and Mrs. Thedford died in 1981. A lot of you will also remember the Thedford's parrot named Polly. Polly was quite a talker and sang well too. The following was taken from a

1936 Bogata News : V. Thedford, who is observing the 28th anniversary of his entrance into business in Bogata, announces for Monday, September 18, the formal opening of his new building on South Main Street. The establishment was moved into its new quarters last week and the entire force has been busy adding final touches to prepare for the formal presentation to people of this area.

In 1911, just after the railroad had built into Bogata, that V. Thedford, a young salesman for the Washington Tailoring Co, came to this section to put on a sale of made to measure clothes in a nearby town. A torrential rain washed out the sale and Mr. Thedford rode the Paris and Mount Pleasant passenger train into Bogata. Several new buildings were going up and the town looked to Mr. Thedford like one with a future.

Anxious to get into business for himself, he set up a tailor and cleaning shop in a small wooden building on South Main Street, just north of the railroad, employing a Mr. Smith to operate it while Mr. Thedford retained his traveling job. Less than a year later he returned to take over operation of the business which has operated continuously under his ownership and management since that time.

First equipment was as good as other shops of the day, though it consisted of only a few tubs and a hand iron in the cleaning department. As a tailor, however, even from the first days, Mr. Thedford has featured the leading lines.

On September 22, 1913, Bogata's young tailor was married to Mrs. Myrtle Lee Hutchinson, who has been and continues to be active and efficient in the office of his business. They have four children, Vernon who is with the U.S. Marines, Otto, who will attend Texas University this term, Miss Margaret, who is cashier of the Community Public Service Co., in Bogata and Mable, Bogata grammar School student, Mrs. Thedford's son is Lieutenant Joe Hutchinson of the U.S. Army.

Thedford's acquired its first steam press about 1913 and has used about a score since that time. The press line now includes three regular presses, a special coat press and a steam iron. Cleaning equipment has been constantly changed as more modern and efficient systems were placed on the market. Latest addition is a windwhip dryer for silks. Mr. Thedford, an expert hatter, personally handles all work in this department.

Building his business into one of the best in Northeast Texas has taken much of V. Thedford's time, but he has found many hours and dollars to give to the betterment of the Bogata area. An officer of the Chamber of Commerce since it was organized, a member of the school board for more than ten years, a committee member active in highway and other work are only a few of the posts he has filled.

Decision to construct a building of his own was not reached on short notice by Mr. Thedford. Having always looked on Bogata as a town with a future, he had planned the step for many years but says he just never got around to it.



Mrs. Lucy Bell Holder remembered

By Frances Mayes Rozell In 1970 Mrs. Holder retired from Talco-Bogata Schools after teaching for 43 years.

Mrs. Holder was born in 1903 in Rosalie, the daughter of Dr. Robert and Martha Dodd Jones. Around 1900 Dr. Jones came to the thriving community of Rosalie to practice medicine. He married Martha Dodd in the Rosalie Methodist Church in 1902. They had two children, Mrs. Lecy Bell and a son, Robert Dodd Jones. The following is an article Mrs. Holder wrote about her father, Dr. Jones:

"Practicing medicine, riding horseback or in a buggy, with no antibiotics, x-rays, or drug stores was not easy. There was not even a flash light for nights when horses could not see the road. Instead of writing a prescription to be filled, Dr. Jones would ask for a sheet of paper, which he cut into squares. He then opened his medicine case, took tablets which he crushed with his flat ended knife. Maybe added powdered medicine, made sure each paper contained the proper amount of the mixture and gave directions for giving. The bottles in the medicine case were refilled from huge amber colored ones at his home office. About 1912 Papa got a Ford road-

About 1912 Papa got a Ford roadster. One night he decided to make a call in the new car. He lit the carbide lights and cranked the car, then attempted to back out of the old office converted to a garage. Losing control, he crashed into the fence, saw horses and enough other things to make a terrific noise. He had the former office moved and a door cut in both ends so he could drive through with no backing necessary.

In 1991, Denise Wood, an employee with the Bogata News at the time, did an interview with Mrs. Lucy Bell for the Familiar Faces Column. The following is taken from that article:: Mrs. Holder attended school at

Mrs. Holder attended school at Rosalie and graduated from Clarksville High School in 1921. It was her grandmother's idea for her to go to college. She went to the University of Texas and East Texas State Teacher's College. Her first teaching job she

was barely older than her students. To look more mature, she wore a switch in her hair. She didn't know if the appearance of the switch worked, but she did have to use it occasionally.

In 1935 she married Sam Holder. They were married for 50 years until his death in 1985.

Not only has Mr. Holder been a teacher, but for a time she was the principal at Johntown, during World War II. Of the two, Mrs. Holder like teaching better. She enjoyed teaching teenagers above all the students she taught. Her favorite subject was Science. Of the different generations she saw through her students, she felt that human nature doesn't change, only surroundings do.

Looking back on her career she said, "The most vivid memories were those of BHS. Those were happy yearsI hope my ex-students know that I tried, that I loved them and that I am always interested in their lives."

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Pat Hanson Welch wrote recently of Mrs. Holder: "For a small school BHS had more than its share of really fine teachers. One was Mrs. Lucy Bell Holder. She thought our education was the main goal at BHS. Her goal was to stress the importance of learning.....We ex-students are lucky because Mrs. Holder, without fanfare or drum roll, consistently gave her all to what she considered the most important job in the world"

We thank June Gullion Watts for the picture of Mrs. Holder taken in her Science class that she loved so much.

Mrs. Holder was a member of the Rosalie Methodist Church since 1914. She died January 2, 1996 and is survived by two sons and daughters in law, Dr. Sam and Glenda Ward Holder of Linden and Dr. Bob and Ginny Holder of Baytown; 5 grandchildren; 6 great grandchildren; and a niece. 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
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
