Driver's license applicants must present Social Security card


Beginning February 3, all applicants for an original or renewal Texas driver's license will be required to present a social security card in order to obtain the license.

This will also hold true if the person has lost their license and, upon application for a duplicate, it is discovered that the number is not on file.

Items which will be acceptable for Social Security number verification

are: the original Social Security card; a paycheck stub with the name of the person and S.S.A. number (nothing handwritten); and a W-2 form from an employer.

While this rule has been in effect for some time, and, up to now, has been voluntary; it will, starting at the date listed above be mandatory for anyone wishing to obtain a Texas driver's license.



Bogata Theater remembered

By Frances Mayes Rozell

Bogata around 1917. He owned and operated the first theater in Bogata. It was located on the west side of Main Street across from the hotel.

The theater was in operation during World War I. These were, of course, silent movies. Iva Lassiter Hooker, who was a young girl at the time, played piano for sound to go along with the movie and she would play and sing the war songs during reel changes, etc. Some of the songs were "Tipperary", "Goodbye Ma, Goodbye Pa, Goodbye Mule with your old Hee Haw"", " Till We Meet Again" and" How are We going to Keep Them Down on the Farm After they've Seen Paree"

M.S. Peyton bought the theater from Nance and kept it until the late 20's. Joe Ford remembers: "The admission was like 10 cents, but Mr. Peyton had a policy that "kids" who brought 10 empty tin cans to the theater could get in free. This was his way of letting those who didn't have the money see the movie."

Bogata was without a theater for a while. Mr. W.T. Ferguson of Deport, who had a theater there, would bring his portable movie "rig" to Bogata on his model T Truck. He set up on North Main Street south of the hotel. He hung a sheet on the outside of the last building on the east side of the street and would project there. The merchants bought advertisements from him to cover his expenses and make it profitable for him to come. Large crowds of folks would gather south of the hotel to enjoy the movie.

About 1935, Mr. and Mrs. Neil Blankenship came to Bogata with some rented movie equipment. They hired a local carpenter, Fred Prichard. to put a building in shape for a theatre. It was about mid way of the west side of the upper business area and remained in this building as long as Bogata had a theater. The front of the building was recessed and most impressive posters of upcoming movies were placed there to entice old and young alike to come in for the show.

Mack Glover, who as a very young boy had run the silent movies for

Mr. and Mrs. J.P. Nance came to W.T. Ferguson in Deport and later ran the movie after the turn table was added for sound, was hired to wire and set up the movie system for the Blankenships.

> Mrs. Blankenship had worked at a theatre in Bonham as a young girl and was a very good theater operator. She had Sunday afternoon movies as well as midnight show. Again the merchants took advertisements from her to help keep a theater in Bogata. Mrs.. Blankenship, in later years, bought a new RCA sound system. People would come to town on Saturday afternoon to shop and take in the movies. Most often the afternoon show would be a western with: Gene Autry, Roy Rogers, Hop-a-long Cassidy, Wild Bill Elliott, Lash LaRue and the like. The street would be packed with people, you could hardly walk up and down the side

During the CCC Camp days in Bogata, Mr. Ferguson would bring his portable 'rig' to the camp south of Bogata twice a week. He also took it to Avery about this same time.

Mrs. Blankenship retired from the Bogata Theater business about 1947. Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Gill and Mrs. Lela Buffo kept it in operation for a few years, then Lela's sister, Leona and her husband, Luke Phelps, came into the business. They struggled to keep a theater in Bogata. The near by drive in theaters hurt business and televisions finished it off. They gave up about 1960 and the theater days in Bogata were gone for good.

Dotty Simpson, Mildred Hill, Fred Prichard and others come to mind when you think of the Bogata theater. They were part of show business.

Kids are growing up today without dodging bullets on the front row of the theater on Saturday afternoons. Somehow they have their first dates...but, where do you take a first date if not to the Bogata picture show? This was a business that provided an awful lot of wonderful memories for an awful lot of people.


