Studies show milk milk fat may reduce cancer risk

Drink more milk, eat more butter, and you may lower your chances for getting certain types of cancers, according to a dairy specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service

Moreover, the milk from cows that graze East texas pastures may contain more anti-carcinogens-compounds that prevent cancer- tan the milk produced in other regions of the country says Max Sudweeks, who is based at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

The health advantage from consuming dairy products isn't just idle speculation. There's mounting data from both mouse studies and of human populations to show that milk and milk fat may lower the chances of breast, prostate and other cancers. A critical review recently published in the American Journal for Nutritional Sciences summarized more than 70 scientific studies done in the USA and other countries.

The review noted that several studies have shown clearly less tumor development of mice fed butter than those fed margarines made of polyunsaturated oils.

Mice studies were not the only ones that indicated cow's milk and dairy fat lowered the risk of cancer. Another study found that mother's milk from women of the Hare Krishna religious sect contained twice as much conjugated linoleic acid as that of Australian mothers. The Hare Krishna

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


