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



Mrs. Fennell of Kanawha recently wanted n Irish Potato Cake recipe. Reba Cecil sent not one, but two recipes. They are a little different, but both sound good. I had not heard of an Irish Potato Cake before, but they sound delicious, with a mixture of raisins nuts, dates, coconut and cocoa in them!

Did you know that there are hundreds of way to prepare potatoes? Besides boiling and mashing, they can be french fried, baked, roasted, sauteed, broiled, scalloped, julienne, German-fried, hashed browned, lyonnaise, creamed, au gratin, duchess, Dutch, Belgian, stuffed, whole and many, many more!

Potatoes are one of life's most important vegetables. They are one of the most important foods with high nutritinal value and are grown in most countries. The United Staes produces about 400 million bags of potatoes yearly and of course everyone knows that Idaho is known for it's potatoes, producing over 102,500,000 bags per year. The Soviet Union produces the worlds largest crop with 1, 609,400,000 bags.

Several hundred kinds of potatoes are grown in the United States. Four varieties account for 70 percent of the nation's potatoe crop--Russet Burbank, Norchip, Kennebec and Katahdin, in that order. All four are good for baking, but the Kennebec is best for processing into potato chips. Othr varieties include the Chippewa, Cobbler, Red LaSoda, Red Pontiac, Superior and White Rose. Food processors make potatoes into chips, instatn mashed potao powders and other products. Food canners use potatoes in such foods as hash, soup and stew. Other products whose in-

gredients may include potatoes are alcoholic beverages, flour and certain starches used in industry.

A potato consists of 80 per cent water and 20 percent solid matter. Starch makes up about 85 percent of the solid material. Most of the rest is protein. They contain many vitamins, including niacin, riboflavin, thiamin and vitamin C. Potatoes also contain such minerals as calcium, iron, magnesium, phosphorus, potassium, sodium and sulphur.

The potato originated in SOuth America, with the Spanish explorers being the first to introduce them to Europeans in the mid-1500's. They were then introduced in England and from there Ireland and Scotland. They became the principal crop in Ireland because they grew so well there. In fact, the potato became known as the Irish Potato becausse such a large part of the Irish population depended on them for their food.

Mrs. Fennell, I hope this is one of your recipes you needed and let me know how it turns out! We will see you in the kitchen!

Irish Potato Cake-uses nuts, dates, raisins and coconut. Sounds as much like a pound cake as anything and so

delicious! Potato Pancakes-uses grated potatoes shaped into pancakes.

Potato Puffs-this recipe called for potatoes to be riced. In case you don't know what that means, they are mashed or forced through a ricer.

Glazed Potato Donuts-This one is basic yeast dough with mashed potatoes.

Potoato Chip Cookies Can't end a column with a little dessert. The recipe says they are so light, they melt in your mouth!

Roll or pat to 1/2 inch thickness. Cut with doughnut cutter. Place on greased cookie sheet and let rise until doubled, about 30 minutes. Fry doughniuts in deep, hot oil and drain. Turn and dip in glaze mixture and place on wire rack to

Potato Chip Cookies

I pound butter l cup sugar 3 cups flour

2 teaspoon vanilla

7 ounces crushed potato chips

Cream butter and sugar. Add flour vanilla and chips. Drop by spoonfuls onto ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 12-15 minutes. Bake on top rack of oven. Cookies burn easily. SPrinkle with powdered sugar

During retirement years, Mrs. Webb devoted herself to her traditional projects and especially to her grandchildren, Nathan Walker of Bedford, David Walker of Grapevine, Drew Chance and Andrew Webb of Paris and to her great-grandson, Christopher Walker of North Richland Hills.



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



## Web Tracks

For those that are interested in or want to know more about the internet

The digital world will never be the same after two announcements last week from Intel Corp. and IBM.

The first development by Intel Corp. alters the basic physics of the chip design in a way previously thought impossible. The transistor is the basic unit of information storage on a computer chip, one digit for each transistor. It takes 8 bits of data to produce an alphabet character in computer text. This new chip can store not one, but two bits of data on each transistor, doubling the storage. Intel's engineers believe they have not reached the limits of this new technology and it may be possible to store and retrieve three, four or even more bits on each transistor.

This new technology is known as 'multilevel cell" flash memory and is called StrataFlash. Flash memory, also known as flash ROM, stores data even in the absence of power. Chips store the ones and zeros of digital code as tiny electrical charges. To "read" a one or a zero, each repre-

senting a digital bit, the circuitry reads only whether a charge is present or absent in the transistor-whether the glass is full or empty. With this new technology, you can go beyond the "empty" or "full" to read whether the chip is "2/3" or "1/3" full. These four distinct states will yield the equivalent of two bits of data on each tran-

This technology will not really be applicable to computer memory. Modems, printers, scanners and cell phones will benefit from larger flash

The next big announcement came from IBM . IBM has developed a copper computer chip instead of aluminum and this breakthrough will speed up computers and make them more affordable. Switching to copper could speed a microprocessor 40% and reduce costs 30% while using less electricity. This new process enables IBM to make transistors more than 500 times thinner than human hair about 30% smaller than current

NOTICE OF RATE DECREASE REQUEST

On July 31, 1997, Texas-New Mexico Power Company ("TNMP") filed the TNMP Transition Plan in accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The proposed effective date of such change is January 1, 1998. The period of the TNMP Transition Plan is five years (the "Transition Period"), beginning on the proposed effective date and ending on December 31, 2002. All classes of customers receiving service from TNMP will be affected by said proposed rates. TNMP serves approximately 170,000 customers in Texas. The proposed rates for all of TNMP's Texas operations over the transition period will decrease gross revenues to the Company with respect to current revenues. The reductions will occur January 1, 1998, January 1, 2000 and January 1, 2002 in the approximate amounts of \$4.5 million, \$3.6 million and \$3.6 million, respectively. The total expected decrease over the five-year Transition Period is approximately

The purpose of this filing is to obtain approval for the TNMP Transition Plan which will achieve an orderly transition to competition in the electric utility industry. The TNMP Transition Plan has five primary

components: (1) A five year Transition Period, beginning January

1, 1998. (2) Rate benefits to customers, including rate decreases for residential and commercial customer class, a rate freeze for industrial customers and the elimination of the Power Cost Recovery Factor PCRF).

(3) Recovery of Excess Costs Over Market (ECOM) through:

(a) accelerated depreciation and a lower rate of return on equity for TNP One ECOM; (b) creating a regulatory asset by redirecting the recovery of depreciation on transmission and

distribution assets to the depreciation of TNP One ECOM; and

(c) setting an earnings cap and applying any earnings in excess of the cap to the depreciation of TNP One ECOM.

(4) Choice of electric energy suppliers, open access. and unbundled service prices by January 1, 2003. (5) Quantification of actual ECOM at the end of the Transition Period with either a refund of any

over-recovery of ECOM or the implementation of a Competitive Transition Charge (CTC) to recover any remaining ECOM over a five-year period (Post-Transition Period)

During the Transition Period, TNMP will have a fair and reasonable opportunity to reduce expenses, mitigate its purchased power costs, and reduce the 'stranded costs" associated with TNP One, TNMP's generating plant.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at the business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your
