Called "How Difficult Can It Be", the video places adults into situations that make them feel much of the frustration, tension and fear children with learning disabilities feel.

Two things really caught my attention.

One was when the group was presented with a grainy, black and white photo. Not a single person could identify what the image was.

The "teacher" zeroed in on one particular student. "Carol" he roared" look at the picture harder!" Of course, she still couldn't identify the photo.

He reached into his pocket and produced a check for \$100.

"Everyone knows that all you have to do to motivate a student...right" he announced.

"Carol, if you can tell me what the photograph is I'll sign this \$100 over to you".

Of course, poor frustrated Carol couldn't tell him what the picture was of it simply wasn't possible.

He began to snarl at her, insult her and threaten to take away her privileges if she didn't properly identify the photo.

None of it did a bit of good, of course, because Carol wasn't capable to doing the task set before her.

The man then put a clear plastic sheet with a brief outline sketched on it. Instantly a cow's face sprang into view. When the sheet was removed it was still simple to see the cow!

In other words, with the proper instructions and assistance, the problem became simple. But how many times have we all done the "try harder, if you'll do it I'll give you something...if you don't do it you'll be punished" routine?

He pointed out that it doesn't take long before a child will cease to even try under these conditions.

And finally, he mentioned something that applies to every

day life. He said "I don't want to hear a teacher say "I can't give that learning disabled student a lot of extra attention, it wouldn't be fair to the other children".

It sounds reasonable. But the instructor pointed out that the REAL definition of fair is not "everyone gets equal" but that "everyone gets what they need".

Somewhere along the line we have come to think that fair does mean equal, but it doesn't. As an example, if I was not hungry and someone else was hungry, would it be fair for me to get the same amount of food? Of course not!

Both of these points I intend to take to heart in my personal life. Because if you think about them very long, it's evident that both of these little lessons can apply to everyday life, to all people, not just children who have learning disabilities.



NOTICE OF RATE DECREASE REQUEST

On July 31, 1997, Texas-New Mexico Power Company ("TNMP") filed the TNMP Transition Plan in accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The proposed effective date of such change is January 1, 1998. The period of the TNMP Transition Plan is five years (the "Transition Period"), beginning on the proposed effective date and ending on December 31, 2002. All classes of customers receiving service from TNMP will be affected by said proposed rates. TNMP serves approximately 170,000 customers in Texas. The proposed rates for all of TNMP's Texas operations over the transition period will decrease gross revenues to the Company with respect to current revenues. The reductions will occur January 1, 1998, January 1, 2000 and January 1, 2002 in the approximate amounts of \$4.5 million, \$3.6 million and \$3.6 million, respectively. The total expected decrease over the five-year Transition Period is approximately

The purpose of this filing is to obtain approval for the TNMP Transition Plan which will achieve an orderly transition to competition in the electric utility industry. The TNMP Transition Plan has five primary components:

(1) A five year Transition Period, beginning January

(2) Rate benefits to customers, including rate decreases for residential and commercial customer class, a rate freeze for industrial customers and the elimination of the Power Cost Recovery Factor

of Excess Costs Over Market (ECOM) through:

(a) accelerated depreciation and a lower rate of return on equity for TNP One ECOM; (b) creating a regulatory asset by redirecting the recovery of depreciation on transmission and

distribution assets to the depreciation of TNP One ECOM; and

(c) setting an earnings cap and applying any earnings in excess of the cap to the depreciation of TNP One ECOM.

(4) Choice of electric energy suppliers, open access, and unbundled service prices by January 1, 2003. (5) Quantification of actual ECOM at the end of the Transition Period with either a refund of any

over-recovery of ECOM or the implementation of a Competitive Transition Charge (CTC) to recover any remaining ECOM over a five-year period (Post-Transition Period).

During the Transition Period, TNMP will have a fair and reasonable opportunity to reduce expenses, mitigate its purchased power costs, and reduce the "stranded costs" associated with TNP One, TNMP's generating plant.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at the business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 13326, Austin, Texas 78711-3326. Further information may also be obtained by calling the Public Utility Commission's Office of Consumer Affairs at (512) 936-7120. Hearing-and speedh-impaired individuals with text telephones (TTY) may contact the commission at (512) 936-7136. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the commission.
