

Several years ago Rivercrest High School made the news nation wide when it was reported there was a high incidence of Aids in the student body and graduates. The story was proven false after much uproar at the school. T.V. and radio stations swarmed what would have been a tragic story. The publicity was undeserved.

On Saturday night, Oct. 25, 4 graduates and 4 students of Rivercrest High School traveled to Dallas hoping to go to Medieval Times. They had no reservations and were turned away. The group decided to go on into downtown Dallas and go to Planet Hollywood and have supper.

As young people are prone to do they changed their minds and took a horse drawn carriage ride around downtown. While on the ride one of the boys saw what he thought was a Bible on the street outside of a church in the area. He called at the driver to stop, jumped out and picked the checking it for a name and returning it to the owner.

The group finished their tour ride and went into the restaurant to get on the waiting list. They opened the "Bible", a leather bound book with a zipper around the outside, after getting on the list to eat. Eight young people were totally shocked to find it contained large amounts of signed checks and business items. A business card proved it to belong to the Vice President of Channel 4 Fox News.
