





Wilkinsons attend 376th bomb group reunion

Jean and I left the farm on Sunday, October 12, for Emerald Bay on Lake Palestine. We drove mostly in a light rain getting to my sister Marjoree's home just before dark. We transferred our baggage to Marjoree's van and loaded Marjoree and Dora Thompson's baggage also. This was the second year for my two sisters to go to the reunion with us.

We left Emerald Bay at seven a.m. on Monday, October 13. We drove in a light rain. Our first stop was near Shreveport, Louisiana to visit a cousin, Bernice (Dawson) Gates and her husband, Wilson. While we were there her daughter, June, came. After a short visit, we hit the road again. We drove to Shannon, Mississippi that day. We drove all day in the rain. Got to our cousins, Oliver and Joyce Dawson's, just after dark on Monday the 13th. We spent Monday night and Tuesday night with Oliver and Joyce.

On Wednesday the 15 we resumed our journey to Knoxville, Tennessee where our reunion was being held. We arrived at Nashville in the early afternoon. We stopped and toured the Hermitage, Andrew Jackson's home. We would have enjoyed being able to spend more time there.

On the road again for Knoxville. We arrived at the Knoxville Hilton about dark. Checked in, then ate in the hotel restaurant.

Thursday morning we picked up our packets from the reunion reception desk. Spent the day visiting old friends and meeting new people. The new members all had a red, white and blue ribbon on their name tags. We try to make them feel especially welcome. We lose thirty to forty members each year. So far we are picking up about the same number of new members each year.

Thursday evening we had our welcome reception in he hotel ballroom. Light snacks, punch and a cash bar. A lot of handshaking, backslapping, hugging, kissing and a little lying. After the welcome reception, a few came to our room for drinks and visiting

Friday morning we went to breakfast in the ballroom. A free breakfast has become a part of the package furnished by the hotel. After breakfast we returned to our rooms.

Jean just reminded me that I had left out the most important happening on Thursday. A lady, Judy

Gardner, who owns a dress shop in one of the malls, had a fashion show and sales deal for the ladies in the hotel ballroom. That was a big hit for the ladies. It went over so big that they had her to return on Friday.

On Friday we had a Symposium on the December 28, 1943 Mission to Vicenza, Italy when the 376th lost 10 B-24s. This was the most planes that the 376th lost on one mission. All the planes from the 512th Squadron were lost that day.

One of the guys from the 512th who was shot down that day has been a regular member of the after hours sessions in our room for the last two years. He has told some interesting tales of his experiences while in German prison camps.

One of the most interesting aspects of this mission was that the 376th had flown a mission to Vicenza about a week earlier and had very little opposition. They were expecting another milk run. The Germans had moved in a lot more anti aircraft guns as well as fighters. As estimated 60 to 100 fighters attacked them that day. As was their habit, the fighters would hold up about 2000 yards out (out of range of our Cal. 50 machine guns) and lob their rockets in for the formation then come on in and attack the cripples. That day it was a very effective tactic

Friday night we went to Pigeon Forge to the Dixie Stampede. Pigeon Forge is the Tennessee answer to Branson, Missouri. I would have enjoyed the dinner more had they furnished silverware. The chicken and barbecued ribs were really greasy to eat with your fingers. However, they did furnish a large wet napkin when you were finished. We did enjoy the show which was performed in an arena about half as large as the Bogata Rodeo Arena. It was sort of a Civil War Scene with different types of

On Saturday after breakfast, we boarded buses to go to Oakridge to the Atomic Bomb Museum. They had a demonstration before our tour through the museum. For one of the demonstrations, the man had a girl with long hair come to the stage. She placed her hand on a large ball. There was a large disc on a stand behind her head. When the man turned on a switch the girl's long hair stood on end. The man said that atoms passing through her caused it. I was real happy to see this demonstration. I had thought for fifty four years that fear had made my hair stand on end on all of my bombing missions. Now, I know that I wasn't scared, it was atoms passing through my body making my hair stand on end.

Saturday night was our dinner dance. Our speaker was a very funny guy. He had a set of large flash cards. He was teaching us the language of the Smoky Mountains. He kept us laughing the whole time.

Sunday morning we had our Memorial Breakfast. This is a very emotional time for me. After we eat, the list of our members who have died since our last reunion is read. Then taps is played. The navigator from our crew had died last April.

Sunday morning, after breakfast, we boarded buses for Ashville, North Carolina to visit the Biltmore Estate. George Vanderbilt opened the doors of the Biltmore House to family and friends on Christmas Eve 1895. The house has 250 rooms with four acres of floor space. It is located on eight thousand acres of forest, farmland and pleasure gardens. It has the most visited winery in America. I really enjoyed visiting their tasting room. However, I was not overly impressed by the taste of their wines. The trip to Ashville, the visit to the Biltmore and visiting the winery took the entire day. The tour guide had intended that we eat dinner in the restaurant next door to the winery, but they had a two hour wait. We went to a very nice restaurant that had recently opened. After dinner we boarded the bus for the return trip to the hotel.

Monday morning, after our breakfast, we loaded the van for our trip homeward. We drove to Clarksville, Arkansas and spent Monday and Tuesday nights with our sister-inlaw, Helen Wilkinson. On Wednesday we drove to Emerald Bay. Thursday morning we continued our trip homeward. It started raining on Jean and me about thirty miles east of Dallas. We were in a hard rain until we got to Fort Worth.

Jean and I arrived at the farm about four o'clock on Thursday the 23rd. Needless to say we were very tired but happy to be home. Even the cats and cows seemed glad to see us.

Our reunion for 1998 is to be held in Minneapolis.



Fast food facilities familiarity too much?

Old makeup can cause serious eye infections

Cosmetics designed to give women an eye-opening appearance can harbor bacteria, which can cause serious eye infections.

"Eyelashes naturally have bacteria on them and as soon as you use a makeup brush on the eyelash or eyelid, the brush is contaminated," said Dr. Alice Matoba, associate professor of ophthalmology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston and attending physician at the Methodist Hospital.

Over time, this leads to a buildup of bacteria in the cosmetics container, increasing the chance for an eye infection or an allergic reaction with each use of the product.

"Particles of makeup can land in the eyes and cause redness and irritation," said Matoba. "More serious, potentially sight threatening infections can result if the surface of the eye is scratched with a contaminated brush or makeup pencil."

Most cosmetics have long shelf lives, but since they can be contaminated with bacteria after only one use, it is a good idea to keep track of how long you have been using products such as mascara and eye-liners.

While there are no guidelines for cosmetics use, risk of infection can be reduced if you change them out every three to four months.

Also, avoid sharing cosmetics.

Cross contamination occurs when two or more people use the same brushes or eye-liners. The primary danger with sharing makeup is passing on an infection, such as viral conjunctivitis or pink eye.

Exposure to even a small amount of virus can lead to a very uncomfortable infection.

If you experience symptoms of a viral infection, including discharge, swelling of the eyelids or inflammation of the white of the eye, an exam by an ophthalmologist is recommended.

Q. What are the complications of childhood diseases like measles, mumps and whooping cough?

A. Childhood diseases are definitely not child's play. Measles can cause pneumonia, deafness, brain damage or death. Rubella or German Measles is a mild illness for children, but a pregnant woman who gets it may lose her baby or give birth to a child who is deaf, blind or has brain damage. Mumps can result in an inflammation of the brain or spinal cord. Diphtheria kills one of every ten to twenty people who get it. Whooping cough (or pertussis) can cause pneumonia, convulsions or swelling of the brain (encephalitis). Tetanus (or lockjaw) kills four of ten people who get it. Hib causes meningitis (inflammation of the lining of the spinal cord and brain), resulting in brain damage or death. Hepatitis B is a serious disease that can lead to liver cancer, cirrhosis and death. And there is no cure for polio, which can cause permanent paralysis of arms or

I was in the grocery store the other day and overheard a couple "discussing" the running tab on their groceries. The wife put a jug of milk in the shopping cart while her husband shook his head saying, "Can you believe the price on this?"

No telling what that same guy would have said had he been shopping in Tokyo where - on average - that same jug of milk sells for around \$6 a gallon. The fact is no one in the world pays less of their disposable income for food than Americans.

Sure there are some food items on every grocery aisle that will cost you a little more this year than last. But compared with the rest of the world, a trip to the supermarket in the U.S. is a downright bargain. Consumers in Japan would probably stock up on steak if they could pay \$4 a pound like we do in this country. Truth is they're paying \$26 a pound for that same sirloin.

In fact, of nine items normally found on our supper tables, shoppers in Paris pay close to \$30. Japanese residents pay almost \$60. While here in Texas and the U.S., that same supper will cost you \$16.91.

So before anybody starts fretting about the high cost of eating, we might want to stop every once in a while and think about that high quality, abundant food supply that American farmers and ranchers have allowed us all.

Just remember: it's hard to complain when your mouth is full.

104th Infantry, 26th Division

May 9, 1945-France. I'm in the replacement system, having left the hospital some time ago. I'm anxious to get back to the outfit to try to find out what my status is: occupation or the Pacific.

June 22-Czechoslovakia. Got a letter today telling me of ME (?) husband going to CBI (China-Burma-India) direct. Lord, what a blow. Don't think I can live to go even after a furlough home but direct--that'd kill me. Truthfully though, it's gonna be a helluva lot harder to finish off the

June 24. I got a Xmas package today, peanuts (stale but edible), two books, a diary, soap, washrags, shaving cream, gum cigarettes (old but smoke good) candy (unsalvageable). All in all its been enjoyed though. You see, we haven't been eating too good, transportation problems I hear. Ration situation is slowly improving though.

June 28-Czec. Woman, you can't imagine how I feel. Yesterday the Regimental CO told us all Officers with 85 points or over would be transferred soon for eventual separation from the service. Well, there I sat with 83 points. He said anyone with below 85 would stay with the Division and go to the CBI. It seems that all hope is gone. This is the way it figures: Length of service 36, Overseas service 8, Dependents 24, Battle Stars 15 (1 for Bulge; 1 for Central Germany; 1 for Germany west of Rhine.) Anyway you cut it, 's still 83 points. It was close but no cigar I guess.

We have a little problem in a couple of hours...night problem which is to last from 2200 to 0200. Thank goodness it's only a problem, not the real thing. Patrols are my nemesis. Remind me to tell you the time I had to go into a town held by Germans to stay 72 hours or get a prisoner. Those were the times that try men's souls. I thought I was gone.

September 28-Reid, Austria. Gee, I'm glad to see so many of the boys coming home and being released.

the 223rd.

Grant, Mac, Relph and maybe Evans (can't believe yet I'll make it). Yep, you're glad to see home but you really hurt when you think of the boys that won't make it. It isn't really a hurt like I guess a wife or mother would feel, it's not that sentimental. It's kinda like the hurt you feel when your football team fights against a team they haven't a chance to beat. Poor bastards, hey never had a chance. How anyone is coming back beats the hell

Just got some new poop. There is an officers shipment leaving the 4th. Maybe I'll be on it,

October 8-Bamberg, Germany. Well, I still don't feel any better about the whole situation. They're doing everything possible to drive us insane. We won't leave here until Sunday, 14 October.

October 25-LeHavre, France. Guess it's been more than a week since I last wrote and I'm sure you think I'm just out of NY. To the contrary, I really think we'll never make it home.

It took us about five days in box cars to get here at Camp Phillip Morris. We have tents with floors and stoves but due to a lack of spark arresters, no fires can be built. Another thing that makes our stay here so enjoyable is the fact that before liberation LeHavre was bombed and some 18,000 civilians killed therefore the population greets American soldiers with open arms, we have had only two soldiers murdered since we

November 1, 1945-LeHavre, France. Good news, we are to board ship Santa Paula bout one hour. Should take about a week to cross. Then to Ft. Sam and home.

Nov. 4, France. This war ain't bad. Here I sit in my dugout with my platoon guide, runner and medic. Logs overhead, dirt for walls, living with all the comforts of home. We're just about to eat a meal cooked over a little gas stove. Some Frenchman's

Let's see, Jack, Cannon, Lowell, cow died a rather unnatural death the other day and we decided not to let it ruin. Occasionally the Germans lob a few 88's and 120 mortars over from their positions some 1,000 yards away, otherwise things are fine. The only trouble is I'm afraid someone will decide we want those German of these days and I'll end up a hero.

6 November-No Man's Land. What do you think about the heading? Yep, me and my platoon are right out about 1/2 way between the Krauts and Americans. The Krauts don't know we are here yet, I hope. We are holed up in an old house and if they haven't found us yet they'll have a hard time from now on. We just heard an American loudspeaker telling the Germans the news and how hopeless further resistance is, but the only answer the Americans got was a helluva lot of artillery. Sometimes education of the German seems to be a hopeless situation. They just can't understand anything. It's quite an experience to have propaganda and shells passing over at the same time. The boys are sitting around eating K rations and raising hell cause there's just about half enough. I don't know how long we will be here or where we'll go from here but I hope it isn't long till this

Had quite an experience last night walking in the woods. It seemed every 20 steps there was a fence and every five steps was a stump that looked exactly like a Nazi. Luckily none were. Weather hasn't been too cold but rain every day keeps you miserable. It's got to the point where barest essentials of living...food...any kind of shelter and dry clothing are the most important things. Of course, the most important thing is being home again.



I'll never be alraid again

I left the Air Corps in 1945, thinking wars were over, but I was recalled and sent to Korea in 1951. I was in the 49th Fighter-Bomber Wing in Korea when one of my friends, Lt. Owens, came back from a mission with his F-84 plane shot up so bad he didn't dare try to land it. He had good radio communication, I was in the tower with Col. Davenport as Davenport told him that his only chance was to bail out of his plane.

Owens kept his voice calm, but I could tell he didn't trust that parachute 100%. If the chute didn't open, Owens would fall to his death. He said, "Let me fly around just once more." Davenport said, "You have to jump! Your only chance!"

He jumped. The chute opened and he came down safe. That night, across the table from me as we ate supper, he was one of the happiest men I've ever seen. "I"ll never be afraid again!" he said to me. "Two more missions and I will get this thing over. I'll get to go back to the Land of Uncle Sugar, be home with my wife and kids. After this, I'll never be afraid again!"

He was happy, confident and happy. Next day he flew another combat mission, and he was shot down and killed.

20th Air Force

I worked on the airplanes that dropped the bombs. Believe me, we had to be very careful be because the doors on the bay that held the bombs sometimes would not open properly. WE worked hard to be sure that every plane we sent our came back.

However, the happiest day of my life was when one of our B-29's flew over our base and we saw the bomb doors open and it looked like millions of ribbons dropped. The Officer in Charge told us the war had ended in Germany.

the 134th Evac. Hosp. Unit served where needed

J.C. was drafted in December, 1943. He took basic training at Camp Fannin, Texas at Tyler, During basic training, his arches and metatarsals broke down. Because of his feet, he was transferred out of infantry into the Medical training program at Camp Livingston, LA at Alexandria. He was assigned to 1st Army Special Medics, 134th Evacuation Hospital. He served with the 5th Medical Battalion, 5th Division, went to Camp Polk, LA for a short time. From there he went to Camp Kilmer, NJ where he was shipped to New York on a troop train. At New York, he boarded a ship and was sent overseas. The ship docked at LaHavre, France (Camp Lucky Strike). From there he went to Belgium and then to Hallie (pronounced Holly) Germany, just a few miles from Berlin. He was here when the Germans surrendered. He was sent to Reams, France, 20 miles from Paris. This place was called Tent City. There were no barracks, just tents in a field. His next move was to Marseille, France. He was here when the atomic bomb was dropped on Japan. About 12 or 15 men were killed by wild rifle fire, most of the men just started shooting and hollering when they heard the news. Three days after the bomb was dropped, they boarded the M.V. Noordam, a Dutch luxury liner converted into a troop ship. They were scheduled to go to Manilla. Three miles out to sea they were told they to New York an would report there in 17 days. Rough seas caused a change of plans. They went to Norfolk, VA in 11 days. From Norfolk, he went by troop train to San Antonio, Texas for

a brief stop over, then to Camp Chaffee, Arkansas, from there to Camp Campbell, KY. He arrived at Camp Campbell on November 1, 1945. He was sent back to Camp Chaffee where he was discharged in April of 1946. Rank at the time of discharge was Technician Fifth

J.C.'s outfit came from France to Dinnant, Belgium when General Patton came up from Italy during the Battle of the Bulge. 134th Evacuation Hospital set up in a school building and took care of casualties from the battle. The 101st Airborn Division was in Belgium fighting all around them.






Being the only girl, he always sent me to the milk shed to ask our father for his Saturday night spending money. \$1.50 and he shared \$.05

My "War" Story

My oldest brother, Floyd E. Wright, graduated from Deport High School the year I was born, 1939. I remember very little of him my first few years. Since he was only 16 when he graduated from high school and since it was the tradition for the "Wright cousins" to all migrate to Dallas in search of employment when they completed when they completed high school, and since he couldn't get a job until he was 18, Floyd worked at Ross McClure's (Bogata) and Fred Skidmore's (Pattonville) garages awaiting the 18th birthday. Since we did not have an automobile, Floyd lived with these families while learning the automobile trade. He later worked for Mohr Chevrolet in Dallas and ultimately retired with General Motors on the regional management level. Automobiles and what made them tick were in his blood.

World War II whisked Floyd away before he could actually get his career in Dallas on its way. He served in the Marines in the Philippines. One of the few memories I have of the actual war days was that each member of our household received a ration book to buy items we needed.

Oh my, how my Mother would cherish every letter she received from Floyd, reading them over and over, Floyd's letters were censored by the military before they were mailed, and Floyd could only write on one side of the stationary. I remember Mother and Daddy (Mr. and Mrs.. Ben F. Wright) getting one letter, and


one page had been cut into three pieces, probably cutting out the section divulging his location, or something the U.S. didn't want to possibly end up in the enemy's hands.

I don't actually remember Floyd leaving for the service; I was too young. But I remember one time he mailed us a coconut, complete with the outer layer, one always sees coconuts in the grocery stores with the outer layer removed. The coconut

After years had passed, we still did not own an automobile. One night "Buggs" Skidmore drove up to our home, got out and came in and visited. Now Buggs is one of the two sons of Fred and Mable Skidmore, who owned the garage in Pattonville where Floyd had previously worked. I was still just a small child, not yet in school. After Buggs had visited probably five minutes, Mother asked him if his wife, Frances, was in the car. Buggs said, "Oh, yes, I forgot, she is out there." Mother raced out of our home to welcome Frances in. When Mother arrived at the car, low and behold, Floyd was sitting there. Well, Mother almost went bananas she was so tickled to see Floyd. She began yelling for Daddy to come out and get





Guard cutter USS Klamath, we had one crew member who was different from the ordinary sailor. His name was Maximillion Talisman (Max) Boatswain's Mate 2nd Class. Max, a Boxer dog, came aboard with an officer.

When the officer was transferred, Max stayed aboard with the crew. Max knew all the 125 member crew. If a sailor came aboard that was not of the regular crew, Max let every sailor know by barking. Klamath's home port was Seattle. She was moored on the waterfront street adjacent to downtown Seattle. When some of the young single sailors went on liberty, they took Max with them. All of the pubs on the waterfront knew Max and would let him come in with the sailors. When the sailors wanted to be alone, probably with a girlfriend, they would call a cab and the driver would take Max back to the ship.


Max was taught by the crew to get

Two sailors took Max downtown while one was shopping, the other one stood just inside the door He heard this lapping noise and turned around to find Max getting a drink. He took Max outside the store, afraid civilians would think that Max was unsanitary

Max, aboard the Klamath, has been to Hawaii, Midway Island, Japan, Adak, Alaska and through one storm with 50 foot waves. The storm was hard on Max as he had no hands to grasp something to hold onto. Max didn't seem to mind, as usually some sailor would hold on to him. Max was still serving aboard the Klamath when I left.

The 97th Division was first organized at Camp Cody, New Mexico, Sept., 1918. It was manned by drafted men from Oklahoma and Minnesota. The organization was never fully effected.

In accordance with the Army plan of allotting inactive divisions to the various service commands (then-1923-corps areas), the 97th was allotted to the 1st Corps Area in 1923. Accordingly, in 1943, when it was necessary to activate the division, it was the commanding general of the 1st Service Command who ordered the division into active service.

Training

The division was activated at Camp Swift, Tex., in Feb., 1943, and assigned to the Third Army. At the outset, the division trained at Camp Swift and at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. It participated in the Louisiana Maneuvers in 1943 and returned to Fort Leonard Wood when they were completed. The division was transferred to Camp San Luis Obispo, Calif., July 20, 1944, and to Camp Cooke, Calif., on Nov. 1, 1944. The division left for the European Theater of Operations in



In the meantime, fighter planes flew P51's and P38's flew continuously over us making a cloud cover. It reminded me of a flock of blackbirds. An hour later the decoy plane left the runway and the President's plane arrived.

Accompanying him were Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Gen. George Patton, Gen. Marshall and Gen. Clark. Other dignitaries were heads of Army, Air Force, Navy and Marines.

We were standing in formation with enough space for the jeep to drive through the ranks. With President Roosevelt in the front seat with the driver, Gen. Marshall and Gen. George Patton in the back seat. When the jeep stopped, Gen. Patton placed his right hand on the back of the vehicle and hurdled the jeep and when he stopped, he froze to attention.

He was wearing his famous polished boots. I was standing within 50 feet of all the brass and dignitaries. It was certainly an impressive event and one I'll always remember.

First Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Inf. Division

The First Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Inf. Division was in regimental reserve about two miles behind the lines in the foothills of the Vosges Mountains near Coar, France. Early December 1944, cold, snow all over everything, and a bright moonlit night. About 2 a.m. I had finished checking on the perimeter guards as ordered by the A Company Commander, I walked up to the back of a half-track that had been set up with the regimental radios and parked about 50 yards from the command post. The "track" had been rigged up with a canvas top over the bed and I knew it would be warmer in there than anything else around.

A rap on the steel rear door and the man on radio watch pushed one side open. I climbed in and sat down on the floor near the door with my back to the wall. The combination he warmth from the radios (radios then had large vacuum tubes that ran hot) and the soft buzz of the radios and I dozed off.

A knock on the door by my side ought me back to reality, and I unlatched the door and pushed it open. A figure stood there in white coveralls, what we called a "ghost suit", and asked if I had a cigarette. When Elbert was sent overseas, it was two months or more before we heard from him. The War as I saw it...

It was cold March 3, 1942 and there was snow on the ground. My Dad came in the bedroom and informed me it was time to leave. We left Deport at about five in the morning to catch a bus in Paris headed for the Army reception center in Mineral

We got all of our gear issued and started our long stay away from home. There were four of us from Deport leaving at the same time, Donald and Esker Westbrook, Budget Marshall and me. We were separated in Camp Walters and I was sent to Camp Crowder, MO. I don't know how to describe the way I felt when I loaded on the troop train, except I was already homesick and scared.

I spent six weeks in Camp Crowder and then went to Orlando, Florattached to the Army Air Force. I spent the next year training and playing baseball for Orlando. I don't know what part the baseball played in winning the war, but you did what they told you to do. I could have spent the whole war playing baseball but like the "village idiot" I chose to go overseas with my own outfit.

We left Orlando on a troop train going to San Francisco, CA. We were on the train for eight days and arrived in Frisco for departure to the South

While we were traveling through Utah, the train stopped and there was a family standing at the depot to see Pop" Dailey. Pop had five children and was 38 years old and drafted and sent to the South Pacific. I thought it was real good of the Army to arrange this last "goodbye" meeting for old Pop. I began to realize what "goodbye" meant after this meeting.

We shipped out by loading on the Delta Queen, the Mississippi riverboat that is still in operation on the Mississippi, and boarded the troop ship in Frisco on December 11, 1943. It would be two years to the day before we came back to the same place. We went on the Liberty Ship 'Sea Barb" to Guadalcanal in the

Solomon Islands. I was sent to Green Island at the tip of the Solomons.

The only contribution I made to the war was going on a P.T. support mission over New Ireland in a P.B.Y. We dropped flares to light up the island so the P.T. boats could shoot up the enemy. I was scared to death all through the mission (the Japs did not even shoot at us) and after about seven hours, returned to Green Island. I was on New Guinea, Numifor Island and then to the Phillippines for the remainder of the war.

We sailed under the Golden Gate Bridge at almost the same time of day only it was two years later, 1945.

The Army was really good to me and many others. We got a college education for free, and they paid us \$105.00 a month in cash then when you had a child it was \$120.00 bucks a month. I went to East Texas State Teachers College, lived we called the "Chicken Shack" and had it real good. I got a master's degree gratus the Army. I don't regret a day I spent from 1942 to 1945, I do not ever want to have to go through this again, but would not take anything for my experience. I wish I could have been a "hero" like some from Deport, but we all had a job to do and we did it the best we could.

I earned the following decorations and citations while I served four years: The American Theater Campaign Asiatic-Pacific medal with three bronze stars; Phillippines Liberation medal with one bronze star; Good Conduct medal; Victory ribbon; one Service stripe; four Overseas Service bars; and "I never even saw a Jap."

My job in the South Pacific was to direct sea planes to pick up "downed" pilots who were in the ocean. Some had been shot down and some had mechanical trouble. I know we were helping win the war with this job, but sometimes I felt like a "sad sack" until a "downed" pilot came by the information center and gave us a 'fifth" and said "Thank You".



Paving the way to America's World millimeter guns, one 37-millimeter War II victory in the battle of Manila, Pfc. John N. Reese, Jr. was posthumously awarded the nation's highest military decoration on November 8,

"Pfc. John N. Reese, Jr. was killed in the line of duty and he and a comrade killed more than 82 Japanese, completely disorganized their defense and paved the way for subsequent complete defeat of the enemy at this strongpoint," read the citation which was signed by President Harry S.

Reese, from Pryor, Oklahoma was killed February 9, 1945 during the key battle in the Philippines Islands.

He was an automatic rifleman with Company B, 148th Infantry, on February 9, 1945 during the battle of Manila, Philippine Islands, engaged in the attack on the Paco Railroad Station, which was strongly defended by 300 determined enemy soldiers with machine guns and rifles supported by several pillboxes, three 20-

gun and heavy mortars.

On his own initiative, private Reese left the platoon, accompanied by a comrade, and continued forward to a house 60 yards from the objective.

The two men remained in this position for an hour, firing at targets of opportunity, killing more than 35 Japanese and wounding many more. Moving closer to the station and discovering a group of Japanese replacements attempting to reach pillboxes, they opened heavy fire, killed more than 40 and stopped all subsequent attempts to man the emplacements.

While the two men started to return to the American lines, alternately providing covering fire for each other as they withdrew, Private Reese was killed by enemy fire as he reloaded

Just prior to landing, the voice of Axis Sally came over the PA system saying "Tonight we want to welcome the 103rd division to France. We will receive you warmly, very warmly." That was an understated omen.

His unit was the first to land at Marseille, to become a part of the 7th Army. Combat began in the Vosges Mountains, on the outskirts of a village called St. Die. The company commander said "If you live through this day, you've got a good chance." It's ironic, the commander was killed that day. The Mayor of St. Die vowed to name the town square for the 103rd Division. Holmes never saw the named square as his unit pushed on to Alsace and ultimately to the Siegfried

As the attack progressed in the Haardt Mountains, resistance was fierce. Road junctions were wellmined, usually set up with machine guns as supporting fire. Open ground was dangerous as the enemy had all likely routes of approach covered.

It was rough in the hills, slogging along, halt, slog again with weariness beginning. Man followed man, company followed company, slipping, sliding, sweating, swearing, halting briefly as the cold became almost unbearable.

The troops were loaded with equipment, having to drag it up the slippery slopes, through the brush and down the ravines. Carrying your rifle, a belt of ammunition, three bandoliers, a grenade launcher, three or more grenades plus raincoat and sleeping bag. and your rations. The grenades were dangled from your bandolier or rifle strap, stashed in a jacket pocket or else hung from your pockets by jamming the grenade handle through a button hole. The four jacket pockets were the Infantryman's warehouse. Always room for one more thing, hoping clean them out when you got the time, still "stuff" in them from Marseille. The jacket crisscrossed by your rifle belt and the bandolier straps made you bulge like Mae West on the top and flare out like her at the hips.

As you ate your way through your K rations, you'd save the cigarettes, matches, candy, sugar, chewing gun and toilet paper. The toilet paper was crammed into the shock bands of your helmet liner, the rest into a jacket

You started with a jacket pocket filing system, cigarettes and matches in right breast pocket, gun and sweets

1st Sgt. James Holmes of Patton- in the left, but you'd find a strap ville, Texas completed extensive pinning the pocket shut so you'd use before sailing to Europe, landing at glomeration worse than the contents of a woman's handbag, in every pocket, always hunting in the wrong pocket, finding you couldn't get the pocket you wanted because a strap clamped it shut.

In December of 1944, the unit bumped against the strongest defensive line the world had ever known, the Seigfried Line. The Seigfried was designed as a permanent defensive line, with strong points backing up strong points, each mutually supporting. Fierce fighting attacks and counter attacks including close combat ensued. Heavy losses on both sides were encountered.

The company was short on supplies-re: ammunition and explosives. Holmes, being a farm boy, was selected to take a mule train (18 mules) to deliver supplies and rations to designated areas in the Seigfried Line. After delivery, the mules were to be used to evacuate the killed in action bodies. This proved to be more complicated than anticipated. The mules were reluctant to having frozen bodies attached, causing considerab. movement and struggle making them difficult to control...

This melee on the mountain was observed by the Germans resulting in heavy artillery barrages. The health and welfare of the mules was no longer paramount by the person leading the mules. The mules with the KIA's attached became wildly out of control. They came flatulent, kicking, bucking, snorting and running in all directions. The unsupervised exercise resulted in bodies being scattered once again on "Pill Box Hill".

After a lull in artillery fire, the mules caught and their mission was accomplished. One of the mules was wounded and treated at a battalion aid station, likely, the only mule in the Army to earn a Purple Heart!

The unit continued to fight for another three months inside the world's strongest defense positions with losses and replacements, more losses and more replacements. During this period, Sgt. Holmes was given a battle field commission to the grade of 2nd Lieutenant.

In late March of 1945, the unit punched a hole through the Seigfried Line. Holmes' platoon was attached to Task Force Rhine, a completely mechanized unit. It was dusk when tank-riding infantrymen shoved off towards the Rhine River. Moving into enemy territory, instructions were to fire at anything that moved, "Reconnaissance by fire, is the military

The Task Force overran and destroyed the German Army that defended the Seigfried Line. Forty miles into enemy territory, the column stopped to refuel. The Task Force came upon a 12th century castle that had been fortified by the Germans and used as an observation post.

Lt. Holmes was ordered to take his platoon from the Task Force and eliminate the enemy from Landeck Castle. His platoon started up the hill towards the castle just as dawn was breaking. The hill seemed to go up to about 70 degrees. The Germans tossed down boulders and hand grenades on the advancing platoon, scattered snipers throughout the woods, making the mission more perilous.

Lt. Holmes took one squad of men up a ravine and struck from the rear, making radio contact with his platoon Sergeant to advance a frontal assault. The platoon, led by Lt. Holmes, killed or wounded 18 of the enemy before the remaining 37 including a Lt. Colonel, raised their

hands in surrender. While securing the castle, Lt. Holmes rounded the corner of the building, meeting a German face to face. Both raised their weapons to fire. The German pulled the trigger first, forgetting that he had not released the safety on his weapon. As the platoon lined up their prisoners, one treacherous German suddenly pulled out a Burp Gun that had gone undetected both cases, Lt. Holmes prevented two Germans from causing damage to the platoon.

The platoon accomplished the mission with minimum casualties. Returning to the base of the mountain, encountering one of his men, Lt. Holmes asked "What are you doing down here? The soldier, shaking and crying responded, "Sir, I just couldn't fight anymore. Something told me that if I went up that mountain, I would die this day." Lt. Holmes gave the Corporal a cigarette and said, "Soldier, I had the same feeling while on top of that mountain."

The unit moved on through Germany, into Austria and reached the Brenner Pass in the Alps with little resistance. On V.E. Day, he thought of all the heroes left behind on the Seigfried, wishing they could have been there to celebrate.

Major James Holmes, Ret. (Major Holmes brother, Roy (Ed) Holmes, son of Clarence and Lula Holmes, attended Pattonville schools graduating from Deport High School in 1942, was killed in action during the attack on Iwo Jima while serving with the 4th Marine Division, March 9, 1945. 

Another good memory in South Korea was when I got my Army tour complete and was ready to come


I had two brothers serving in the Navy that had finished their tour of duty and got home before I did. Great memories all getting to be home again.

What may have started the Cold War....

After helping commission the USS Aleutian Islands to turn our ship over Sandusky (PF-54) in New Orleans with a shakedown cruise to Bermuda, then back to a shipyard in Philadelphia and then on to Staten Island. New York to escort six troop transports through Panama Canal, a fuel stop at Bora Bora (Society Islands) and 45 days later arriving in Finch Harbor, New Guinea and on to Hollandia, New Guinea. After crossing the equator 12 times escorting convoys that were invading islands as we worked our way to the Phillippines and surviving aircraft attacks and one typhoon that sank three Navy destroyers, we headed back to the US with a stop in Hawaii. We arrived in Seattle, Washington and after repairs in a shipyard, headed for Cold Bay.

to the Russians on a lease-lend deal. When we arrived one half of our crew stayed with the ship and half of the Russian crew came aboard. We were to familiarize the Russian crew with the operation of the ship. We could not speak Russian and they could not speak English. There were no interpreters, we used the hands-on type training. We were told not to give the Russians money and they were not supposed to have any American money. One night a Russian sailor motioned me to go with him. We went to the stern of the ship where no one else was around. He motioned to my low quarter shoes and through hand motion, I knew he liked them because they were polished and

shined. Their shoes were of rough leather that couldn't be polished. He indicated that he wanted to buy my shoes by holding up five fingers. I held up ten fingers. He gave me two US \$5 dollar bills. I did not know where he got the money and I did not ask. I pulled off my shoes and gave them to him and walked back to my quarters barefooted. What he did not know at that time, there was a quarter size hole in the bottom of both shoes. When he found out, it may have been the beginning of "The Cold War".

I flew bombing missions as a radio operator/gunner in a B-24 bomber out of Guilia Field in Cerignola, Italy during World War II. Our main objective was to disable the German war machine factories and the oil refineries which furnished fuel to operate the machines. By August 1944, American planes had carried out many raids on the Ploesti Oil Refineries in Romania which furnished one-third of Germany's fuel. Within days after a raid, these refineries would be up and running again. Three days before my crew flew it's first bombing mission, the death blow was struck and Ploesti was gone from the scene. This meant most of the German fighter planes were grounded because of the lack of fuel. In their place were antiaircraft guns. From then on our bombers passed over the targets amidst terrifying puffs of black smoke from the sting shells from these guns-flak!! At times, flak was so thick we could not see the sun.

On August 22, 1944, our crew was ready to go--our first mission: Blechhamer, Germany. I flew a total of 55 missions over ten countries, but

Blechhammer was to become the most dreaded word I would ever hear. By daylight that day we loaded into the plane and were ready to taxi down the runway, anxiously awaiting the long flight over the Adriatic Sea to Blechhamer. We came home that night seasoned veterans. Seven planes from our group did not return. The plane flying next to us lost a wing. When the crew abandoned ship, only nine parachutes from a ten-man crew were seen. The big bomber went into a deadly spiral toward earth. As we watched and prayed, the plane leveled off for just a few seconds and the tenth parachute came out and opened. Planes were at our wing one minute and gone the next, evaporating into thin air from direct hits from the antiaircraft guns. Some planes became huge fireballs when their fuel tanks were hit. Some went down with engines burning, no chance for the crew to escape. A few ditched in the Adriatic.

In October, 1944, we flew to Blechhamer again. While over the target, we lost one of our engines to flak. Flak was so intense that our plane rocked and quaked from the hits and near misses. Our pilot managed to keep the plane in formation until after the bomb run was made and our load of bombs dropped, then peeled sharply away to return to base. Normally, it took two hours to cross the Adriatic Sea, but today while we were crossing, two more engines went out. We were down to a very low altitude and it looked as though we might have to ditch in the Adriatic. We threw everything out that we could get loose from inside the plan to lighten our load: parachutes, flak suits, guns, ammunition--even our top-secret Norden bomb site went into the sea. The pilot barely managed to maneuver the big B-24 onto the runway at the Isle of Vis, a friendly base off the coast of Italy. After landing safely, I climbed from the plane and counted 155 flak holes in our plane, ranging in size from one inch to 18 inches in diameter. I fell to my knees and kissed the welcome earth and

Boy I really had some fun them days. Didn't you? Roy has my shotgun out there where he is I think.





VIETNAM VETERANS MEMORIAL

I could sit down and write my Army experiences in sentences of one word. Like wool uniforms, \$21.00 a month, sea sick, homesick, board the ships, deboard into small beach crafts, airplane rides in C-47's, passes to town, riding a train from Florida to California, buddies we would never see again, radar units that would make you sterile, WACS, Canadian WACS, Daytona Beach, the \$50.00 a month, drilling with 8 3/4 pound rifles, tents, seasick, furloughs back home, buddies being shipped out, the Florida heat, the South Pacific heat and rain, Green Island, Guadalcanal, Bougainvillea, Soloman Islands, Green Island, a Jap sub, Numifore, New Guinea, checkers, cards and card games, sea sick every time we made a trip, my Thompson machine gun I never shot, an extra stripe, K rations, C rations, no rations, fights, poker, drilling, orders from bottom to the top, rumors, more rumors, letters from home, writing letters home, hometown paper, mad at your buddy, mad at all your buddies, mad at the world, air raids, dead Japs and Americans, the road to Tokyo.

Some time back, I noticed an article about a B-24 they had found on Esprito Santo in the New Heberdes Islands. This was the first island we landed on and at the port was Esprito Santo greeted by six Corsairs doing a victory roll over our ship. Why they did a victory roll, I don't know, maybe they had shot down some Japs or that we were going to bring home a vic-

Many odd things happen to you in the Army. I was talking to a kid in the chow line who had been shot in the arm. He was from Brookston, Texas. He was in a a machine gun crew. but he was going get in the mortars as they were way back, like another 20 yards He came out on the ball field in Paris to see me after the war and the first thing I asked him was "Did you get in the mortars?'

Donald "Whiz" Roach from Bogata was on Guadalcanal and his friend John Norton from Paris was tryng to find Whiz. He was walking up a trail in the jungle from the air base and there 8,000 miles from home they ran into each other. Both had graduated from PJC.

I was on several islands but never even saw a live Jap, thank goodness. From Esprito Santo we went to Guadalcanal. From there to Bougainvillea in the Solomons and on to Green Island, and then to Emeru. We caught a C-47 back to Guadalcanal and on the way landed in Bougainvillea. The pilot, who must have just graduated from flight school, hit the runway, bounced the 47 up and the wings wobbled up and down, then he straightened it out and landed it. There were 52 scared soldiers that airplane and we threatened to stay on Bouga-

invilleas rather than fly back with

him. Another time we were flying from Celau to Palowan Island in the Phillippines, the pilot went into a cloud. We fell about 2,000 feet and were pushed up 3,000 feet by the updraft again. We all were so scared we could only hold on a cuss and swear we were going to have him court marshalled when we got back.

I keep saying "funny things happen to you in the Army". After a tour of duty on Numifore Island, we loaded up all the tin we could find and all of the wood we could use and loaded them on six landing boats. There were six of the landing boats going back from Numifore to Biak. We were out in the Pacific with no protection and a Lieutenant who was dead reckoning us back to Biak.

It was five or six hundred miles back but we made it without a hitch. The biggest excitement I had in New Guinea was catching beautiful butterflies. What a way to fight a war! Butterflies and Raisin Jack was what kept us going.

I had one job I really enjoyed. We were detailed to unload a L.S.T. that was loaded with beer. Out of a detail of eight, I think we unloaded half the beer and drank the rest. We also ate the scraps (and they were meat scraps) that the Merchant Marines threw in the garbage can. It was good after a year and half of C's and K's and no
