In recent interviews it was astonishing to hear that many Americans say they would happily settle for less pay if they could have less hours to work!

Some companies are actually offering a four day work week with shorter lunch hours and an hour longer day. People working there seem to love it.

So, the next time you think about the "typical American remember that he or she is working longer hours than any other worker in the civilized world! So much for our lazy, unproductive image!

More than 100 years ago, the McConnell, James and Privett families last gathered at Gethsemane Cemetery in Caddo, Oklahoma to lay to rest Civil War veteran Lee A. Privett, the maternal grandfather of the late Will McConnell of Red River County. On Saturday, November 1st Privett's descendents and Civil War re-enactors from his unit, the 34th Texas Calvary, dedicated the first headstone to mark his grave.

Rick Baird of Cuthand, Privett's great-great-grandson, originated the idea to secure the military marker. Rick is very interested in the Civil War period and is an active member of the Sam Bell Maxey Chapter of Sons of Confederate Veterans.

The dedication began with the opening prayer offered by Vernon McConnell of Talco. The Confederate honor guard was called to attention by Lt. Tom Stewart of Flower Mound. Melanie McConnell Klein of Whitehouse welcomed family members and friends and then spoke of Lee Privett's family life and military service, based on research from Rick Baird.

Lee Privett was born near Springfield, Illinois in 1832 and married Nancy Ann James in 1857 in Ladonia, Texas. In 1862 he enlisted in the Confederate army and was mustered into service in Tallequah, Indian Territory. Privett served in the 34th Texas Calvary until the end of the war and

Heat up the oven and get that fresh bread starting to bake. I have come across some great recipes this week that would go great with a fresh loaf! In fact, these flavored butters will taste good on anything from fresh bread to hotcakes to various types of potatoes

Simple to make--just get softened, spreadable butter and mix with your favorite flavors! Buter is a tasty spread, mainly for bread, but can be used also to fry or used in many baked goods.

In the United States, people use butter made from the milk of cows. In some countries, however, butter may be made from the milk of goats, horses, sheep, low and behold, reindeer or other animals. Sevral products are made from butter. These products include butter oil and whipped butter. Butter oil is a liquid used in cooking. Whipped butter has air mixed in it to make it lighter and easier to spread.

Throughout history, people have used butter for various purposes other than for food. In ancient Rome people used butter for hairdressing and also as a skin cream.

Butter comes from butterfat, which is present in milk and cream in the form of tiny droplets. Butter is churned from cream because cream contains about 10 times as much butterfat as milk does. When cream is mixed rapidly at a certain tempera-

Butter Recipes

ture, droplets of butterfat form particles called butter granules. Churning turns these particles into butter. Creameries make butter in a process that has three steps: (1) pasteurization, (2) churning and (3) packag-

Pasteurization-Cream must be pasteurized before churning as this process kills harmful bacteria and prevents butter from spoiling. There are two types of pasteurizationbatch and high-temperature shorttime pasteurization. In batch, the cream must be heated to at least 165 degrees and held at this temperature for at least 30 minutes. In high temperature short-time, the temperature must reach 185 degrees for at least 15 seconds

Churning involves beating or stirring the cream to turn butterfat to butter. Before churning, cream must be kept in storage tanks at 40-50 degrees for several hours. During storage, a process called tempering occurs, which makes cream easier to

Creameries make two chief types of butter. One is sweet cream and the other is sour cream types. Miost butter made in the United States is the sweet cream type. Sweet is made from sweet (fresh) cream. Sour cream butter is made from cream that has been soured.

Lactic acid is used to ripen (sour) cream. This improves the flavor of

Creameries may add color with various food dyes while churning. The natural color varies from pale to deep yellow, depending on the breed of cow and the feed that they ate. A feed consisting of fresh green grass makes butter a deeper yellow that does a feed made up of grain or hay.

Wisconsin has the highest annual butter production with 295,600,000 pounds. Next is California with 228,800,000 pounds, Minnesota at 156,000,000 pounds, Quebec with 94,400,000 and last is Washington with 84,500,000 pounds.

Historians do not know when people first started making butter. People from India churned butter from the milk of water buffaloes as early as 2000 B.C.

So this week's recipe has a flavor for everyone's taste and we hope you enjoy them and can use some of these during your holiday preparations. Thanks and we will see you in the kitchen!

Q. What are the complications of childhood diseases like measles, mumps and whooping cough?

A. Childhood diseases are definitely not child's play. Measles can cause pneumonia, deafness, brain damage or death. Rubella or German Measles is a mild illness for children, but a pregnant woman who gets it may lose her baby or give birth to a child who is deaf, blind or has brain damage. Mumps can result in an inflammation of the brain or spinal cord. Diphtheria kills one of every ten to twenty people who get it. Whooping cough (or pertussis) can cause pneumonia, convulsions or swelling of the brain (encephalitis). Tetanus (or lockjaw) kills four of ten people who get it. Hib causes meningitis (inflammation of the lining of the spinal cord and brain), resulting in brain damage or death. Hepatitis B is a serious disease that can lead to liver cancer, cirrhosis and death. And there is no cure for polio, which can cause permanent paralysis of arms or

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That's the recipe researchers will follow as they rebuild a one-mile stretch of Galveston Island sand dunes in an experiment that may save millions of dollars of beachfront property from being washed out to sea.

Texas A&M University at Galveston marine biologist Jim Webb hopes to stem the tide and learn how to prevent beach erosion by rebuilding sand dunes along the one-mile stretch.

"The beach and the dunes form a natural barrier to erosion and provide a source of sand to the beach," he said. "The dunes protect the land and houses behind the beach by blocking the wave action."

In Texas, sand dunes often mark the boundary between private property and public beaches. When the waves wash away so much land that a house encroaches on the beach, Webb said, the General Land Office forces the homeowner to demolish the house so it won't interfere with beach access.

'We've got houses that are literally falling into the Gulf," Webb said. "Water has cut underneath some of the foundations of the houses. We're trying to restore the dunes, renourish the beach and get some protection in front.

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
