People have said they are going to keep in mind the point that we try not to stare and end up totally ignoring someone with a disability, which is worse.

Readers have said they never considered that just because there is a Handicapped Accessible sign things might not be easy for someone with a problem.

And, lots of good folks have expressed their sympathy over my temporary (it better be) incapacity.

Well, I've graduated, in a way, to a walker. Tried the crutches, found out that they don't work well with a pain ful, partly functioning knee and a no-weight-on-it-at-all foot which are on different legs. Nearly pitched myself headfirst through a doorway and put them away to go back to the walker, which makes me feel like I'm 110 years old, at least.


Like the wheel chair, the walker has given me a new view and a new sympathy for those who use it.

While I can clean house (except I can't figure out how to run the vacuum) from a wheel chair, I cannot do a single thing from a walker.

I mean, it is impossible to carry a glass or cup of liquid, a book, paper, or anything at all while hobbling around with the metal contraption!

I can carry clothes if I am willing to drape them on the crossbar and put up with them sliding off three or four times before reaching my destination.

I can't straighten up and look people in the eye, and I feel rather conspicuous as I stump







With all the "bugs" going around during winter, many sick people mistakenly think they have influenza. That may lead them to think the flu shots they got are not working.

"Lots of people get colds in the winter and mistakenly think they have influenza," said Dr. Wendy Keitel of the Influenza Research Center at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine.

Cold-like symptoms can be produced by many viruses circulating this time of year, such as rhino-, corona-, parainfluenza-, respiratory syncytial-, adeno-, and other viruses.

Any of these can cause typical upper-respiratory symptoms such as runny nose, sore throat, sneezing, watery eyes and nasal obstruction, Keitel said. In fact, a mild case of influenza can also produce such symptoms.

Although other infections can be associated with flu-like illness, few if any have the same impact in the community as influenza. Not only can symptoms of influenza be severe, making you feel much worse than a cold ever could, but influenza complications can lead to death. As many as 20,000 people, most of them elderly, die each year in the U.S. from flu complications, chiefly pneumo-

"Sometimes people will avoid get-ting flu shots," Keitel said, "because they are convinced that they caught influenza from the shot last year.'

Actually, they are likely associating the flu shot with a coincidental illness caused by some other infection

"The danger in such thinking is that people who really need flu shots will not get them," Keitel said." The elderly and people with heart and lung disease, in particular, should get flu shots annually because they are among the people most at risk for possible deadly complications." The flu vaccine is not 100 percent

effective, but your chances of avoiding the flu and its complications are significantly higher with the shot than without it.

Holiday lighting hints from TNMP

brightest features of this festive season. It also is a potentially dangerous one. Texas-New Mexico Power Company offers the following suggestions to make your lighting both attractive and safe.

Do not place the tree too close to heat sources such as space heaters or fireplaces, and avoid using an open heat source, such as candles, on the

Lights and extension cords should be tested for safety and bear the Underwriters' Laboratories or UL label. Always check lights for damage,

such as exposed wires, loose prongs and cracked or broken sockets. Make sure the power is off when

stringing lights. Use indoor lights and outdoor lights

Holiday lighting is one of the in the proper places. Outdoor lights should be waterproof and should be fastened to trees or structures to prevent damage by winds.

Do not overload extension cords or light strings. Three sets of lights on an extension cord should be the maximum amount. Avoid connecting large light sets through miniature light sets. And before decorating, check light sets for smoking and melting by placing on a nonflammable surface and plugging in for 10 to 15 minutes.

Avoid using electric lights on a metallic tree, which can become charged with electricity through faulty wiring. Consider using colored spotlights above or beside the tree instead.

Indoor lights should be securely

attached to trees, and bulbs should not be in direct contact with needles or branches.


Unplug lights when the tree or house is unattended.

Water the tree frequently to prevent bulbs from scorching pine needles.

At the end of the seasonn, careful packing will avoid damage to lights and wiring for next year's use.


Always keep a fire extinguisher nearby for emergency purposes.



A total of 3,329 North Texans have a pleasant surprise from the IRS this holiday season.


The IRS has been unable to deliver \$1,727,002 million in tax refunds to North Texas residents. The smallest refund check is \$1. The biggest undeliverable checkk is \$22,657. Nationwide, nearly 100,000 taxpayers have yet to receive their 1995 refunds which total about \$62.6 million.

These refunds were returned by the post office because they were unable to deliver them. People often move without giving the IRS their new address. Incorrect names and addresses are other common reasons why refunds are returned to the IRS.




