A Progress? Report!

I believe I have had more comments on my column about what it is like to be wheelchair confined than any I've written in some time.

People have said they are going to keep in mind the point that we try not to stare and end up totally ignoring someone with a disability, which is worse.

Readers have said they never considered that just because there is a Handicapped Accessible sign things might not be easy for someone with a problem.

And, lots of good folks have expressed their sympathy over my temporary (it better be) incapacity.

Well, I've graduated, in a way, to a walker. Tried the crutches, found out that they don't work well with a painful, partly functioning knee and a no-weight-on-it-at-all foot which are on different legs. Nearly pitched myself headfirst through a doorway and put them away to go back to the walker, which makes me feel like I'm 110 years old, at least.

Like the wheel chair, the walker has given me a new view and a new sympathy for those who use it.

While I can clean house (except I can't figure out how to run the vacuum) from a wheel chair, I cannot do a single thing from a walker.

I mean, it is impossible to carry a glass or cup of liquid, a book, paper, or anything at all while hobbling around with the metal contraption!

I can carry clothes if I am willing to drape them on the crossbar and put up with them sliding off three or four times before reaching my destination.

I can't straighten up and look people in the eye, and I feel rather conspicuous as I stump into a room.

But, I can get to places I can't in the wheelchair, and it does save my poor, overloaded saint of a husband from having to load and unload a wheelchair every time I leave the house.

I know they make baskets for walkers, my mother used to have one. But even with that it was hard to carry a glass of water without sloshing it over the edge, and most things tend to fall out of the basket as it is moving.

No, I now share a new sympathy for people who must use one all the time. Hopefully, next week I will have endured my six weeks with no weight on the foot, and can begin walking on it again. You should have seen the look on my face when the doctor said "well, we'll x-ray it then, sometimes they take an extra two weeks". I don't want to hear this! I mean I REALLY don't want to hear this.

Bogata council passes ordinances concerning park, dumpsters

The Bogata City Council met Monday and heard from Mr. Woodie Brantley of Texas Waste Management and Mr. Clinton Lewis of Southern Disposal, Inc., of Antlers, Oklahoma. The council will make a decision at a later date concerning trash pickup for the city.

The council heard the first reading of an ordinance to prohibit overnight sleeping in Thomas Park and voted to pass an ordinance to enforce the no loitering at businesses where signs are posted and they also voted to pass

an ordinance for a curfew for children under the age of 18 years.

They voted to pay the balance of \$455.97 for the carpet at the Community Center and agreed to pay for rubber boots for two employees in the Water Department.

Is it the flu or some other "bug"

With all the "bugs" going around during winter, many sick people mistakenly think they have influenza. That may lead them to think the flu shots they got are not working.

"Lots of people get colds in the winter and mistakenly think they have influenza," said Dr. Wendy Keitel of the Influenza Research Center at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine.

Cold-like symptoms can be produced by many viruses circulating this time of year, such as rhino-, corona-, parainfluenza-, respiratory syncytial-, adeno-, and other viruses.

Any of these can cause typical upper-respiratory symptoms such as runny nose, sore throat, sneezing, watery eyes and nasal obstruction, Keitel said. In fact, a mild case of influenza can also produce such symptoms.

Although other infections can be associated with flu-like illness, few if any have the same impact in the community as influenza. Not only can symptoms of influenza be severe, making you feel much worse than a cold ever could, but influenza complications can lead to death. As many as 20,000 people, most of them elderly, die each year in the U.S. from flu complications, chiefly pneumonia.

"Sometimes people will avoid getting flu shots," Keitel said, "because they are convinced that they caught influenza from the shot last year."

Actually, they are likely associating the flu shot with a coincidental illness caused by some other infection.

"The danger in such thinking is that people who really need flu shots will not get them," Keitel said. "The elderly and people with heart and lung disease, in particular, should get flu shots annually because they are among the people most at risk for possible deadly complications."

The flu vaccine is not 100 percent effective, but your chances of avoiding the flu and its complications are significantly higher with the shot than without it.

Candy Recipes

Orange Balls

1 pound bag vanilla wafers
1 stick butter
1 small can frozen orange juice
1 box powdered sugar
1 cup chopped pecans

Crush wafers until fine. Melt butter. Mix with orange juice. Mix dry ingredients in large bowl. Mix with liquid. Shape into small balls, size of walnut. Roll into powdered sugar. Place on wax paper to harden.

Date-Nut Roll

2 cups sugar
1 cup milk
1 tablespoon butter
1 cup chopped dates
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup finely chopped nuts
1-1/2 cups coarsely chopped nuts

Combine sugar, milk and butter in heavy saucepan; blend thoroughly. Place over low heat. Stir until sugar is dissolved and mixture is boiling moderately. Cover; cook for three minutes. Remove cover. Remove crystals from side of pan with damp cloth. Cook to soft-ball stage; add dates. Remove from heat. Add vanilla. Cool, without stirring, to lukewarm. Beat until very thick. Add finely chopped nuts, knead until smooth. Divide into three equal parts; shape each into a roll. Coat each roll with 1/2 cup nuts. Chill; cut into 1/2 inch slices.

Peanut Clusters

1-6 ounce package chocolate chips
2/3 cup sweetened condensed milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1-1/2 cup Spanish peanuts

Melt chocolate chips. Add milk, vanilla and peanuts; mix well. Drop by spoonfuls onto a buttered cookie sheet or waxed paper.

White Trash

2 cups Rice Krispies cereal
2 cups Captain Krunch cereal
2 cups broken pretzels
2 cups salted nuts
1 package white almond bark

Combine first 4 ingredients. Melt almond bark and pour over cereal mixture; mix well. Drop on waxed paper.

Microwave Peanut Patties

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
dash salt
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1-1/2 cup raw panuts
1 tablespoon margarine
1 teaspoon vanilla
2-3 drops red food coloring

Combine sugar, water, salt and corn syrup in 2-quart glass bowl. Bring to a boil for 3 minutes. Stir and add peanuts. Cook 9-11 minutes more or until soft ball stage. (234 degrees) Remove and add margarine, vanilla and coloring. Cool and beat until creamy. Drop by spoonfuls onto cookie sheet.

Butterscotch Candy

3-6 ounce packages butterscotch morsels
2 heaping tablespoons peanut butter
1 can peanuts
1 can shoestring potatoes

Melt butterscotch morsels and peanut butter in double boiler. Add peanuts and shoestring potatoes. Drop by spoonfuls onto waxed paper.

Farmers now have data available to them from 24 satellites originally developed for the Pentagon. In 1998, NASA will launch 2 more satellites and private companies are planning more satellites that can analyze a parcel as small as a square yard.

"Precision Agriculture" uses lasers, satellites, computers and various monitoring systems to bring the latest science to farming. A computerized fertilizer system can automatically spread the exact amount of fertilizer needed using a global positioning system receiver on a tractor. This system uses data from infrared satellite photos, historic yields, soil moisture and the slope of the land in a computer program.

Higher yields and profits have resulted. Also, the environment is protected with less fertilizer runoff.

Holiday lighting hints from TNMP

Holiday lighting is one of the brightest features of this festive season. It also is a potentially dangerous one. Texas-New Mexico Power Company offers the following suggestions to make your lighting both attractive and safe.

Do not place the tree too close to heat sources such as space heaters or fireplaces, and avoid using an open heat source, such as candles, on the tree.

Lights and extension cords should be tested for safety and bear the Underwriters' Laboratories or UL label. Always check lights for damage, such as exposed wires, loose prongs and cracked or broken sockets.

Make sure the power is off when stringing lights.

Use indoor lights and outdoor lights

in the proper places. Outdoor lights should be waterproof and should be fastened to trees or structures to prevent damage by winds.

Do not overload extension cords or light strings. Three sets of lights on an extension cord should be the maximum amount. Avoid connecting large light sets through miniature light sets. And before decorating, check light sets for smoking and melting by placing on a nonflammable surface and plugging in for 10 to 15 minutes.

Avoid using electric lights on a metallic tree, which can become charged with electricity through faulty wiring. Consider using colored spotlights above or beside the tree instead.

Indoor lights should be securely

attached to trees, and bulbs should not be in direct contact with needles or branches.

Unplug lights when the tree or house is unattended.

Water the tree frequently to prevent bulbs from scorching pine needles.

At the end of the season, careful packing will avoid damage to lights and wiring for next year's use.

Always keep a fire extinguisher nearby for emergency purposes.

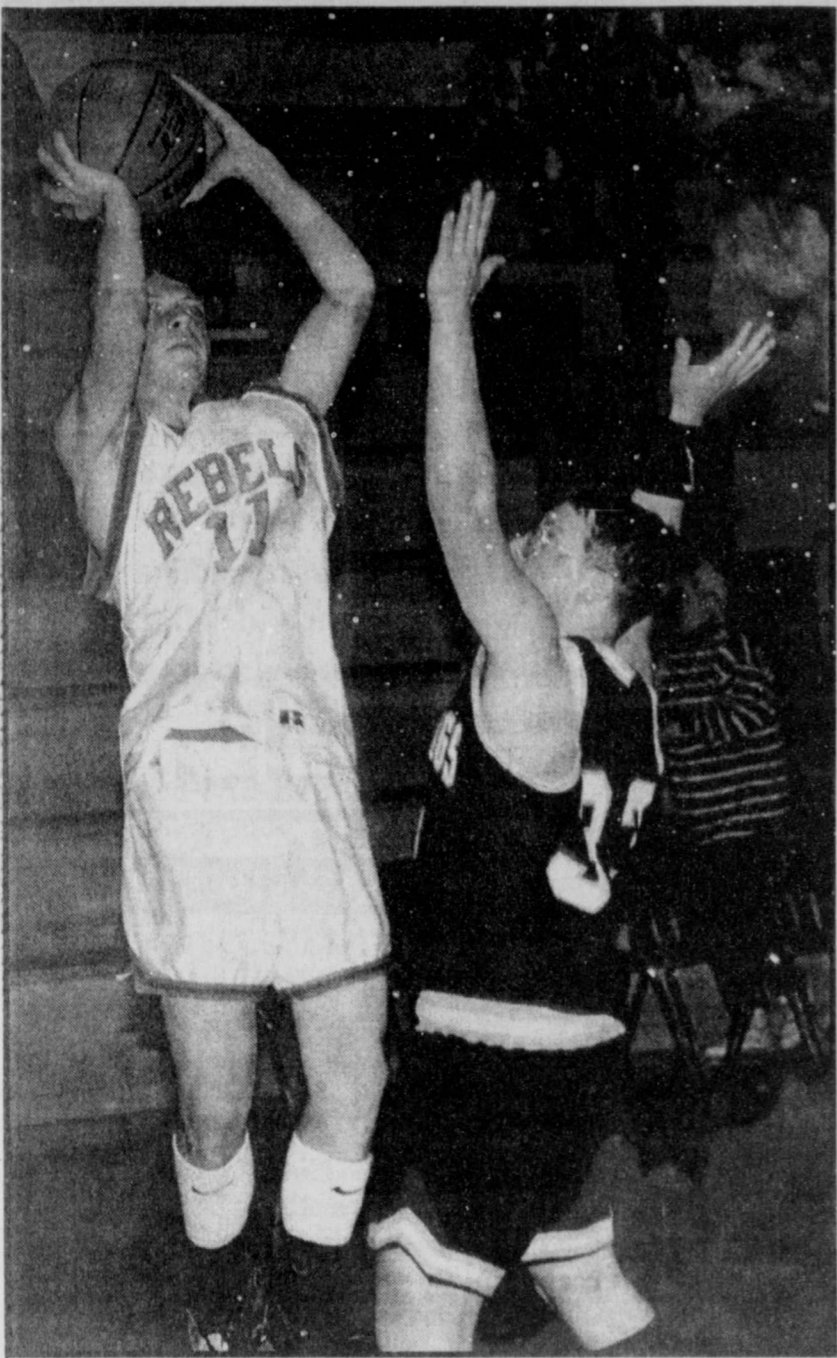

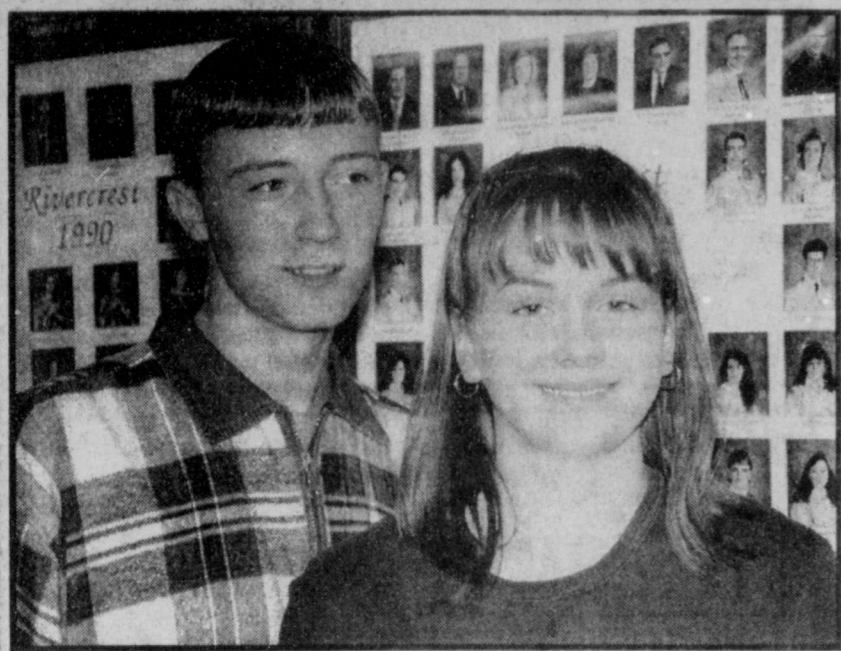

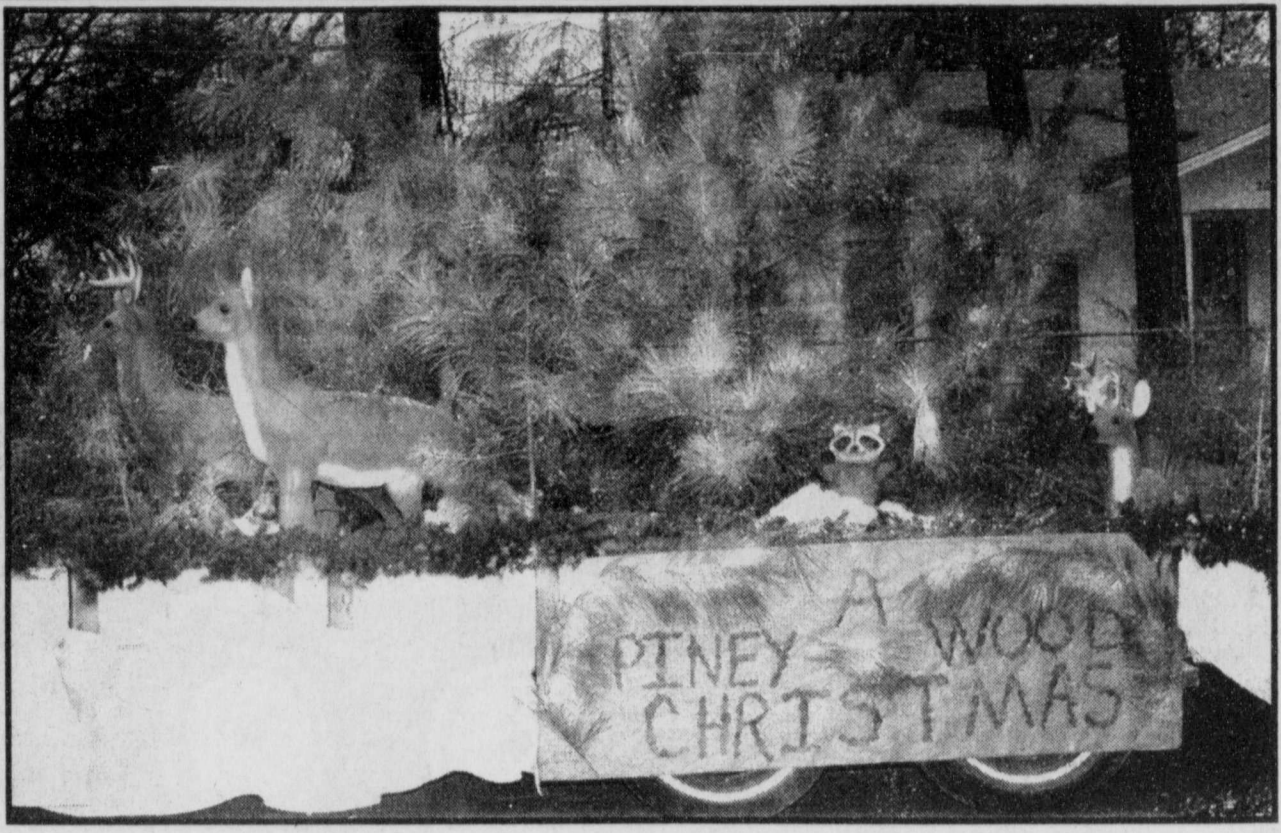



\$1.7 million in refunds remains unclaimed

A total of 3,329 North Texans have a pleasant surprise from the IRS this holiday season.

The IRS has been unable to deliver \$1,727,002 million in tax refunds to North Texas residents. The smallest refund check is \$1. The biggest undeliverable check is \$22,657. Nationwide, nearly 100,000 taxpayers have yet to receive their 1995 refunds which total about \$62.6 million.

These refunds were returned by the post office because they were unable to deliver them. People often move without giving the IRS their new address. Incorrect names and addresses are other common reasons why refunds are returned to the IRS.
