As we approached the turkeys, most of them scattered. One large tom, however, strutted over towards the car.

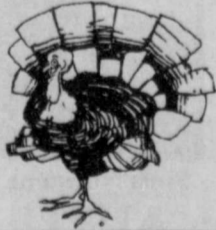
I had the window rolled down, taking pictures, and for no real reason stuck my hand out of the window and wiggled my fingers at him.

Lorie Moose files for County Clerk office

Lorie Taylor Moose, 16-year veteran of the Red River County Clerk's office has filed to succeed retiring clerk Mary Hausler in the March 10 Democratic Primary.

In 1981, Mrs. Moose began working in the clerk's office on a part-time basis. By 1984, she had moved into a full-time position as deputy clerk. "I took a real interest in my job," she said. "And wanted to learn as much as possible about the office. Mary has been a great role model. By watching her, I was able to learn even more."

In the mid-80's, a computer system was implemented and Lorie was directly involved in the upgrade of the record keeping.

The voter registration rolls were added to the computer a year later. For the past eight years, Mrs.

Moose has had the sole responsibility for the criminal court records, attendance at court proceedings and the administration and disposition of cases. This responsibility includes working closely with offices of County Judge, County Attorney, Sheriff and Adult Probation.

A native of Red River County, Lorie Moose lives in Clarksville with her husband, Shawn, and their daughter, Emily, a first grader at Clarksville Elementary School. Mrs. Moose graduated from Clarksville High School in 1981. She is the daughter of Marveline Robbins Langston, who is married to Buddy Langston. Her father is Jimmy Taylor, who is married to Lila K. Taylor. Mrs. Moose and her family are active members of Friendship Baptist Church.

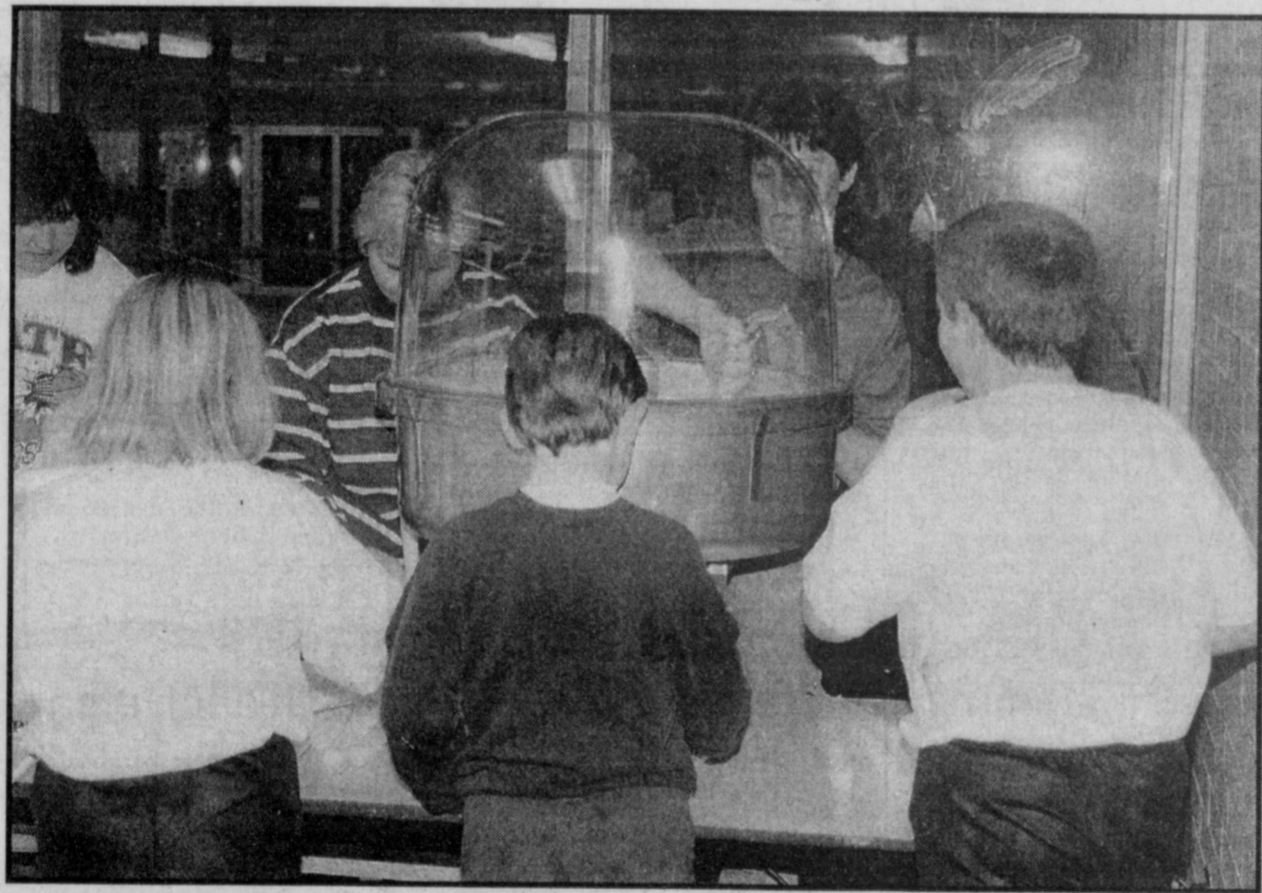

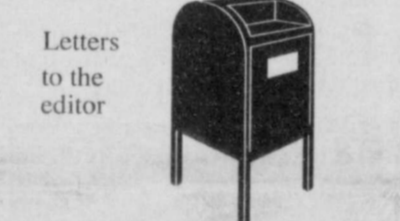

January 29, 1998 "Well-known" Recipes

- Cocoa Cola Cake**
- 2 eggs
 - 2 cups sugar
 - 1 cup Coca-Cola
 - 3 tablespoons cocoa
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 2 cups flour
 - 2 sticks butter
 - 1/2 cup buttermilk
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1-1/2 cup miniature marshmallows
- Combine flour and sugar in mixing bowl. Heat butter, cocoa and Coca-Cola to a boiling point. Cool to lukewarm and pour 1/2 over flour and sugar mixture. Add to remaining 1/2 mixture, buttermilk, soda, eggs and marshmallows. Batter will be thin with marshmallows floating on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes in flat pan.
- Icing:**
- 1/2 cup oleo
 - 1 box powdered sugar
 - 3 tablespoons cocoa
 - 1 cup chopped nuts
- Heat oleo and cocoa to boil; remove from heat and pour over powdered sugar and nuts; mix well.
- 7-Up Cake**
- 1 package yellow cake mix
 - 1/2 cup oil
 - 1 box pineapple instant pudding
 - 2 eggs
- Mix ingredients and beat until fluffy. Add one 10-ounce bottle of 7-Up. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes.
- Icing:**
- 2 eggs-beaten
 - 1 stick butter
 - 1-1/2 tablespoon flour
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1 cup crushed pineapple
- Mix above and cook slowly until thick. Add 1 cup coconut and frost while warm.
- Heath Bar Cake**
- 2 cups brown sugar
 - 1/2 cup butter
 - 1 cup milk
 - 2 cups flour

- 1 egg-beaten
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
 - 6 frozen Heath Bars-crushed
- Mix together brown sugar and flour. Cut in butter until it looks like cornmeal. Measure out 1 cup of mixture and set aside. Add the rest to the remaining mixture. Beat well and pour into greased and floured 9x13x2 inch pan. Spread with topping of crushed candy bars. Blend candy with 1/2 cup broken pecans and 1 cup reserved crumb mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes.
- Mountain Dew salad**
- 2 small packages lemon jello
 - 1-1/2 cup Mountain Dew
 - 1 medium Cool Whip
 - 1 cup milk
 - 1/2 cup pineapple juice
 - 2 diced bananas
 - 1 small cursh pineapple-drained
 - 1 small lemon instant pudding
 - 2 cups mini-marshmallows
- Dissolve jello in 2-1/2 cups water. Add Mountain Dew, pineapple, bananas and marshmallows. Top with mixed pudding and milk. Fold in Cool Whip and spread over jello mixture.
- Rice Krispies Casserole**
- 4 cups Rice Krispies
 - 2 pounds sausage
 - 1 medium onion-chopped
 - 1 stick sharp cheddar-grated
 - 1-1/2 cup cooked rice
 - 4 beaten eggs
 - 2 cans mushroom soup
- Layer cereal, browned sausage and onions, cooked rice and cheese. Mix eggs and soup and pour over top of layered ingredients. Sprinkle top with cereal. Bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes.

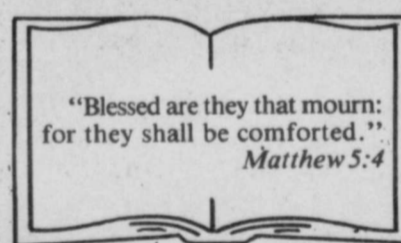

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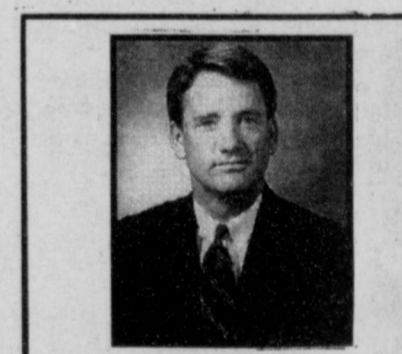

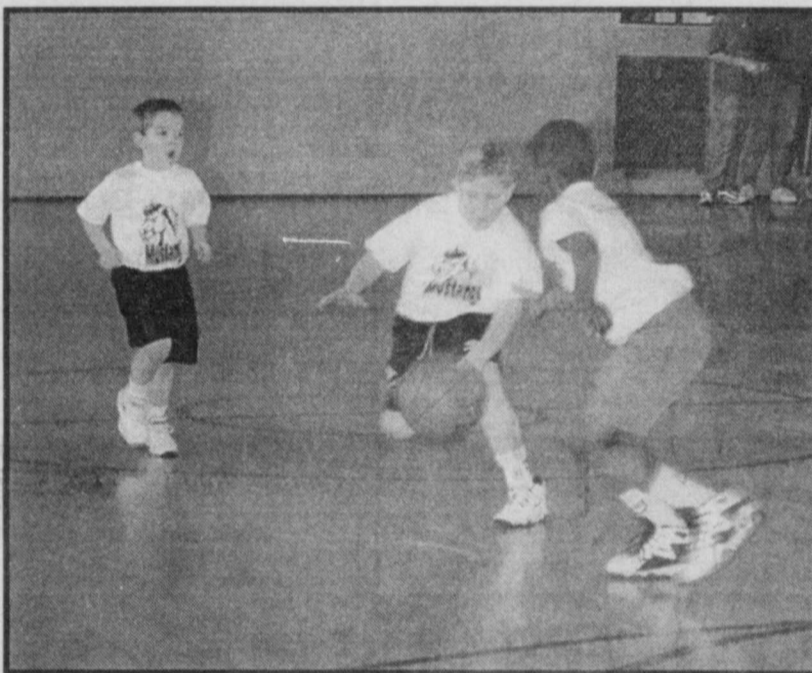
The quintet plays swing era music made popular by Count Basie, Fats Waller, Benny Goodman, Duke Ellington, Earl Hines and others.

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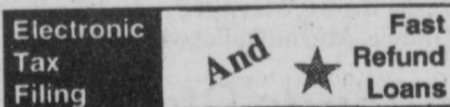

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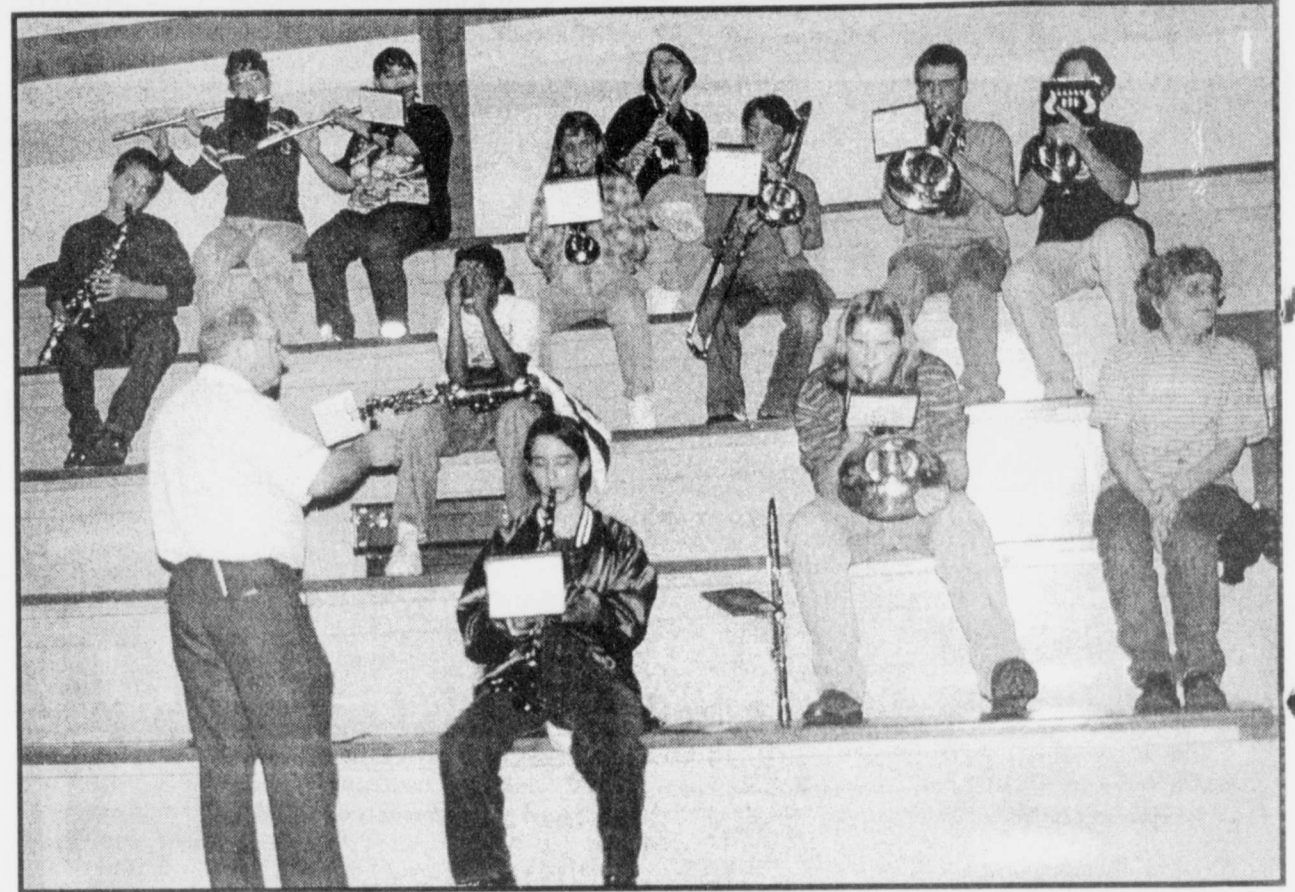

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Red River County grand jury returns 22 indictments

The Red River County grand jury returned 22 indictments Thursday, January 22.

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

The last legislature passed several laws which address problems which were not covered sufficiently by prior law. One of these areas is a growing problem statewide with graffiti. The new law lets out a criminal offense for such actions. The law is outlined as follows:

1. A person commits an offense:
 1. If with aerosol paint or an indelible marker.
 2. Without the consent of the owner.
 3. A person intentionally or knowingly makes markings, including inscription, slogans, drawings or paintings on property of the owner.

The penalty for this crime is based on the amount of damage:

- Loss of less than \$500 is a Class B misdemeanor which carries a penalty of up to six months in jail and up to a \$2,000 fine.
- Loss of \$400 or more but less than \$1,500 is a Class A misdemeanor which carries a penalty of up to one year in jail and up to a \$4,000 fine.
- Loss of \$1,500 or more but less than \$20,000 is a State Jail Felony which carries a penalty of up to two years in a state jail facility, such as the unit in Bonham, and up to a \$10,000 fine.

If the marking is made on a place or worship or human burial, a public monument, or a community center that provides medical, social or educational programs and the amount of loss to property is less than \$20,000, it is also a State Jail Felony.



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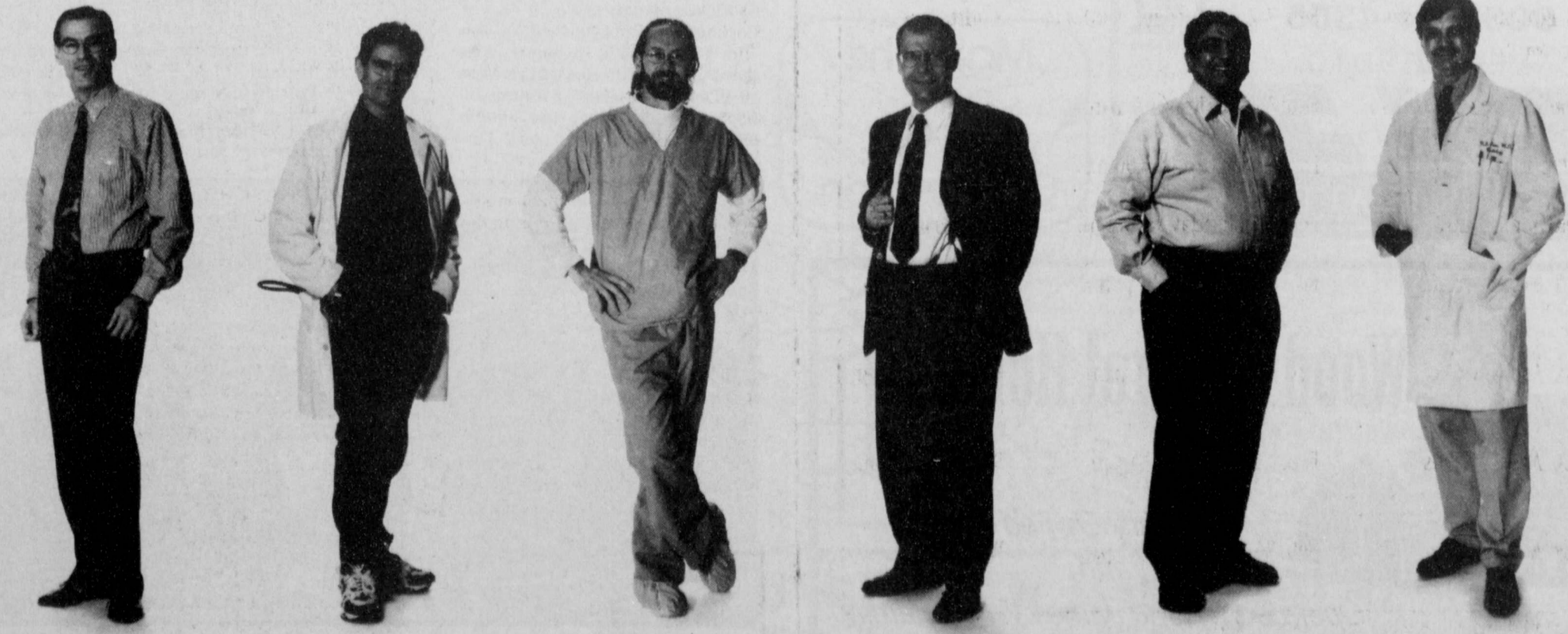
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
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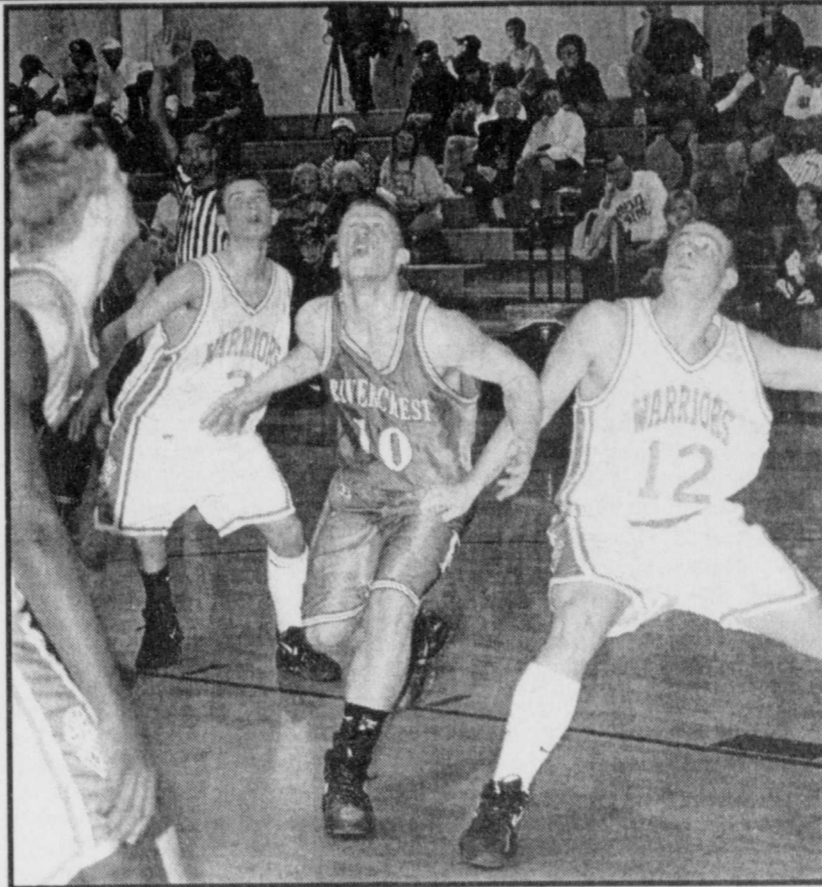

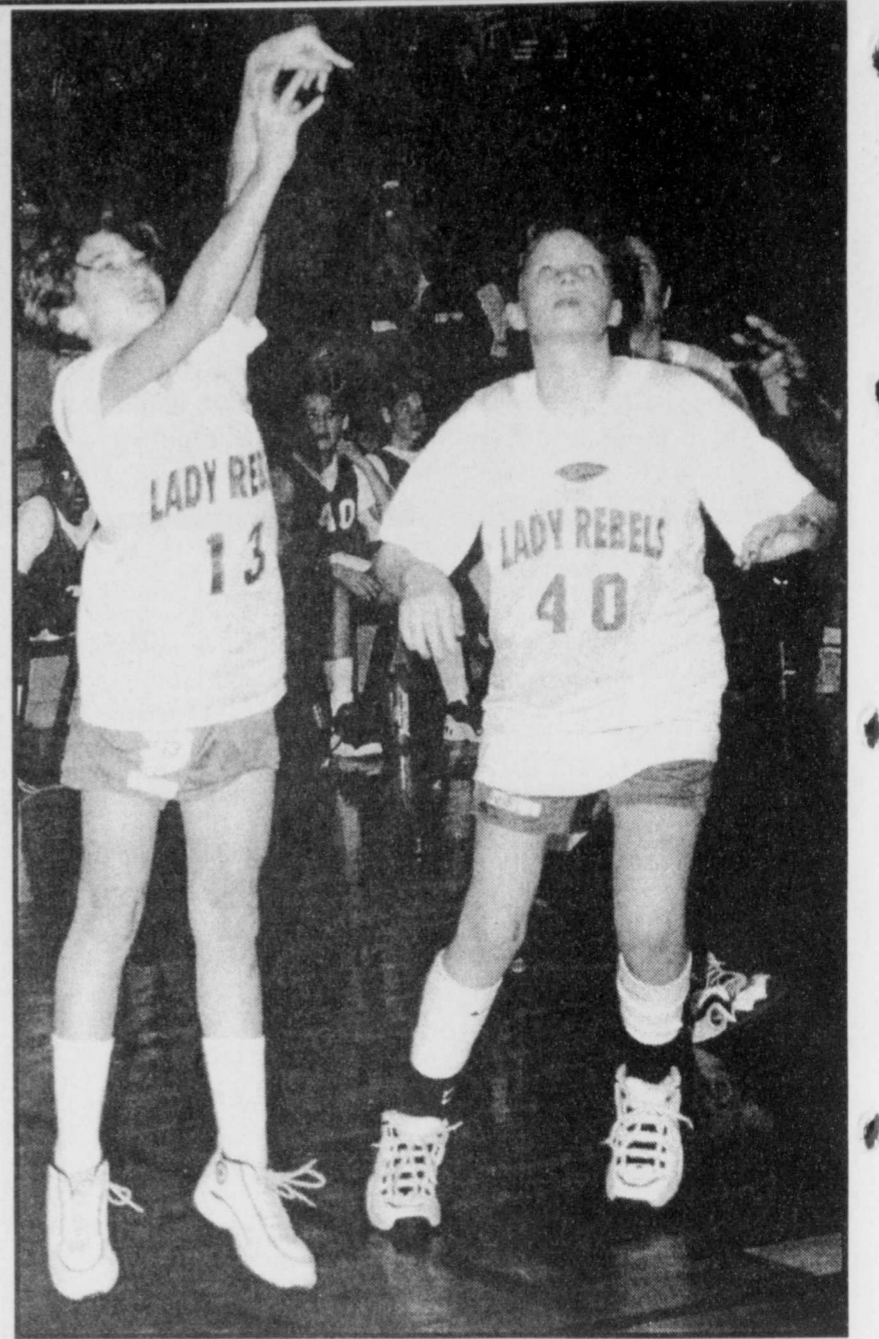

Why is the census of agriculture important?

By now, all farmers and ranchers in Texas and across the U.S. should have received a report form for the 1997 Census of Agriculture. The Census takes place only once every 5 years and serves as the nation's only uniform, comprehensive information source on agricultural production, inventories, sales and expenses for all stages and counties.

Census of Agriculture data affect virtually all farmers and ranchers, either directly or indirectly. Census data are used by a great variety of people and businesses for many purposes.

* Farm organizations use the results to develop farm programs and policies.

* Agribusiness use Census of Agriculture data to identify sales territories and the best locations for retail outlets.

* Census data are often used by local planning councils to document the value of agriculture to the area and to protect agricultural interests in rural areas.

* Cooperatives use Census data to determine where facilities should be located to serve agriculture most effectively.

* Farmers and ranchers use the data to spot trends that will help them decide which crops to grow or livestock to raise.

* Congress uses the information to develop or change farm legislation.

* U.S. Department of Agriculture uses the information to establish programs and determine eligibility for those programs.

For those with a stake in agriculture, the Census is the most comprehensive source of information on farmland use, kinds and acreage of crops harvested, value of products sold, acres treated with fertilizers and pesticides, number and types of livestock raised, cost of fuels and energy consumed. Financial data generated by the Census include interest expenses, value of machinery and equipment, and farm related income. The 1997 Census of Agriculture also collects data about direct sales, number of hired workers, and the number of injuries and deaths that occurred on the farm.

Because of the importance of agriculture to our nation, Title 7 of the U.S. Code requires farmers and ranchers to answer the Census of Agriculture. This same law protects the privacy of the individual responses. Completed Census forms are confidential. They may be seen only by National Agricultural Statistics Service employees and may be used only for statistical purposes. The individual producer's copy is immune from legal processes. Any individual can obtain a copy of his/her report upon request.

The Census of Agriculture final results will begin to be published in spring of 1999. The results will be available in electronic form as well as in printed form. They can also be found in many depository libraries. To obtain more information about

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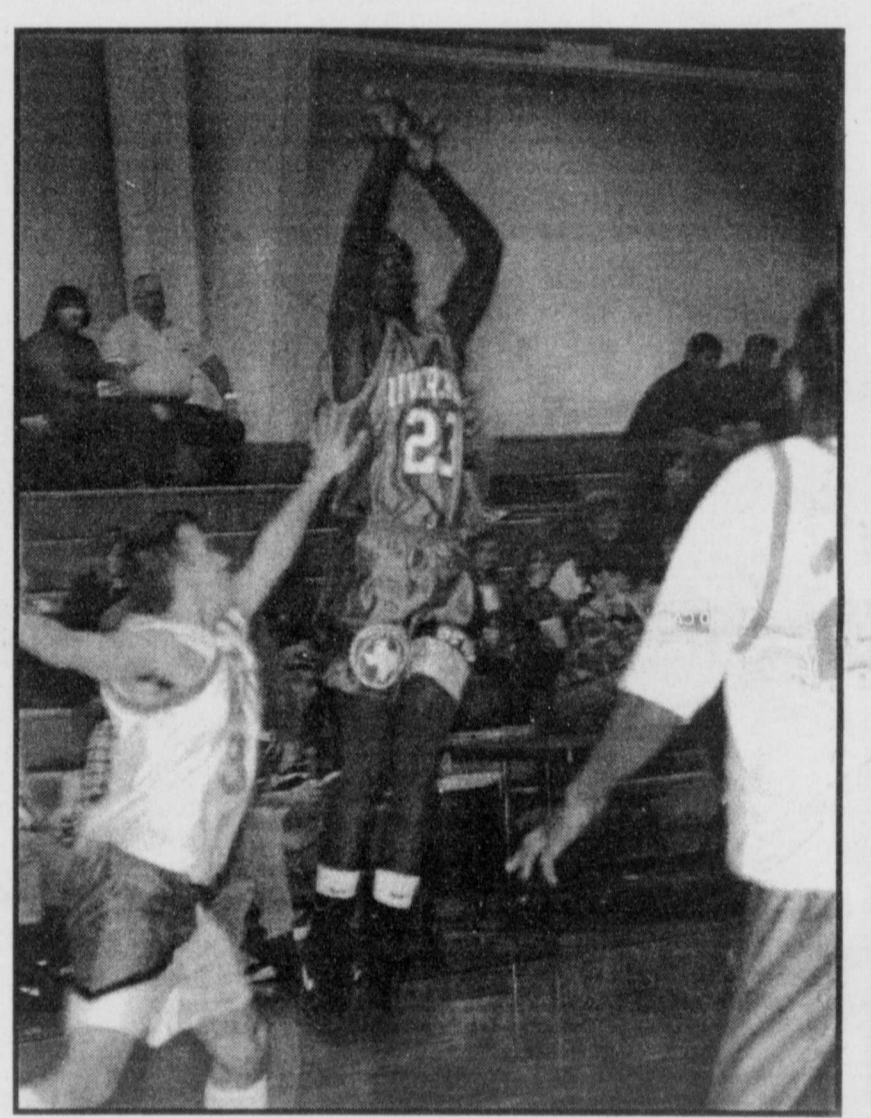
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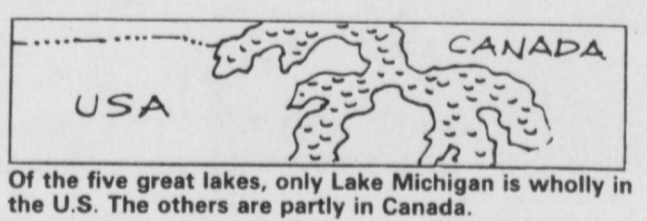

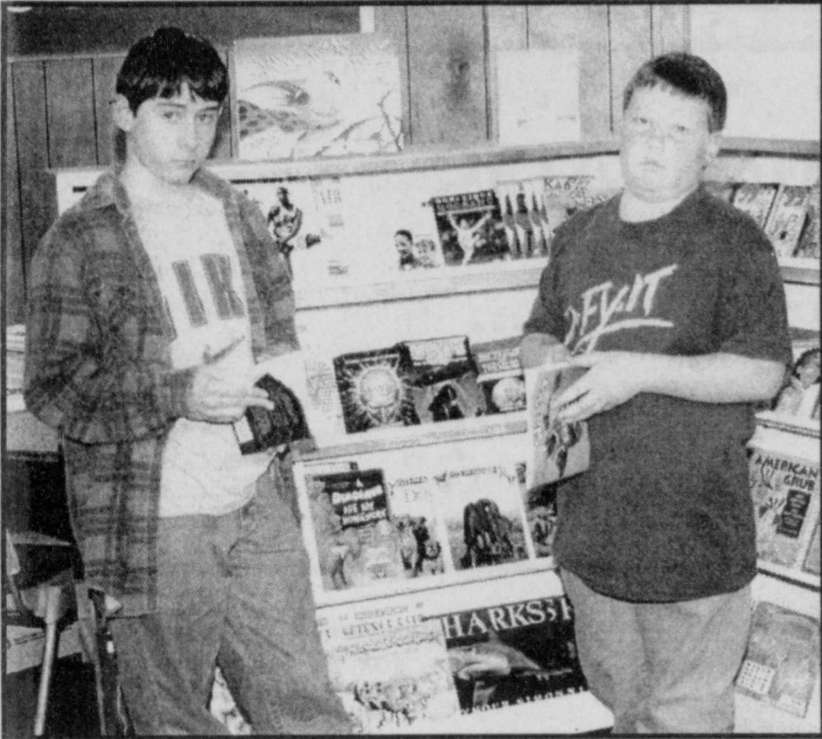

Fifty Years Ago This Week

We appointed Mac Varley to serve on the Red River Appraisal Board, approved a web page on the Internet for Red River County, approved transferring the receipt of county monies from the clerk's office to the treasurer's office and approved adopting two public roads as county roads in precinct 3.
