Stakeholders hear proposals about four lanes through or around towns

At a stake holders meeting Tuesday night at the Rivercrest High School Auditorium in Johntown a capacity audience discussed a 137 million dollar project to build a four lane highway from Paris to Mt. Pleasant

Representatives of Dannenbaum Engineering Corporation first discussed the types of lanes to be built and the process of surveying areas along present U.S. 271. The new lanes proposed are to be built in the same style of surface that the present U.S. 271 is built of.

The project will be built in five phases.

The first phase will be advance planning and environmental study and development of the right of way. This could take from 2 to 2 1/2 years to complete.

Phase 2 will be the appraisal and catn take up to 2 years.

Phase 3 will involve funding for the project which was set at 137 million two years ago.

Although some funding is available now for White Oak, Ripley and Mustang Creek and Sulphur River bridges.

Phase 4 will involve developing contracts to build.

Phase 5 will be the actual work on the project.

Projection of the start date for the project can be as long as five years from now.

The first phase of the project will start at Paris on the south side of the city with a six to seven million dollar interchange. The next section would be built from Paris to Pattonville at a projected cost of 9-11 million dollars.

At Deport, Bogata and Talco relief routes around the cities are being

According to Steve Ekstrom, the four lanes can be located anywhere between these boundaries.

At Bogata and Talco the areas from north to south of the cities form a loop on both north and south and come together on he east side to join the presently existing U.S. 271. Again, any area between the north and south boundaries could be where the four lane routing could actually be built.

According to Ekstrom, plans are to keep as much of the existing road in use as much as possible. If a relief route is used around any of the cities between Paris and Mt. Pleasant, the old part of US 271 will become a business U.S. 271 and will be state maintained.

The need for a four lane highway on US 271 is cited to relieve the traffic load on Interstate 45. Officials say that I-45 at the present time is over loaded with traffic.

A question and answer session was held after a short recess. Many landowners were concerned about entrance, exits, crossings and bridges along the route.

Market values and distance of highways to property lines were discussed as well.

Many land and home owners didn't receive a right of entry from Dannenbaum Engineering Corp., Hayter Engineering, Inc. Hicks and Company and Aerial Data Service Inc., they said.

Forms were handed out to those present who did not receive one in the mail prior to the meeting. The forms are needed so that the surveyors can enter property in the proposed areas for a large X to be placed at approximately 1800 foot intervals. Aerial photos will be made in December after the foliage has dropped.



August has been another good month for us on our road work. We jumped around a little getting some small jobs done that needed to be done. We were able to pull a few more ditches and also get a few roads trimmed back with our tree trimmer. We've also started another long project between Cuthand and Johntown. Hopefully we can get these ditches pulled and the road rock before the rain begins. It's been a long time since these ditches were pulled, and they needed it badly in some places.

This month we hauled 25 loads of railroad rock and 11 loads of red rock out on the roads. We also hauled 2 loads of railroad rock to the yard and 6 small loads off the yard. We also installed 2 culverts and began some work on our grant road at Rosalie. We plan to put the top on it next summer.

Lemon Squares l cup all-purpose flour 1/3 cup confectioner's sugar 1/3 cup butter or margarine l cup sugar

2 tablespoons all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt 3 egg whites-lightly beaten 1-1/2 teaspoons grated lemon rind 1/2 cup fresh lemon juice 1/4 teaspoon butter extract

Combine I cup flour and 1/3 cup confectioner's sugar; cut in butter with pastry blender until mixture is crumbly. Press firmly into bottom of lightly greased 11x7 baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until lightly brown. Whish together granulated sugar and next 8 ingredients; pour over prepared crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until filling is set. Cool on wire rack. Cut into sdquares; sprinkle evenly with confectioner's sugar.

Chocolate Swirled Poundcake

4 sticks butter or margarine 3 cups sugar 6 large eggs 4 cups all purpose flour 3/4 cup milk

Beeat butter at medium speed with an electric mixer 2 minutes or until creamy. Gradually add sugar, beating 5-7 minutes. Add eggs, one at a time, beating just until yellow disappears. Add flour to mixture alternately with milk. Mix at low sped until blended after each addition. Stir in vanilla. Combine I cup batter and chocolate syrup, stirring until blended. Divide remaining batter in half; pour I half into prepared tube pan. Spoon half of chocolate batter on top; repeat layers. Gently swirl batter with knife. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 35 minutes.

Roll a rolling pin over tops of sections to cut dough edges. Bake at 450 degrees for 8 minutes. Cool. Combine peanut butter and confectioners sugar. Spread evenly over tart shells. Combine granulated sugar, cornstarch and salt in medium pan, stirring well. Whisk in egg yolks, milk and half and half. Cook over medium heat, whisking constantly, until thickened. Remove mixture from heat and stir in butter and vanilla. Pour evenly into tart shells and chill. Top with whipped cream and chopped peanuts.

Cherry Cheesecake Bars 2 cups all-purpose flour 1-1/2 cup uncooked quick oats 3/4 cup firm; ly packed brown sugar 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1-8 ounce cream cheese-softened l can sweetened condensed milk 1/4 teaspoon almond extract l can cherry fruit filling

Line 13x9 pan with aluminum and lightly grease. Combine first 4 ingredients in a large bowl, stirring until mixture is crumbly. 
