## Bogata council hears from citizens, makes decisions

The Bogata City Council met to to Hardy Stewardson, D.V.M. They hear from citizens and discuss several items of business Monday night, September 15th.

A number of citizens attended the

A.D. Stephenson spoke, presenting his views on several issues. The council heard staff reports from

Wendall Davis and Charles Clegg. In new business they approved a donation by Wendell Reeder of a water truck for the volunteer fire de-

The council discussed the purchase of an air conditioner and heater for the portable building that serves as the Police Department. This was tabled until they can obtain bids.

They discussed the importance of putting up house numbers on every house in Bogata. This is extremely important to the citizens because of the time it can save in emergency situations. Every citizen is urged to put up house numbers that are at least 3 inches high and preferably reflective. This is a voluntary thing, but the city wants to stress that if anyone has trouble purchasing or installing these numbers they can call city hall. The city or fire department is willing to help anyone who has a need for help install these letters. Anyone who is not sure of their house number can call city hall and verify it.

The council discussed the repair or replacement of the pump unit on the number 6 well and electrical work at the tank lot. This was tabled until further estimates can be obtained.

They also voted not to move the city council meetings to the community center.

All city employees were authorized to do animal control work when the regular animal control officers were unavailable.

At this time if animals have any identification on them which provides a clue to their ownership the animal control officers are attempt ing to take them to their owners and ask them to please confine the animal as stipulated by the law. If an animal is taken in they are taken to Clarksville

are kept for 72 hours. An owner may claim their animal by paying the \$5 per day boarding fee. That is the only charge unless the animal is not vaccinated for rabies. They must pay the \$9 vaccination fee in addition to the boarding fee in that case.

The council voted to donate \$11,750 to the fire department to purchase needed supplies and equipment to assist the firefighters in doing their duties.

They also agreed to pay \$156,000 into a fire truck fund to assist in the

purchase of a new fire truck. Citizens are also being asked to make a \$2 a month voluntary contribution on their water bills to help with the purchase of a new fire truck If the city gets a new truck it should save citizens about 15% on their insurance rates each year. This savings should be substantially more than the \$24 per year donation. Without this new truck the insurance rates

The council then went into executive session. They discussed and evaluated city employees and salaries for 1999.

They have decided to make Robert Lewis a full time employee and give him a 25 cent per hour raise as soon as he can show proof of possessing a Texas Drivers License. Mr. Lewis currently has a Tennessee Drivers


The council also voted unanimously to not renew the contract of Police Officer Tiffany Marian . She will be given one week severance

They also voted to place an ad in the newspaper to hire a full time assistance secretary/court clerk.

They discussed having a city employee drug testing policy. It was tabled for further discussion.

They discussed the budget and final approval of the budget will be Monday, September 21st.

They also discussed remodeling the lobby and secretaries office. This was tabled to await estimates.







This week's cook comes from the County Extension Office of Lamar County in Paris. They sent us some recipes on soups. Since the weather has cooled off some and we have gotten that much needed rain, we will use them this week.

The County Extension Office is a wealth of information available to everyone. They can answer your questions ranging anywhere from what types of trees you have or which ones are best suited for this area to testing your soils for needed fertilize or nutrients.

The office also has available, many tips for the homemaker and busy career woman. They have many brochures available for many types of activites along with having recipes and handy tips for the home.

Our soup recipes this week can be made ahead of time and frozen for your convenience for future use. A soup is any combination of vegetables, meat or fish cooked inliquid. It may be thick (like gumbo), smooth (like a bisqe) or chunky (like a chowder or houillabaisse). Though most

soups are hot, some like vichyssoise and many fruit soups are served cold. Soups are often garnished with flavor enhancers such as croutons, grated or cubed cheese or sour cream. They can be served as a firs course or as a meal, in which case they are often accompanied by a sandwich or

Potato Soup-everyone loves potato soup and here is just another version to try with ahint of ham

French Onion Soup-browned onions and simmering will make this a taste treat for any soup lover!

Southwest-Style Bean Soup with Avacado Salsa -kidney beans prepared with a flavoring of several spices to create a mixture that is great for a cool evening in front of the

television during footballs season. Avacado Salsa-this recipe uses chunked vegetables mixed together and not mashed or blended to top the Southwest Soup above.

#### Potato Soup

3 tablespoons butter 3 onions-chopped pounds baking potatoes peeled, quartered & cut into 1/4" slices)

3 cups chicken stock -1/2 cup water 1-1/2 teaspoon salt

6 ounces baked ham-diced 4 scallions-including greens(thin slices)

1-1/2 cup cream

1/4 teaspoon fresh-ground pepper 1/3 cup chopped fresh parsley

In large pot, melt butter over moderately low heat. Add onions and cook, stirring occasionally until translucent, about 5 minutes.

Add potatoes, stock, water and salt and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, until potatoes are tender, about 20 minutes. Add ham and scallions and cook until potatoes are very soft, about 10 minutes. Add cream, pepper and parsley and bring to just simmer, stir-

#### French Onion Soup

2 tablespoons butter 3 tablespoons cooking oil pounds onion-(4) cut into thin slices 2-1/2 teaspoons salt 3 tablespoons flour

/2 cup red wine 2 quarts beef stock 1/2 teaspoons dried thyme

/2 teaspoon fresh-ground black pepper 5-1/2 thick slices French bread

/2 pound Gruyere cheese-cut thin slices In large pot, melt butter with 2 tablepoons of oil over low heat. Add onions and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Cover and cook, stirring occasionally, until the onions are very soft for about 20 minutes. Raise the heat to moderate and cook, stirring until onions are a rich brown for about 10 minutes. Be careful that the onions don't ourn. Add flour and cook, stirring about 2 minutes. Add wine and scrape bottom of pot to dislodge brown bits. Add stock, thyme and remaining salt. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer, partially covered 40 minutes. Add brandy and pepper to soup. Meanwhile, trim bread to fit bowls. Heat broiler. Place bread on baking sheet and brush both sides with remaining oil. Broil both sides until brown. Heat oven to 375 degrees. Place

6 oven-proof bowls on baking sheet.

Divide soup among bowls. Float toasted

bread on soup and top with cheese. Bake

soup until cheese is bubbling and golden

Southwest-style Bean Soup w/

Avacado Salsa 3/4 pound dried red kidney beans 1/3 pound bacon-cut crosswise in thin

I chopped onion 3 ribs celery-chopped 3 carrots-chopped

3 cloves garlic-chopped 3/4 teaspoon dried thyme 2-1/2 tablespoons ground cumin 1-1/2 teaspoon dried oregano

I-I/2 tablespoons tomato paste 3 quarts chicken stock I bay leaf 1-1/2 teaspoon salt

3/4 teaspoon fresh-ground black peppinch cayenne pepper

1/2 cup sour cream 1-1/2 cup Avacado Salsa

Soak beans overnight in water to cover at least 2 inches. Drain. In large pot, cook bacon crisp. Add onions, celery, carrots, garlic, thyme, cumin and oregano. Cook, stirring occasionally until onions are translucent, about 5 minutes. Stir in tomato paste. Add beans, stock and bay leaf. Bring to boil Reduce heat and simmer, partially covered, about I hour. Add salt and simmer until beans are very tender, about 15 minutes longer. Discard bay leaf. Add the black pepper and cayenne. Serve topped with the sour cream and salsa.

Mrs. Prince was born November 30, 1946 in Carlsbad, NM, the daughter of Walter Ollie and Leila Boyd




