And, within the space of 45 minutes no less than four people stopped to offer assistance.

I appreciate it. I appreciate it more than they will ever know. If there had been a problem I would have definitely taken them up on their offers.

But would someone please explain why it never, ever comes about that help is there when you don't need it...but when you do need help the road is empty, and friends are somewhere far, far way!

Murphy's law again! And there is no denying that it exists!

City Council hears various reports

The Bogata City Council met in regular session Monday, January 11 at 7 p.m. Four council members attended, as well as six employees and approximately 11 guests. Minutes of previous meeting were approved, also bills and final water bill accounts.

Lanny Walker of Arnold, Walker, Arnold and Co., P.C. gave a report on the audit. The council voted to accept the audit report.

Wendell Davis reported 8 main leaks, 6 sewer stops, repainting park sign, 4 locates by Lone Star Gas, one by GTE, rerouting chlorine feed line, rewiring of motor on water pump at tank lot by Hale Electric, installing 2 new cutoffs to meter, one water/sewer tap on N. Douglas, and other miscellaneous items.

Wyatt Bush reported 15 dogs picked up in the past month, of which 8 were returned or picked up by owners.

Charles Clegg, Police Chief, reported 62 traffic stops with 14 citations issued; one threat of suicide (unfounded); 2 service calls; 1 welfare call; 2 prowler calls; 1 suspicious person call; 2 juvenile truants escorted to school; 3 minor accidents; 5 trespass warnings; 5 reports of criminal mischief; 1 disorderly conduct; 3 disturbances; 1 family disturbance; 2 weapons violations; 1 warrant served; 1 arrest clearing burglary of a habitation and 1 disturbance with bodily injury, no charge.

Nelda Talley, Municipal Court Clerk, reported 19 docket entries, 5 failure to appear notices to be sent; 1 parent summons and a total of \$605 collected.

Council voted that all employees in the office take one hour lunch breaks and to stagger the lunch hours and keep the office open during noon.

Council voted to have street lights installed in the middle of the block between S. Bryson and S. Main on 5th SE, one on the corner of 3rd NE and N. St. John, one on the corner of 2nd SW and Patterson, and one in the middle of 2nd SW between S. Howison and Patterson.

Merle Hughes was recommended by the Mayor to fill the seat vacated by James L. Lawson, who recently

resigned due to moving out of town. Council voted to approve the Mayor's recommendation.

Council voted to purchase another computer. They tabled action on State TxDOT land use. Larry Evans was named Emergency Management Person. He will work with Charlie Clegg and Wendell Davis as an emergency coordinator.

Council voted to take bids on selling a 1969 Ford Fire Truck. They voted to have TVT do the work on extending the Fire Department metal building at a cost of \$1950.00.

They approved an Ordinance appointing Nelda Talley to Municipal Court Clerk, and they approved the Police Department Police Handbook. Action in junked vehicle ordinance violations was tabled until the next meeting. Council went into executive Session at 8:40 p.m. and reconvened in regular session at 8:54 p.m., at which they time voted to raise Freddy Booker and Nelda Talley's salaries.

The meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

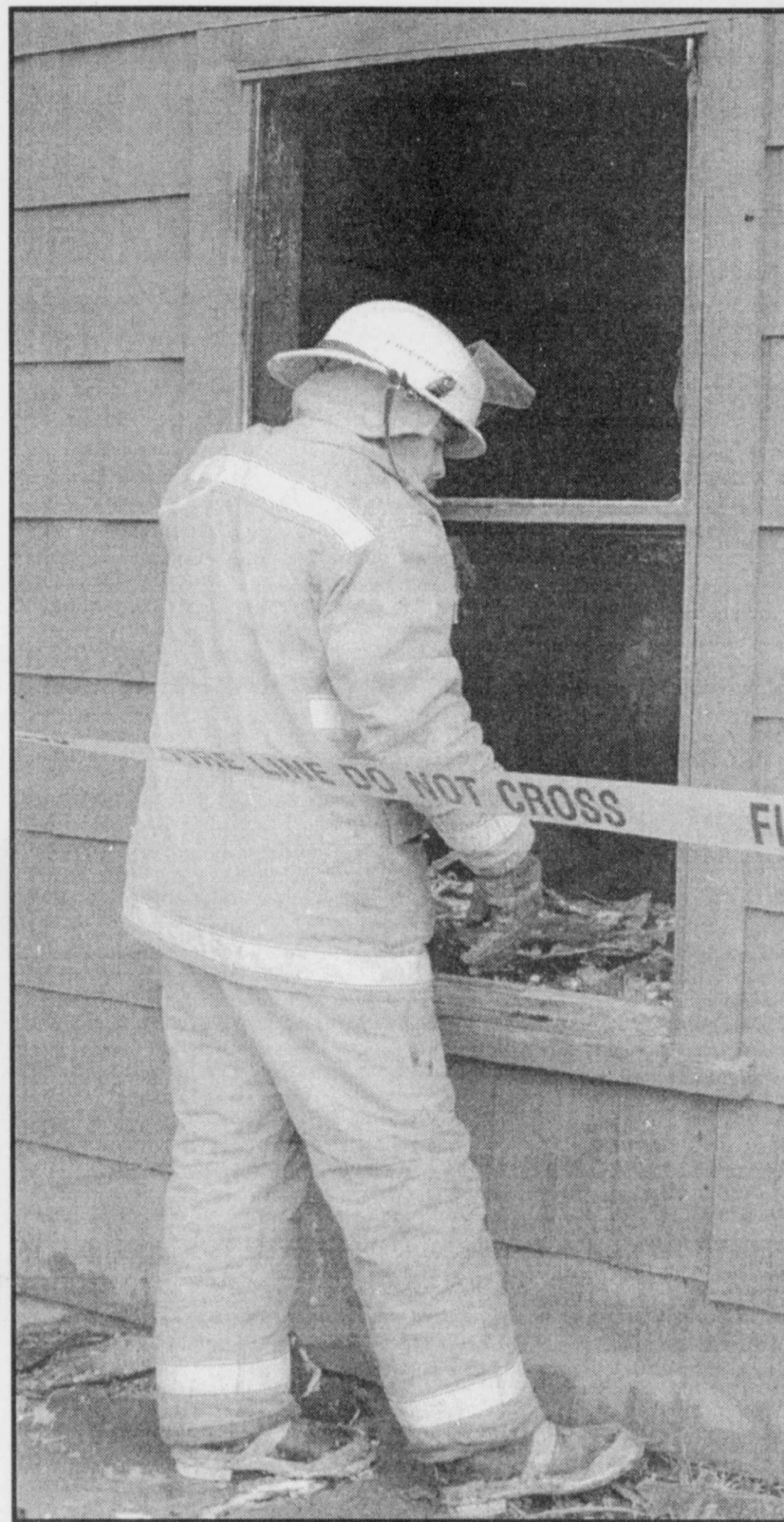
Ms. Furch is a first grade teacher and has been at Glen Park for fourteen years now.

Eudy receives President's Award

Ricky Eudy, Texas Utilities Railroad Electrician, received his company's highest honor, the President's Lifesaving Award, on January 4 at a reception attended by co-workers, friends and family.

Eudy's award followed an accident that happened one year earlier where Eudy and his wife Deena, formerly of Cuthand, now of Mt. Pleasant, were visiting his family when he was led to what he thought was a rumble of thunder.

The sound turned out to be an overturned car with flames spreading from its engine compartment. Two of the three occupants, a man and woman in the front, survived. A third woman was fatally injured on impact. All were trapped in the vehicle.

John Henry, conscious and coherent, was trapped on the passenger side. Peggy Preston, bleeding and critically injured with numerous fractures, hung from her seatbelt on the passenger side, her body pinned in the wreckate, her face in oil dirt.

Finding a gap in the wreckage, Eudy handed his pocket knife in to Mr. Henry, who cut his seatbelt, but his only route of escape was across Miss Preston. With the help of Eudy's

family, they lifted Mr. Henry across Miss Preston.

Eudy, his nephew and a neighbor tried lifting the car by its rear bumper while the others moved into position to help free the trapped woman.

When they couldn't lift the car from above, Eudy crawled beneath it on hands and knees and tried again. He was finally in a position to move her and while his family tended Mr. Henry, he monitored Miss Preston's pulse and breathing until rescue workers arrived.

Eudy graduated from Rivercrest High School in 1969 and began working for TU within the week. He began working with meter checking crews before joining Texas Utilities Mining Company as an electrician's helper in 1976. Today he is a licensed electrician operating the electric trains hauling coal from the mines to the Monticello generating facility.

Trained in first aid, rescue and safety procedure before going out on a job, each year more than 800 local TU employees spend eight hours in safety and first aid refresher courses.

January 14, 1998 Just Recipes!

Tex-Mex Cheesy Potato and Corn Chowder

1 cup chopped celery
1 cup chopped onion
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 carton or 2 cans chicken broth
8 cups peeled and cubed potatoes
1 can whole kernel corn with red and green peppers
1 can chopped green chilies
1 package Pioneer No-Fat Country Gravy mix
2 cups skim milk
4 ounces Mexican Velveeta-1/2" cubes

In large saucepan, cook and stir celery and onion in butter over medium-high heat until tender (about 5 minutes). Add broth; bring to a boil. Add potatoes; cook over low heat for 20-25 minutes or until potatoes are soft, stirring occasionally. Stir in corn and chilies; return to boiling. Dissolve gravy mix in milk; stir in boiling mixture. Add cheese. Cook and stir over low heat until cheese is melted. 6-8 servings.

Parmesan-Green Onion Biscuit Wedges

3 cups Pioneer Low Fat Biscuit and Baking Mix
1/2 cup shredded Parmesan cheese
3 tablespoons finely chopped green onions and chives
2/3 cup skim milk
1/2 cup fat-free peppercorn ranch salad dressing
garlic salt

In large bowl, stir together biscuit and baking mix, cheese and green onions. In 1 cup glass measure, combine milk and salad dressing. Stir into baking mix to form stiff dough. Turn onto surface dusted with additional baking mix. Knead 10 times. Roll dough into circle about 1/2 inch thick. Cut into 12 wedges. Place on baking sheet coated with cooking spray. Sprinkle with garlic salt. Bake at 400 degrees for 12-15 minutes or until golden brown. Makes 12 biscuits.

Mexican Meatball and Salsa Chili

1-1/2 pound ground beef
1/2 cup dry bread crumbs
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 large onion-chopped
2 teaspoons vegetable oil
2-1/2 can Mexican-style tomatoes
1 jar salsa(your taste)
2 teaspoons ground cumin
1 teaspoon chili powder
1 teaspoon finely chopped jalapeno pepper
1 package Pioneer Brown Gravy Mix (not fat or regular)

In large bowl, stir together ground beef, bread crumbs, salt and pepper and shape into 1-inch balls. Place on baking sheet; bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes or until no longer pink. Meanwhile in 4-quart saucepan or Dutch oven, cook and stir onion in oil until tender. Add 2 cups water, tomatoes, salsa, cumin, chili powder and jalapeno pepper; bring to a boil. Dissolve gravy mix in 1/2 cup cool water; stir into boiling mixture. Add meatballs; reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes to combine flavors. 8-10 servings.

Cheesy Ranch Pinwheels

3 cups Pioneer Buttermilk Biscuit and Baking Mix
1 tablespoon chopped fresh cilantro leaves
1 cup skim milk
3 tablespoons prepared ranch salad dressing
1 cup finely shredded Colby-Jack cheese

In large bowl, stir together biscuit and baking mix, cilantro and milk to form a stiff dough. Turn out onto surface dusting with additional biscuit and baking mix. Knead 10 times. Roll dough into rectangle about 1/2 inch thick. Spread with salad dressing; sprinkle with cheese. Beginning with long side, roll up like a jelly roll. Cut into 1/2-3/4 inch slices; place on baking sheet coated with cooking spray. Bake at 400 degrees for 10-12 minutes or until biscuits are golden brown. Makes 12-14 biscuits.

No-Fail Divinity

4 cups sugar
1 cup light Karo syrup
3/4 cup water
1/8 teaspoon salt
3 egg whites
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Combine syrup, sugar, water, and salt in a 2-quart casserole. Cook in microwave 20 minutes or until candy thermometer reads 260 degrees. Stir every 5 minutes during cooking time. While syrup cooks, beat egg whites until very stiff. Gradually pour hot syrup over egg whites and continue beating at a high speed until mixture is thick and candy starts to lose its gloss. (Usually about 12 minutes). Add vanilla and nuts to candy and drop by spoonfuls onto wax paper. Makes approximately 7 dozen pieces.

Large and Luscious Chocolate Cookies

1 cup granulated sugar
1 cup packed dark brown sugar
1/2 cup butter-softened
1/2 cup margarine-softened
2 large eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips, melted and cooled at room temperature
3-1/3 cup Pioneer Buttermilk Baking Mix
2 cups large semi-sweet or milk chocolate chips or chunks
1 cup white chocolate chips

In large mixer bowl, beat sugars, butter and margarine until creamy, about 3 minutes. Add eggs and vanilla; beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla; beat until light and fluffy. Mix in melted semi-sweet chocolate. Add baking mix; beat on low speed until blended. Mix in large chips. Chill dough for at least 1 hour. Do not overbake. Cool in pan for 10 minutes. Lift foil with cookie to wire rack and cool completely. Repeat with remaining cookie dough. Melt white chocolate and use to decorate as desired.



IN A PINCH?

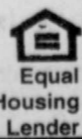

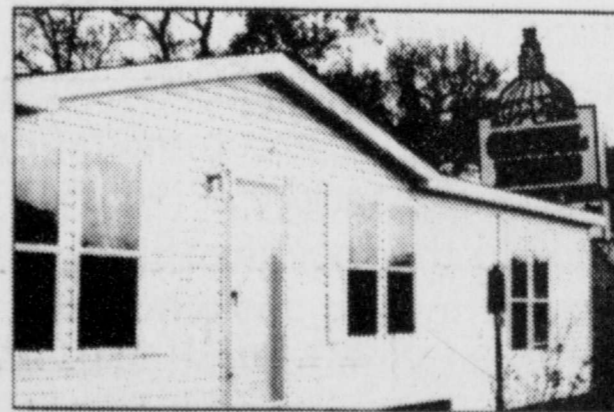

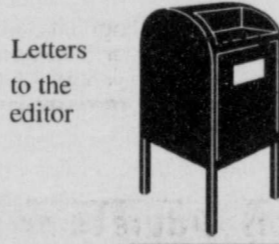

the boards on rebounds and held the Lady Rebs to 6 points. Score 30-15 Honey Grove.

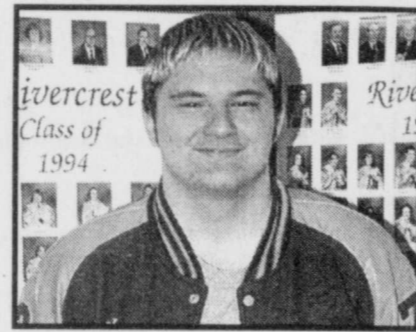

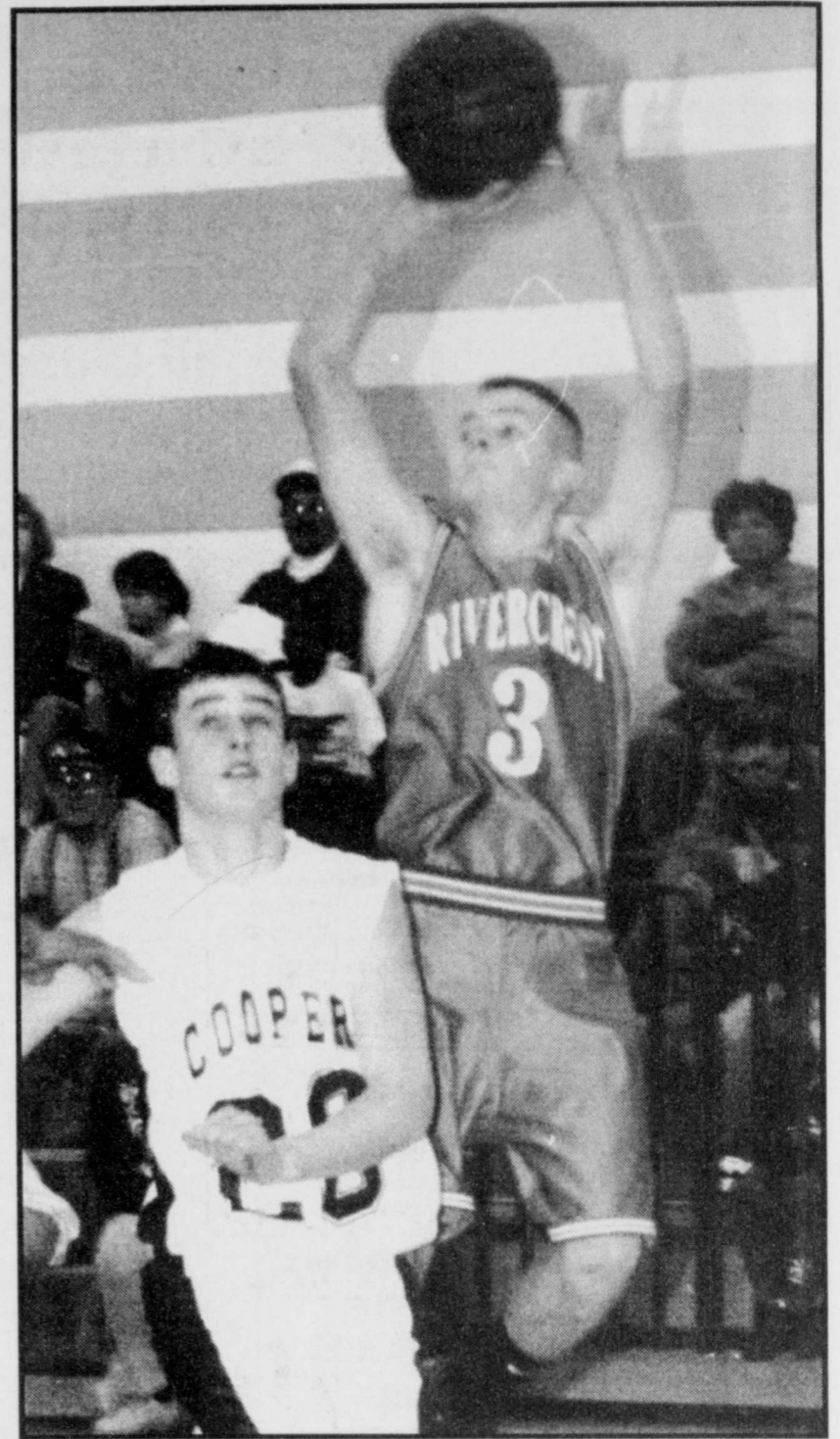
