All members are encouraged to attend since there is much business which needs to be discussed.

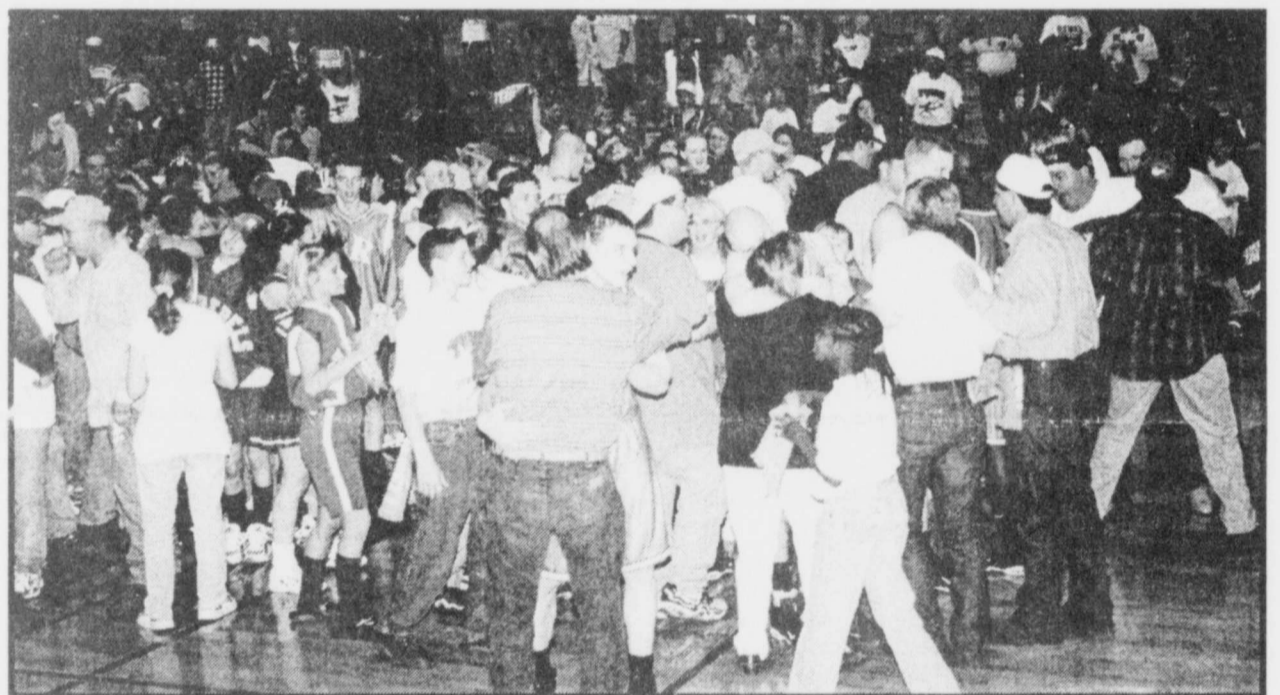
Methodist youth plan bake sale

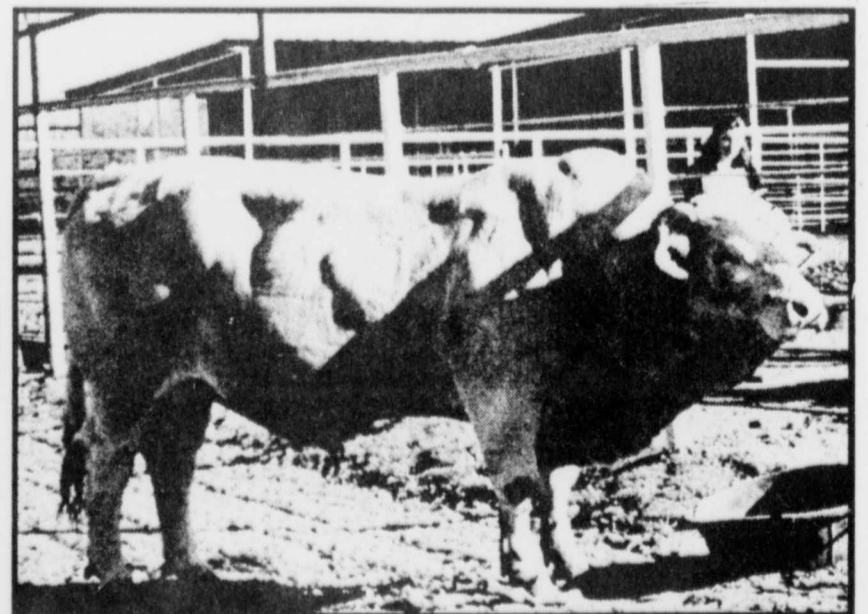
First Baptist G.A.s to hold Spaghetti luncheon

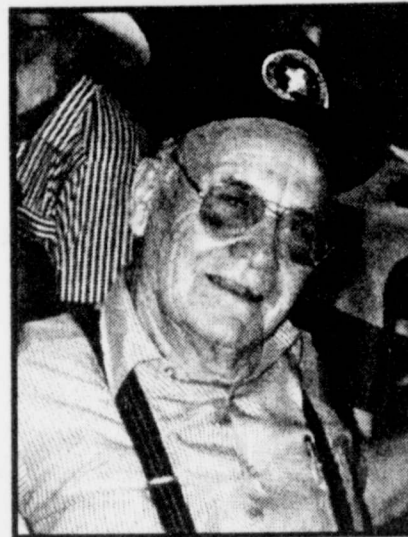
Elizabeth B. Davis dies February 24

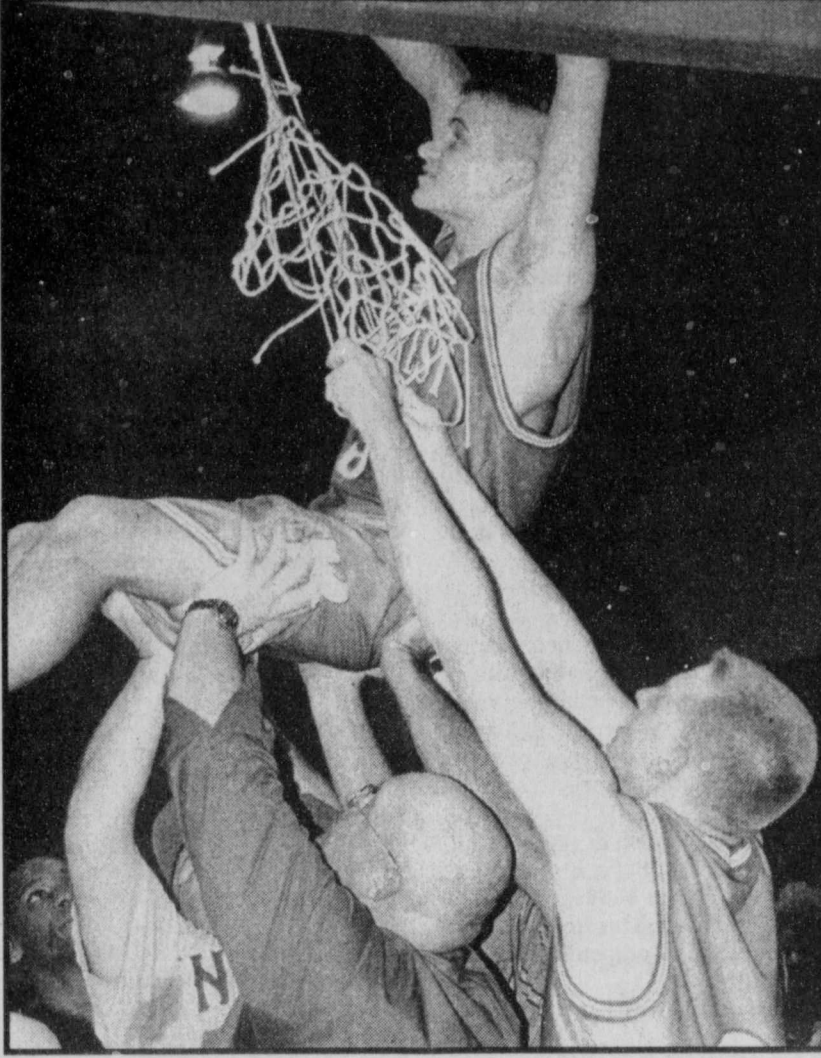

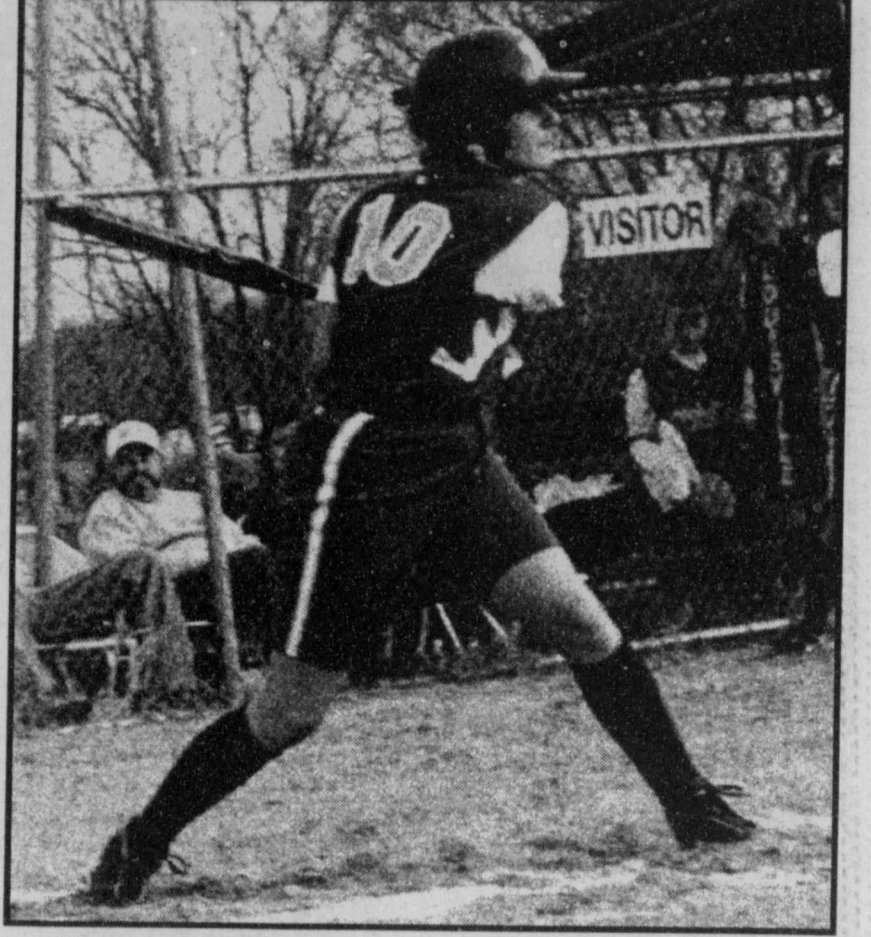

I called a long time friend, Mary Lou Hall to collect some local news this week and learned some interesting things.

Mary Lou and Roger live just west of Talco on what is known as Three Humps Road. They have always had farm animals, bailed their own hay and worked a garden and I knew Lou was an outdoor nut. Her yard is always beautiful and she has always slaved to keep it that way. But what I did not know was she is now collecting some unique animals along with her horses, cows, chickens, ducks, geese, pigs, cats and dogs. She has pigmy goats and emu's.

Alot of folks went through the get rich quick trip with emu's and ostrich's and some how Lou wound up with a male and female emu. It seems the female of the species lays eggs and her job is done. The male builds the nest, turns the eggs and cares for the young and that is exactly what her male is doing. He has made himself a nest right near the black top road and is busy attempting to raise a family. The female had laid 25 or more eggs but Lou, not wanting 25 baby emu's, stole one egg at a time until he only has 4. The eggs are large and deep green and look like a huge avocado. Lou informed me it will take 65 days for them to hatch and he has been at his baby raising for just over a month.

The bird will let Lou come near but her dog Toby and her pigmy goats or anything else that comes near is under attack.

Lou said folks that live on her road are watching along with she and Roger and awaiting the first crack of an egg and can't wait to see this oh-so-loyal father-to-be with his chicks. The loosey goosey mother could care less.

Lou also told me about one of her pigmy goats who produced 4 babies. Of course she got to raise 2 of them on a bottle due to a lack in the lunch room line on the mother. This year one of her mother goats has produced triplets. Lou was surprised recently when a lady from Ft. Worth called her and asked if she could bring her children to see Lou and Roger's animals. Of course, she was told yes and Lou laughingly calls her home her "petting zoo".

Lou is also a great baby sitter and not just for her grandchildren, Camen, Caley, Crystal and Brian, but for baby animals. Lou's sister, Betty owns a pet store in Ft. Worth and on occasion asks Lou to baby sit special animals when they have to be out of town. So far she has sat with a boa constrictor, a lion cub and a huge tortoise.

I thank Lou for my visit with her on her farm. I also will be waiting to see if the emu's babies hatch.
