When the James Wood family of Bogata looked up last Wednesday morning they had something strange looking hanging on their highline wires. After investigation, it seemed to be some kind of weather balloon, but it was a strange looking one, so they began trying to find out its origin. After exhausting all their resources, they finally took it to Bogata School to Science teach, Don Easterling, so that the students might benefit from it. Mr. Easterling got on the internet and found that it is a Radiosonde. A Radiosonde is a weather measurement instrument that measures upper air profiles of pressure, temperature and humidity, when launched into the upper atmosphere on a weather balloon. It had ascended to the upper atmosphere for about 1 1/2 hours to an altitude of 20 to 30 km. During its ascent the radiosonde transmitted data on weather conditions to the ground station, until the decreasing atmospheric pressure made the weather balloon larger and larger and it burst. After this the radiosonde and the balloon naturally fell down. He learned that a Vaisala radiosonde does not contain environmentally hazardous materials that would require special treatment. The Vaisala radiosonde was made in Vaisala, Helsinki and if it had been launched from Helsinki, it could have been sent back for a refund, but it was decided that this particular gizmo was probably launched in Oklahoma. 





for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) through March 31, 1999. The conservation program, a limited number of producers who have serious soil, water, and other

According to Steve R. Smith, District Conservationist for USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS), EQIP is not like the former Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) or Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP). This program is extremely limited and is for persons engaged in livestock or agricultural production who would provide the greatest environmental benefits at the least cost to the program.

"Applications will be prioritized after March 31, according to specific criteria," Smith continued. "After the Farm Service Agency (FSA) deter-


Acceptance into EQIP will require a 5 to 10 year contract, even if only one year of cost-share is needed. Contracts are for a maximum amount of \$50,000.00 with a maximum 75 percent cost-share.
